They have been ordered to appear and to appear and to tell Judge Ray C. Hotchkiss why they should not be ordered to drop their equirement for documented proof of local egidency as a prior condition to voter

Hotchkiss ordered the "show cause" ring Friday after he had denied temporary injunction against use of the requirement on that last day of registration for the Aug. 3 city council primary election.

The request was presented in private session in a suit filed by attorney Zolton A. Ferency on behalf of four students who questioned the city's authority to levy such a requirement.

Ferency, a former state Democratic party chairman and 1966 gubernatorial candidate, said the suit probably was the first of its kind in the state to test "the narrow issue of required documentation of

The plaintiffs are Audrey Jean Gunn, 26, of 212 East Pointe Lane; Kathleen Wilk, 25, of 501 Hillcrest St.; Calvin Jensen, 24, of

1199 Arbor Drive, and Scott Keith Hanson, 23, of 144 Highland St.

All claim East Lansing residency and contend thay they were denied, between June 3 and June 23, a registration affidavit when they failed to provide the required documentation of residency in the form of a driver's license, lease, rent receipt or letter sent to their current address.

Named as defendants in the suit were Beverly Colizzi, city clerk, and Linda Grandy and Joyce Trovapo, deputy clerks Codefendants include John M. Patriarche, city manager, and councilmen Mary P. Sharp, Robert J. Wilcox, Wilbur B. Brookover, James B. Brown and Gordon L. Thomas. Mrs. Sharp, Brookover and faculty members.

The clerks have been charged with denying registration to the plaintiffs and the other officials for directing the clerks to demand documentation of residency.

At issue before the court Friday will be the city's broad interpretation of state law. Citing Sec. 168.499, commonly known as election law, as their authority, Mrs. Colizzi and the other clerks have demanded documentation of residency before administering the registration affidavit.

The statute cited clearly grants clerks power "to require any applicant for registration to answer under oath any questions touching on his qualifications as residents if they were not employed. The an elector and . . . to administer oaths and affidavit was later drawn up by a

statements contained in affidavits."

Perjury related to voter qualifications can be punished with a \$1000 fine and five years in prison.

The residency documentation is explicit in the city's affidavit, which reads in part: "I have no other legal residence, as evidenced by such documents as my drivers' license or automobile certification."

The current affidavit came into use following a furor last August when students were denied registration because the city said they were not residents. At that time students were not considered

"negotiating team" that included students, councilmen and Ferency. Ferency said recently the documentation clause had , been accepted "in the hope that we could live with it." It has since been abused to the point of harassing young voters, necessitating the court action, he said.

Ferency said the city clerks have the duty "to protect the integrity of the election processess and do not not possess the authority to legislate voter qualifications or new safeguards, no matter how harmless they may factually seem to

House votes to continue nes present spending levels

The Michigan House of Representatives oted Tuesday to allow state expenditures o continue through July at levels istent with the just - ended fiscal year. The proposal, which goes into effect mmediately, was passed by the state enate June 29 to "assure, guarantee and

provide for the uninterrupted continued operations of state government."

The state entered a new fiscal year July 1 without approving a new state budget. Passed by an overwhelming vote of

80-16, the emergency bill was proposed to "buy time" for state legislators who have been tangling unsuccessfully with a new state budget for some months.

Chairman of the House Appropriations

Committee Rep. William Copeland, D-Wyandotte, said Friday he will send some of the minor budget bills to the House floor this week for consideration.

The tie - up in adopting a new state budget involves property tax relief and proposed hikes in the personal income tax.

Gov. Milliken, backed by a majority of Michigan Republicans, favors holding the income tax increase to a minimum, though Democrats argue that future increases will be needed to accommodate expanded school funding.

Speaker of the House William A. Ryan, D-Detroit, presented a budget package to the House Friday which represents a notable compromise from the speaker's earlier proposals.

Ryan called for a 1.1 per cent increase in the state's personal income tax with some

Signup crawls into night

State News Staff Writer A usual five minute procedure took an hour and a half Friday as hundreds of people converged upon East Lansing City Hall to register to vote.

According to Neil Colburn, head of "Project: City Hall," the delay was caused by a great number of people wanting to register with only three clerks available to register them.

