Grossfeld quits post at ASMSU board meet

Cabinet President Bob Grossfeld, under fire from the student board for allegedly violating the Associated Students of MSU (ASMSU) Operations Code, resigned at Tuesday night's board meeting.

The board moved immediately to accept Grossfeld's resignation.

The board also selected a representative to Academic Council to present a proposal that would allow students time to campaign for fall elections.

Grossfeld's move climaxed a three - hour session, most of it spent exchanging accusations. While the charges against Grossfeld centered around the code, the real showdown was over Grossfeld taking action without first getting board approval. Grossfeld admitted breaking the letter of the code on certain occasions when there was no other way of getting something done, but denied ever breaking the intent of the code.

"The important thing is to do what we can for the students, and if that means stepping on some bureaucratic detail in the code, then I'll step on it," Grossfeld said. "I'm not a Machiavelli, but on the other hand I can't ignore things that have to be done. Most of the things the cabinet's done have been in spite of the board rather than because of it.'

The chargers were nit - picking, Grossfeld continued, because the board had ignored the Operations Code on many occasions. The accusations against Grossfeld



Grossfeld said Wednesday he resigned for a variety of reasons, but not because of the

"You get to a point where you're doing your best and the people working with you are doing their best, and a bunch of bureaucrats - namely, the student board say you can't do this, and you can't do that, regardless of whether or not it could help the students) then it's time to call it quits," he said.

"If we're going to go by the code, we'll go all the way," ASMSU Chairman Harold Buckner said Wednesday, "A lot of (Grossfeld's) actions were interfering with my job - evidently a lot of the board members felt the same way.'

Before resigning, Grossfeld made a proposal to amend the ASMSU constitution, separating the cabinet from the student board. Under the proposal, the cabinet would have autonomy both financially and politically to carry out its programs, while the student board would be restricted to policy matters.

"The cabinet is the arm of ASMSU that actually does something - that can help people," Grossfeld said. "But I'm sick and tired of one arm - the student body trying to hack off the other."

Grossfeld's proposal was sent to policy

In other board action Tuesday night, Richard S. Kruch of ASMSU's legislative relations bureau was chosen to present a proposal to Academic Council to allow students to participate in campaigning the week before and the week after fall elections without jeopardizing their academic standing. Respect nations, Nixon pleads

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP) - President Nixon, "honored to be the first American President to visit Yugoslavia," appealed to all nations Wednesday night to respect the

"Long ago Yugoslavia chose the path of nonalignment, and for more than two decades Yugoslavia and Marshal Tito personally have played major roles in the nonaligned movement throughout the world," the President said. "We in the United States respect that position.

"But the great question today is not whether a nation is aligned or nonaligned, but whether it respects the rights of others to choose their own paths - and Yugoslavia, by its example, has given heart to those who would choose their own paths."

Nixon spoke at a state dinner given by President Tito, who is a Communist but who for 22 years has refused to recognize Moscow as the fountainhead of all Communist wisdom.

In toasting his visitor, Tito criticized the big powers for intervention in the Middle East and Indochina — and, by implication,

Arriving from Italy, President Nixon received a friendly and orderly welcome from the people of Belgrade. Compared with his visit last year to Romania, however, the welcome seemed smaller and less vibrant.

president whom Tito regarded warmly. At the state dinner the two presidents heartily toasted each other's country, then got down to world problems.

Tito said Nasser's death "in the present political situation in the Middle East makes it incumbent on our side to exert maximum efforts to arrive at a peaceful and just political solution for which President Nasser strove consistently and with dedication to

Administration attempts to block lottery loopholes

WASHINGTON (AP) - Still plugging holes in its draft lottery system, the administration has knocked down the chance of escaping induction by becoming 1A late in the year.

The Selective Service System announced Wednesday a three - month extension of draft liability for any 1-A man whose draft board has reached his lottery number but who has not been drafted by the end

of the year. The aim is to prevent the unfairness of drafting one man according to the lottery of last December and then passing up another man with a lower lottery number just because he became available along with a crowd of other low -numbered men after the manpower needs were filled.

