## Milliken asks reform action on crime, schools, finances the recommended school aid program until

Gov. Milliken asked the legislature to deal with the problems of crime, education and state finances as they "enter the new

In his State of the State message to the joint senate and house, the governor told the lawmakers that tax increases could be held down as a result of reductions in certain programs, but that the state government must "tighten its belt."

He said the tax increases proposed last fall of \$203 million could now be reduced to an increase of \$143 million.

He outlined cuts in his school aid bill as a result of re - evaluating areas including teacher pensions, lesser increases in future enrollments and postponement of pupil teacher ratio reductions.

Total reductions in his school aid program he said, would result in a decrease of \$57 million from his earlier proposal.

The governor also promised to wage an "extensive and determined effort" to combat crime in the state.

"Crime thwarts our exectations for the

70's, he said. "Its costs in terms of the all pervasive fear to walk the streets of our

cities is one which we can no longer bear." He mentioned revision of the criminal code, adoption of a State Commission on Investigations and an up grading of police training and equipment as specific ways of fighting crime.

In addition he told the lawmakers that his budget message in February would include \$100,000 for strengthening probation services."

Following the speech, he said that the "governor is trying carefully not to antagonize the voter, but is in danger of doing nothing." House Speaker William Ryan, D-Detroit,

in his evaluation of the speech, predicted the school aid bill would now be more difficult to pass than before. He explained that if the legislature

complies with Milliken's request to vote for lower tax increases than originally planned, it will be difficult to get votes for the school aid bill.

Ryan also expressed disappointment in the governor's proposed \$79 million reduction in the school aid bill, which he said would affect the special programs for underachievers, the culturally disadvantaged and remedial reading programs.

### Wharton sits on first board; agenda busy

President Clifton R. Wharton Jr. will preside over his first MSU Board of Trustees meeting at 10 a.m. today in the board room of the Administration Bldg.

The trustees are expected to consider the selection of a replacement for Oakland University Chancellor Durward Varner.

Varner announced his decision Dec. 15 to accept the chancellor's post at the

chancellor's appointment or the process to be used in selecting the new chancellor. Board chairman Don Stevens, D-Okemos, may make a statement on his

status as a trustee. Stevens, whose term runs out this year, is rumored to be in serious trouble with the

state Democratic party because of his refusal to support former Governor G. Mennan Williams for MSU's presidency. Stevens is expected to comment on a

The discussion of several high administration appointments may occur, although the recommendations are not on the regular board agenda.

## 300,000 CUTBACK

## Reduced manpower total planned by June--Laird

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Secretary of Defense Melvin R. Laird said Thursday total U.S. military strength will be cut by about 300,000 men by June. This was a heavier manpower reduction

than previously announced. We are moving toward smaller and more efficient military forces," Laird said

in a speech prepared for the California State Chamber of Commerce. "Assisted both by the diminution of our

role in Vietnam and by management reforms, we can provide the security which the nation requires with a trimmer defense establishment."

Laird's speech amounted to a general review of his first year as defense secretary in which he said "new directions have been

Laird indicated that the new defense budget will total about \$73 billion, which he said will be about \$10 billion below what the last Democratic administration projected for the 1971 fiscal year.

Speaking of President Nixon, Laird said that "in his judgment and in mine, the reduced level of military spending will provide adequate and prudent defense." The Pentagon has indicated in the past that military manpower would be reduced

next June as the United States accelerates its withdrawal from Vietnam The larger figure of 300,000 used by Laird underscores pressures from the White House to cut defense spending deeper and

A cutback of about 300,000 men would leave U.S. forces totaling about 3,155,000 worldwide. Pentagon authorities by ve said another deep manpower cut s coming next

year and probably will push the total reduction over 500,000 men.

Laird defended the administration's Vietnam policies. He noted that in years before the Nixon administration came to power, the number of American troops in Vietnam "went up and up and up." Now Laird said the number is going down.

Also, he said, "There is an important difference between a policy that places the major combat responsibility on our GIs and one that places the responsibility on the Vietnamese."

