'U' asks salary raise, hikes housing rate By STEVE WATERBURY

he University is seeking federal mission to retroactively increase ulty and staff salaries as soon as it ives its 1971 - 72 appropriations m the state legislature, President arton said Tuesday.

the University administration also has ounced that the increases in residence and married housing rates which e passed by the trustees in May are sidered in effect.

After studying all of the material lable to us on the interpretations of Federal wage - price freeze, we eve we have implicit authority to ider the increases effective," Roger Wilkinson, vice president for business finance, said Monday.

Vilkinson said the executive office of State of Michigan has consulted the teral Cost of Living Council and has nd that the freeze does not apply to eased college housing rates such as

those approved at MSU prior to the order.

"If there should be an authoritative federal ruling later which holds that our situation is explicitly covered by the freeze, we will make any necessary refunds," he said.

Wharton said he has written to the Federal Cost of Living Council to request an exemption for the increase under the wage - price freeze which was announced by President Nixon on Aug.

"We believe we have a good case for an exemption from the freeze order," he said. "In anticipation of receiving our state funds, the University budget had been constructed on the basis of a wage increase retroactive to last July 1 when the fiscal year actually began. These plans were made prior to the federal

Wharton had previously stated that salary increases for faculty and staff which the MSU administration was contemplating pending receipt of the

1971 - 72 state appropriation faculty may be the only ones in this 'necessarily must be held in abeyance at least until the federal freeze is lifted."

Wharton said that if the University's appeal to the Federal Cost of Living Council is rejected, it would create a highly inequitable situation between the state's University employes and their counterparts in the state civil service who apparently will be receiving a salary hike retroactive to July 1, despite the freeze order.

"Both groups are state employes," he said. "Both groups are entitled to salary increases effective July 1. Yet, as matters now stand, only one group will receive their planned benefits.

Not mentioned by Wharton, but likely to arise in any discussion between federal and University officials of MSU's appeal, is the present disparity between Central Michigan University's (CMU) faculty receiving salary increases which the faculty members in other state universities appear likely to miss.

"It would appear that the CMU

state to receive increases uneffected by the wage freeze since the administration and trustees of that university were willing to enter a contractual agreement effective July 1, 1971," C. Keith Groty, asst. professor of labor and industrial relations, said Monday.

Soledad plea to investigate prison denied

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) - In a tumultous court hearing, two judges refused demands Tuesday by the two surviving Soledad Brothers to order black legislators admitted into San Quentin Prison "to see what is happening" at the scene of Saturday's escape try in which six men died.

George Jackson, 29, the third of the Soledad Brothers, was shot down in the break attempt after three white guards and two white prisoners had been killed in the prison's maximum security adjustment

"If you don't act in some manner to get these men (black legislators and black community leaders) into that prison, you can blow this country so wide apart it will never be recognized," John Thorne, Jackson's attorney told Superior Court Judge Carl Allen.

The Coalition for Human Survival will run a write - in candidate and operate a joint campaign with the candidates of Project: City Hall for the Nov. 2 East Lansing City Council election, spokesman John R. Veenstra, East Lansing graduate

student, announced Tuesday. The write - in candidate will be named later, he said.

Veenstra said members of the coalition voted 16 - 2 Wednesday to support Project: City Hall candidates George Colburn and George L. Griffiths in exchange for support of the proposed write - in candidate, continued application of coalition issues and active

participation of coalition members in project campaign decisions.

"We've been motivated to enter a write - in candidate by the results of the primary in which we ran very strongly," Veenstra said.

Coalition - backed candidates Chuck Will and Elyse Eisenberg placed seventh and eighth in the primary. Colburn and Griffiths placed fifth and sixth, just making the six - candidate cutoff.

"We will continue to raise the issues which seem to have set the tone for the entire campaign: Is East Lansing going to be a city for people or cars? Veenstra said. He said there will be a concerted effort to stop the present city council's priority on making the city

streets more convenient for cars passing through than for people residing in the

Veenstra said Griffiths, attending a recent coalition meeting, agreed with its fundamental issues, particularly those of striving for a more responsive city government and of obtaining increased student participation.

"We think we can elect two or three change - oriented candidates who will be sympathetic to the University and young people," Veenstra said. "In the primary, an overwhelmingly conservative turn out elected what we consider four

Bia Four reach accord

The Big Four, often at odds in East - West confrontations concerning mutual responsibilities for occupied and divided Berlin, concluded in Berlin Monday a draft agreement on the future of the former German capital.

Such heretofore thorny issues as access to and from isolated West Berlin, often the focal point of Communist harassment that in 1948-49 included a Russian land blockade of the city, seemed on the verge of being eased if not solved.

