Nixon bans germ warfare use by U.S.; pledges research halt

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Nixon announced Tuesday the United States will never use germ warfare -- even if attacked by an enemy spreading bacteria.

The President also promised to destroy all existing stockpiles of bacteriological weapons and to halt all further research on such weapons.

In future, the President told newsmen, research will be confined to efforts to counter any germ warfare attack, such as developing immunization shots to protect the population.

Nixon also broadened the official policy on use of chemical weapons -- notably poison gas in war.

While the United States long ago renounced first use of lethal chemical weapons. Nixon extended the renunciation to include first use of chemicals that merely incapacitate rather than kill.

The President's announcement capped a six-month review of chemical and biological defense policies and programs completed last week by the National Security Council.

"On the basis of this review," he told reporters, "I made a number of decisions which I believe will sharply reduce the chance that these weapons, either chemical or bacteriological will ever be used by any

"Mankind already carries in its own hands too many of the seeds of its own destruction," Nixon said. "By the examples that we set today, we hope to contribute to an atmosphere of peace and understanding between all nations."

In a more formal printed statement

Nixon said he regarded his moves "as an initiative toward peace."

The President acted after Congress had shown marked reluctance to appropriate money for germ warfare research. And there were indications that destruction of present stockpiles of bacteriological weapons would pose little problem since, it was understood, they deteriorate rapidly.

Nixon bore down hardest on the germ warfare issue saying:

"Biological weapons have massive, unpredictable and potentially uncontrollable consequences. They may produce global epidemics and impair the health of future generations. I have therefore decided that:

"-- The United States shall renounce the use of lethal biological weapons and agents, and all other methods of biological

"-- The United States will confine its biological research to defensive measures

to aid building of Olin annex

Plans for a new annex to Olin Health Center include the utilization of an experimental mass production technique to be used in construction.

Construction is expected to begin spring term on a site between the existing health center and Berkey Hall.

The project will be the first to combine prefabricated modules along with suspension techniques Robert D. Schuetz. associate director of the Institute of Biology and Medicine, said Tuesday.

"The idea is a simple one. The Health Center annex will have two steel towers with a truss system overhead, with the modules hung in a suspension system."

"The basic structure itself can lend itself to mass production, with the individual modules being built away from the construction site that will allow the application of mass production techniques

in their construction." Schuetz said that this method of construction would provide the

-- John A. Garraty, formerly of the MSU faculty, now professor of history at Columbia University and currently president of the Society of American Historians.


Presiding over the ceremonies and awarding the degrees will be Acting President Adams.

The commencement speaker Brewster, has had a distinguished career as a professor of law, legal scholar and president of Yale.


He has served various governmental agencies and held important federal commissions by appointment of two presidents of the United States.

Proposed bill to give student increased role By SHARON TEMPLETON

The Michigan House of Representatives is showing an increased awareness of the grievances of college and university students.

House Bill No. 3901, recently introduced into the Michigan Legislature by Rep. George F. Montgomery, D-Detroit, proposes to create student grievance committees at all institutions of higher education.

Representation on the committees will be directly proportional to the enrollment. with not less than three and no more than 11 members.

MSU, the University of Michigan and Wayne State have over 25,000 students and their grievance committees would be composed of 11 members elected for one-year terms by the student body.

According to the bill, now under study by the Committee of Colleges and Universities, members of the committee would receive the same salary as a part-time instructor at the university.

"The compensation and expenses of student grievance committee members

U.S. troop withdrawal ahead of Nixon goal

WASHINGTON (AP) -- The United States is keeping up the withdrawal of U.S. troops from Vietnam beyond the goal announced by President Nixon last September, a Pentagon spokesman said

Thursday. Nixon's stated objective, aimed at withdrawing 60,000 U.S. troops by Dec. 15, was reached last week. This was about 25 days early.

The Pentagon spokesman described the withdrawal as an on-going, continuing program" and said the United States is maintaining the momentum of withdrawal.

A new presidential statement, expected by late December, will set new goals which likely will bring the total of troops withdrawn over the 100,000 mark early in

The pace of the withdrawal, which began last June, has been irregular but has averaged out to about 12,000 men a month. Pentagon sources forecast the U.S. troop total will be down to about 480,000 within the next few weeks. The high point of the U.S. troops commitment came last February with a total of 543,500 U.S. servicemen in Vietnam.