## GNP hit \$932.2 billion in '69

WASHINGTON (AP) -- The Gross National Produce (GNP) rose to \$932.3 billion last year, pushed by the greatest inflation in almost two decades, the

Commerce Dept. reported Thursday. The increase of \$66.6 billion over the 1968 GNP of \$865.7 billion was second only to the \$72 billion rise in that year, another period of staggeringly high price

It boosted the national closer yet to a trillion-dollar economy which some economists say may be reached this year, although it would take an increase larger than last year's.

On their face, the GNP figures indicated the nation may be on the brink of its fifth post-World War II recession because real production -- the GNP minus the effects of inflation -- showed virtually no change

during the last three months. A recession is defined as two consecutive quarters of declining real production. One prominent government economist

cautioned against concluding that one has begun, primarily because the three-month-old strike against General Electric Co., the nation's fifth largest

### 200 protestors seize MIT head officers

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP) - A band of some 200 deomonstrators smashed through a door Thursday and seized the offices of the top officials of Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

The group, many of them MIT students, demanded abolition of the MIT discipline committee and cancellation of punishment meted out to students who took part in

previous unruly demonstrations. The door to the office of MIT President Howard W. Johnson was broken in by four skimasked men using a battering ram made of two four - foot pipes welded together, with hand holds on the sides.

The ram was dropped at the scene and the ski - masked quartet fled after forcing the door, am MIT campus policeman said.

The others in the group, chanting antiwar and other slogans occupied Johnson's office and also the nearby office of MIT Corp. Chairman James R. Killiam

The invaders ignored an order by MIT Provost Jerome B. Weisner to leave the The takeover followed a rally in the rotunda of the MIT administration

building. Two groups demanded last week that the school abolish its disciplinary committee and negate all disciplinary actions taken against students as a result of

The school was given until Wednesday to comply with the demand. It refused.

### Pill hormone denied use as chick fattener

WASHINGTON (AP) -- Senate investigators were told Thursday the government continues to approve the use in birth control pills of a hormone it banned ten years ago as a chicken fattener. Its use as a chicken fattener was

discontinued, the senators were told, because it caused cancer in laboratory Dr. Roy Hertz, a noted birth control specialist, identified the synthetic female

hormone as estrogen. Long known to cause cancer in at least five species of animals, the hormone was virtually abandoned in Britain recently after studies linked it to fatal blood

Hertz said the government gave approval for the use of estrogen in birth control pills after banning it as a chicken fattener "on

Dr. Robert W. Kistner of the Harvard Medical School disagreed with Hertz's evaluation of the pill's hazards and its suspected link with cancer. But he agreed reluctantly under questioning that estrogen causes pre-malignant, localized cell changes known as carcinoma in situ.





#### International News

The Lebanese government told Palestinian guerrillas Thursday to evacuate their quarters in inhabited areas of South Lebanon within 48 hours or face retaliatory measures. Beirut radio reported that the warning followed a protest demonstration against the guerrillas Thursday by the inhabitants of the town of Hasbaya. Some informants felt the decree was likely to create new tension between the government and the guerrillas, who carry out attacks against Israel.

William James Owen, a Labor member of the British Parliament for 15 years and a leader of the Cooperative Movement, was arrested Thursday on charges of espionage for a foreign power. The Scotland Yard announcement did not identify the foreign power, but other sources said it was not the Soviet Union. The 68-year - old lawmaker was not identified with left wing groups in Parliament. He never held any government office or national post within the Labor

Speaking from secret exile, Gen. C. Odumegwu Ojvkwu charged Thursday that federal Nigerian conquerers aim at genocide in Biafra that would make World War II look like "child's play." The defeated Biafran leader said that only the stationing of "some neutral force" in his former secessionist territory would prevent the mass extermination of Biafrans.

North Vietnam accused President Nixon Thursday of violating his election promise to end the Vietnam war and of bringing dishonor to the United States. Hanoi's deputy chief delegate, Col. Ha Van Lau and the Viet Cong representative ignored a renewed appeal from the United States and South Vietnam to stop making propaganda speeches and begin negotiations in ernest. For the second successive week, all four delegations were represented at the deputy level. Hanoi and the Viet Cong again charged that the United States was "downgrading and sabotaging" the talks.