Friday was the last day to register and

be eligible to vote in the Aug. 3 East Lansing city council primary. This, coupled with the passage of the 26th Amendment, brought hundreds of voters to city hall to

City clerk Beverly Colizzi said she did not recieve word until 4:55 p.m. Thursday that 18 - year - olds would be eligible to vote in the Aug. 3 election.

"I knew there would be trouble, but I didn't expect anything like this," Colizzi said Friday afternoon more than a hundred people filled the first floor of city hall, waiting to register.

Faculty females hit sex bias

WASHINGTON (AP) - Female faculty members at major colleges and universities throughout the nation are bringing charges of sex discrimination to academia.

Complaints have been filed with the federal government against Brown, Harvard, Yale, Maryland, Michigan, Pittsburgh, Wisconsin, Tufts and Stanford by women employees attacking hiring and promotion procedures, salary levels, standards for admission to graduate

studies, and tenure, which many female

academians say they find difficult to obtain.

So far, 250 complaints of sexual bias have been filed against 30 institutions. Federal officials have initiated 45 investigations, and won compliance from at least two major schools.

"There is a tendency on the part of many people we deal with to believe all the women's movement consists of is a bra burning display and rhetorical rantings against the existence of men," said J. Stanley Pottinger, chief government enforcer of antidiscrimination laws.

"There is that element," said Pottinger in an interview, "but when you find five women in an English department who have published as much or more than their male colleagues, who have equal degrees and who have been at the university longer, yet are paid less, have less tenure and are promoted at a slower rate, you're talking of something with real substance to it."

McGovern charges bias by Democratic treasurer

WASHINGTON (AP) - Sen. George McGovern, D - S.D., Tuesday accused Democratic National Treasurer Robert Strauss of breaching neutrality and signaling presidential campaign support for Sen. Edmund S. Muskie. Strauss denied it and said he had done no more for Muskie

than he would for any candidate - including McGovern. The South Dakota senator based his complaint on Strauss'

appearance with Muskie during a Dallas trip July 1. McGovern said, and Strauss confirmed, that the party treasurer flew to Texas on a private jet with Muskie, and was on hand for

his appearance before the Texas Trial Lawyers Assn. in Dallas. McGovern also said Strauss, a Texan, "arranged a private fund raising meeting for Sen. Muskie with friends of Mr. Strauss in

Strauss, in a telephone interview in Dallas, denied that. "I did have a reception for him, but it had nothing to do with fund raising," Strauss said. He said he arranged a similar reception for Rep. Wilbur D. Mills, D - Ark., several weeks ago, and would

do the same for any of the Democratic presidential prospects. Strauss said he had been asked, as a friend and a party official for "assistance and the courtesies of our state by almost all the

"In each instance, I've done everything I could," the party

treasurer said. "With respect to Sen. McGovern, I would be particularly pleased to show him off in Texas," said Strauss. He said McGovern is a good friend and has been particularly helpful in

Democratic fund raising efforts. McGovern made his complaint in a letter to Lawrence F.

O'Brien, the Democratic national chairman. "Of course, Mr. Strauss is entitled, as are all of us, to favor one Democrat over another, but he is not entitled to do so publically while holding high party office," McGovern said. "Indeed, he is not entitled to do so, in effect, on the money of rank and file Democrats who contribute funds to the national committee under the belief that its officials are neutral as among the candidates for the nomination."

Use of travel funds debated

"I'm just worried about my constituents," McCauley said. "If we continually approve tax hikes, we should see that the money is used wisely and is

McCauley released Friday a report by the state on overseas travel by MSU employes that was conducted by the office of State Auditor General Albert Lee.

The study showed that general fund expenditures for MSU employe overseas travel amounted to \$11,100 from July 1, 1970, to March 1, 1971. Additional expenditures from the general fund were made in payment of the salary of employes

while they were on the overseas trips. "We're talking about taxes here, pure and simple," McCauley said. "It's time we cut some of the fat off of school

appropriations." McCauley said he was not criticizing "legitimate research trips or those vital to keeping professors current.'