Soviet Jew exodus ends

The Soviet Jewish movement has decided that the Kremlin ended an unprecedented period of Jewish emigration to Israel this summer because it no longer politically expedient.

"The exodus is over. It was just as we said, a temporary measure calculated to silence criticism of their Jewish policies while they got the congress and more trails out of the way."

This was how one movement member Monday assessed the Soviet government's liberalization of its Jewish emigration policy during the four - month period of March through June.

Uganda, Tanzania clash

Fighting has broken out between Ugandan and Tanzanian troops on the border 200 miles southwest of Kampala, sources in the president's office said Tuesday. President Idi Amin canceled a scheduled visit to northern Uganda.

The two countries have been at loggerheads since Milton Obote was deposed as president of Uganda last January, President Julius Nyerere of Tanzania refused to recognize Amin's military regime.

'War means Arab defeat'

Another Arab - Israeli war will lead to another Arab defeat and the loss of more territory, King Hussein of Jordan told the Beirut, Lebanon, newspaper Al Nahar Tuesday.

"The disarray and weakness of the Arab world have never been worse,' he said. "The Arab countries are not yet strong enough to take on Israel."

Hussein called for a continuation of the present cease - fire "until the Arab states coordinate their policies and build up a joint force capable of exerting effective political and military pressure on Israel."



Bombings rock Manila

Dynamite bombs exploded early Wednesday at the Manila homes of two Philippine congressmen of the ruling party, hours after 2,000 persons demonstrated against a government proclamation authorizing arrest and detention without charge.

The decree announced Monday by President Ferdinand E. Marcos, is designed to combat what the government calls an armed insurrection by Communist rebels. The Socialist party claimed the degree was unwarranted and asked the Supreme Court to declare it unconstitutional.

Wallace directives voided

Two Alabama school systems must carry out court ordered desegregation plans regardless of directives to the contrary from Gov. George C. Wallace, a federal judge ruled Tuesday in Birmingham.

Morever, U.S. Dist. Judge Sam C. Pointer Jr. told the Calhoun County and Oxford City school boards that it was doubtful Wallace could issue executive orders to school boards even when the orders did not conflict with court decrees.

Prefreeze rent rates planned

Despite official indication last Thursday that summer reduced rental rates for area apartments will be effective this fall, six local apartment managers have declared their previously established rents still will apply in September

Another manager refused to explain possible rent set - ups for his apartments. Joel Altman, of Altman Management Co., said his attorneys are seeking advice and a ruling from officials on what

Until a ruling is made, Altman continued, he would not comment on rates. He expected the move to come soon, adding that he would comply with the final decision. No definite ruling on the rent freeze had yet

been located by the other six managers. In view of current uncertainty, they said their rental rates established long before the freeze will continue this fall unless a reversal is issued from Washington. The managers' comments followed a report in

Friday's State News, that the President's Cost of Living Council ruled that reduced rates will carry over into fall leasing.

A representative from the Dept. of Housing

and Urban Development said the council must enforce the President's desires that rents do not increase during the 90 - day freeze. An executive review board has been charged with investigating

the policy. Locally, the seven apartment managers indicated they would comply with whatever outcome is reached by officials responsible for rulings on the freeze. Five expressed uncertainty with the present situation, saying attempts to find an answer to the freeze by themselves and attorneys have resuled in confusing or conflicting opinions. David G. Arning, manager of Meadowbrook

Trace, explained his company has handed down a

directive which appears to stipulate that persons who now live in his apartments under contract for a reduced rate may renew this contract for current amounts. Arning said he was not exactly certain about

all aspects of the directive. He said the order pertains to reduced rates for nonfurnished apartments, for loss of roommates and for temporary residence in a more expensive apartment

Persons signing a new contract this fall, and not for a renewal of the summer lease, will

probably be required to pay previously planned rates, he said.

Asked about a \$2 rent increase per apartment planned last February to take effect this September, Pat Pulte, manager of Cedar Village Apartments, said his attorneys have instructed him to operate with the increase and under terms of leases already signed.

Pulte added that Internal Revenue Service workers told him that such leases were binding contracts. He said rental rates established before the freeze will be effective unless a different opinion is confirmed.

ASMSU attorney Kenneth I. Smith said he has not yet received an opinion from Washington and that he sent a telegram last week to the Office of Emergency Prepareness for word of rental

In another sidelight on the rent freeze, only two of the seven area apartment manager contacted said they would refuse to release a breakdown of their rental schedules to anyone calling for information on the subject. The other five said their rental information was available for public inspection.