The Viet Cong published Thursday a partial list of Vietnamese killed in the "American massacre" at My Lai on March 16, 1968. The list includes the names of 242 persons arranged by families and hamlets. It was published by the Viet Cong delegation at Paris and was said to be incomplete.

#### National News

The Securities and Exchange Commission gave a go-ahead Thursday to a nationwide "partnership" venture intended to launch nearly \$2 billion worth of new, privately built lower income housing. Authorized by Congress and backed by a board of big name industrialists, the newly created National Corporation for Housing Partnerships expects to win cooperation from local investors and builders in every major city... The main lure is a tax inducement - a rapid depreciation write-off permitted for new buildings. The paper losses can be used, on income tax returns, to offset profits from other sources.

Martin Sweig, suspended administrative assistant to Speaker of the House John McCormack, and Nathan Voloshen, a lawyer and lobbyist, both pleaded innocent I hursday to federal conspiracy charges to use McCormack's House office as a base for influence peddling. The indictment alleged that Sweig schemed with Voloshen to assert the influence of the speaker's office in connection with cases involving Voloshen's

S. I. Hayakawa, the San Francisco State College president who gained national attention with a hard-line policy on student demands, said Thursday he has decided not to run for public office this year. "To dedicate oneself to the defense of academic freedom is perhaps the most important thing an educator can do," Hayakawa said. Hayakawa had been mentioned for months as a possible candidate for the Democratic nomination for the Senate seat held by Republican George Murphy. There was also talk of his running for state superintendent of public instruction, a post currently held by Republican Max Rafferty.

Consumer advocate Ralph Nader said Thursday consumers must establish public interest law firms if they are to combat the weapons of Washington's lobbyists. "The consumer movement," Nader said, "has received less attention from the President than the exas football team or any number of golfers, comedians or actors who have had his valuable time. He would listen if consumers were more powerful." Nader was speaking to the fourth annual Consumer Assembly.



Man has just about succeeded in completely destroying every natural resource that he has been given Lake Erie is a dead sea; Gary, Ind. may never see what the sun really looks like again; huge strips of Appalachia are laid waste by strip mining.

The first step has now been taken. President Nixon has opened the new year by signing the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969. The panacea has arrived.

This bill declares that it is the policy of the federal government "to use all practicable means to create and maintain conditions under which man and nature can exist in productive harmony and fulfill the social economic and other requirements of present and future generations of Americans."

It also establishes a three - man Council on Environmental Quality to be appointed by the President and approved by the Senate. The purpose of this council will be to tell us that,

## 'U' bookery practices what Profit preaches

Students are always complaining about various aspects of the local bookstores. They complain that the stores intentionally get rid of all the leftover books after the first two weeks of each term. They complain that the owners do not stock enough books or intentionally understock so there will not be any books left over.

Clearly the book -- buying process at MSU leaves much to be desired. Last summer the Man & Nature Bookstore, a student -- run bookmart that would stock all titles was set up. The desired result: to save students money and trouble, but M & N never had enough capital to make it as a student bookstore. It has become instead a place to buy radical literature, pop and yogurt, at a discount price to members.

The New Community -- sponsored book exchange was a step in the right direction -- it did keep student money in student pockets. However, many students were unable to find the books they needed for more advanced courses.

Back to the local bookeries. The greatest inadequacy here is the 25% gap between buyback and resale prices. All East Lansing bookstores, including the MSU bookstore, use this sytem.


Therein lies the inconsistency. All of the Grand River stores are in the business for the money; their owners have a living to make. The MSU Book Store is operated by the University and is supposedly run on a non - profit basis.

Something is wrong here. Either the MSU Book Store is not really a non - profit institution, or the rent that the University charges the store is excessive. This brings up the point of why the store should pay any rent

There is a solution to the situation. The University should turn over the MSU Book Store to the students now. As a student - run corporation, the MSU Book Store would finally give students a place where they could get a fair deal on textbooks. The buyback and resale price gap could be reduced just enough to cover overhead.