The overseas travel study released by McCauley makes no criticism or Auditors will also complete studies of

Provost John E. Cantlon said Tuesday that although inferences may be drawn from the travel report by some that the University has engaged in improper actions, "nothing could be further from the truth."

"No institution which prides itself on academic excellence and the quality of its faculty can expect to maintain such excellence by limiting itself to a parochial setting," Cantlon said.

The overseas travel of MSU faculty members can also have beneficial effects abroad "where the expertise and knowledge centered at MSU can be shared with others to help strengthen their nations," he said.



Cantlon revealed that in fiscal year 1970-71, MSU expended \$15,000 in state funds for travel and \$203,000 for salaries of employes on overseas missions. "The total of \$218,000 represents only about three tenths of one per cent of the roughly \$59 million which the state allocated for



Contempt citation hit

Twenty-one House Democrats charged Tuesday that the Commerce Committee's attempt to cite CBS and its president, Frank Stanton, for contempt of Congress is a threat to the First Amendment and they urged their colleagues oppose the move.

Rep. Parren J. Mitchell, D-Md., who originated the move, said in a statement that the proposed citation is "neither justified as a matter of law nor warranted as a matter of public policy."

Dept. changes revealed

The changes are a followup to a series of recommendations made last year by various task forces established to study reform of the department.

Garrison's move came in Criminal District Court, alleging the federal move aginast him came "in order to impute disgrace to the . . . district attorney."

Dems propose program

Democrats proposed Tuesday a seven-point program they said would get the ecomony moving again and combat inflation.

Lawrence F. O'Brien, Democratic national chairman, said that President Nixon should call a national emergency conference on the economy to consider the Democratic proposals.

O'Brien called for substantial boosts in benefits for old people, the incapacitated and victims of broken homes through Social Security and welfare programs.

Draft filibuster in doubt

Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield of Montana, said Tuesday he will not filibuster against a draft extension bill even if his amendment calling for a U.S. pullout from Indochina in nine months is dropped.

But he declined to say whether, if a filibuster develops, he would support a move to invoke the Senate's cloture rule to cut off debate.

The draft law expired on June 30, halting all inductions for the time being. Both the Senate and the House have passed bills to extend it for two years but have deadlocked over Mansfield's amendment.

Indians protest aid to Pakistan







Senate to hear legislation to aid Vietnam veterans

Legislation which would porvide educaitonal benefits for Vietnam veterans and guarantee home and business loans was sent to the Senate floor Tuesday by the Taxation and Veteran's Affairs

Committee. A substitute bill to broaden the original bill's coverage in the area of educational benefits also was adopted by the committee, Sen. James D. Gray, D-Warren, said. The substitute bill, sponsored by Gray, was referred to the Approproations Committee for a cost estimate

on the program. The substitute bill would provide Vietnam veterans with tuition and fees not to exceed \$900 a year for each of four years education in programs approved by the federal Veteran Administration. Also, \$100 a year would be provided for two

years for books and materials. Veterans would also be Ralph Kelly, legislative eligible for state guaranteed coordinator for the collegiate loans of up to \$10,000 for the purchase of a home or business. "I am confident, Gray said,

"that once the costs have been determined, the bill will be step toward improving veteran's Kelly said. brought before the entire Senate membership for action."

Gray added appropriations could be included in this year's budget until voters take action on the bond issue.

Many veterans fail to find work, Gray said, and wind up unemployed. Unemployment has been reduced in Illinois, Texas and Massachusetts, all with similar bills, because more Vietnam veterans there have taken advantage of the educational benefits.

DETROIT (UPI) - The city's garbage strike ended Monday when Detroit's 1,400 sanitation workers unanimously ratified a new, three - year contract.

Garbage pickups were scheduled to resume Tuesday morning with a mammoth job of collecting trash and refuse that had accumulated for five days.

Tentative agreement on the contract was reached early Monday between city officials and leaders of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal employes (AFSCME).

Also covered by the new contract are the other 5,600 members of Council 77 of the AFSCME, who had threatened to strike if a new contract was not drawn up within the next few days.

These union members were to hold a ratification vote on the new pact later Monday.