Phillip G. Bozzo, spokesman for the Student

Housing Corp. and the Off- Campus Council, si East Lansing tenants report that their manage are hesitant about releasing rent schedules for public inspection. Bozzo said he is continui efforts to obtain personal statements from the landlords.

Meanwhile, the MSU housing groups a compiling file cards specifying pertine information on local apartments. Tenants in asked to call in information about their residen to the housing corporation or to the council.

Information solicited includes the number the apartment or room, the summer rental ru the contract rent rate if different from summer name of the caller and his telephone number.

About 50 calls have been received sir Friday. Bozzo explained the information in needed for possible court action against landlone who refuse to comply with the rent free

Witnesses are needed to testify in court about landlords disregarding the rent freeze, continued. Information on cards may be used prepare depositons and affadivits for use court. Bozzo said the housing groups had lawyers who are willing to seek injunctive relief or fight evictions for tenants.

Further control termed likely

Some of the nation's key business leaders favor a mandatory wage - price control system after President Nixon's 90 - day freeze order expires in November, Commerce Secretary Maurice H. Stans said Tuesday.

After meeting with the heads of 11 large American corporations, Stans said he too agrees that Nixon should impose a system of controls to guard against an explosion of wages and prices.

But Stans told a news conference it is up to the newly created Cost of Living Council to decide what type of controls or restraints will supplant the 90 - day freeze.

Shortly before Stans met with newsmen, the Federal Home

Loan Bank Board announced a \$1.8 - billion package to put more money in the home - mortgage industry and hold the line on interest rates.

The board did so by reducing the amount of cash - on hand that federal savings and loan associations must keep and by subsidizing the home - lending market to the extent of \$1

Meanwhile the U.S. dollar weakened in Europe's money markets Tuesday as the world's trading nations protested at an emergency meeting in Geneva against America's new economic policy.

U.S. currency was in demand only in Tokyo as banks began buying back the dollars they had sold by the hundreds of millions following President Nixon's Aug. 15 announcement of drastic measures to defend the American economy. Tokyo dealers estimated that about \$165 million changed hands during the day.

Chief complaint of Europeans and the Japanese at a meeting of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade -GATT - in Geneva was against the 10 per cent surtax that Nixon slapped on certain classes of goods imported into the United States.

Nathaniel Samuels, U.S. deputy under secretary of state, defended the American measures and explained the reasons for them. He emphasized that the surtax was a temporary GATT was formed after World War II and set up rules for

liberalizing international trade. Many countries complained that Nixon's surtax violates GATT rules. Most of the world's big trading nations are among the organization's 80 members. However, other nations have taken measures similar to those of Washington in periods when they had deficits in their balance of payments - an excess in the flow of currency outward over that coming in. The United States is in that fix now. The surcharge would help correct the

situation by making imports more expensive.

On the home front the lack of any curb on interest rate has been one of organized labor's key complaints about Nixon's new program.

Stans said the business leaders, including the heads of General Motors, General Electric and U.S. Steel, ha concluded that the post - freeze fight against inflation "cannot be accomplished on a voluntary basis."

Both the recent cut in foreign aid and the 10 per cent import surcharge announced last week by the United States will hurt the underdeveloped countries, he noted.

"The 10 per cent increase in import duty means a sharp setback to those less developed countries which are attempting to promote the production and export of their manufactured goods. And this setback may be magnified if the Europeans and Japanese decide to retaliate against the United States.

"On the other hand," explained Kreinin, "revaluation of certain Western currencies will make the less - developed countries more competitive in European markets, so that their exports can be stimulated."

"If the wage - price control program succeeds in slowing down the U.S. rate

will become so preoccupied with the of inflation, the underdeveloped present currency and trade problems that countries will become less competitive against the United States. On the other hand," he explained, "to the extent the new tax measures stimulate the U.S. economy, this will mean increased imports into the United States and benefits for the less - developed countries."

While examining international reaction to Nixon's new economic policies, Kreinin speculated on steps Common Market countries would take.

"The President's announcement found the six members (of the Common Market) at an impasse, with the German mark floating and the French insisting it be stabilized.

What is most likely to happen? According to Kreinin, European currencies will be revalued in varying degrees against the U.S. dollar. He called such a development "highly welcome, long overdue," and said its effect on the American economy would be salutory.



Room and board hike feeds inflationary fire

The mercenary inclination of this University is well known and well documented. Thus, the continual spiral of tuition and room rates seldom raises an eyebrow in the academic community. In spite of such precedents, however, the University's latest scheme to grab a dollar by defying the President of the United States is truly amazing.