That is the kind of situation created by the mid - year graduation of hundreds of thousands of college students, many holding lower numbers than those already

The time it takes to process such men into 1-A status leaves them unavailable for a draft call until late in the year, and the Pentagon has been unwilling to wait that long for recruits.

"Fairness requires that these men be effectively exposed to a draft obligation,' said draft director Curtis W. Tarr.

The move leaves unsolved, however, a related fairness problem - that of the men already drafted to meet Pentagon needs because the latecomers were not available

The carryover men will tend to benefit the new manpower pool facing next year's draft, while this year's pool sends extra men in their place.

The carryovers will, in fact, be drafted for 1971 calls even before the regular 1971 manpower pool is touched. Their draft priority will be second only to that of volunteers during next January, February and March.

Selective Service officials said they have no estimate of how many men will be carried over with this three - month extended liability, but Tarr said "relatively small numbers" would be affected

The move also leaves unsolved the problem of when one man is drafted under extended liability while another man in exactly similar circumstances escapes extended liability - and military service-

CAIRO (AP) — Egypt is saying goodbye to its leader Thursday on a scale probably unseen since the days of the pharaohs.

Officials said they expected a million Egyptians to take part in the funeral of Gamal Abdel Nasser.

On the eve of the final farewell, vast crowds of Egyptians, many still screaming their grief, marched arm - in - arm in downtown Cairo.

World leaders converging for the state funeral filed past Nasser's body, lying in state in Kubbeh Palace, the presidential

Vote drive nears end

Voter registration for the Nov. 3 general election will end Friday with less than 1,000 new voters on the books.

"We'll have to get pretty busy to reach 1,000, including the ones we registered on campus," Beverly Colizzi, East Lansing city clerk


Mrs. Colizzi said 372 students registered at a registration table set up at fall class registration manned by members of the League of Women Voters who were temporarily deputized. She said an accurate tabulation of new voters will not be possible until a week and a half after the books close Friday.

At a meeting Sept. 17 the East Lansing City Council approved the proposal to instigate an affidavit in registering voters. The affidavit is a sworn statement signed by the potential voter attesting to his age, citizenship and residence as being East Lansing. The affidavit was implemented by the city clerk Sept. 18.

Monsoon storms are beginning to lash the critical northern sector of South Vietnam and could force the allies to abandon one or more of their forward bases.

Already, the northeast monsoon has cut heavily into American bombing strikes and reconnaissance flights. And it could bring a large - scale enemy offensive.

If the North Vietnamese follow their performance of the past, they will use the tropical rains as cover for a drive toward South Vietnam's populous coast lowlands, some military sources report.

There was no solid indication of an oncoming assault but, as one U.S. commander noted, "It is always a possibility."

In Saigon, Gen. Creighton W. Abrams, commander of U.S. forces in Vietnam, was reported "resting comfortably" Wednesday night after he collapsed while attending a military ceremony earlier in the day.

It was the third time this year the four - star commander has been hospitalized.

U.S. ambassador Charles W. Yost declared Wednesday that revival of the Arab - Israeli peace talks requires strengthening of confidence in the Suez Canal zone standstill agreement.

Egyptian Ambassador Mohammed H. El-Zayatt immediately interpreted the statement as U.S. support of Israel's position in quitting the talks on the grounds that Egypt violated the agreement by advancing Soviet supplied ground - to - air missile sites.

The exchange occurred in speeches in the U.N. General Assembly in advance of another private meeting of the U.N. Big Four chief delegates - their first since the civil war in Jordan and the death of President Gamal Abdel Nasser.

National News

The Nixon administration accepted Wednesday a multimillion dollar program for putting the unemployed into federally supported public - service jobs as part of a major

overhaul of the government's manpower-training system. After an all - night negotiating session with members of the House Education and Labor Committee, the administration accepted the job provision as the price for getting a comprehensive manpower bill it wants.