Such a bookstore would provide a place where all students could buy and sell their books all of the time. It would keep at all times a complete stock of books being used that term. Until such a store is set up, MSU students will never get a really fair deal on books.

## MSU's conservative heritage

In theory, if not in practice, MSU is an educational institution and therefore primarily concerned with academics. While the school enjoys a certain reputation as an athletically - oriented institution, most of its students only sit in the stands and, because they either lack an imposing physical stature because of lethargy or were denied male organs by birth, they generally do not enjoy the scholarships and automobiles lavished on our talented

The point is not to take scholarships away from the athletes. Why begrudge them a good thing: Instead, the point is that, as credible as it may see to some administrators, there are many students on campus who, while fully enjoying the spectacle of sport, feel they are here for some other purpose than to huzzah the ole team on to the Rose Bowl.

MSU is a conservative school. Until very recently, its students might easily have been at home in the malt shop with Ricky and David Nelson digging the "rebop" and painting the sides of their '54 Chevies with

things like "Air is a Gas."

More importantly, the school's administrators have traditionally measured their success not as educators, but in terms of how many acres of land were added to school property annually. In a farewell interview with the State News last spring, former President John Hannah defined the University's role as one of

making students good and useful citizens for the society they would enter upon graduation.

This conservative conception of the University as a student - factory did, in fact, produce an over - grown semi educational factory which, after processing students through a four year development period, including weekends, built around copping a feel and fraternity pranks, delivers trimmed and manicured bodies up to the American corporate structure.

MSU has never possessed a name for

educational innovation. Instead it has concentrated much of its revenue in athletics and athletic facilities and is consequently still an impersonal, de humanized environment somewhat hostile to a meaningful education. It is testimony to MSUs institutional nature that its student body responded like affection starved puppies to Dr. Adams who, besides being articulate and accomplished, had as his main appeal the qualities of being human and tangible.

Because of the school's conservative heritage, it is slow to change and rarely innovates. Language requirements, archaic rules governing off - campus living, farcical student government "powers," institutionalized rascism in the sorority and fraternity systems, and even our "progressive" grading scale are all elements of a MSU education which are widely recognized, even within the university, to be irrelevant to the students purpose. To strip the student of all scholastic elements except his purpose would be just as bad, but to burden him is merely obstructive.

And how does MSU plan to improve itself and to answer the challenges of modern American education? Jack Breslin, trying to find a way to spend \$11 million, said, "They decided that no one really knew what to do with a new Union building...It was at that point that a new events building came about." Oh wonderful. The central argument for it, I suppose, is that sports brings money to the university. In response, one must ask what money brings. In this case, it brings sports to the university.

Sports are interesting and fun and they open alumni checking accounts. But MSU must wake up to the fact that it is 1970 and its success as an educational institution hangs on its efforts to improve itself academically. How many new experimental programs could \$11 million buy? How many scholarships and research grants and professors and classrooms could be had? How many poor people could be educated?

Mr. Breslin and the University want ASMSU's approval before proceeding. It would be nice if ASMSU would say no. If it doesn't, at least we can all hold our heads up high as we walk 'neath the ivied walls to the faint strains of the Alma Mater, and we can be secure in the knowledge that God is in heaven and we have a basketball court as good as

Grades, fail, final, midterm, 'C', test. We didn't need Jerry Rubin to tell us

that MSU is a prison and our professors are the wardens. It's been obvious to us for years -- through grade school, junior and senior high schools, and college -- that students are "niggers," slaves to the system, insitutionalized robots computed to regurgitate facts that are immediately forgotten after the final exam.

The grading structure is a mis educational case in point. Every student realizes that he has been brainwashed to work for the grade, grade point and, in turn, to please his professors -- i.e., a means to an end. Yet he continues to accept the system with little or no criticism while agreeing under this contract to gain trivial knowledge once his courses are completed.

