# Area high school press free of obscenities

EDITOR'S NOTE: State News Staff Writer David Bassett researched the following article as part of a State News study on area high schools. Watch for articles on high school dress codes and further examination of high school regulations in this Sunday's State News.

Obscenity, an area of vociferous controversy in many college newspapers, seems to have passed over the heads of high school journalists in the East Lansing-Lansing-Okemos schools.

While not totally absent from rough drafts, profanity never appears in high school newspapers in this area.

Only one school, Okemos Senior High,

has seen what approaches profanity, and that occurred early last year in a newspaper which did not have faculty supervision.

Carl White, faculty adviser of the East Lansing High School Trojan Trumpet, said the newspaper requires only that "reasonable standards of quality and good taste prevail," and that this standard has never been broached as far as he knows.

White also said that school policy prohibits students from printing that which could encourage "disruptive acts within the

"Students may print anything which is responsible and in good taste," White said. East Lansing High School also became the home of this area's only functioning

underground high school paper last year. Dubbed the Achilles Heel, this paper is somewhat more radical than its "establishment" counterpart.

White said that while the Trojan Trumpet is written primarily by, for and about "straight" students, the Achilles Heel is much more liberal in its editorial policy.

In the past, the latter paper has printed such things as two articles condemning a guest speaker from ROTC, liberal criticism of the school's administrative policy and satires on the Vietnam war.

Okemos High School's newspaper adviser, Frank Crane, also notes a definite absence of profanity. However, Okemos is in a much different situation from East

Lansing High, due to the fact that Okemos has not had a regular student paper in several years.

"For the past few years," Crane said, "this school had a paper with almost no faculty supervision. It was printed infrequently and clandestinely, and contained a great many vulgarities.

"As a result," he added, "we are now trying to merely get the paper off the ground. We have a very bright staff, and, in time, they may become more radical and/or obscene.

"The kids are allowed to draw their own guidelines," Crane concluded, "and up to this point have shown no indication that they plan to use offensive words."

Lansing's Eastern High School, while drawing from a less economically and culturally stable area than either East Lansing or Okemos, also noted few problems of censorship in its student publications.

Hugh Spagnuolo, adviser of the Eastern paper, said that his students have refrained from the use of profanity in the past.

"We might permit them to print 'hell, yes' or 'damn sure' " Spagnuolo said, "but that is about the limit. I don't think the parents would stand for much more than

"However," he continued, "I think the greatest reason for the lack of obscenity in our paper has been the fact that the students don't want to offend anyone.

"Most of our students come from middle or lower-middle class families, and as a result, they are upward-motivated and anxious to conform," he added.

Ironically, Eastern was the scene of extensive picketing earlier this week as students protested the alleged beating of a student by Robert Johnson, the school's principal.

Several staff members of the Eastern paper added that they aren't concerned with profanity in their publication. They said rather that they hope to improve its quality by the addition of items of cultural and world interest.

### Calif. students granted voice in tenure cases

RIVERSIDE, CALIF. (AP) - Professors at the University of California at Riverside reacted with cautious approval -- and some reservations -- Wednesday to their chancellor's order that students have a voice in faculty promotions.

The student evaluation policy, made public Wednesday, will apply to all nine University of California campuses in the state. It was drawn up by university President Charles Hitch over the summer and specifies that a department chairman must include "evaluations of the candidates solicited from students concerning the candidates' teaching effectiveness..." in any statement to a promotion committee considering a faculty member for high rank or tenure.

The new policy was disclosed in a speech by Riverside Chancellor Ivan Hinderaker. Previously few faculty members on any of the nine campuses knew about it, but at Riverside, biochemistry professor Randolph Wedding said, "I think it's fine."

Hinderaker told students and faculty that all future faculty evaluations on the 20,000-student campus will be based in part on student evaluations of a candidate's teaching. He directed academic departments to set up machinery for the

Noting that he had suggested two years ago that the departments initiate the same policy on their own, he declared: "The academic community has a reputation for being outspokenly liberal on political issues affecting other people. Yet we, in the academic community, have tended to be rigidly conservative on anything affecting ourselves or the way we teach or the structure in which we function as

### Rally reveals 17,033 names tavor Adams

There were 17,033 signatures supporting Acting President Adams when students delivered their petitions to student representatives of the All-University Search and Selectin Committee (AUSSC) at a rally Wednesday afternoon.