Deputy Secretary of Defense David Packard, who returned last weekend from a closeup look at the pace of "Vietnamization" probably will report within the next few days to Nixon on how well the program, aimed at shifting the major burden of the war to the South

Vietnamese, is proceeding. This is the critical factor in U.S. withdrawal plans which, by various indications, aim at removing all U.S. ground combat troops from the country by the end of 1970.

North Vietnam reportedly has stepped up the rate of infiltration of men and supplies into South Vietnam with the advent of improving weather along the Ho Chi Minh trail network.

About 20,000 fresh North Vietnamese troops reportedly had entered the boost of his fighting forces in the South for a possible offensive. Nixon has warned the North Vietnamese that any significant rise in infiltration and U.S. casualties could lead to a slowdown of the U.S. troop pullback.



Currently the College of Business and University College do not have representatives on SAC because they have no official advisory committees.

Bathurst said that the effectiveness of SAC, as it is now conceived, will depend largely upon the outcome of the McKee Committee, which is currently studying the Massey Report and all aspects of student participation in academic

government. Hopefully, undergraduate student representation on the Academic Council will be approved, which would create a communications link between SAC and the Academic Council, Bathurst said.

The undergraduate representatives to the Academic Council would also be on SAC.

The ad hoc SAC constitution committee, which is composed of seven members of SAC and two members appointed by the student board, is now in the process of forming a constitution for SAC.

"Our goal is to define the areas which SAC would pertain to and to structure SAC to serve as a focal point for all academic matters involving students," Bathurst said.

This would, in effect, leave the Student Board free to concentrate on non-academic matters, and give SAC responsibility in academic matters which directly concern students.

SAC was formed three years ago, and until September, had been virtually inactive. Fall term has been devoted to a rejuvenation of SAC and co-ordination of its new membership.



International News

North Vietnamese and U.S. troops fought a series of battles Tuesday along the Cambodian border. The largest engagement lasted for six hours around Black Virgin Mountain, an enemy stronghold menacing the nearby provincial capital of Tay Ninh. So far, the enemy in the winter-spring offensive has been unable to coordinate ground attacks. The fighting resulted largely from aggressive U.S. patrolling.

A Soviet writers organization Tuesday accused liberal novelist Alexander Solzhenitsyn of being "hostile to socialism" and invited him to defect to the west if he wants to. Solzhenitsyn, whose last two novels are banned in the Soviet Union, was expelled from the Writer's Union Nov. 6.

Hanoi's official Vietnam news agency charged Wednesday that more than 500 South Vietnamese have died from chemical sprays used by American troops. The agency charged the United States of conducting "thousands" of chemical sprays and causing widespread damage by their use.

Lebanese Premier Rashid Karami formed a 16-man government Tuesday night ending a seven-month government crisis. Karami announced the new government following a 10-hour meeting with President Charles Halou at the presidential palace. Nearly all of Lebanon's political factions are represented in the government.

The Soviet Union criticized Tuesday a U.S.-backed draft treaty outlawing biological warfare and demanded a total ban on all chemical weapons as well. The draft treaty was submitted to the United Nations by Britain. Soviet delegate A.A. Roschin proposed in the General Assembly's main political committee that priority be given to a draft treaty by the Soviet Union and eight other communist states banning both chemical and biological weapons.

National News

The National Violence Commission, deploring "growing antagonism between young and old," recommended Tuesday lowering the voting age to 18 to give young people a growing voice in government. It also endorsed President Nixon's draft reform proposals and urged new legislation to expand employment opportunities for the nation's youths.

The Senate voted Tuesday to continue the income tax surcharge at a 5 per cent rate for the first six months of 1970. It defeated an amendment by Sen. Harry F. Bird Jr., D-Va., to strip from the tax reform bill a provision which would continue the levy for that time. The outcome was a significant victory for President Nixon in the early voting on disputed issues in the big bill.

The St. Louis Post-Dispatch said Tuesday that a firm owned by secretary of the Interior Walter J. Hickel recently received a contract for about \$1 million worth of construction leased by Atlantic Richfield Oil Co. for its Alaskan headquarters in Anchorage. The firm, Hickel Investment Co., is owned by the Cabinet member and his wife, but is under the management of Hickel's brother, Vernan, while Walter is in Washington. Atlantic Richfield is one of the major oil companies involved in the Alaskan oil boom and, the Post-Dispatch said, "has a huge stake in Hickel's official decisions as guardian of the public's lands."