You know it's difficult for many professors to admit that you only learn when you WANT to learn. What better reason to educate oneself than through the desire to be educated. What better reason to mis - educate oneself than through the rigid requirements under which one is "educated" within the present system. What better way to stifle intellectual pursuit than to hinge that accomplishment on the attainment of a certain number of credits and a minimal grade point average.

But here's the rub: most professors have been pounded with tests in their own college hey days, they struggled to gain their present status in the mis - educational set - up and they are still being tested through "publish or die"). To start you off on the right track -- to make you want to learn for the sake of learning - is to negate much of what the professor believes in and represents as a warden in the penitentiary.

The travesty resides in the inalterable fact that schools can only exist with students. If students don't attend a certain class, there is no class. If professors get up and lecture on and on -- ad boredom infinitum -- and the students say "we don't want this; we don't want to be spoon fed and given tranquilizers; we want to get knowledge out of this course and not '4.0,' '3.0,' or '2.0'," then the students are in command. If the professors balk students walk -- walk out and do their learning only as it can be done: through an intrinsic desire to learn.

Make no mistake about it -- students have the power. But they have abrogated that power by allowing themselves to be molded into automatons who think "grades, fail, pass, final exam, midterm, more grades, fail." For instance . . . from the ideas of Jerry Farber . . . why not have all the students in a course, with a term paper as the sole requirement, hand in the same, mimeographed term paper? What's a professor to do with 77 copies of one term paper? Does he fail the entire class? You are making trouble for the system because students have taken the power they themselves had placed in the cookie jar.

Or . . . have an entire class answer questions on a test so that each individual receives the same score. "What's a mother to do?"

There are courses on this campus - few

as they are - which do challenge the student to think for himself, to motivate himself out of his own curiosity and to continue his education even after the course is over. (Yes that's right, even after the course is over and the final grade. verdict has been rendered.) The injustice is that most of these students will, in five years, look back from their nine to five jobs and say, "Yeah, I had one of those semi - ungraded, semi - structured courses. What a groove! Easy "4.0," man Easy

... and that's what it's all about ... you put your right foot in, you put your right foot out you put your right foot in and ya ol shake it all about. You do the Hokey. Pokey and you turn yourself around. That's what it's all about!

Let's not place the blame on student apathy. It's the cut and dry corned beef hash served on a tin platter that puts students to sleep. And when they awake... oh, only if they did awake -- it's too late.

You can either study for the grade or yourself. Not both. If you work for the grade, you work for someone else. The grade only symbolizes your success in the gladiatorial arena of student competition and does not proclaim the self . improvement only you can comprehend. You come into this world desiring to touch, feel and be human; school imprisons your mind and senses, can place you on probation or give you a parole, and hands you the guilty verdict on the day you walk into kindergarten and are told, "don't fidgit, be courteous, attentive and put your puzzles away where you found

indication of how far the black man still is from true emancipation. I, personally, have always felt that a major reason for the failure so far of the drive to genuine black independence both in Africa and elsewhere is the black man's apparent inability to distinguish appearance from substance. In Africa it is more important to pose a false appearance of unity rather than to courageously face vital issues of disagreement: witness the ostrich - like behavior of the Organization of African Unity (OAU) whenever a serious problem arises in Africa. Elsewhere, some self styled leaders (e. g., the "Governing Council") would rather mouth meaningless cliches and unimaginative slogans than seek to acquire the values that would produce genuine self - esteem in the black man.