Included in the agreement was a 76-cent - an - hour across - the board wage increase for the 7,000 employes spread over the

length of the contract. Cornelius Hudson, president of Sanitation Workers Local 26,

said workers would be back on the job early Tuesday. "We might even work some Saturdays to pick up the huge piles

of refuse that have accumulated," Hudson said.

EDITORIALS Lightning-swift drops: No boon for students

Last spring Jim Melin, Grand Rapids senior, signed up for a half term elective in finance. Summer Term began and Jim attended the first three days of class. That weekend, however, he sat down to do his first reading assignments and found that he had gotten in a lot deeper than he had thought. Since finance was not required in his major he elected to bail out and promptly dropped the course the following Monday. It was then that he got the bad news: his minute hesitation before dropping had cost him 50 per cent of the course fee.

Jim's experience with the lightning - swift drops and adds period for summer half - term classes is by no means unique. Another student spent the first week of class negotiating with the economics dept. for an independent study course. On Friday he was informed that his proposal had been accepted, and on Monday he dropped four credits he was taking as a Visitor and added the four - credit economics class. He will be charged an additional \$26 in

Problems

Still other students have run into problems with obtaining textbooks and/or class outlines in time to be able to determine whether they wished to retain a class. Some simply did not realize that there were two different full - refund drop deadlines (Friday for half - term, Tuesday for full - term) and assumed they had until Tuesday to make up their minds.

Historically the half - term drop problems has its roots in an experiment that has, for the most part, proven successful. Until spring 1970 there was no free refund policy and any student dropping classes received a standard 50 per cent rebate. Beginning that term, however, the administration implemented the four - day full refund period in an effort to give students a better deal while providing an incentive for them to quickly make up their minds whether to remain in a specific class. The faster one student dropped a course, it was reasoned, the sooner another could add it, missing only a

minimum of course work. The two - day free drop period for summer half - term classes was

mathematical formula that half term classes met twice as often and, therefore, the drop period should be reduced correspondingly. The major rationale was that a full five - day drop period would deprive students waiting to add courses of up to 20 per cent, or the equivalent of two weeks, of course work.

Not manifest

This problem, however, has failed to manifest itself. A check of the "Big Three" colleges - Arts and Letters, Natural Science and Social Science – indicates that students have had "no difficulty" obtaining their pick of half - term classes. A very few courses, notably in the art department, have had some minor problems, but these generally involved filled sections rather than closed classes. In fact, obtaining classes went so smoothly that one administrator in the College of Social Science commented that "kids were coming out of registration dumbfounded" because they had not preregistered and still had no problems getting complete schedules

Further, an extended drop period for half - term classes would present no problem in terms of additional bookkeeping or administrative burdens. Asst. Registrar Victor Henley states that his office "could administratively handle" an extended free drop period of four days as easily as the present two day span. In fact, one could argue that a uniform drop deadline for half - and full - term drops would actually present less of an administrative hassle for the registrar's office.

Re-evaluation

The ball for re-evaluation of the present summer term free drop period is firmly in the hands of the several colleges. The registrar simply executes policy and his office has indicated that they "can't see that there isn't any good reason offhand" for not extending the deadline providing "the deans, colleges and instructors are satisfied that there is no problem."

Clearly the disadvantages of the present system markedly outweigh any marginal benefits that students may be receiving. The assistant dean's group or another responsible body owes it to the students of this University to implement a uniform arrived at by the simple full-refund drop period.

Parochiaid ruling right, but inequities remain

Last week the U.S. Supreme Court struck down parochiaid to elementary and secondary schools. In so doing the high court did much to unravel one of the touchier political knots on the American scene.

At the heart of the entire question was the First Amendment which states that "Congress shall make no law respecting the establishment of religion or prohibiting the free exercise thereof . . . "

In this light, the high court's decision rightly closes the door on the questionable procedure of state funding for private religious schools. Unfortunately and perhaps unavoidably, the decision, in essence, requires parents to either send their children to public schools or pay

twice for the cost of their education. The interests of all parties would seem to be equitably served by the implementation of a "voucher system" for dispensing school tax dollars. Under this plan, a parent would obtain a voucher representing his school tax assessment and then take it to the school of his choice.

