Auditors of the General Accounting office examined 35 contracts totaling 135 million awarded to 21 contractors in

For 18 procurements totaling \$47 milion, the auditors found that negotiated ontract prices were \$1.5 million higher han the cost indicated by data available to the contractors at the time of negotiation. The contractors were not identified.

The auditors said little or no overpricing s found in the other 17 contracts totaling \$88 million.

As examples of overpricing, the report sid, one contractor's bill for purchased parts for hand grenade fuses was \$303,000 higher than justified by previous cost experience. It said a negotiated price for gin direction computers and magnetic discs included materials overpriced by The auditors conceded that the

overpricing on the contracts examined was not large in relation to the totals involved. but said it occurred under the same conditions that the 1962 Truth in Negotiations Act was intended to correct. The 1962 law requires contractors to submit cost or pricing data in support of their price proposals and certify their

As a result of the GAO findings, Staats uid the Defense Department has associated price reductions of \$340,000 in two cases and is taking action to obtain adjustments in other cases.



Supreme Court ruling confuses voter sign-up

When the U.S. Supreme Court handed down a ruling last month upholding the 18 - year - old vote in national elections, it also handed confusion and headaches to Michigan's election officials.

The court supported the 1970 Federal Voting Rights Act which, among other things, lowered the voting age to 18 and set 30-day residency requirement for voters

in presidential elections. But since Michigan's 21 - year - old voting age still applies to state and local elections, city clerks and other officials are left with the task of separating over - 21 - year - old registrants from minors who may vote only in federal elections.

The 30-day residency requirement also set by the new federal law will apparently have little effect in Michigan.

Michigan's constitution, which calls for a minimum of six months' residency in the state for state elections, requires only 30 days' residency for national elections.

East Lansing Clerk Beverly Colizzi said Tuesday she will continue to ask registrants if they have lived in the state for six months rather than the 30 days prescribed by the federal law.

"The 30-day requirement only applies to persons voting for president and vice president," Mrs. Colizzi said. "So actually the federal law changed nothing in regards to residency.'

She said if an 18 - year - old who was not a six - month resident came to her seeking to register, she would recommend that he come back nearer the time of a federal election, since that is the only election for which he is eligible to vote.

Mrs. Colizzi said Monday her office is already noticing the extra load of paper work involved in keeping separate books

A greater problem, however, will likely arise when election day arrives and a distinction must be made between adults and minors at the polls.

"I think this will be a more acute problem than the paper work involved in registration," Kenneth Franklin, a legal adviser to Gov. Milliken, said Tuesday.

"But I don't think it's an insurmountable problem," he added.

He suggested that separate voting machines be set up at the polls and that election workers manning the books on election day merely check the voter's age in the book to determine which machine he should use.

Minors would be given a ballot bearing only the names of candidates running for national offices -- president, vice president and Congress.

State Elections Director Bernard Apol said Tuesday he would soon compile instructions based on discussions with the attorney general, to assist city clerks in registering minors.

Apol said he expects the state legislature to introduce proposals aimed at clearing up the confusion.

Last year the legislature voted to place a constitutional amendment on the ballot that would have lowered the state's voting age to 18. The proposal was soundly defeated by state voters in the November

investigating abduction

Authorities sought three men Monday in connection with the abduction of a 17-year-old Lansing youth Sunday night, the Eaton County Sheriff's Dept. said.

Lt. Gene Hoag said the FBI may be called into the case. He added, however, that the FBI becomes involved in most kidnaping cases.

Hoag said James Magee, a student at Sexton High School, was found in the front yard of a home about two miles from Lansing. The youth was bound at the hands and feet and was taken to St. Lawrence Hospital for X-rays of bruises on his chest.

According to Hoag, Magee said he had been dumped less than an hour before he was found. Other details of the alleged abduction were not revealed.

Magee was forced at gunpoint into a car outside a west side drive - in restaurant the sheriff's department said.

Magee had expected to return to school Monday after a month's absence because of a broken nose suffered in a fight with a student at Sexton. School officials declined to link the incident with the abduction.

Budget Cuts Discussed

House Republicans met behind closed doors Tuesday to discuss proposed cuts in the state budget but withheld any recommendation pending Gov. William G. Milliken's decision on what must be trimmed.

Thirty-five members of the 52-man GOP caucus met for a three and a half hour budget briefing with Glenn Allen, Milliken's chief fiscal aide.

Milliken, predicting a \$108 million deficit by the end of the fiscal year next June 30, is expected to present his recommendation for budget cuts to the legislature sometime early next week.

The legislature already trimmed some \$50 million out of the current budget late in 1970.

Referendum set on four issues

Students will be faced with four proposed amendments to the ASMSU constitution on an all - University referendum this month, including one issue that will strike close to home for almost everyone: a proposed increase in the student tax.