With the stumbling block over public - service employment removed, the bill was approved by the committee 25 to 3.

Wholesale prices turned back up in September, taking some of the bloom from the Nixon administration's apparent view that it is winning the battle against inflation.

Food and fuels were the major factors in the rise of four tenths of one per cent in the government's Wholesale Price Index for September reported by the Bureau of Labor Statistics Wednesday. The rise wiped out a four tenths drop in wholesale prices in August, the first decline in nearly three years.

The bureau's price report coincided with other government reports warning of possible widespread fuel shortages that could further boost prices, and a 2 per cent rise in prices paid to farmers for raw products.

Most of the wholesale price changes in both August and September were due to food prices which are frequently subject to month - to - month fluctuations. The corn blight caused sharp price hikes for corn and other grains, the report said.

Edward Everett Horton, whose sly, wry grin, outrageous double take and anxious mannerisms made him a master of drawing room comedy for 60 years, died Fuesday. He was 84.

Brooklyn - born Horton made his debut as a chorus boy, starred in countless plays and made more than 100 movies. Death came at his home on Edward Everett Horton Lane in Encino, California, a suburb of Los

The cause of death was not announced but the family requested that, in lieu of flowers, memorial contributions be made to the American Cancer Society.

Progress on settling local issues – termed the key to ending the 16 - day - old strike by the United Auto Workers against General Motors – continued at a sluggish pace Wednesday and hopes of a quick end to the walkout dimmed even further.

With bargaining on the national agreement being held in abeyance while all efforts were placed on the local - level agreements, there was little progress to report.

General Motors and the United Auto Workers had 38,358 local issues unsettled when the strike began at midnight Sept. 14. As of Wednesday afternoon, there were still 29,376 unresolved, down only 773 from the day before.

Trustee Don Stevens, D Okemos, and Patricia Carrigan, Democratic candidate for the MSU Board of Trustees, said Tuesday night that any liberalizing at MSU would come to an immediate halt if their Republican opponents are elected in November.

LONDON (AP) - Britian released Leila Khaled from jail and flew the Palestinian girl guerrilla out of the country Wednesday night - the price for getting hijack hostages home safe from Arab

Earlier Wednesday, the last six American male hostages held by Palestinian guerrillas in Jordan left Athens for home. The release of the six cleared the way for Switzerland, West Germany and Britain to free seven Arab commandos, as demanded by the Palestine guerrillas.

Board rejects racism charges

MSU's Anti - Discrimination Judicial Board rendered its first decision Tuesday in dismissing a complaint filed by Pauline A.

Miss Hess charged racism as well as discrimination and harassment against Celeste M. Moy, Detroit junior , and a cheerleader: Don E. Coleman, asst. director in the Dean of Students office and

Day-care center needs

pre-enrollment increase

intigao MSU trustees have tentatively approved funds to establish a day riguogare center for the children of ounitstudents in married housing. The rities enter, to be run by the Institute for


Family and Child Research, is to begin its operation Jan. 2, 1971 – if enough children pre - enroll.

The future of the day - care center is uncertain at this date because preenrollment figures are only one fifth the minimum needed for the project's fiscal success. The University has promised \$15,000 in aid if 50 children can be pre enrolled. If the quota is not filled by Oct. 5, the last day for pre enrollment, the \$15,000 appropriation will be withdrawn and consequently the day - care center will fade from reality.

It is still possible for the day - care

center to succeed. There are between 400 and 600 children in married housing. The privilege of using the day - care center would cost \$25 a week. In addition, some scholarship and county welfare aid is available for undergraduates.

day - care center to meet the needs of married students for a long time. Although the primary facility will be for the care of children two and one - half to five years of age, an evening adult program would provide discussions on child development and recreational opportunities. If the dual program is allowed to get off the ground, the institute can apply for federal aid after six months.