Granted, certain minimum standards would have to be established for schools and bookkeeping would almost certainly be made more complete, but this seems a small price to pay for true freedom of choice.

Is there any harm in stopping taking birth control pills a few days or a week early in order to make your period come at a more convenient time? Will this increase the chance of pregnancy even if the next month's pills are started after the proper seven day wait?

Ovulation is under the control of several hormones. The birth control pill creates a hormonal condition resembling early pregnancy resulting in inhibition of the usual release of an egg each month. In order to be effective, the pill must be taken each and every day for the prescribed length of time. Skipping pills or shortening the period of time on the pill runs the risk that normal processes will break through the supression of ovulation set up by the pill. Shortening the cycle by a couple of days probably would make no difference, but a week is asking for trouble. Most pregnancies that occur in women



Ministers tune in to 'U' issues

By LESLIE LEE State News Staff Writer

Using a small office with antiwar posters, a United Nations flag and Eastern tapestries adorning the walls, the Reverand Warren Day of the United Ministries in Higher Education at 1118 S. Harrison Road tries to involve himself in a "world agenda."

Day said the campus minister needs to be sensitive to the issues and concerns of the campus. These involve the overriding issues of the times and issues of higher education. In this role the church can be helpful as critic and instigator from their perspective between the campus and the community.

"Certain questions must be asked," he said. "They need to be asked not only of the establishment and administration but of the demonstrators. Are you sure of your directions? Do you destroy personalities in pursuit of your ends?"

The university-oriented church can criticize and innovate whereas the community church finds it much more difficult Day said. The agenda of the community church is set with the local life of the congregation, it plays a conciliatory role. The campus church is set by the world agenda and is not closely tied by the local community. Because it does not feel these pressures, the university church can initiate and question, he said.

The question of the campus ministry, and that of the church in general is: "In what way can the resources of the church be related to its concerns?"

To do this the United Ministries in Higher Education was formed by the group effort of 10 denominational campus ministries. The local ministry at MSU is run by six full-time ministers - Day, The Rev. Bill Krumsk, The Rev. Jeanne Butterfield, the Rev. Richard Jackson, the Rev. Keith Pohl and the Rev. Don Ward.

At present the ministry is divided into four areas:

The undergraduate ministry which attempts to meet the concerns of the students at MSU. In this area fall the Albatross Coffee House on Grand River Avenue and a student newspaper, the Almond Branch.

The international ministry, seeking to relate to persons, structures and issues with a cross-cultural dimension. The science and human values ministry which tries to deal with

MSU medical students, in both the colleges of Human and Osteopathic Medicine, will receive training from a perspective which administrators say is interesting, challenging and different from that found in most other medical schools.



'Satchmo' dies, heart gave out

"Satchmo" Armstrong, beloved troubadour of the jazz trumpet, with a delightful rasp to his voice and roll to his eye, died Tuesday, his heart worn out, his golden horn silent at last. He was 71 years old Sunday.

"Me and my horn, we come a long way together," Armstrong married in 1942, and a sister and once observed.



on labor pact for Lum's

Preparation of a contract for employes at Lum's of East Lansing, 213 MAC Ave., has stopped until managers of the restaurant provide bargaining agents with an employe security list, a spokesman for the Hotel - Restaurant Employes & Bartenders Union said Tuesday.

The list is expected to come quickly, the spokesman said, and will be used to match employes' demands with wage rates. After wage rate classifications are completed, the contract proposal will be presented to Lum's management, she added.

The contract is expected to be ready for employes by next fall, the spokesman said. Employe demands must first be presented, followed by a counterproposal by management,

after which an agreement will be worked out, she

A move to organize Lum's employes came shortly after a bid for a similar union failed at Lizard's, 225 Abbot Road, said C. Patric Larrowe, professor of economics, who has assisted Lum's workers in their union bid.

Picketing at Lum's began in mid - May, when more than one - half of the employes signed union authorization cards, Larrowe said. Lum's managers declined to recognize the cards, he continued, and suggested the employes hold an

Rep. Brown hits tax hike without relief conditions

State Rep. Jim Brown, R - Okemos, announced recently that he will not support an income tax increase unless a pair of corresponding tax relief conditions are met. The conditions for Brown's support are:

•Approval by both the Senate and House of Gov. Milliken's constitutional amendment roposal to eliminate dependence on property to finance school operations, and placement of the

Restoration of the property tax and city come tax credits on the state income tax.