The substance of Mr. Nixon's proclaimation seems straightforward enough: with a very few exceptions, a 90 - day wage and price freeze means a 90 - day freeze, and sorry if you're caught in a bind. The University admittedly is in an unpleasant position. The cost of labor, food, supplies and maintenance has definitely gone up over the past year and the legislature has yet to yield any inkling of this year's appropriation. So in response, the University administration announced Monday that they will go ahead and raise room and board rates \$20 a term as approved by the board of trustees

Volleyball?

With surprisingly little publicity the U.S. Volleyball Team returned Monday after losing a tournament in Cuba. While losers generally are not the stuff of which headlines are made, the fact that a group of American athletes was on Cuban soil with the approval of the U.S. State Dept. certainly is.

Since Premier Fidel Castro came to power, this nation has treated the island country with the same nonrecognition reserved for Red China. The presence of the American team would seem to indicate a thaw in this policy.

Granted it is a little early to be shouting "diplomatic coup," but if ping pong can work in China why not volleyball in Cuba?

Of course, Vice President for Business and Finance Roger Wilkinson realizes that despite the University's assertion that it has "implicit authority to consider the increases effective" there may be some problem with the Feds. The "U's" answer: refund the raise if the federal government later rules against the University's action. It is rather like giving a hold card to President Nixon.

Granted, there is more to the University's rationale for the hikes than the bald - faced assertion that "we need the money." In his statement Wilkinson indicated that the University considers the freeze inapplicable in this situation because the housing increases were approved and announced last May, because many students have already contracted for the new rates and because some married housing residents have already paid a month's rent in advance based on the new rate.

In essence, the University's logic is that a law which applies to labor simply does not apply to institutions. Any number of labor contracts were negotiated and ratified in advance of President Nixon's announcement but still will not be implemented until the end of the 90 - day period. In particular, the faculty of this very institution will have to eschew a pay hike until at least November.

The University's action in raising dormitory rates is precisely the sort of inflationary move that the President's rent - wage - price freeze was designed to combat. The workers - in this case the students - will not for the most part receive any increase in wages, but the total worth of their income will be effectively diminished by the room and board

We can appreciate the University's position and problems, but in this case we sincerely hope that the federal government takes them to task for their actions.

Difference in pot laws absurd, needs remedy

The University community is a maze in both the metaphysical and legal senses. Depending upon just where one is situated, a malefactor can be busted by any of about seven different police forces. If, however, the crime in question is possession or use of marijuana, the hapless lawbreaker would do well to be apprehended north of Grand River Avenue.

By action of the city council this Spring, pot violations can be treated as misdemeanors in the City of East Lansing, punishable by a \$500 fine and/or 90 days in jail. On the property of MSU, however, the same violation is treated as a felony and can accrue penalties of up to \$5,000 and/or 20 years in prison. The cartological fact that most of north campus lies within the East Lansing city limits is apparently little more than a quirk of history, since East Lansing ordinances do not, for the most part, apply to the University.

The University is governed by MSU ordinances enacted by the board of trustees. In the absence of an appropriate campus statute, state law is in effect. It is state statutes which require the harsher marijuana penalties.

It would be an understatement to say that the present situation approaches the absurd. Clearly, no crime - especially the "crime" of marijuana use and possession increases ten fold simply because it is committed south of a particular median.

In enacting the new, much more lenient marijuana law the City of East Lansing took a significant step toward a realistic approach to the question. If MSU is truly the enlightened center of learning it purports to be, then the board of trustees is obligated to follow the city council's lead and purge the campus of the "cruel and unusual punishment" ordained by the state

Progress or atonement of sin

A new \$13 million technical school for Indians was dedicated Saturday at Albuquerque, New Mexico. The coed Southwestern Indian Polytechnic Institute will open Sept. 16 to about 700 young Indians from 64 tribes throughout the United States.

I question the good intentions of this new technical school.

One is impressed that the white man, who originally uprooted the Indian culture, now is making atonements in the form of training so that the 'savages" can fit into the white society. Indeed, it is laudable that instead of funds being spent for military programs or adventurous space outings, money is being channeled into urgent domestic

Initially the institute will provide training in business management, clerical work, drafting, electronics, radio, television, engineering, offset lithography, commercial food preparation, telecommunications and optical technology. Future plans include programs in automotive mechanics and aircraft maintenance.

But there is something about the concept of training Indians to fit into our technological culture that makes me uneasy. I have a romantic vision of the Indians — at least before the white man intervened - as being a brave people, yet very conscientious and honorable. The Indians are a people who traditionally respected the land and the rights of other men.

