AUSSC began considering additional candidates for the position following the unanimous passage of a resolution Sept. 10 by the trustees asking the Search and Selection Committee to come up with more names in addition to the four names submitted to the trustees Aug. 14.

At their last meeting with AUSSC Sept. 18, the trustees recommended Adams, former Gov. G. Mennen Williams, Jack Breslin, University secretary, and Durward Varner chancellor of Oakland University for consideration.

Hathaway said AUSSC is considering these names, and others. He said the committee may start interviewing new candidates for the position.

MSU board of trustees' chairman Don Stevens, D-Okemos, said Monday that no date has been set for the next meeting of the trustees with AUSSC. "We haven't had any word from the

Search and Selection Committee," Stevens said. "The ball is in their hands and they'll have to toss it back to us." Stevens said if AUSSC does not contact

him about an earlier meeting, the trustees may suggest a meeting on Oct. 16 or 17 at the time of the regular monthly board Stevens said he believes the Search and Selection Committee will consider the

recent petitions and statements of support for Adams in naming additional candidates. "I think the Search and Selection

Committee is giving great study to all the candidates and I think the opinions of



faculty, students and others will be considered," he said.

Stevens said he was "impressed" by the widespread support of deans, department heads and distinguished faculty award winners in the Henderson committee petitions.

"It's a good cross-section of support from the faculty. There's no question that he has wide student support. And many of the most distinguished citizens in Michigan have come out in support of Adams," Stevens said.

"And from my own point of view, I have always rated him among the best available for the office."

Both Stevens and Hathaway said they believe the next president will be chosen in accordance with the procedures set down in the Taylor Report.

"I have faith that the guidelines will be followed," Hathaway said.

"It is my view that he will be chosen according to those procedures. It will be best for the University if he is," Stevens

Congress unenthusiastic about draft lottery proposal

WASHINGTON (AP)--Secretary of Defense Melvin R. Laird got a cool reception Tuesday when he tried to persuade Congress that a draft lottery is the fairest way to let young men know their callup prospects.

Rep. F. Edward Hebert, D-La., chairman of a special house subcommittee hearing Presidnet Nixon's proposal, said the difference between the lottery and a plan the President could establish without congressional approval is "tweedle-dum and tweeldle-dee ."

The lottery plan would still leave most young men guessing as to just when they might be called, Hebert said.

And he said removal of the present congressional ban against a lottery--which is all Nixon asks-- would give the President "a blank check" to abandon the lottery proposal and establish any system he likes. "It would be a wide open game," Hebert

fiarest and simplest way to reduce the present seven-year draft-risk period to one year. He said its need is particularly urgent in view of administration hopes to significantly cut draft calls in the months

Reduced draft calls as a result of scaling down Vietnam troop levels and seeking more volunteer soldiers would raise the probable callup age and thus extend the period of draft uncertainty.

Under the Nixon plan, the 365 days of the coming year would be scrambled and drawn. Men whose 19th birthdays fall on the first dates drawn would be the first called, starting the following January. Birth dates drawn last would likely escape the draft entirely.

But committee members including Hebert and Rep. Samuel S. Stratton, D-N.Y., said a man who drew a middle number, like 260, could only guess when

he might be called or what his chances were of escaping the draft.

Rep. Alexander Pirnie, R-N.Y., pressed the long-standing argument that removal of draft uncertainty might reduce the motivation to enlist or join ROTC, National Guard and reserve units.

Asst. Secretary of Defense Roger T. Kelley said the lottery system's impact on the volunteer programs would work both

A man who drew a high number might be less motivated to enlist, he said, but a man who drew a low number-- and thus high draft susceptibility--would be even more inclined to enlist or join one of the volunteer programs.

Hebert indicated a preference for the "moving age group" system Nixon has said he will establish by executive order if Congress does not permit the lottery

6,000 American troops to leave Thailand bases SIAGON (AP)-The withdrawal of American troops from the Southeast Asia cauldron gained momentum Tuesday with the disclosure of plans to pull 6,000 soldiers and airmen out of Thailand and the departure of 1,000 more Marines from South Vietnam. Announcement of the impending U.S. troop reduction in Thailand came in a joint communique from United States and Thai leaders in Bangkok. It was much larger

President Nixon has ordered 60,000 American troops withdrawan from South Vietnam by Dec. 15. More than 25,000 already have left.

personnel would be withdrawn through

The 6,000 American servicemen are to be out of Thailand by next July, but the first units will leave within a few weeks. Other troops will follow "as expeditiously as possible, consistent with operation requirements related to the Vietnam conflict," the Thai-U.S. communique said.