Anti-crime bills nudge Democrats to the right

A quick perusal of recent congressional output indicates that the only thing rising faster than the crime rate is the amount of anticrime legislation. What is not so immediately clear is whether the new laws are aimed at squelching the criminal on the street or the Democratic party on the Hill.

The latter claim - that the Republicans are legislatively trying to frame their opposition - is depressingly easy to substantiate. In the words of Rep. Emanuel Celler, chairman of the House Judiciary Committee, the Organized Crime Control Bill was, for example, "repressive, unconstitutional and irrelevant to the problem of crime in the street." And it is important to remember here that right - leaning Celler is hardly of liberal stripe.

The plan is clear: the Republicans are intent upon ramming anything vaguely labeled "anti-crime" through the congress and happily lampooning hesitant Democrats along the way. This ploy is meeting success: the current political mood in the nation is definately running toward the old Biblical, fundamentalist philosophy

of retribution as opposed to solution. Finally with the speed of a rushing glacier and the finesse of a Governor's wife running for the Senate, the Democrats have started to respond in kind. It is a matter of survival, they

Unfortunately this tack does not really work. Doves look most ungainly in Hawks clothing - and Agnew is not the least reluctant in handing out his "come lately awards." Part of the problem is that the embattled Democrats, in attempting to step rightward, are utilizing the shotgun approach rather than the more selectivist Hubert Humphrey sidestep.

The peril is eminent: The Democrats may be damned no matter how they move. Their present position could easily net them the epithet of "soft," but a rightward swing could damage their credibility and drive the uncommitted middle voter further Republican.

In sum, the fate of election 1970 still rests, not with what the Democrats accomplish, but what the administration can muff in the next

Students go off-campus to avoid immoral dorms

Richard Ernst, Republican candidate for the MSU Board of Trustees, cannot be criticized for taking a stand on the issues. It is indeed heartening to hear that the GOP standard - bearer is also concerned with the \$2 million that MSU dorms will lose this year.

Ernst argues that students are moving off - campus "because of concern about loss of privacy, ereation of conditions not in keeping

with personal moral codes and the existence of a climate not conducive to good studies and research."

Freedom in life - style is more properly associated with off campus living. Students move off campus to get away from hall restrictions, not to move into a more restricted atmosphere. In addition, off - campus living can be cheaper than the \$361 a term now charged for residence halls.



While it is true that television is a limi medium and within its limits deals w many untruths, the commercial mention really uncovered the fundamental essence American life today. This essence, in whi material goods are canonized and lives oriented to impress others with superfic words and actions, has and is be promoted at the expense of inner peace a happiness which so many of us aretaught a socialized never to know in our lifetimes.

Perhaps in this word it is not possible get along without constant or frequent ro playing but it does seem reasonable attempt to limit one's role - playing a often the insincerity and cruelty whi concomitantly follow. Fortunately, some, genuine happiness may reside in su an attempt and, if not, at least the attempt necessary before one can attempt something different or choose to remain stagnant.

Many philosophers and poets has reflected on the absurdity of, not only role playing or being untrue to one's self, but als the playing of life's game too seriously. this vein, it may be useful to mention a p contradiction of mine.

There is an enterprising scholar. And I becomes enthralled with the life and wor of Lao-tzu, the eminent sage of Taoism. Ar he becomes so enthralled that he spends h whole life writing, translating, deciphering reading and becoming mesmerized with the never - ending beauty and simplicity of th sage's words of wisdom. Only the scholar ha forgotten that Lao-tzu despised the schola and felt that humans should refrain from th world of words and shades of meanings an instead experience nature, the warmth o the sun, feelings, a wind, etc.

Today it is extremely difficult to live handsome life filled with marriage, a home children, comforts unless one joins the ra race and accordingly becomes a rat. But the contradiction remains for the scholar or, for that matter, anyone who watches and listen intead of feels and does. And it seems that the answer - if one exists - may lie in seeing through the contradictions, problems hypocrites (Alan Watts) and realizing that these supposed absurdities are so meaningless as to not confront us as "problems" for serious contemplation.