The proposed amendments are to increase the student tax, to make the heads of the major governing groups voting members of the student board, to establish an all - University elections commission to supervise all ASMSU elections and referendums and to prohibit student board members from paying themselves out of student taxes.

The amendments were tabled by the board at the end of fall term, awaiting a student referendum early this term.

"We expect the four amendments to be passed by the student board at next Tuesday's meeting," ASMSU Chairman Hal Buckner said Monday. "The referendum will be held around Jan.

The tax proposal, the issue affecting students most directly, could increase the student tax from 50 cents to \$1 per student

The revenue from the tax increase is earmarked for specific student representatives will projects, 20 cents to be used to expand legal aid services and 30 cents to establish a student cooperative.

A second proposed amendment would return the vote to the heads of the major governing groups - Men's Halls Assn., Interfraternity Council, Off - Campus Council, Women's Inter residence Council and Panhellenic Council - who are currently nonvoting board members.

When the structure of ASMSU was changed to the present district representative system, the vote was taken away from the governing groups since it was believed that the district representatives would more adequately represent the various

student constituencies.

A third proposed amendment would establish an all -University elections commission to run all ASMSU elections and referendums.

The rationale for the proposal is to set up a permanent body that could unify election procedures and provide impartial



Taylor Report: lesson in 'U's official channels

of studying, staying stoned, an excess of movies, and very little action. Maybe it's the weather. It's hard to be concerned about much of anything when it's 20 degrees below

So with little outcry the McKee Report (alias the Massey Report, now alias the Taylor Report) should die a quiet death and be rewarded with an even quieter epitaph this term. The Academic Senate may pass the new revised Taylor Report. It contains little that threatens the faculty's position in the University, and even gives them sole responsibility for preserving the "intellectual authority" of this enlightened community.

But the McKee Report is dead. Dissected, probed, and dismembered by the Academic Council and Senate, any resemblance between the report -- soon to be considered by the Senate -- and real student participation is mere coincidence.

A new book, entitled "Academic Gamesmanship: An Irreverent Primer Report is worth passing because it is on How to Make a Ph.D. Pay" states "Getting ahead (in the University) is well worth the effort because a professor who has learned how to play the game enjoys a very good life, one that combines security and physical comfort with a high degree of independence. It is the surest road to a life of comfortable indolence if one feels so inclined, and of serene dedication to one's harmless manias if one chooses to 'work.' "

University faculty, it seems, have an enviable position to protect. Students involved in decisions could foul up a plush occupation. To prevent such an occurence, faculty have made extensive inroads into

Winter term is traditionally a term control of the University, particularly in the past decade. As "Academic Gamesmanship" says "The campus is a government of professors, for professors and by professors."

> Things are likely to remain that way here for quite a while to come. To be sure, many faculty members realize all components of the community ought to share equally in the decision making process, but they remain a minority.

Perhaps the entire reasoning behind the McKee Report was off base. Students politely asked the faculty for a voice in academic government to make a privileged clique a little less exclusive. And when the majority of the faculty refused, many students reacted with surprise. It may be little consolation now that the McKee Report was doomed from the word go, but may be a tactical point to keep in mind for the future.

The debate is now reduced to whether the bastardized Taylor better than nothing. As it stands now, the report certainly couldn't be called "pablum for permissiveness," and further revisions from the floor of the Senate could make the document even more worthless.

The biggest mistake students could make at this point, however, would be to focus too much attention on the now emasculated Taylor Report, and ignore the fact that Academic Council comprises but one part of the University's governmental structure. It's time students saw the whole forest of channels. Perhaps there is a way around hidebound, faculty controlled government.

Election day unknown; but register for it now

Alas, it seems that higher bodies have nothing better to do than pass laws to confound and confuse the people and the City Council of East Lansing. The latest one has to do with election dates.

Under a recently passed state law, council members have the weighty burden of determining whether the city elections should be held in November instead of the present

Moving the date to year's end, say change proponents, would give newly elected councilmen more time to become familiar with their jobs and until spring to prepare the new

Opponents argue that a November election would mean an August primary -- and August is the month when many East Lansing residents are out of town on vacation.

The election date problem is further complicated by the fact that the East Lansing City Council will not decide the issue until Jan. 18 -three days after the close of registration if the election is to be held on April 5.

The answer is simple: register now, before Jan. 15. This way, regardless of the date of the election, you will be qualified to vote.

A word of caution: some registering officials have indicated that students may not register unless they press the issue. Press it - your constitutional rights are at stake. Among other things, be prepared to prove that you have been a resident of East Lansing for six months.