The withdrawals will leave U.S. military strength at 484,000 in South Vietnam and 43,000 in Thailand.

The Thai government, sensitive to congressional criticism in the United States that American troops might be drawn into Thailand's border clashes with guerrillas, asked for talks on a cut in the force.

Although there are some American military advisers working with Thai units, the bulk of the U.S. troops are at six Air Force bases where bombing runs are staged against North Vietnamese infiltration routes through Laos. Informed sources say about 126 sorties--flights by single planes--are mounted out of Thailand daily. Of the 49,000 U.S. troops in Thailand, 36,000 are Air Force, 12,000 are Army support troops and 1,000 are military advisers. There was no information on what troops would be included in those to be withdrawn.





International News

West German's tiny Free Domocratic party decided Tuesday to give Willy Brandt's Social Democratic party first crack at forming a new coalition government.

But the mini-opposition group, main loser in Sunday's Bundestag election, kept the door open for a possible alliance with Chancellor Kurt George Kiesinger's Christian Democrats, still the country's strongest party.

The liberal Free Democrat leader, Walter Scheel, told newsmen that the party leadership, with a few exceptions, voted "to negotiate first with the Social Democratic party."

Scotland Yard conceded defeat Tuesday in its bid to get black policemen for an integrated force, because immigrants won't serve.

"There is nothing we can do if colored applicants do not come forward," said Chief Supt. Kenneth Lee, who heads the yard's community relations branch.

"It would seem that colored boys are afraid that if they join the police they will be shunned by their fellows.'

National News

President Nixon, who got less than half the votes cast in the 1968 election, lent his support Tuesday to legislation providing for election of the president by a direct popular vote.

He endorsed the proposed constitutional amendment passed earlier this month by the House and urged the Senate to adopt it.

Acting Majority Leader Edward M. Kennedy and Minority Leader Hugh Scott expressed hope that the measure can pass the Senate this year by the required two-thirds margin.

To become the 26th Amendment to the Constitution, the election reform must be ratified by the legislatures of 38 states, a formidable obstacle to its becoming law in time for the 1972 general election.

After 17 years on the launching pad, pay television entered the final countdown Tuesday for a December launching--unless Congress decides to call the whole thing off.

The U.S. Court of Appeals, in a crucial decision, upheld the authority of the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) to permit television broadcasts that can be received in the home only upon payment of a fee.

The FCC rules are already in effect and the commission has said it would start authorizing pay-TV operations 60 days after a court decision, unless Congress intervenes.

As approved by the FCC, a pay-TV station would broadcast a scrambled signal that could be converted into a picture on a home received only with the aid of a decoder, for a fee.

AFL-CIO leaders said Tuesday in Atlantic City that President Nixon's "blunderbuss" policies of tight money and high interest have failed to halt inflation and threaten to plunge the nation's economy into a recession.

"The government's restrictive policies, tight money and unprecedented high interest rates contribute to rising living costs, hit residential construction and threaten rising unemployment and recession," they said.

"These policies of general restraint are dangerously wrong," said a report by the 29-man policy-making executive council of the 13.6-million-member labor federation.

Michigan News

A small group of dissidents at Detroit Northern High School, unable to stir up a massive student protest even with the help of a fire alarm, marched, instead, on the board of education headquarters Tuesday.

There they presented a host of demands--ranging from barring all police from the inner city campus to replacing all pictures of whites at the school with portraits of black leaders such as Malcolm X, H. Rap

Brown and Stokely Carmichael. School administrators promised to "look at" the demands, but no time was set for another meeting.

A power failure hit two of Detroit's biggest office buildings Tuesday morning, but the only persons seriously affected were secretaries who had no juice for their electric typewriters.

Lights blinked out about 7:30 a.m. at the General Motors Corp., World Headquarters and across the street at the 28-story Fisher Bldg.

The Detroit Edison Co., supplier of electricity to both office complexes, said the two failures were a freak coincidence. The trouble at the Fisher Bldg. was caused by a power company cable failure, Edison said, but the fault at GM lay in internal equipment.