The important task is not running away from problems but facing them squarely AND, at the same time, being fully aware that the problem is not "problematic" but always involving enlightenment of the mind and soul.

By facing problems (externals) with the hope of achieving inner awareness, we begin the perilous journey of understanding who and/or what we really are. And through knowing ourselves perhaps we can make some sense out of the agonies of our

Can't radicals be radical?

EDITOR'S NOTE: Beginning today, the State News will periodically publish a column wirtten by J. Pat Rooney, who is currently president of Executive Systems, a management consultant firm. Mr. Rooney is a noted authority on higher education, and he last year organized two national conferences on campus unrest and a national conference on the crisis of high schools.

Mr. Rooney's column, though certainly not representative of the business community, will hopefully provide a perspective usually lacking from those within the immediate academic community.

Are even the radicals radical? Or is the unending talk of a better society just a rhetorical ego trip?

Radicals have been telling us how we must change society, making us uptight about how society is dehumanizing. It seems to me that most of the radicals I know are willing to submit to dehumanizing treatment of themselves, and given the opportunity, they appear to treat others with just as much insensitivity as the power structure they complain about.

I recount a couple of my own experiences. I took the family to a rock concert by Steppenwolf. Our seats were \$4.50 each. Most of the seats were better and cost more. A crowd of more than 7,000. Which all adds up to a very great deal of money for a one-night, one-hour performance.

I have never been more angry in my life, for that giant-size crowd of young people (I was one of the over 30 exception) had to obtain entrance to the stadium, ticket in hand, through only two one-person- at - a time turnstiles. The result was a giant balloon of people trying to squeeze through a knothole. The other stadium entrances were closed. It costs less to pay attendants at two gates than 10 gates.

It's dehumanizing to push people through the eye of a needle.

No adult audience would have stood for such treatment, and no right- headed performers, or promoters, would have treated an adult audience in that fashion.

But the "student is a nigger," and even

their rock heroes treat them that way. Those who profit from the dehumanizing of people

can take the blame. I created a major scene at the rock concert, ridiculed by many of the students squeezing through the same turnstile. If one in every 20 of the thousands of paying customers had lodged strong protest - not talking about violence - the system could not have taken it. The "system becomes nonfuctional when faced by massive protest. More correctly, the system is forced to respond, and cannot operate effectively, when faced with quantities of protests.

I sputtered: "Can't even the radicais be radical?"

I'd been through the scene of being served by black people and paying the money to white people for absolutely the last time.

The one redeeming thing in this situation is that I was able to insist on paying the money to the black woman - and giving the tip to the black woman (the tip was a stake, too) -without having to create a major scene.

These two tales - and, unfortunately, a great many others - make me despondent about the works of reform - and - humanness

As to niggers with dark skin -

The other night I had dinner at a pretty far out restaurant, operated by people who at least thought themsleves "hip." There was wall - to - wall protest music, and a lot of counterculture hair styles around. A white female took the food order,

opened the wine bottle . . . and that was the st of her work.

A black female took over. The black girl mothered over us to make sure we had everything we wanted. The white girl did the prestige things, the black girl did the work. Then I asked for the check, which the black girl provided, saying, "You have to pay them" - "them" was the white counterculture types.

that are mouthed in such abundance.

The analysis of choice concerning radical rhetoric and radical action comes from Ivan Illich. (Illich heads the Center for Intercultural Documentation in Cuernavaca, Mexico, and is one of the world authorities on educational reform.) Illich argues that you've got to stop the societal disfunction at your own doorstep. He contends, if we are willing to be messed over ourselves, we will later accept it as fair and reasonable to do the same thing to others.

One of the things that most people don't realize is the vulnerability of the system to protest, expecially when that protest is over moral issues of human dignity.

