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## Three-Mile Underground Passage Heats Buildings and Campus.

If, when winter comes, you happen to walk across a green strip of grass amid the snow somewhere on campus and tip over some dandelion blooms (and don't laugh—it's happened before), don't attribute the phenomenon to commercial winds or monsoons or any of those other little things you studied in the fourth grade or during your freshman year. And don't say it is the changeable Michigan climate, even the chamber of commerce would hesitate at that. For the explanation, if you're still following, is quite simple: The college does all its heating from a central plant through a system of tunnels over three miles long. When the heat is turned on, the temperature in the tunnel runs up to around 140 degrees, and as a result there is sufficient leakage to warm the earth above it—to the point of producing dandelions in December.

When you have a strong desire to go through the tunnel, you run over to the building and grounds department and plead your case. The B & G outfit promptly sits on it and advises you to interview either President Shaw or Secretary Halladay. You finally do that, after several long delays. By the time you wonder whether you want to go through the tunnel or not you get an official okay. Then you continue as you did.

The head of the B & G staff looked at us with an amused smile and asked if we could stand heat. We reacted affirmatively and indignantly. After all, we had participated in spring parades. So the gentleman led the reporter (no remarks) into a turbine room that was as neat as a fraternity house after hell week and introduced us to the foreman. The foreman in turn put us in charge of a guide, after both had dropped a few odious reminders on the heat situation. Then the guide secured a thermometer, advised us to shed a couple layers of outer clothing, and we were off.

The tunnel opens at the end of the turbine room, where steam which has been used to produce the college power is released into the tunnel's capacity of heating our buildings. The pipes run along the sides of the arched, white-washed passage, along with college telephone, electricity and radio wires. At intervals they are bisected by expansion valves, which allow for changes in length at different temperatures, and which are also the source of the heat leakage. Occasionally, we are told, the heat was turned on so rapidly the valves were overtaxed, and the pipes were twisted over a foot out of position. Aside from this mechanical data, there is little to the cavern except its history.

According to our guide, the first branch of the tunnel was built more than 30 years ago. Usually called the west branch, it runs from the power house to Olds hall, sticks out an extension that provides for Wells, the English building, the gym and the armory, then turns off to the Library, Beaumont tower and Abbot hall. But at the same time he was thoroughly entertaining his public with an accurate and vivid running account of State's smashing and timely victory over the heralded Plaid of Pittsburgh. Graham McNamee was kind in his comments on this institution as he loudly praised State's beautiful campus, its competent officials, colorful stadium and hospitable citizens. If any of you have ever heard him describe the terrain around the Rose Bowl at Pasadena you will no doubt get a good picture of how your Alma Mater has been painted by the illustrious Graham, to your friends and my friends throughout the land.

The Michigan State Spartans remained undefeated Saturday when they conquered the strong Carnegie Tech eleven by a score of 13 to 6, and proved beyond a doubt

that their victory over the University of Michigan was not just a lucky break.

The Tartans brought almost a veteran team to East Lansing, the same outfit that held State's records for last year, and which was in charge of the nationally famous Wilkes, a center for Tech, would have put them in the twilight and brand the Spartans as one of the biggest teams in the mid-west, but until the end of the season the eyes of the football world will be fixed on Michigan State.

The entire State line, which not playing the injured ball that they played against Michigan, charged and batted hard to keep the play in Carnegie territory for most of the afternoon. Zindel and Beasley were the outstanding tacklers, and Baughis played a great defensive game.

Ray Reynolds, who piloted the Spartans at the University of Michigan game, was again at the quarterback position. He gave a great exhibition of running back Tech plays, and each in the third quarter he carried the ball around his own left end in a lateral pass for the first touchdown.

Tom McCarty, veteran fullback for State, played his usual smashing game. Several times he was called on to crack the middle of the Tartan line for the two yard needed for a first down, and in the third quarter he kicked a field goal and the kick for the point after touchdown.

Steve Sebo played one of the best games of his career. Once he got under way, he took three or four Tech tacklers to bring him down, and in the fourth quarter he hoisted a field goal from the 25 yard line.

Lou Zajac and Ed Kiewicki, holding down the ends for State, played great offensive as well as defensive ball. In the third quarter Kiewicki figured in a tricky lateral pass to Reynolds for a (Continued on page 4)

Answering Dean E. A. Hessey's question as to how many other schools had longer vacations than allowed here, Kindig cited figures on eleven prominent institutions to show that nearly all of them had more days off than Michigan State does.

Dean Emmons next stated that dismissing of classes on Wednesday noon had always resulted in a wholesale cutting by students on Wednesday morning and on the following Monday, to which it was pointed out that students had not cut excessively following the Spartan Day last week.

Dean Elisabeth Conrad then asked what would be done to entertain the students who were left here because they lived too far from East Lansing to go home for only three days. She stated that every year it had been necessary to keep the dormitories open since about one-third of the co-eds stayed here and the remaining students went home. As a suggestion for entertainment, it was suggested that perhaps the Student Council and the A. W. S. could cooperate in arranging some sort of an affair to entertain those students who stayed here.

Following this discussion, Kindig and Palmer then withdrew from the meeting and the faculty talked the matter over. At the conclusion of the meeting, President Shaw reported to the students that the faculty had passed a resolution to allow the vacation to remain as stated in the college catalog. No reason was given as to the faculty decision.