"To provide equity in our tax structure, we nust have property tax relief," Brown said. "I fully support the governor's proposed constitutional amendment and have no intention of adding to the property owner's burden.

"The reinstatement of the tax credits simply epresents the fulfillment of a government promise to the people. These credits were uspended for last year with the understanding

hey would be reactivated this year. "We are starting the new fiscal year and find the state operating unconstitutionally because the legislature has not yet adopted the budget bills. This condition is clearly forbidden in the

constitution. This makes it obvious that the concept of superpower negotiations by a few power brokers in the legislature is not workable in settling the budget questions.

"I don't like the idea of a few powerful men cutting deals the rest of us are supposed to swallow. This consensus concept of operating government is inherently bad."

Brown also disagreed with the idea that must raise additional revenue to finance the 1971 - 72 budget. He said he'd support an income tax increase only to replace the funds lose through property tax relief.

"If we had the courage to clamp restrictions on spending, we could balance the budget to match revenues without the massive tax increases

"There seems to be a blind acceptance of the idea that spending must be continually increased," Brown added. "Often I've heard the people credited with demanding additional public services. Most often, I believe, it is actually the politician and the bureaucrat who seek popular favor through initiation or continuance of services regardless of their value or desirability."





CHICAGO (UPI) - Big Ten officials will interview three prospects for the job of conference commissioner today, but no announcement was expected of any decision.

Robert F. Ray, Iowa faculty representative and chairman of the joint group of faculty representatives and athletic directors, said the special meeting was required by the conference handbook as part of the procedure for selecting the commissioner.

The joint group must make a recommendation to the presidents of member schools, who actually name the commissioner and establish his contract.

MacGregor said he believes there are 35 to 40 senators who will vote to uphold Nixon's veto of the giant public works bill, enough to prevent overriding. MacGregor called the bill "unworkable and unwise."

He said Nixon is not committed to his revenue sharing plan unchanged and said if the changes "constitute improvements they will receive the consideration of the President.'

MacGregor said he expects the House Ways and Means Committee, whose chairman, Wilbur Mills, D - Ark., has expressed opposition to the Nixon plan, will change the distribution formula and add a need factor to the revenue sharing.

On Nixon's welfare program, "What throws strangers is the MacGregor predicted details will be worked out by the late summer congressional recess period. He also said he looks "to see revenue sharing passed in some form by the end of

The final version of revenue sharing, MacGregor forecast, will be substantially in accord with what Nixon proposed.

Klein, speaking on civil rights progress, said:

When Nixon took office . . . he didn't intend to go out and use rhetoric. But we would go out and prove a record by deed and direction. Major gains have been made. We believe the Nixon program offers real hope and jobs, not criticism. for the first time for the black community."

enforcement of the 1964 Civil Rights Act had concentrated on areas of racial discrimination. Spurred by the Woman's equality Assistance League and the National Organization of Women, complaints have increased to a point, said Pottinger, where his division has more cases than it can handle, even though his 92 - man staff has tripled in the past year.

Scores of institutions have submitted to HEW 'affirmative action plans," specific remedial goals and timetables aimed at bringing more women into higher levels of the educational stablishment.

Pottinger said most colleges and universities usually yield to complaints and agree to review their operating procedures, perhaps because of the ax Pottinger holds over their heads.

Colleges and universities which do not measure up face the possibility of losing federal contracts. a key source of income, particularly for research. For example, \$7.5 million in federal contracts was withheld from the University of Michigan until the school came up with a plan to end sex discrimination. The university agreed to pay \$6 million in back pay, retroactive to 1968, to women faculty members.

Government and private statistics indicate that women do not advance as rapidly as men in institutions of higher learning, and women's salaries generally are lower.

The U.S. Office of Education reports that omen make up about a fifth of the nation's 533,000 college and university faculty members. Of these, 35 per cent hold the rank of instructor, the lowest in academia, while only 9 per cent are full professors, top rank for teachers. Among