Frank Stanton, president of the Columbia Broadcasting System, said Tuesday that it does not take overt censorship of the news media by the government to "cripple the free flow of ideas." He said the "ominous character" of Vice President Agnew's criticism of television news media "derives directly from the fact that it is made upon the journalism of a medium licensed by the government of which he is a high ranking officer."

Michigan News

A recent report by a federal commission on law enforcement identified Michigan as one of the states in which "the wealthiest and most influential core groups (of organized crime) operate." Discipline likely for fasting G.I.s

PLEIKU, Vietnam (AP)--Army field hospital soldiers, planning a 24 - hour Thanksgiving Day fast to protest the Vietnam war, face possible disciplinary action, their commander said Tuesday.

The allegations of the antiwar leaders came to light during a survey of servicemen who signed a national advertisement opposing the war. The newspaper advertisement appeared Nov. 9. Sixty-five of the signers were from Barksdale-believed to be the largest number from any Air Force base.

Of the signers contacted, however--from Barksdale and other bases--most said they had felt no repercussions from superiors, although some said they received lectures from commanding officers.

"I've simply exercised freedom of speech," says 1st Lt. Mitchel Osborne, one of the few war protesters the Air Force says is still under investigation.

He said he was informed Oct. 27 by the Air Force's Office of Special Investigation-OSI-that he was under investigation for "organization of an antiwar demonstration on 15 Oct. 69 designed to promote disloyalty among Air Force personnel."



Haynsworth's rejection: another one to follow?

The Haynsworth affair isn't over. Nixon has reafirrmed his desire to "restore a proper balance" on the court, meaning of course that he intends to again nominate a conservative.

But debate over Haynsworth didn't center on his conservative ideology, rather over his financial dealings and decisions which, at least in tone, were not consistent with other court rulings.

The question arises over whether the Senate has the prerogative to reject a nominee on the basis of his political ideology. The power is there, clearly, but if Nixon persists in nominating still another conservative, one whose financial record is clear, the Senate may be more hesitant to reject him.

There is another criteria which Nixon will have to observe if he is to seat a conservative on the court Many of Haynsworth's civil rights decisions, while not in defiance of other court decisions, clearly failed to acknowledge the Supreme Court's stand. For Haynsworth, the desegregation decision never occurred. A conservative on the court must be willing to abide by previous court rulings, even if he disagrees with them.

Sen. Philip Hart, D-Mich., has long opposed Senate rejection of Supreme Court nominees on the basis of political stance. Over Haynsworth, however, his attitude changed and he did indeed oppose him, not only for conflict of interest, but for his right wing, Strom Thurmond views as

Senators who opposed Haynsworth's ideology covered up their opposition by referring to the Brunswick affair and other financial conflicts as the basis for their negative vote. If Nixon succeeds in nominating someone whose record is beyond reproach, then the depth of these sentiments should become clear.

We believe that the Supreme Court stands as the single protectorate of individual rights over public rights, and as such must be a leader in social reform. Further, we believe that the Senate does indeed have a right to reject the next nominee if his views are contrary to the tone of the court.

This does not preclude a conservative judge, however, Warren Burger seems to be molding himself into a justice who, while existing on the conservative political spectrum, nonetheless recognizes the role of the court as watchman over the other two branches. The immediate desegregation decision served by Burger is evidence that a man can meet Nixon's qualifications to the court and still uphold the tone and letter of the court.

While we would, of course, prefer a man of more progressive nature, if Nixon persists in nominating a conservative, the Senate must judge the man's political views not only by conservative-liberal standards, but by the integrity and character of the man, and his adherence to what Sen. John Williams, Rep. Del., calls "the expected requirements of judicial



Some 567 Vietnamese may have died in March 1968. Struck down. By Americans. Massacred is the word. Maybe it was 155. Well, there are MPs in Britain who feel if the story is 1 per cent correct, it's very grave. Get it-grave. Not really the adjective. The noun. Webster's: "an excavation for burial of a body; tomb."

Nazi Germany. Extremely grave. But very few graves. Bodies lying on one another. Piled high to the sky. Vietnam isn't that bad. Maybe piled low to the sky.

