RULES OF FALL TRACK EVENTS ARE ANNOUNCED

Annual Handicap Track and Field Meet Will be Run Off This Week.

ENTRIES ARE LIMITED

Four Medals Will be Given to First Four Places in Each Event.

Coach Ralph H. Young, director of athletics at M. S. C., issued the regulations governing the annual fall track handicap track and field meet to be run of this week Thursday and next week Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday.

There are 12 track and field events, listed for the meet and all will be run on a handicap basis. The handicaps will be posted on the afternoon that the scheduled events will be run and all runners are requested to consult this list.

Four medals will be awarded in each event to the first four place winners. Medals will be gold for first, silver for second and bronze for third and fourth.

Any field event men who are out of class at 4 in the afternoon are asked to compete at 4:15 if possible to facilitate the speedy completion of the events.

The big day of the meet will be this Thursday. Events on this day will include 100 yard dash, 150 yard dash, 200 yard dash, 250 yard dash, 300 yard dash, 350 yard dash, 400 yard dash, 450 yard dash, 500 yard dash, 550 yard dash, 600 yard dash, 650 yard dash, 700 yard dash, 750 yard dash, 800 yard dash, 850 yard dash, 900 yard dash, 950 yard dash, 1000 yard dash.

- 1. Entries in this meet are limited to fall track and cross country candidates.
2. Four medals (gold, silver and two bronzes) will be given to the first four place winners in each event.