A year ago, in the company of four not well - dressed students, a New York hotel

refused to honor our reservation. The students insisted that I not take on the hotel management, because they said this would be a great learning experience for me. I finally went along with what was happening because it would have been easier to protest against the passivity of my young colleagues. My student friends supplied themselves with a good story for rap session, but would do nothing to challenge the situation.

Was it better to insist on paying my money to the black waitress, or the acquire only & good story about racism in our society? By confronting the situation, I got both. Submission to unjust and immoral treatment does nothing to change the


It is clearly more difficult for young people, lacking the credentials of the system, to take on the system, but it's not by any means impossible - especially when a few act in concert.


One of the rhetorical failures is the use of the term "the system." The term suggests that there is one diabolical monolith creating all of the societal problems - and implies the futility of doing anything about societal disfuctions. The concept of "the system" permits the individual to feel sorry for himself, while letting him feel free to de nothing about the injustices he encounters

The only position of radical reform that is worth the name is one that confronts societal disfuctions where we encounter them. . . in our own lives. Otherwise, it's only rhetoric.

The radical rock group and the "hip" restaurant management use the appearance of social change to their personal economic



HOLLYWOOD (AP) - The American Humane Assn. plans to start rating foreign - made movies "acceptable" or "unacceptable" next month, depending on whether animals in them have been treatedcruelly.

A particular target is the so called running W, used to trip a galloping horse into a spectacular fall, Harold Melniker, director of the association's Hollywood office.

Invisible wires linking a horse's legs and an off - camera stake send him head over heels, and sometimes he gets a broken leg or neck, said Melniker. "The practice was quite



Red China marks birthday

TOKYO - Red China is marking its 21st birthday seemingly more confident, more stable and less fearful of war with the Soviet Union than it was a year ago

Western sources speculate that the holiday Thursday may be highlighted by a spectacular demonstration of Chinese nuclear progress, the launching of an intercontinental ballistic missile. But there is no outward evidence that such a test, moving Peking into the first rank of nuclear powers, is being COSTS CITED prepared.

Two nuclear explosions - one underground, the other in the atmosphere - punctuated the 20th anniversary period in 1969. They appeared timed to warn

the Soviet Union against encroaching on Chinese borders. good harvest and satisfying Peking. Moves have been made relaxed.

The chaos of the three - year cultural revolution has been succeeded by relative political calm. The Communist party has affairs. Long-vacant set about restoring party branches. 





Psych committees open to undergrads

Under a proposal approved by the department last spring, undergrad students will serve for the first time on five of the 10 department

"It's the first department in the University that has implemented the suggestion in the McKee Report to allow undergrads to serve as full voting members on faculty committees," Dick Aslin, Brookfield, Wis. senior and cochairman of the Psychology Club said.

The McKee Report proposing increased student participation in academic governance, is now being reviewed by the Academic Council.

Positions open to undergrad psychology majors are on the following committees: Undergraduate Instruction Committee, which determines curriculum and graduation requirements; Advisory Committee, a liaison between the department chairman and undergrad students; Human Subjects Committee, which decides ethical procedures for human subjects in experiments;

and the Space Committee, which assign departmental building space.

Officers of the Psychology Club, of which all psychology majors are automatic members, are also being nominated. Positions of president, vice president and secretary are open.

These student representatives and Psychology Club officers will have full voting power at all regular faculty meetings as well as on their specific

Any psychology student desiring nomination should leave his name and phone number in the box at 109 Olds Hall. A short biographical sketch is optional. All psychology majors will receive ballots by mail before Oct. 5.







Trip nets Nixon political support

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP) - In visiting Yugoslavia today President Nixon is in some ways wooing the political support of a million or so Americans who have relatives in this country.

That figure is the estimate of a Yugoslav official who said: "The great majority of Yugoslav -Americans are moderates. They are loyal to both the United States and Yugoslavia.'

Officials here contend most Yugoslav - Americans are proud of their homeland and of the fact Poll SQYS that it is being visited for the first time by a U.S. president. They admit there are activists in the United States hostile to Miliken President Tito's regime, but say these are fewer than five per cent.