In Africa the departing colonial powers were at first impressed by the bombast of the "newly independent" countries of Africa but soon discovered that beyond the issuing of high sounding resolutions and trying to ape European statesmen, African leaders were not interested in dealing with crucial problems left over from colonialism; so they returned to business as usual. And now everybody shouts about

neo-colonialism I hope the same does not happen to our black brothers over here. Now consider the PASOA-BLFI

statement. The same people who rail against neo-colonialist encroachments in Africa now hail as a "victory" for Nigeria and "African unity" the repression of Biafra by European firepower. Biafra fought largely with the weapons fashioned by her own engineers and scientists; Nigeria was flooded with tanks and jet bombers from Britain and Russia. This is what PASOA - BLFI calls a victory for Africa. Has PASOA - BLFI considered the implications for the future of African independence if peace in Africa is to be maintained by armed might borrowed from Europe. Has the "Governing Council" asked itself why the eagerness of Britain and Russia to crush the Biafran revolution approached neurotic proportions. Does it appreciate the magnitude of the tragedy in purely human terms of the fact that 36 hours after Biafran troops laid down arms not a single ton of food or member of the international press has been allowed by the Lagos regime to reach Biafran civilians who have for three years been subjected to land, air and sea blockade.

If the PASOA-BLFI statement was motivated by genuine ignorance, I can only feel pity for its authors. I am sure that now that the military phase of the struggle is over the true story of Biafra will soon begin to emerge. Then, hopefully, some of our black brothers here will realize that to fight for dignity, independence and self. esteem for the black man and at the same time oppose Biafra is an irreconcilable contradiction. As for myself, while not claiming any distinction as a prophet, I feel quite sure that Biafra will have the last laugh in Africa.

### Dorm power proposed

A proposal to guarantee rights in residence alls by giving students definite power in meeting with dormitory managers was read at a Women's nter - Residence Council (WIC) meeting

The paper, written by the students of Case Hall, was presented by Margaret Lesher, Glen Ellyn, Ill. sophomore and president of North case. The need for improved student - manager elations was indicated after a recent

isagreement over the use of a Case Hall room. "If the proposal passed on an all - University pasis, it would put students and management on n equal basis," Miss Lesher said.

The proposal includes a requirement that written records be kept of all student nanagement communications, a student rievance committee be formed and a direct

system of resolving student - management differences be initiated. WIC tabled action on the proposal until the final draft is prepared.

Some residents of Campbell Hall submitted a list of questions concerning the proposed All-Events Bldg. which they would like WIC to consider. Their main suggestion was that improved facilities be planned for cultural performances.

No action will be taken by WIC on the building until they have been contacted by Executive Vice President Jack Breslin.

Plans were also made to publish a pamphlet on residence halls to inform incoming freshmen and present dorm residents about MSU residence halls. The pamphlet would include a description of hall policies and the individual differences in regulations among the dorms.

editor of the National Review, spoke about the New Left, the New Right and liberalism Wednesday night. He said our society makes many people feel that they are incapable of governing their

Speaking about the federal government, Evans said that it frequently violates the right of free speech and dissent as well as religious rights.

He said the loss of freedom is very real for a large number of people and the government at its discretion will tell you what you can and cannot do.

Evans said that at the present time, "we have a power structure" that the nations founding fathers wanted to avoid. Citing an example of governmental violation of rights, Evans said that by the mid 1960s 1.2 million Americans had been

evicted from their property for public projects. He added that the people who have established the programs which abuse personal freedom have done so in the belief that they are acting in the public interest.


In response to such increasing governmental authority, Evans said, a diverse resistence against the power structure has sprung up which is at the root of both the New Left and the New Right movements. He characterized the New Left movement as a "half-baked Marxism" which is at best "eccentric."

The New Left has not succeeded chiefly because it has failed to conduct an ideological critique of the liberal orthodoxy, Evans said. The New Left mentality is a faithful reflection of liberalism. he added.

Evans said the New Left holds basically a nihilist point of view which is totally relative, and which is not founded on any absolute principles.

The New Right he said favors a more decentralized position for the government. The New Right, and other conservatives as well, are willing to try a new approach to the country's social ills whereas the liberals are not, he added.

Spivack explained that the president must conduct himself



### JEFF ELLIOTT Let's check the facts before we take action

A lot of controversy has developed in the last couple of days with the news of a \$10 increase in tuition to help finance the

building of a new All-Events Bldg. on campus. While several SN staff writers have presented stories on the building and the proposed student tax, our sports staff has yet to publicly take a stand on the issue. We have postponed taking such a stand because adequate information has not been provided to us or to the general public.