The petitions, which have been circulating for 10 days, ask that Adams' name be added to the list of AUSSC candidates for the University presidency. The student petition drive had more signatures than there were voted in Choice '68, the mock college balloting for the U.S. President last fall.

It had more signatures than Mayor Gerald Graves of Lansing had votes to be elected to that office.

It had more than twice the participation that the ASMSU spring elections had.

It was, according to Chuck Mostov, ASMSU board vice chairman, "the greatest petition drive ever at MSU."

One trustee, a faculty member, a dean

and the ASMSU board chairman spoke as

the petitions were turned over to Milke Hudson, black student representative to AUSSC, and Mike Geizer, undergraduate student representative. Jack Bain, dean of the College of

Communication Arts, told the approximately 400 students at the rally that the University "definitely needs an academician" as its president.

"We now have a man who is such a person and will always be such a person even if you take the acting away from his title," Bain said. "Walter Adams has a Walter Adams

### Fervent 400 at Adams rally

Despite the damp ground and chilly weather, about 400 people attended Wednesday's rally for Acting President Adams at Beaumont Tower. Even a faithful canine follower voiced his opinion (which sounded favorable) of the goings on.

The crowd cheered loudly when ASMSU Vice Chairman Chuck Mostov announced that there were a greater number of signatures on the Adams petitions than the number of votes that elected the present mayor of Lansing.

### Adams issues 3-point policy on moratorium

Acting President Adams issued a three-point statement Wednesday concerning the Oct. 15 moratorium to discuss the war in Vietnam. The statement said that

-- Faculty members wishing to suspend classes during the moratorium may do so. but must notify students in advance and provide for make-up sessions or self-study assignments to cover the work scheduled for that day.

--Students who wish to absent themselves from classes Oct. 15 may do so without

-- University facilities will be made available to student groups certified by ASMSU and to faculty groups who wish to participate "in orderly discussions and peaceful expressions of conscience on Oct. 15" so long as activities do not interfere with the normal academic processes.

"In doing so, the University recognizes that the decision to demonstrate moral outrage or civic dissent by peaceful means is a matter of personal conscience and individual discretion rather than a matter of institutional fiat," Adams' statement

Adams' statement came at the request of the Academic Council, which passed a resolution similar to the statement

The MSU American Assn. of University Professors (AAUP) has also endorsed the council action.

# Milliken praises Adams, holds moratorium views

Gov. Milliken Wednesday praised Acting President Adams but did not actively endorse him to fill the position permanently.

He said he would not interfere in a matter that is a concern of the board of trustees, but, he added, "I would offer my observation that Dr. Adams has done a tremendous job in the time he has been in office.

"I think everyone in this state owes him a debt of gratitude for the job he has done," Milliken continued. "He has demonstrated that he has gained the faith of students and faculty, and I think he should be commended.'

Milliken noted the Wednesday State News editorial commended Adams for his "wit and cool," and commented that he certainly should be praised for that.

On another subject, Milliken said he has not taken a position on the Vietnam war moratorium, but said it "upholds the American tradition of dissent and protest. "I find it difficult to urge that classes be shut down, but if the campuses do this,

they should be rescheduled." At his press conference, Milliken also refused to indicate a preference for the successor to Ira Polley, who abruptly resigned Monday as State Superintendent

of Public Instruction. "They (the State Board of Education) have gotten themselves into this unfortunate situation and they must get themselves out," he said.

"I hope the man will be competent, but it may not be easy to get one" for the job, he added.

The governor also discussed financing of his educational reform measures, indicating he would spell out specific proposals Friday when he addresses the legislature.

But he disagreed with Sen. Harry DeMaso, R-Battle Creek and chairman of the Taxation and Veteran Affairs Committee, who said the money could be raised for education if the tax loopholes were plugged.