Jovan Grbovic, secretary of the headquarters for Serbian emigrants abroad, a cultural organization, described anti -Tito extremists and terrorists as Fascists, some of whom collaborated with Hitler and Mussolini during World War II. "They are making a business of extremism and they are not contributing anything to the United States," he said.

RADICAL-LIBERAL

Agnew rebukes Goodell

MINOT, N.D. (AP) - Vice President Spiro T. Agnew said Wednesday he would have to include Sen. Charles E. Goodell, R-N.Y., in "that radical liberal coalition that has been obstructing the President's program since 1968." He said he would not support Goodell for re-election.

And in New York, Goodell attacked Agnew, saying he was "deeply disappointed in Agnew's public statements about the presidential commission's report on campus unrest.

In a television interview taped for showing Wednesday night in several North Dakota cities, Agnew said: "Sen. Goodell has left his party. He has not supported this administration on the key measures.

Asked if this meant he might support Conservative James Buckley, in the November election the vice president said, "You can't make that assumption. I merely say that my support for Sen. Goodell is a moot question because he already rejected the support of the

administration and suggested we stay out of his state. I'm merely saying I'm not supporting Sen. Goodell.'

At Palm Springs, Calif., Sept. 12, Agnew declined to specify that Goodell was one of his "radical - liberal" targets, but said, "I probably will make some judgment about that particular senator somewhere along the campaign trail." Goodell also faces Rep. Richard L. Ottinger,

D-N.Y., in the senatorial election. In response to Agnew's statement that he would not support Goodell for reelection, the senator said in New York:

"I am confident that the people of New York State will not allow Spiro Agnew to pull the lever for them in November."

Arab truce called failure

The Jordanian army launched artillery and ground attacks Wednesday against two guerrilla · held towns in Northern Jordan in violation of the latest truce, the Palestine guerrillas charged. The three - man Arab truce committee in Amman, the Jordanian capital, sent Arab obervers to investigate. The two cities are Irbid, 50 miles north of Amman and the scene of violent fighting in the 11 - day civil war, and Ramtha, 10 miles to the

In the United Nations, the United States appealed to Israel and Egypt to resume the stalled

Middle East peace talks. The Palestine guerrilla charge, broadcast over Camascus radio, said "the roar of explosions can be clearly heard from the Syrian order." Ramtha is only five

miles from the frontier. "The Jordanian military regime exploited the current state of deep grief which has gripped the entire Arab world over President Nasser's death to stage the new attack on Irbid and Ramtha to implement its plan of liquidating the Palestinian resistance movement," the guerrilla statement said.

It called the bombardment "an open violation of the Cairo greement" reached Sunday between King Hussein and guerrilla leader Yasir Arafat to stop the civil war.

guerrilla communique described the ground attack as massive. It said the ground orces struck after a day - long artillery bombardment of Irbid and Ramtha.

The communique said the main target of the ground attack was the old fort of Ramtha. Guerrillas there "put up a heroic defense using rockets and antitank guns," it added!

Elsewhere in the Middle East, kings and world leaders gathered in Cairo for the funeral Thursday of Gamal Abdel

People throughout the Arab world continued to mourn his death, which occurred Monday of a heart attack.

In some instances violence flared. Arab mourners in the occupied Gaza Strip threw a burning tire at an Israeli army vehicle and shouted "God is greater than Israel" when Israeli troops fired over their head.

The Arabs marched through Gaza waving black flags and chanting: "God is great. Take Nasser to paradise.

In Beirut, the Lebanese capital, shooting broke out when parading mourners tried to stop cars in the street, but no one was hurt. Cars with portraits of Nasser toured the capital.

After the Palestinian truce violation charge was broadcast in Damascus, Amman radio broadcast a statement from Brig. Ahmed Abdul Majid Hilmi, the Egyptian commander of the Arab cease -fire observation force in Jordan, ordering the army and the guerrillas alike to cooperate with the mission to the two northern towns.