Sort of like the Green Beret case. The

guy's dead. Not dead. Never really existed. He's got a wife, though. With a kid. Sometimes they both cry. "Where's daddy?"--in Vietnamese.



When is the safest time to have sexual intercourse without the use of any protective measures?

P.S. Please answer in your column; upon discussing the subject with different people, I found that no one knew the

During this period of "sexual enlightenment," hardly a week goes by when I don't receive a letter similar to yours. I've answered some of them in this column, and some of them personally, but I'm beginning to get a little worried. For every letter I receive asking for basic physiological information, I suspect there are dozens more that could have been written by people who also need information. Most of the letters are from women. But, I've found men much less knowledgeable.

An astute observer of the local scene estimates that somewhat more than three women become pregnant each 24 hours that school is in session. My contacts with students lead me to be amazed that the figure is not higher Lest someone misinterpret this remark, let me emphasize--I am not talking about the incidence of sexual intercourse, I am talking about the frequency that sexual intercourse occurs without either partner taking responsibility for contraception. The man especially is negligent in this area considering the availability of condoms from any drug store.

Back to your question. There is no "safest time" to have intercourse without protective measures for the couple who does not want to have a child. Rhythm, withdrawal and putting on a condom half way through intercourse is not practicing contraception. It's nothing less than mad delusion that permits a couple to engage in sexual relations on a random and ill thought-out basis. The fact that most women are most vulnerable to become pregnant 14 days before the onset of the menstrual period is of woefully little solace when you begin to consider the extent of the variation from this.

While I'm moaning about this state of affairs, let me add that ignorance about the physiology of sex is exceeded manyfold by the lack of information on some of the emotional and interpersonal aspects of sexual relations. Judging by how few questions I'm asked, it would appear that the interpersonal aspects are more difficult to talk about than the physiologic.

For 50 cents you can buy "The Complete Book of Birth Control" by Allen Guttmacher, published by Ballantine Books or "The New Handbook of Modern Birth Control" by Paula Seilers, published by Dell. You might also read L.A. Kirkendall's "Premarital Intercourse and Interpersonal Relationships" or Ira Reiss's "Premarital Sexual Standards in America."

My roommate has a problem. Many times during her waking hours she has uncontrollable fits of laughter. During her hysteria, she has an involuntary urge to urinate and sometimes voids uncontrollably. This is becoming more and more frequent and a little bit of a nuisance. Could this have anything to do with tea drinking? Sometimes immediately after she goes to the bathroom, she comes out, laughs again and re-enters the bathroom. What can be done?

Since you didn't indicate any amnesia for the event or a loss of consciousness, I'll assume these signs are not present. If they were, your roommate might have temporal

lobe epilepsy, an interesting disorder in which the person can engage in all sorts of complicated actions automatically.

Ah ha, a tea drinker! Tea, like coffee, contains caffeine in about the same amount. It also contains a closely related chemical called theophylline. Caffeine is a potent central nervous system stimulant. Theophylline has some of the same effects as caffeine, but is a very potent diuretic (increases the production of urine). Some people are very sensitive to the effects of both of these drugs. Usually the sensitivity is manifested by irritability, sleeplessness A close friend discovered that a strong

cup of tea duplicates subjective feelings of several shots of scotch, but she did not experience the involuntary urinary symptoms. Your roommate is only the second person I've ever heard who is capable of such a cheap, safe "high." If she enjoys the laughter she can always drink her tea in the bathroom.





It seems that reforms of abortion laws--and better vel repeals--are coming. It is time that such action be supported by those who want to slow down the population growth without resorting to coercion or compulsion. As the Secretary General U Thant of the United Nations said, "the opportunity to decide the number and the spacing of children is a basic human right."

Until there is a perfect, universally available contraceptive, abortion should be infinitely preferred to compulsory sterilization or compulsory birth control which may be the choices of the crowded future.

People are suffering. I am living so well. It bothers me. Yet I'll go ahead and eat my traditional dinner Thursday. It'll be a good day. And some more children in West Africa will die.

Owens Heisman winner

Steve Owens, the human bulldozer from Oklahoma who plowed through enemy defenses for more yardage rushing than any player in college football history, Tuesday was named winner of the Heisman Trophy as the year's outstanding college football

Owens, a bruising 6-foot-2, 215 pound senior from Miami, Okla., outpolled Mike Phipps, Purdue's outstanding quarterback, in balloting by 992 sports writers and sportscasters.