The lawmakers are extremely hesitant to raise taxes with an election year coming up, but Milliken added, "I do not think we can raise the money without raising taxes." He said that the toes of some sacred cows will be stepped on in the process.

"You can seldom move in any direction without stepping on some toes. But you must move in that direction which is in the public interest."

The state's chief executive also brought up the program to be instituted by the Michigan Dept. of Public Health in combating an expected epidemic of the German measles or rubella.

The state is spending more than \$1 million for the vaccine alone to administer initially to kindergarten through third grade students, in the hopes that they will not contract the disease and carry it to an expectant mother.

Although some 80 per cent of child bearing age women are immune to rubella, if those other 20 per cent succumb to the illness while in the early stages of pregnancy, the unborn child will likely be born abnormal.

In a New York study concerning 344 births where the mother had been ill, only 73 of the children were born normal. By the cyclical nature of the disease, health officials are expecting an epidemic

as large as that of 1964-65 when 29,000 cases were reported in Michigan. Already this year there are 4,000 reported cases, while only 1,900 were reported all last year.

Griffin's move prompted at least one other influential Republican senator to join the opposition and caused a Democratic leader to comment that there now is "serious question" that Haynsworth could be confirmed.

Maine's Margaret Chase Smith, chairman of the conference of all Republican senators, said in a floor speech she opposes Havnsworth on the basis of his business dealings and decisions while a member of the 4th Circuit Court of Appeals since 1957.

She said Republican opposition to the nomination in the Senate is much greater "than is generally realized."

Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, the asst. Democratic leader, said there is "serious question" of Haynsworth receiving a sufficient support for confirmation.

Kennedy declined to say how he stands. But he said he still expects the Judiciary Committee to report the nomination to the floor although he said the vote will be "much closer" than before the Griffin announcement.

A Republican member of the committee, Maryland's Sen. Charles C. McMathias, R-Md. also declined to say how he will vote in committee or on the floor.

Mathias refused to guess how many Republicans might vote against Haynsworth but said in answer to a question that 19 was a "logical estimate."

Griffin, who notified the President of his decision Monday, said he believes Haynsworth to be an "honest and learned judge."

"But," he added, "legitimate and substantial doubt has been raised concerning his sensitivity to the high ethical standards demanded of the bench."

# CUA condemns University for maintaining slave caste

American society, including the University, is maintaining a slave caste from which blacks cannot escape, according to representatives of the MSU Center for Urban Affairs (CUA).

The possibility of the existence of a slave caste in America was the theme of "The Rightness of Whiteness" dialogue conducted Monday and Tuesday nights as part of the Holmes Hall dialogue series.

The program was presented by members of the white community organization staff of the CUA and volunteers from the United Ministries for Higher Education and the University Christian

Al Hurwitz, of the CUA staff, said the existence of a slave caste is distinguished by five characteristics. They are: (1) The slave caste must be made to feel inferior. (2) The master caste must feel superior. (3) The slave caste must

feel that what is good for the master is good for them. (4) The master caste must perceive the slave caste as a threat to their superiority. (5) The slave caste must recognize that they exist at the pleasure of the master caste.

Hurwitz said class and caste are different. A person can rise above his class, but there is "no escape from the assigned caste."

The majority of the time both nights was used for small group discussion of the slave caste concept and its application to modern America. The program concluded Tuesday night with a discussion of racism, the University and society. MSU is "an example of white supremacy and white privilege," Michael Geizer, a student staff member of CUA, said.

"The admission tests given here are, in fact, based on white middle-class culture," he said. A caste system is established in the University and it is assumed black culture is inferior.

### International News

American ground forces reported no contacts with the enemy Wednesday as a battlefield lull continued throughout South Vietnam, the U.S. Command reported.

Headquarters said U.S. helicopter gunships and artillery outfits reported killing 20 North Vietnamese 60 to 75 miles north of Saigon. Air Force B52s flew three missions against suspected enemy targets along the Cambodian border, down from the average of eight missions flown every 24 hours by the heavy bombers. No American casualties were reported.

An Arab guide and an American student priest testified in an Israeli court Wednesdaythat Denis Michael Rohan was demented by religious fanaticism before he set fire to the Al Aksah mosque in Jerusalem's Old City.