The doctor's bag

I went to a gynecologist about three months ago and he said I had venereal warts and they would go away without treatment. This has not happened and I wondered if you had any ideas on how I could get rid of them.

Warts are the result of a viral infection in the epidermis or superficial layers of the skin. As the virus reproduces it causes local disruption of the structure of the skin leading to the formation of the wart. The appearance of the wart seems to be dependent upon the ecology of the area inhabited. Thus, a wart on the hand will have a different appearance than a wart in the genital area where a moist and warm environment seems to result in abundant proliferation. The venereal wart's proper name is condyloma acuminatum. This cauliflower - like growth occuring most often in women is actually not a venereal

disease at all and is thus misnamed. The relationship between a host and an

unwanted guest is always complex and what makes warts appear on some people and not on others is unclear. Often the warts disappear without treatment and the person may develop immunity to the virus. Failing spontaneous recovery, treatment with local application of medicine is usually successful and if this doesn't work, it can be frozen off or zapped with electricity. All three treatments should be managed by a physician so I suggest returning to your gynecologist. You have but one set of genitalia, take good care of

My roommate and I disagree about opening the windows in our room. He says that drafts at night will give you a cold, I disagree. Which one of us is right? Also, why is it that some people can

stand the cold better than others? When I think the temperature of the room is fine he thinks it is too cold and vice versa.

My own informal, non-validated study indicates that disagreements between roommates about opening windows ranks third behind making noise and leaving rooms messy. Drafts at night do not give you a cold; neither do drafts during the day. Viruses produce colds and close contact with people enhances the transmission of the infection. Some investigators feel that a higher incidence of colds in winter is due to the fact that people stay indoors more and are in closer proximity to each other. The hot, dry indoor winter environment may produce irritation of mucus membranes and enhance the possibility of developing a cold. A room humidifier of the steam or dry vapor type is a safe, effective counter

Most people seem to sleep better when the room is cool but there is always an exception. Baring illnesses such as hypothyroidism which is accompanied by cold intolerence, there is no good explanation for individual variation in cold



Buckner hits Nixon's reply to Scranton campus report

ASMSU Chairman Hal Buckner has sent a letter to President Nixon attacking Nixon's response to the Scranton Commission's report on campus unrest.

But when asked if he expected any kind of response to his letter, Buckner said "not really."

The letter, dated Dec. 28, calls Nixon's reply to the report "particularly disappointing to students like myself as it conveys a negative, hypocritical tone that has seemed to typify your entire administration.'

Buckner said Monday he decided to send the letter after listening to Nixon's reply to the Scranton Commission report on television. He said the purpose of the letter was to "ask Nixon why he continues to say one thing and do another."

Buckner's letter accused Nixon of deliberately delaying any reply to the commission's report until late December, "a time when the campuses are by and large deserted for Christmas break. "I can only conclude that you are taking an opportunity to

reply when you felt you would be safe from the adverse reaction of those most intimately concerned with the report's content this nation's campuses," Buckner said.

Nixon's attempt to shift blame for campus disorders from himself to the academic community was "passing the buck," Buckner's letter said. He said that while the moral leadership of the country does not rest with the President alone, the greatest

Buckner charged that Nixon has done little to help end poverty, the draft, the Vietnam war or racial discrimination or to give more young people the chance to attend college, the so-called 'cause of dissent.'

The letter also questioned whether the 1,000 extra FBI agents Nixon requested to help "keep order" on campuses was in keeping with the administration's alleged policy of avoiding direct involvement in the institutional affairs of a college campus.


Buckner said that an even more critical issue was Nixon's response ("or lack of it") to the incidents at Kent State and Jackson State.

"Your failure to endorse the commission's criticism of the Guardsmen at Kent State and the police at Jackson State and the implication that the taking of life was there justified, gravely threatens our universities' openess," the letter stated.

Buckner also criticized Nixon's use of students as a political lever in elections, mentioning the offer of Att. Gen. John Mitchell to send a Justice Dept. representative to campus - just prior to the Nov. 5 elections - to meet with and engage in dialog with

Seven weeks ago ASMSU sent the requested invitation to the Justice Dept., saying that anytime after the Nov. 5 elections would be fine. No further word from the Justice Dept. has been



U.S. State Dept. reacts to Soviet Russia's 'threat'

WASHINGTON (AP) -- The State Dept. voiced shock Tuesday at what it termed an open Soviet threat of retaliation against U.S. establishments in Moscow because of attacks on Soviet institutions in America.

It strongly rejected the Soviet charge of U.S. government connivance in the violent demonstrations which Moscow said Zionist extremists have mounted against Soviet missions in New York and Washington.

And it reported two anonymous threatening telephone calls to U.S. diplomats in Moscow under circumstances suggesting official Soviet backing for the calls.

