BOTANY GROUP TO HOLD FORAY

Anyone Interested in Subject Invited to Attend Event Next Thursday.

The annual Fern Botany Foray will be held on Thursday, May 23, in the botanical department greenhouse. This is an all-day botanical foray in which members of the botanical staff and their families and all students interested are invited to take part. It is not necessary to be a botanical student this year in order to be eligible.

The point to be visited this year is the vicinity of a small lake called Duck Lake (one of several by that name) which lies about two miles east of the town of Crystal in Montcalm county. Those who are going will meet at the botany building about 7 o'clock Thursday morning so that they may all get away by 8 o'clock. They should carry a lunch with them and a cup and spoon. Coffee will be provided at the place of destination Thursday noon.

Upon reaching Duck Lake cars will be parked at the picnic grounds on the south side of the lake and the woods and swamps at the south and east of the lake will be botanized for about three hours. Lunch will be eaten at about 1 o'clock at the picnic grounds. After a little period of rest, the cars will all drive around the lake through the snow (if held). About an hour will then be spent botanizing near a couple of other small lakes a few miles west of Crystal Lake, after which the return will be made to East Lansing. Wear old clothes and shoes that will not be hurt by wading in swamps.

Those who plan to go should leave their names with the girl in the botany office as soon as possible, but not later than 4 p. m. Wednesday, so that cars may be provided for all. Those who have cars please indicate how many vacant places there will be in the cars. Those who do not have cars will pay twenty-five cents at the time of registration. It is hoped that a large crowd will go this year.