The 28-year-old Australian defendant seemed amused

Rohan, said by his defense counsel to have been mentally ill when he tried to burn down the 1,400-year-old mosque Aug. 21, chuckled as the Arab guide testified.

Egypt declared Wednesday it would accept the so-called Rhodes formula for negotiating asettlement with Israel, the same formula used to bring both sides to an armistice 20 years ago.

A government spokesman said in Cairo that Egypt remains resolutely opposed to any direct talks with Israel, but that the 1949 Rhodes formula would be acceptable because it did not constitute direct negotiations.

Britains opposition Conservatives pledged Wednesday full backing for the efforts of Prime Minister Harold Wilson's government to pacify Northern Ireland's feuding communities and to outlaw religious and other discrimination in that troubled land.

More than 4,000 delegates attending the annual convention of the Conservative Party voted unanimously for a resolution that backs the Labor government's main aims.

Two South American jetliners were hijacked to Cuba Wednesday, the second anniversary of the death of Ernesto "Che" Guevara, hero of the Cuban revolution.

It was not known whether there was any connection between the hijackings and the anniversary. Guevara was an Argentine-born revolutionary killed by Bolivian soldiers when trapped with a band of guerillas Oct. 8, 1967.

One of the planes was a Miami-bound Aerolineas Argentinas jet carrying 54 passengers and 17 crew members. Four Americans were reported aboard.

### National News

Magdalene Sinclair, wife of imprisoned White panther Party Leader John Sinclair and two other Ann Arbor White panthers are awaiting a hearing before a New Jersey Grand Jury on charges of possessing narcotics.

Mrs. Sinclair, 22, appeared in Oakland, N.J. Municipal Court Monday with acting White Panther leader Lawrence Plamondon and Plamondon's wife. The three waived a probable cause hearing in favor of a grand jury which will decide whether there is enough evidence to hold them for trial.

The case was expected to be heard in about two months and the three were released on bond.

A policeman who posed as a hippie and served as a body guard for Yippie leader Jerry Rubin during the 1968 Democratic Convention testified Wednesday that he heard Rubin and Black Panther leader Bobby G. Seale urge crowds to battle police.

Robert Pierson, a 10-year veteran of the Chicago Police Dept., testitied for two-and-a-half hours.

Seale, Rubin and six others are charged with conspiring to incite violence during the convention in August 1968. They are on trial in U.S. District Court before Justice Julius J. Hoffman.

Pierson testified that he let his hair grow, grewa beard and purchased motorcyclist clothing for his role as an undercover worker.

# Polley's successor may be discussed

Atty. Gen. Frank J. Kelley said Wednesday that the State Board of Education may hold a closed meeting to discuss choosing a successor to Ira Polley, former superintendent of public instruction, but may take no formal action at such a meeting.

Kelley's statement came in response to a request made Tuesday by Leroy Augenstein, member of the State Board of Education, regarding the validity of decisions made at private meetings of the board.

"The State Board of Education is required to hold a public meeting open to the public for the purpose of taking formal action to accept the resignation of the superintendent of public instruction and for the purpose of appointment of his successor," Kelley said.

Kelley based his decision on a clause in the Michigan Constitution of 1963 which requires all

governing boards of educational institutions of higher learning, when convened for the transaction of business, to meet in public session.

"The State Board of Education, as a state board performing an essential governmental function of supervision and control of public education, is required by law to hold a public meeting," he explained.

He added that according to Article VIII, Sect. 4, of the constitution, any action passed at an executive or private meeting would be invalid.

However, he said private or executive meetings where no business was transacted were not formal sessions requiring admittance of the

"Private meetings are rarely necessary and should be actively discouraged," he added. Polley resigned his position on Monday, after

learning last weekend that the State Board of Education was planning to oust him because of his refusal to support the board's existence.

# Bill aims at control of obscene calls

offensive phone calls is guilty only of disorderly conduct. Under the Anderson bill, it is a specific misdemeanor to use a telephone to terrorize, threaten, frighten, intimidate, harass, molest or annoy a person.