People have responded to the issue exactly as the stories have been written -- in a negative manner. Most of the information provided in the State News has been accurate, but has told the story from one side of the river -- the side opposed to a new events building.

What else would the Dean of Comm. Arts say when asked if he would rather see a new building for his department or a new sports arena? How many people in the athletic department were asked their preference of buildings?

The last part of that question is causing the split between the more cultural-minded students and the more sports-oriented students on campus and there's no reason that should happen. The fact is that BOTH buildings can be built and can be built in the same year. As could be an events building and a Center for Urban Affairs; or an events building and new additions and improvements to the Library.

A fact which has not been brought out is that the events building and an academic learning unit are not classified in the same priority rating. The events building is listed under buildings which have a non-academic relationship to the University. Academic units such as a research center, a new library or departmental buildings are granted by the state legislature and are, for the most part, funded by that body.

There has been little mention of the variety of uses of the All-Events Bldg., other than that it would provide a basketball arena

This is one aspect on which the Ad Hoc Committee for Advancement of Distinguished Educational Mainstay Energies (ACADEME) has failed to project their views. The committee apparently feels that we would be paying \$11 million for a "gymnasium," where 10 gladiators will duel until five of them are slain. This is an unusual description of a basketball game coming from a group which is self-proclaimedly not anti-athletics, nor anti-fun and support the athletic enterprise.

MSU Vice President and Secretary Jack Breslin has asked members of the press to wait until the middle of next week before taking a stand, when a complete picture and brochure on the proposed building will be issued. Thus, I will refrain from listing the numerous other events which could make use of the building.

I do not expect all students to approve the building and give their support to it. All I suggest is that people get enough information on the matter before coming to a decision.

One theory I hope students do not accept is that Breslin is pushing this only because of his interest in athletics. Vice President Breslin is an important link in the quality of MSU's administration. Undoubtedly his devotion to MSU exceeds any





### AP poll: rising prices affect uition costs across country Barbara Porter, Cadillac freshman to Philip Spike, Manchester senior

**Associated Press Writer** An Associated Press survey showed that rising prices affected public and private universities, large and small Wini Johnson, Colt's Neck, N.J. schools, all faced with inflation

> At MSU tuition has soared during the past five years, increasing \$26l for residents (an 81 per cent rise) and \$525 for out - of - staters (a 60 per cent

hike). The same squeeze is felt by students across the country, the survey shows, who face higher tuition and room and board

Ten years ago it cost \$2,300 to attend Yale University for one year. This year it costs \$3,600. Next year it will cost \$3,900. They include only tuition and room and board, no books or incidental living


expenses.

Increases vary The increases vary from a few dollars to several hundred. Officials blame boosts on higher salaries for teachers, rising construction costs, general inflation, need for new equipment, more expensive housing and cutbacks in federal

The Rev. Clement J. Schneider S.J., acting president of Creighton University in Omaha, Neb., cited general inflation as the reason for next fall's planned tuition boost of \$60 per semester, bringing the yearly tuition to \$1,550.

An Iowa State University official said the increases were necessary because of a lack of funds appropriated by the state legislature coupled with

Murphy, general manager of the New York Mets and one - time relief pitching specialist for the New York Yankees, will be held

Mr. Murphy died Wednesday night in a Queens hospital of a heart attack. He had been hospitalized since Dec. 30 after having suffered a heart attack at his home in Yonkers, N.Y.

A Mets spokesman said the body will repose Friday and a requiem mass will be held at 10 a.m. Saturday at St. Joseph's Catholic Church at Bronxville, N.Y.

Mr. Murphy became general manager of the Mets on Dec. 27, 1967, and was responsible for acquiring some of the young players who helped the Mets win the world championship in

Although he had served in an administrative capacity for the better part of the past 24 years, it was as a relief pitcher with the New York Yankees in the mid 1930's that he first achieved fame. Mr. Murphy, a tall-, lantern - jawed righthander, was considered the game's best relief pitcher during his career and earned such colorful nicknames as "Fireman," "Grandman," and "Fordham


