"Certainly the loss hurt us" he said. "A victory over Wisconsin would have given us a little padding, but I don't believe we're out of it by any means.

"The league is such this year that I don't think we'll have anything definate until the last two weeks. It's evident that anyone in the league can beat anyone else."

Pont has beaten the Spartans two years in a row-14-13 in 1967 and 24-22 last year-with both victories in the closing minutes of play.

"MSU has great personnel," the Hoosier coach said, "and we have to be concerned by their strong running game. We're not discounting Bill Triplett and their passing game, but you have

Allen.

Allen, who has done little except run back kick-offs because of a stubborn ankle injury, ran hard in Tuesday's scrimmage at the stadium.

"It's the best he has looked since the second game of the season," Duffy said. "He's running well and should be ready to go on Saturday."

Allen, the Spartans best breakaway threat in several years, will serve as back-up man to starter Don Highsmith, the No. 6 rusher in the Big Ten with 258 yards.







Spartans--Hoosiers battle for roses?

Homecoming, an undefeated record at home and the slimmest of slim hopes still exists for a trip to the Rose Bowl.

All of these are incentives which should spark the Spartans to a victory Saturday over Indiana. But don't count on any help from the Hoosiers. They've done it two years in a row and would like nothing better than to make it three straight homecoming wins over Duffy Daugherty and Co.

Head Coach John Pont and his now mature young men are on theirway to the Rose Bowl, or so they think. The past two weeks we've seen teams with plans to make the westward bound trip get knocked off

Two weeks ago everybody was talking about Michigan standing the best change, despite the black spot at the end of their schedule which reads: Nov. 22--Ohio State-H. After MSU knocked the Wolverines off, the talk generated around good odds for the Spartans. But Iowa put a cringe in that thought with a disputed one-point triumph over the Spartans last week.

So the Hoosiers are in town now in the same position that Michigan and MSU were in the last two weeks. According to the books the men from Bloomingtom will get knocked off. But then when were the books ever right?

Indiana will hope to bounce back from a costly defeat at the hands of Wisconsin, a feat which only one other team has had to face in the past three years. (The other being Iowa, who bounced back pretty well last week.) Coach Pont said his team just played inconsistent ball against the Badgers, with a lot of chances to win, "but we just didn't cash in on them."

'I feel that a team that is sharp will take advantage of its breaks and won't give them to the other other team," Pont said after the game.

That could very well describe the Spartans' season thus far. The few times the Spartans have received a break like the blocked punt in the Iowa game or Don Law's interception in the SMU game, have had scored soon afterwards. The only thing wrong is that the Spargan offense has given the opposition too many breaks resulting in too many scores. All but the final touchdown that Iowa scored last week came after an MSU mistake. (And even if it wasn't a penalty, the Spartans' mistake of having a lineman a little too far downfield cost them six points.)

The Spartans hare a good team, offensively and defensively. The offense showed it can move the ball effectively if it can avoid the mistakes of big penalties, fumbles and interceptions. The defense has proven itself time and time again, holding the opponent when they must.

Saturday's game could be a battle of give-away if the teams play according to the statistics. The Hoosiers have fumbled the ball 11 times two less than the slippery-fingered Spartans.

Indiana can score and will score-they're averaging 30 points a game in conference play. Iowa had approximately the same average but the Spartans' defense held them pretty much in check. The only trouble was that there was little punch on the offensive ledger.

Triplett, Highsmith, Smith, Foreman, Kough and Kuleza and the front five will have to show a little more punch if the Spartans are to make it a happy Homecoming weekend for students faculty and alums.

All-Stars in finale; meet Flint here

Lansing is getting the look of a winner this year as the All-Stars appear to be running away with the Midwest Football League.

The last hurdle for the All-Stars to pass before they find themselves in their first championship game since 1963, is their home game this Saturday night with the Flint Wildcats, at the Lansing Everrett football field.

Flint is 2-11, on the season, but they still have a chance to be the spoiler for Lansing.

Last year Lackawanna looked championship bound when they ran into a weak Wildcat squad, and suddenly their title hopes were ended.

The All-Stars met Flint twice earlier this season, and came out on top both times. In a pre-season contest Lansing squeaked by the Wildcats, 17-13.

Lansing picked up some new personnel in the early stages of the season, and then preceded to romp by Flint, 33-6.

"They looked very impressive in the first half in Flint," All-Star Coach Turf Kauffman said. "But their lack of depth caused them to fold.'

"We'll go into the game with basically the same personnel as we have been using all season long," Kauffman said. "We may work Bob Super in at

Looking ahead to a possible championship game with Lackawanna, Kauffman is expecting, "a good hard football game."

Lackawanna topped the All-Stars in their first encounter in Lansing, 33-6. But when Lansing traveled into Lancer country, the story was reversed, 18-5.

The only major injury was sustained by Roger Peltier. Peltier is lost for the remainder of the season with a broken leg.