Owens, named as an All-America running back, received 1,488 points to 1,334 for Phipps. Rex Kern, Ohio State's quarterback, was third in the balloting, followed by Quarterback Archie Manning Mississippi and defensive tackle Mike Reid, Penn. State.

The 103,588 fans who crammed Michigan Stadium last Saturday to watch Michigan shock previously unbeaten Ohio State, 24-12, comprised the largest crowd ever to attend a college football

The previous high of 103,234 had also been set at the home of the Wolves in 1959 when U-M played the Spartans, according to the National Collegiate Sports Services, which has been keeping records for the last 22 years.

Gerry Lindgren's record victory in Monday's NCAA cross country championships at New York's Van Cortlandt Park was his 11th in NCAA track and cross country competition.

The slight, bespectacled 23-year old from Washington State University won his third cross country title in a record 28:59.2 over the rugged six-mile course in the Bronx.

Texas, as expected, replaced Ohio State in the No.1 spot in the weekly UPI college football poll. The Longhorns were followed in order by Penn State, Arkansas, Southern Cal, Missouri, Ohio State, Louisiana State, Michigan, Notre Dame and UCLA.

Michigan players Don Dierdorf and Barry Pierson were honored by the wire services for their performances in U-M's 24-12 upset victory over Ohio State last Saturday.

Tackle Dierdorf was named UPI's "Lineman of the Week." while defensive back Pierson was named AP's "Back of the Week" for his three pass interceptions and 60-yard punt return in the

would be paid from the appropriation to the State Dept. of Education," Montgomery

The major purpose of the committees would be to consider all grievances submitted faculty, administrators or other university policies. employees of the university.

"Public meetings would also be held," Montgomery added, "at which individual grievances could be heard."

After considering the grievance, the committee would make recommendations for solving the problem to the president of the college or

assimilates students within the present governing system, giving them a vote on decision-making committees.

The Montgomery proposal limits student influence to an advisory capacity.

The bill would go into effect July 1, 1970, if approved during this session of the Legislature. If not, it must be reintroduced in January and returned to committee for further consideration.

More than likely the bill will not be considered during this session due to the Governor's emphasis on limiting legislative action to educational reform

Jack Kerouac-father of the beat generation and patron saint of the flower people-died a few weeks ago, yet many of his descendants among the hips little more than recognize his name, let alone worship at his shrine.

This unfamiliarity with Kerouac reflects the "generation gap" between the beats of the '50's and their successors, the hips of the '60's, noted Albert Drake, asst. professor of English. Drake, who is in his early 30's,

the beatniks on the West Coast during the middle '50's.

At that time, a bohemian state of mind and set of attitudes. which rejected middle class values, was being shared by a small coterie of people, mostly on the West Coast and in New York, Drake noted.

"The beat movement was a spontaneous kind of movement, an unselfconscious transition from the '50's of Eisenhower and crewcuts to the hippies."

Kerouac not only named this group the beat generation, but gave it a sense of identity, he said.

"The appearance of Kerouac's

novel, 'On the Road,' in 1957 had a teriffic impact on those who were beatniks but did not know what to call themselves," Drake said.

"With the book's publication, the beats realized that there were others doing the same thing they were doing."

Coffeehouses began to spring up about the same time to still further consolidate the beat movement. Now the beats had someplace to go--a common meeting ground, Drake continued.

Not only the rejection of middle class values, but many other significant ideas of the beats--as set down for them by Kerouac--have been adopted by the hips, he said.

Among them is the "restless impulse.

"The spiritual affirmation of moving out across the country with one's friends-of getting from one place to another--is still here," he said.

"But this impulse to get away from home and family has always been a part of youth."

Besides this, Kerouac's interest in Buddhism--he was the first beat writer to look to the East for inspiration--has also been taken over by the "hips" he said.

Drake said that in spite of this community of ideas, the hips have become a phenomenon distinct from their predecessors, the beats.

To begin with, the beats were characterized by a nihilistic outlook-they withdrew from society, he said. The hips, on the other hand, have a missionary zeal and sense of involvement--the anti-war movement is a case in point. .

Even drugs are not an inward thing for the hips, but rather a spiritual, communal thing, he