U-M back to normal after strike try fizzles

The University of Michigan (U-M) returned to normal Tuesday after a strike protesting the U-M administration's policy regarding a proposed bookstore failed Monday.

After having their numbers ! reduced from 500 to less than 100, the picketers gathered in Regents Plaza Monday night to discuss future action.

The leaders of the strike said that the purpose of Monday night's meeting was to "give the board of regents a chance" to change their minds about how the bookstore should be run.

U-M officials replied that it was "highly unlikely" that the regents would hold an emergency session. The regents tonight on third floor Union. are next scheduled to meet Oct. The public is invited to attend.

The bookstore issue mushroomed into a major student-police confrontation last Thursday night when 108 demonstrators were arrested in the Literature, Science and Arts Bldg. after a 14-hour sit-in.

Angered by the arrests and the refusal of the regents to negotiate their demands, strike leaders urged a boycott of classes on Monday, in which less than 10 per cent of U-M's 37,000 students participated.

The most important of the students' demands was complete student-faculty control of the bookstore, rather than university control with a student-faculty advisory committee, as approved by the regents.







Making our collective voice heard

Criticism has been mounting recently against what some have termed "pressure tactics" in the form of petitions by students and faculty on the issue of MSU president.

Certain people, notably a few professors, view the petition drives currently being conducted as hampering the Search and Selection Committee's ability to select names for submission to the trustees.

As Dena C. Cederquist, chairman, Dept. of Foods and Nutrition, said in a letter to The State News yesterday, "Pressures are being applied to the board (of trustees) by labor groups, political parties, faculty and student groups . . . a faculty petition is as inappropriate a pressure tactic as is a political party petition.

While it would certainly be unfortunate if a president were chosen out of pressure, pressure, nonetheless, has already been applied to the board from every group which has, or thinks it has, a vested interest in the University.

Pressure from labor groups, political groups and Daughters of the American Revolution should be viewed by the trustees as immaterial when the time comes to choose a president.

This is not the case, however, with the wishes of students and faculty. It is, after all, these groups who shall most be affected by the trustees' decision.

Nor do we see student and faculty petitions as coercion or pressure placed upon the trustees. It must be remembered that it is the Search and Selection Committee who is being petitioned to consider various prospective candidates, not the board. We see this as being completely within the framework of the Taylor Report. Search and selection is, above all, a sounding board for student and faculty opinion. We are merely attempting to insure that our collective voices are heard by the committee. The petition drives are a communication between students and faculty and the Committee, not a usurption of the committee's power.

The petition drives began because we have not been insured that the trustees will choose to name one of the Search and Selection Committee's recommended candidates. Indeed, since the original list of four was turned back to the committee by the board, we have very little insurance they will follow the committee's recommendations. We are doing nothing more than

insuring that our voices are heard. We can ill-afford to sit idle while the most important decision this University faces is reached without regard to student or faculty sentiment.

Presided over by the winged figure of Eros, god of love, hundreds of students from all over the world gather everyday in the heart of London to sit and philosophize while watching the teeming city life go by.

The attraction of this Piccadily Circus haven is part of the attraction all of England has for young people today and the reason it is becoming a world hangout

Why England and not America? In a sense, England stands for much of what students are demanding in the United States today--such things as caring for one's fellow man, individual prerogative and non-violence. Almost invariably an American visiting England finds the contrast with his own country obvious and embarrassing.

Where the average American will let the rat race get the best of him, the British remain good-tempered and polite. And an Englishman is willing to give his help in circumstances where an American probably

would not take the time. For instance, a shopkeeper who sees a tourist confused with pounds and shillings will often take time out to explain the British monetary system. If it's a question of how to get to Westminster Abby from Trafalgar Square, a stranger is never lost long-he might even find himself escorted! Even during rush hour in the subway, the British never shove or get impatient.

"Don't push, dear," his mother said. "But we'll miss the train!" the lad

"No we won't," the mother replied, "and if we do, there will be another one along." Would it happen in a New York subway? When a small dog dashed in front of an English lorry and was unavoidably hit, the driver got out, wrapped the dog up while a concerned crowd offered suggestions, and then took the animal to be cared for. Would an American driver even stop?