The bill also prohibits the use of vulgar, indecent or offensive language or the suggestion of a lewd act; falsely reporting that a person has been injured or killed; or deliberately disengaging a telephone to tie up service.

"Many persons, including myself, have had personal experience of the annoyance and fright that can be caused by an anonymous caller," Anderson pointed out. "It is a malicious type of crime and one in which in most cases the victims are women."

The bill had been passed by the House but had to be approved a second time because of several minor amdenments made in the Senate.



Some might argue that classes should have arbitrarially been cancelled as a gesture of the University's disgust with the war. case, but in the event someone sincerely believes this stand, it would be a mistake to usurp their rights.

The only hang-up with the council's decision is that now the burden of decision rests with the professor. If he cancels class, there still remains the possibility that some student might be denied the opportunity to attend class on a day he feels it is symbolically important to do so. If he does not cancel class, however, he could be violating his personal moral judgment.

The confusion is lessened, however, if one considers the discuss the issue, irrespective of one's views should be heard next Wednesday, for this is the only manner in which intelligent debate can be conducted.

# Hurdling the obstacles toward direct election

The passage of an electoral reform amendment to the Constitution got a boost recently when President Nixon reversed his opinion of earlier this year for a proportional-vote system and proposed a direct election of the President. Whether Mr. Nixon's prestige will be enough to carry the amendment past its many obstacles remains uncertain.

Electoral reform has been an issue in many elections, but only after the extremely close results in November of 1968 has it taken on epic proportions. The chances for passage of an electoral reform proposal were doubtful, at best, a few weeks ago. But the House convincingly (83% in favor) passed the proposal for direct election of the President and, in doing so, brought out Mr. Nixon's needed support.

As one will recall, the President hac stated after his election that he was in favor of direct election. But he advocated the proportional-vote system because he didn't feel that the direct election could pass. This system would divide a state's total electoral vote according to the percentages of actual votes recorded. The recent passage in the House convinced the President that chances were now good, to very good, that the Senate and at least three-fourths of the state legislatures (38) could be persuaded to join the initiative of the representatives in Washington.

The passage through the state legislatures will be the more time-consuming of the two and will provide the major hurdles for direct election. Already there is word that 13 of those legislatures are going to block confirmation of the plan.

However, the entire picture could change if the Senate votes as overwhelmingly as the House. The

recent position of a key senator augurs much for a decisive, favorable

Sen. Gordon Allott, who was in contention for the post of minority leader of the Senate, announced a short time ago that if the choice narrowed down to direct election or nothing at all, he would vote in support of direct election. Ordinarily, one senator's viewpoint would not foretell much, but Sen. Allott is a conservative Republican, from a small state, and just happens to be the chairman of the Senate Republican Policy Committee.

The Electoral College as it is now constructed gives a disproprotionate share of power to less populous states and, for this reason, Allott was expected to carry on the struggle against direct election, to the death if necessary. His sudden turn-around gives the new plan an impetus

The two major ciriticisms of the direct-vote system are: 1) Fraud would be prevalent due to the factor of "one man, one vote." 2) Candidates would bypass the small states entirely to reach those areas of greatest population density.

While these two objections have merit, they do not make the present system any more appealing. In addition, they are only possible developments and ones that may be regulated effectively.

There is no doubt that direct election of the President is the best and only plan which should be implemented. Any attempt now to water it down by suggesting slight modifications of the present system or proposing proportional-vote or congressional district plans must be

# Pulling political strings

By now you all surely know MSU is seeking a president. You've seen the We-Want-Wally (Acting President Adams) crew at work soliciting signatures of support. And perhaps you saw the smiling face of "Soapy" (former Michigan Gov. G. Mennen Williams) gracing the front page of the State News Thursday.

It was just part of the game last spring when the trustees allowed the All-University Search and Selection Committee to be born. You know, make the University community FEEL involved; keep the natives happy and pimp them

Meanwhile, the AUSSC labored long and hard, commendably or not, digging through a list of 300 suggestioned names for the job and came up with four names to hand the trustees--all part of the proper channels as established with the trustees' personal blessings.