Press officer Robert J. McCloskey gave the U.S.

version of the U.S. - Soviet flareup over anti -Soviet demonstrations here after Moscow publicized a protest delivered by Ambassador Anatoly F. Dobrynin to acting Secretary of State U. Alexis Johnson Monday.

The Soviet protest warned that the United States cannot expect "normal conditions" for U.S. institutions in the Soviet Union when "Zionist extremists not only interfere with the normal functioning of Soviet institutions in the U.S.A. but also venture to threaten Soviet diplomats and other Soviet citizens openly with physical reprisals."

"We are deeply concerned and shocked," McCloskey said.

The Spartans are playing the style of ball that Ganakas knew would be necessary for them if they expected to win, ball control with balanced scoring.

Four Spartans are averaging double figures for the season. Rudy Benjamin, Bill Kilgore, Pat Miller and Brian Breslin. Benjamin leads the scorers with a 24.5 average while the other three are grouped around the 12 point per game mark.

The hot shooting by Miller and Kilgore has taken a lot of pressure off Benjamin and made him a more effective player. Defenses cannot collapse around the senior captain because he can get the ball to either Miller, who is shooting 51 per cent, or Kilgore, a 61 per cent shooter.

MSU has been patient with the basketball, something that Ganakas has stressed throughout the year. Waiting for the right shot has helped give the Spartans a 47 per cent average for the season. Although their opponents have taken 56 more shots than MSU, Ganakas' crew has put as many through the hoop as their foes.

The rebounding problem that was so evident against Northern Illinois has disappeared with Kilgore's emergence as a top flight center. The 6-7 sophomore was named to the Lobo Invitational all - tournament team and he also played well against USC's Ron Riley, who hurting his team's effectiveness. Rapids Junior College and Western Michigan the Frosh went into an extra period against visiting Aquinas on Dec. 14 and scratched out a slim 87-86 victory. The win was the first for the

Spartans and marked the first loss for the Aquinas squad who had entered the contest with a string of five victories. MSU dealt the crushing blow

at the free throw line. Aquinas was tassessed 29 fouls to 20 of Spartans. MSU cashed in on 27 points at the strip to only 18 for their opponents which told the tale of victory. In the second half of play

Aquinas cut a MSU halftime lead of 36-27 to a 74-74 tie. In that frenzied second half Aquinas shot 54.8 per cent from the field and a phenomenal 81.8 per cent from the charity strip.

It might be noted also that the Spartans were at a distinct advantage in the latter stages of the game when four Aquinas players fouled out.

Against Western Michigan on Dec. 12 the Spartan freshmen were not quite as fortunate. The Broncos managed a three point advantage at the half and held back MSU for a 80-72. Western Michigan shot at a .400 clip while the Spartan percentage was a miserable .353.

If MSU highlights were to be found in the defeat they would have to be in the play of Mike Ridley. Playing forward at 6-4, Ridley did a yoeman's job under the boards, gathering in 17 rebounds and scoring 10 points. "Ridley played well on the boards," Coach Matthew Aitch acknowledged, "that was his best game.

Aitch also expressed optimism in the play of Richard Jenks. An improved player, the 6-4 athlete has played at both center and forward positions. Jenks started at center against the Broncos and grabbed 10 rebounds.

Offensively for the Spartans the top scorers remained the same. Guard Mike Robinson led scoring in both the Western Michigan and Aquinas contests. Against Aguinas the 5-11 ace accounted for 34 of the Spartan points and in the contest with Western Michigan he scored 32. "Robinson shot a lot and shot well," noted Aitch, "he hit a good percentage." Robinson leads the MSU freshman scoring with a 32 point average.

Tyrone Lewis, although only a scant 6-1, started both games at a forward position. The fleet Lewis totaled a respectable 14 rebounds in the two games while netting 16 and 17 points to remain the freshman squads' only consistent hot hand other than Robinson.

"As a whole the team has shown much improvement over their first game." Aitch said.

which I've heard Mr. Searle make, I think I have no quarrel with the Attorney General or any of the defendants in the case," he told the court. "I would regard the issue as moot as far as the litigants are

Searle told the court the Attorney General's office still feels the amendment was technically deficient, but that since a vote has been taken, the vote should not be erased

because of technicalities. He urged the court to find the amendment technically deficient, but then ruled that since the will of the people had been expressed it should go into the constitution anyway this

The court took the case under

advisement after the arguments were presented. The fact that both sides argued the amendment should stay in the constitution does not mean the court must decide the case that way, however.


If the court holds the amendment is a part of the constitution, then it also will rule on what the exact effects of it are as far as its effect on auxiliary service and shared time programs, the eligibility of the state for federal education funds and other areas.