Violence is never romanticized by the British and consequently one can walk almost anywhere, day or night, without fear in England. Policemen carry no guns. In addition to the gentleness of English civilization, there exists a respect among men and the belief that the business of life should never transcend human values. Tranquility is more important than corporation profits. With a small protest, and a few letters to a newspaper, citizens have stopped objectionable government and big business plans. In England, one can still win a fight with city hall. This is especially attractive to Americans, who feel the whole country could stand on its head in protest and still find ABM's in their

In many ways England is more liberal than the United States. Abortion is legal. Fashion more free. Art more experimental and tolerance more prevalent. Still, England remains rational on issues big and small, while America gives way to near hysteria over race, poverty and war.

While America's problems may be more severe, she has not yet been forced to try to adjust gracefully to dwindling world

power. England has succeeded in this difficult task, while forced to live among memories of a much grander past. And now she has become a leader in new ways--fashion, theatre and movies, the arts-and has captured the admiration of the youth of the world of the world.

America could stand to take some lessons from her mother country.





Charges dropped, Green Berets head home

BIEN HOA, Vietnam (AP)-With the traditional V-for-victory sign, seven of the eight Green Berets arrested in the alleged slaying of a Vietnamese spy headed home Tuesday after the Army dropped all charges against them.

The eighth member of the group in the secrecy-cloaked case remained behind because he had not completed processing, military spokesmen said.

Led by Col. Robert B. Rheault, commander of all Green Berets in Vietnam until the case broke, the departing Special Forces officers were put aboard a charter plane carrying 212 other homebound servicemen to Travis Air Force Base in California.

The eight Green Berets are due to go on leave while the Army

"I'd just as soon have completed my tour," the 43-year-old Rheault, dressed in jungle fatigues and a green beret, said on department.

Capt. Robert F. Marasco, 27, of Bloomfield, N.J. who had been named by the Army as the alleged trigger man in the case, said: "It's great to be going."

The widow of the allegedly slain Vietnamese agent said: "The soul of my husband will follow those who killed him. The Americans are worse than the Viet Cong! I'm going to blow up the Americans. They are more cruel and savage than the Communists."

Chuyen was reportedly slain June 20 near the Special Forces

wrapped in a sack and dumped into the South China Sea, never to be found. Attorneys for the Green Berets had said the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) approved the slaying after Chuyen was discovered to be working for North Vietnamese and Americans at the same time. The CIA denied any such

Army Secretary Stanley R. Resor announced Monday that Rheault and five other Green Berets specifically charged with murder and conspiracy could not be court-martialed, because the CIA refused to furnish witnesses.

Though the charges against the men were dropped, controversy still swirled around the case.

Among many unanswered questions was why the Army had

pressed so vigorously to have the men tried and what, if any, role Gen. Creighton W. Abrams Jr., commander of all U.S. forces in Vietnam, played in the decision.

Rheault told newsmen Tuesday that the case involved a "penetration agent"--a spy who had infiltrated the American intelligence network. Asked if the spy was Chuyen, he replied: "I believe so."

Customs agents praise drug check

SAN YSIDRO, Calif. (AP)-Operation Intercept, the Nixon Administration's crackdown on narcotics traffic from Mexico, is drawing protests from both sides of the border-- but not from the men who implement it.

"For my money, the whole operation is a great idea," says customs agent Sanuel May, who inspects pedestrians and vehicles at this major California checkpoint between San Diego, Calif., and Tijuana, Mexico.

"If it cuts the supply of dope to the smalltime dealers who push it to the school kids, that's reason enough."

The 35 customs agents regularly assigned here are getting help from 30 borrowed from stations around the country. They're all getting a workout. A few have been temporarily overcome by fumes from engines of lined-up cars. Some have suffered backstrain from lifting hundreds of hoods and trunk lids.

Operation Intercept, aimed primarily at drying up the flow of marijuana and, thus, making it too expensive for young people, has been criticized by businessmen on both sides of the border. Protests have been heard in Congress.

And Mexican President Gustavo Diaz Ordaz has termed it a "bureaucratic mistake" that has "raised a wall of suspicion between our two peoples."



Army accused of hushing up gambling fraud

WASHINGTON (AP) — A senate witness accused the Army Tuesday of muzzling a probe into the rigging of slot machines at U.S. servicemen's clubs because of fear the facts might implicate its top non-commissioned officers (NCO) and embarrass a former chief of staff.