What happened to the four is history by now. The State News received an anonymous call, giving us the four names. We refused to release them and the caller turned to the Detroit papers, who naturally pounced on the story. ## Augenstein distorts drug facts

To The Editor:

Leroy Augenstein is quoted in the State News of Oct. 1 as having said, in respect to Sen. Hart's call for research into marijuana effects, that "Hart doesn't know what he's talking about.'

On the basis of the comments attributed to Augenstein in the news story, it is Augenstein who appears not to know what he is talking about -- or who is distorting facts to fit his predilections.

Augenstein's "suggestion" that marijuana leads to addiction to "harder drugs" is a hoary argument long discredited. Many millions of persons smoke marijuana from time to time, and only a very small percentage of these also use amphetamine or heroin. Of course, those who use heroin most likely have smoked marijuana -- they have also, most likely, drunk alcohol.

It is true that the present oppressive (and blatantly illegal) actions of the American government in conducting massive search and seizures on the Mexican border have driven up the price of marijuana and undoubtedly encouraged some young persons to try other stimulants. (I daresay if prohibition of alcohol was suddenly restored, millions of adults would drift over to "pep pills" and worse.)

This vicious policy of the American government is now used as an argument by narcotics enforcement people that marijuana "leads" to hard drugs!

If narcotics people and their unofficial spokesmen were really concerned about hard drugs, they would support the legalization of marijuana under an administrative system similar to alcohol. This would draw a clean, rational line between what is harmless and legal, and what is harmful and illegal. Use of hard drugs would be drastically reduced, and the Mafia and other big-time gangster-types would be driven out of a profitable business (as would many bureau-of-narcotics people). It is hard to find laws anywhere more irrational, unjust and essentially unequal than the

Most astonishing of Augenstein's remarks is his attack on research on marijuana as

"human manipulation that should never be done." Surely Augenstein is aware of the feature story in the New York Times on May 11, 1969, reporting the experiments of Harvard researchers with volunteer subjects, showing no ill effects whatever from marijuana.

Speaking of manipulation, Augenstein's "crash educational program on drug abuse" for elementary and high schools seems likely to fill the bill perfectly.

### Critical of TV editorials

To The Editor:

In less than two weeks, the State News has printed two articles concerning television on its editorial pages. Both articles were characterized by the usual complete ignorance of the effects of the television medium. Both blindly stumbled about in a morass of trite programming statistics that were boring, rather than informing, and offered the "conclusive" findings of mislead, myopic researchers. Both displayed convictions of the cause-and-effect relation between television content and conscious human actions. Both indicate deep concern for generations of young brought up by television to be either zombies, when confronted by violence, or psychotic murderers and rapists. (This seems contradictory, but then neither article showed even elementary mastery of material or logic.)

Both condemned programming and content as the culprits; neither achieved the overview that reveals television as a medium that has shaped the form of society and the modes of human thought

Since they missed this perspective, they missed an important and obvious effect that television has spawned in the present college generation, the first generation to be raised on television-involvement. This first television generation is characterized by total involvement in the world around it. It is applauded, condemned, encouraged and clubbed in the streets for

It is the demands of television for the total participation of its viewers that has conditioned this generation to seek complete participation and involvement in society. It is the "older generation;" the generation of the mechanical world and the non-participational movie medium of the first half of this century; that is the editors' "average American" who sits "poker-faced in front of the tube as the Vietnamese

No one from a generation reared on television can reject the demands of that powerful medium to become completely and totally involved in the world he lives

It is the low-definition, mosaic-dot presentation of the television image that necessitates a tactile involvement-in-depth from the viewer to complete the picture. This unconscious practice becomes a conditioning and appears in all other actions as an in-depth approach to problems.

When children are confronted with violence on television, they show little interest in the actions of violence, concentrating instead on the facial reactions of the actors. Such in-depth concern similarly carries over into their non-television lives and relationships.

I suggest that Dave Short and the editors read the studies of Marshall McLuhan and other students of media before they try to tell us in some future sloppy articles that the answer to unemployment is to build more factories and that war is the result of

Every year thousands of people in the United States get "taken" by a sharp but shady salesman who sold them the buy of their life at 25 per cent interest over 36 months -- with no money down.

