GIVE PLANS FOR PERSHING CLUB

Company at Michigan State College Will Be Part of First Regiment

A company of Pershing Rifles is to be formed here, it may interest the students to know what to expect on joining this organization.

The company at Michigan State college will be part of the first regiment which includes companies at Ohio State, Indiana, Kentucky, Illinois and Dayton university. The entire national force consists of three brigades of three regiments each. At the drill contest this year to be held at Illinois all the companies will participate. The program for the day will be the drill contest in the afternoon and a formal dance and dinner in the evening.

Upon joining, each student is given a shingle and a fleur-de-lis and a blue and white cord worn on the left shoulder of a uniform. The cord was originally suggested by the Legion of Honor of France.

The purpose of the organization is to encourage the highest ideals of military proficiency to promote American citizenship and to provide appropriate recognition of a higher degree of military ability among cadets of the R. O. T. C.

FORESTERS STUDY MICHIGAN TREES

Quintet Travels to Federal Nurseries at East Tawas.

Accompanied by J. L. VanCamp, instructor in the forestry department, E. R. Baker, S. L. Gowing, L. B. Nugent and J. Tillinghast went on an interesting trip in connection with the seeding and planting course.

Traveling by auto, the quintet went first to the federal tree nursery at East Tawas. From there they proceeded to the Huron National forest to see the tree planting being done by the CCC camps in that area. They spent one day in that vicinity observing not only planting but also the cutting of jack pine for the purpose of the construction of fire lines, and for pulpwood. Another day was spent at the Higgins Lake state forestry and the Roscommon forest fire experiment station.

Student Government?

Several days have passed since the faculty voted to hold classes on the Friday following Thanksgiving. Although the students offered to go to classes a day longer at Christmas time, if they could be excused on November 30, the faculty, without giving any definite reasons, left the calendar exactly as outlined in the catalog.

Student government is supposed to function at Michigan State. The students asked to have one day added to the term in place of the Friday classes Thanksgiving week. Two students attended the faculty meeting last Monday and presented their case to the administrative group. After being overruled, several letters have been submitted to the News, stating the students' wishes, many of them in a very bitter and sarcastic vein. One of these is printed in today's issue.

The following excerpt from the Grand Rapids Herald printed a short time after the Michigan case, gives some idea of how other people feel about the college and its school spirit.

"Expected it would take about half the night to drive through East Lansing on the way back. Expected the whole of Michigan State would be out celebrating in true college fashion. But I met up with a State chap before I arrived there. To my surprise he said: 'No, there'll be no celebration in East Lansing tonight. You see we now have a faculty which doesn't believe in anybody showing any enthusiasm over anything. Our faculty now is opposed to traditions, so cap night and all that sort of thing has been abolished. The result is we have no such thing as college spirit at State any more and before long we'll have no enthusiasm for anything.' 'A few fellows will go there to shrivel up over their books but they'll all be wearing thick lensed glasses and be forgetting to put on their rubber when it rains. We are expecting to see them put the kibosh on football any time and then the college will start downhill rapidly.' 'As I look at it such an attitude on the part of the college faculty is about the most short sighted thing imaginable even though it developed that a half holiday was declared yesterday and a host of belated celebrations engaged in. If the only thing a boy is going to college for is to study, he won't have any love or loyalty for his alma mater and moreover he won't get very far in the world. More that is valuable in after life comes from the things a boy in college gets which are not in the books than from the things for which he burns the midnight oil trying to get-out-of-the-books.

Just to illustrate what I'm getting at, I had a classmate in college who was the only son of a widowed mother. It meant some sacrifice for him to go to college at all. He had a high sense of his responsibility to his mother and her circumstances at home. He entered and immediately settled down to his books. All he did was study. He was a fine student too. Moreover, we all liked him but we couldn't get him to engage in any of the college activities because he felt the most devoted all his time to his books that study was the one thing he went to college for. It was not until our junior year that we finally prevailed upon him to come into our fraternity to go out and play a little tennis and mix around in college affairs and engage in college antics at all.

At the end of his junior year he said, 'I've just discovered that I pretty nearly wasted my first two years here. I felt I owed it to my mother to devote all my time to my studies. I've just discovered how much there is to learn in college outside of the books. I'm enjoying college life now and I'm getting a lot out of it. Moreover, my studies, instead of falling down, are going up. I have more spirit for them than when I was making them just a grind. And that chap graduated with high honors and has done well since he left college. He found an education not all in the books.

So when I came through East Lansing Saturday night after Michigan State had won a great football game I didn't hear a single whoop, see a single bonfire or note any unusual activity on the part of the student body. My little college would have made more noise and shown more enthusiasm over an interclass game than State showed over a great victory over a great university's team. I don't know where these college profs are heading us—either in college or in government, and I guess nobody else, including themselves, does.

While this clipping written by Frank Sparks does not apply directly to the situation regarding Thanksgiving vacation, it does have some bearing on the present set-up.

Over One Hundred Co-eds Report for First Meeting

An enthusiastic response to the call of the Spartans Women's League for new members was evident when over 100 girls attended the first general meeting held in the league room Tuesday evening. To open the evening's program Miss Gertrude S. W. L. advisor welcomed all newcomers and outlined the plan of the league for the coming year. She was introduced by the president, Lorraine DeWilde, who conducted the entire meeting. Following Miss Gertrude's speech members of the board were introduced to the gathering.

The main purpose of this meeting was to explain the function and operations of the league to women new to the campus. This was carried out in a series of informal talks by the heads of the different activity committees which outlined the type of work done in their respective groups. In addition, the 25 most outstanding members of the organization were introduced and commended. These girls are now wearing ribbons of the colors of the league, which are pink and green.

A highlight of the evening was the introduction of the new point system adopted this year. Connie Magelzak, treasurer, explained its operation. Members will be given points for attending meetings and for taking a part in the various activity groups. When a girl has earned 200 points, she will be able to wear an S. W. L. pin. Board members will wear these pins immediately as soon as they have been selected and purchased.

As another important feature of Tuesday evening, Miss Alma Gostch, guest speaker, addressed the group on "Color in Everyday Life." Blanche Ross urged the girls to cooperate in attending pep meetings and in forming cheering sections at the games. The meeting closed with refreshments. 285 Students to Be Given Unlimited Cuts This Fall

Honor Roll Less Than Last Term; Liberal Arts Division Again Leads.

Two hundred and eighty-five students who have had a 'B' average or better for two consecutive terms will receive unlimited cut privileges for this term according to the report issued by J. W. Steward, college attendance officer. This number is approximately thirty-five less than last term.