Irvin A. Beard, a former Army criminal investigator, testified under oath his inquiries led him to believe former Sgt. Maj. William O. Wooldridge was a leader of a clique of sergeants he said skimmed up to \$350,000 a year from slot machine profits at clubs of the 24th Infantry Division at Augsburg, Germany.

Sen. Abraham A. Ribicoff, D-Conn., said he would send copies of Beard's testimony to Gen. Harold Johnson, former Army chief of staff, and invite him to testify.

Ribicoff is presiding at hearings of a Senate investigations subcommittee which for eight months has probed allegations that some sergeants who managed the more than 2,000 Army recreation clubs around the world conspired to loot them.

Johnson was chief of staff in 1966 when Wooldridge was elevated from his position as divison sergeant major at Augsburg and brought to Washington to be the Army's top enlisted man.

David Thomas, attorney for Wooldridge and two other

David Thomas, attorney for Wooldridge and two other sergeants, told reporters after the hearing he may advise his clients to invoke the 5th Amendment "if they are asked questions which may tend to incriminate them." He characterized Beard's testimony as "opinion, speculation, conjecture, and very definitely unfair."

Beard testified Army investigators found many slot machines had been equipped with a jumper, a device used to prevent them from paying jackpots.

Beard said the Army required the gambling devices to return a profit from 60 to 70 per cent. He said his check over a four-year period showed an average profit of only 52 per cent.

"My statistical analysis convinced me that the custodians, managers and other personnel connected with the club system of the 24th Division were stealing between \$300,000 and \$350,000 annually from the slot machines in the Augsburg-Munich area alone, and that the theft had been going on for an extended time," Beard said.

Beard added that evidence sufficient to bring criminal

convictions had been lacking.

But he said he became convinced the sergeants "were engaged in a criminal conspiracy which involved systematic larceny of nonappropriated funds, property and services for their own benefit and enrichment."

He labeled Wooldridge "a leader in the criminal organization." And he said the results of his investigation were swept under an official rug by an order which closed the case with a single, locally filed police report. He said normal procedure would have required a full report to officials in the United States.

He said the decision to stop the investigation was made at a meeting of military police officers in Frankfurt in May 1967.

History class experiment set for Shaw

The men of Shaw Hall are taking part in a University experiment. A series of classes on Historians 'Views of Problems in American Foreign Policy' is being offered on a pass-fail basis.

The classes, instituted at the request of Jim Emery, East Shaw Hall sophomore, and other Shaw Hall students, are being offered through the College of Arts and Letters.

The class is one hour of credit.

Shaw Hall is populated mostly by engineering and science students who do not have time for four- or five-hour regular courses, Paul Varg, dean of the College of Arts and Letters, said. The men of Shaw Hall petitioned the college to make more courses available to them.

A different professor will lecture every Wednesday on a topic related to American foreign policy. The first lecture will be presented by Dean Varg.

Classes on this basis will also be offered winter and spring terms in Shaw Hall. There are no plans for expanding the program to include other living units.

MADISON, Wis. (AP)--Helmeted police backed up by National Guardsmen with fixed bayonets Tuesday repeatedly turned back welfare demonstrators who marched on the Wisconsin Capitol for the second straight day.

The rebuff brought a switch in tactics by the protestors led by the Rev. James E. Groppi, militant civil rights activist from A brief sitdown produced a monumental noon hour traffic jam on the highways circling the capitol in the heart of Madison's

business district. Then they halted their march for a prayer meeting at the feet of police and guardsmen who started straight ahead in stony silence. Demonstrators vowed to keep marching around the building

until the legislature restores welfare appropriations slashed from the state budget proposed by Gov. Warren P. Knowles. But their chances of a replay of Monday's one-hour takeover of the Assembly chambers, thwarting a joint session of the legislature, seemed to have been dimmed by the show of civil and

military force. Moreover, Circuit Judge William C. Sachtjen signed a temporary injunction obtained by Atty. Gen. Robert Warren barring Groppi and his followers from disrupting government activities in the

During a third confrontation at the Capitol doors, Groppi was served with copies of the temporary restraining order. The priest glanced quickly at the order and announced to the crowd he would consult with his attorney at the church he has

been using as his headquarters two blocks from the capitol. "We don't know what's in here," Groppi said. "We will decide whether or not it shall be obeyed.' The two houses of the Legislature met today as guardsmen ringed the Capitol. Members called for emergency steps to