The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) recently estimated that the public loss through semi-legal, and some illegal, sales practices is over \$200 million and rising.

The FTC, National Better Business Bureau and local Chambers of Commerce are trying to inform the public of as many of these sales practices as possible.

"One of the biggest problems we face," Carl Mertz, of the Greater Lansing Chamber of Commerce, said, "is that a lot of people are too embarrassed at being caught to notify any of the agencies that can help

There are many indications of shaky practices that the consumer should be aware of before purchasing anything, Mertz said.

One of the most obvious is the referral letter or supposedly unsolicited praise of a satisfied enters his mind about the customer, often fabricated by the company. Addresses are listed as postal boxes and no telephone numbers are given.



The consumer should ask for the salesman's credentials and for those of the company he represents. A legitimate salesman will not hesitate to give this information.

A consumer should ask the salesman every question that product or the method of purchase and should demand a clear and factual answer.

# 'Oedipus' -- interesting failure

The Theban Cycle of plays, of which "Oedipus the King" is the first, has been handled in a variety of ways since Sophocles conceived it, circa 450 B.C. Many interpretations have succeeded quite well, others have failed lamentably: Phillip Saville's version unfortunately belongs in the latter group.

The Greek drama of Sophocles' time was far more stately and statuesque than today's theatre-goers find their entertainment: the action of the characters was limited, and most wore masks into which small

megaphones were built. The chorus, found in every dramatic presentation of the time, represented the ideal audience, chanting songs related to the theme of the play and occasionally offering advice to







# Self-styled moles warned

Adventurers and fun-seekers who think it would be a super idea to travel through the underground tunnels of MSU should realize the hazards involved.

"We don't allow people who know the tunnels to go in alone,"Paul A. Nilsson, supt. of utilities, said. "The maintenance men always go down in pairs, or even more.

Working down there is extremely dangerous," he said. Tunnels are used to house the steam conduits to campus buildings. The pipes carry about 85 per cent of the condensed steam back to the power plant.

# No. 1-ranked Bucks have no weaknesses

With 18 of its 22 starters of last season back, only complacency could have prevented Ohio State's defending national champions from rampaging through another collegiate football season and, unfortunately, the Buckeyes appear more intense than ever in

Even considering the relative weakness of the Buckeyes' first two opponents, Texas Christian and Washington, Ohio State's start hasn't given contenders for OSU's national title any reason for optimism.

Woody Hayes' charges have outscored their first two foes by a combined score of 103-14.

The Bucks have outgained their opponents by more than a 2-1 (1,067-524) margin in total offense and by a 52-30 tally in first downs.

You can't even find any basis for a charge that Woody has been running up the scores in order to insure a continuation of Ohio State's No. 1 ranking.

The Buckeyes already have had 11 different players attempt a run, 11 players catch at least one pass and all three of their quarterbacks have thrown at least seven passes in the first two

Heavy substitution doesn't appreciably slow down the Buckeye onslaught because of the great depth and talent

Woody has behind his starters. Offensively, the Buckeyes rely more on a ground attack than moving through the air, gaining 692 rushing yards and 375 passing yards in two games.



WORCHESTER, MASS. (UPI) - The source of an outbreak of hepatitis which sidelined the entire Holy Cross varsity football team and wiped out the last eight games on the 1969 schedule, may have disappeared, doctors said Tuesday.

Officials said blood tests on another 90 persons at the Jesuit-run college of 2,300 showed no signs of the liver infection which struck the entire team, including coaching staff, managers, trainer and director of sports information.

Included in the latest blood check were members of the freshman football team, basketball and rugby teams, plus coaches, trainers and groundskeepers at the isolated football practice field atop Mount St. James, where the college is located. City health officials said the source of the outbreak may have

"It is possible the infection was only present in the early days of varsity football practice," said Dr. Arnold Gurwitz, head of the Worcester Health Dept. "Members of the team who used the field later did not contract anything."

Officials said it appeared the infection, which takes four to six weeks to appear, stemmed from a connector on a pipeline feeding the water bubbler at the practice field, which is removed from the