The Indians did not recklessly slaughter more buffalo than they needed, while our pseudo-hero Buffalo Bill destroyed the herds that roamed the west. Perhaps I am too infatuated with an image of Indians as a happy nomadic people who appreciated nature and who developed a very distinct culture.

I remember the cynical comments of a black man who picked me up on an interstate highway earlier this summer when I was hitchhiking. The man, who explained that he didn't enjoy working at his regular job, was driving down to a

Detroit race track where he found the process of securing an income a more enjoyable pasttime.

He said he really envied the Indians because they lived the easy life of hunting and fishing when they wanted to, occassionally engaging in a good fight, and of course spending the winter holed up with their Indian women. The man called the Indians "the biggest pimps who ever lived," not necessarily in a derogatory sense but more to praise them for appreciating the providence of nature while not trying to destroy the

can safely classify the white men of today as "the biggest rapists who ever lived," owing to our habit of devastation on the land, sea and air. Much as the Spaniards' greed for gold destroyed the highly developed Inca civilization and the American imperialism has committed genocide on the Vietnamese people, the white man has imposed technology on the Indians. The story of the American Indian has

Extending the analogy of course we

never received a fairly balanced

presentation. For years, the television movies have shown the cavalry righteously defeating the savage Indians. Only now is a book such as Dee Brown's "Bury My Heart at Wounded Knee," which deals with the cruel and vicious subhuman treatment of the Indians by the double-crossing white man on the bestseller list.

As our consciences are pricked by the notion that perhaps we really did shaft the Indian, as we did screw the black man, as we are suddenly repentent of our sins: we build schools. We cannot make amends by returning their culture to the Indians, so we are charitable enough to let them join our society with the option of becoming full fledged neurotic human beings by our standards. The ironic twist comes in the form of

a student revolution against the society we are training the Indians to fit into. There seems to be a growing consciousness in this country that is calling for an end to technological slavery and a return to humanistic values. We are getting uptight because air

pollution is choking us to death, been our lakes are full of our sewage and cannot swim in them or drink f them. Indeed, what might be called "Indian consciousness" seems desire where man makes wise use of his natu resources instead of exploiting them as they were endless.

A growing number of white men discontent with the boring office and the plastic environment. admittedly there is the popularity of detestable snowmobiles and "all ten vehicles" there are also booming bicy sales and better protection conservation areas. We cannot fool ourselves into think

that our technological society "productive" while the Indians had lazy, meaningless existence. All produce are better ways to kill oursel and strange forms of recreation such pin ball machines in a vain effort find the good life.

Perhaps for every technical school white man constructs, the Indians sho respond by setting up an open humanity school.

Bertram P. Karon, professor of psychology, said that the initial use of electroshock therapy began as a result of some "bad statistics" which appeared to show that epileptics were

Researchers discovered they could induce an artificial epileptic seizure with an electric shock, and thus shock therapy began to be used to treat schizophrenia.

Prof blasts shock treatments Though never very effective for the treatment of schizophrenia, Karon said that researchers soon discovered electroshock therapy did seem to promote a remarkable improvement in people who were depressed.

Karon agrees that depressed patients who were treated with shock therapy appear better immediately after the treatment.

However, follow-up studies on groups of both shocked and nonshocked depressed patients have shown that the difference between the two groups disappears at the end of two years, and that the nonshocked patients are more improved than the shocked patients after five years.

"The evidence is quite clear that if someone is helped by shock therapy, they would have gotten better anyway," he

Persons who have undergone electroshock therapy may have difficulty "putting the pieces together." "It is not like the resistance of the neurotic of the

psychotic," Karon said. "The individual is trying to understand but can't.' Karon said that a more authoritarian handling of aggression may be a by-product of shock therapy, which results in

subservience to superiors and hostility toward those weaker If you do not wish yourself or a relative to be subjected to shock therapy, Karon said there are three magic words

which can be used to ensure that you will not be shocked: "I will sue." "I have never heard of a hospital using electroshock treatment after these words were spoken," Karon said. "There



Official outlines changes in '71 bus passes, routes

A number of changes in campus bus service are planned for the coming year which will be "much to the advantage of the students," a spokesman for the campus bus service said yesterday.

According to Max Niles, the change that will affect most students probably will be the change in the nature of the bus pass. In the past, Niles said, a bus pass consisted of a colored card with no positive means of identification on it.

Fall term, Niles noted, when students buy a bus pass they will receive a sticker to place on their MSU student ID. In this way, Niles explained, only the student who paid for the pass will be able to use it.

Niles said that graduate students no longer will have reduced rates on the campus bus service. In the past, graduate students could purchase bus passes for \$2 a term, Niles said. Now, he explained, they will pay the same rates as everyone else.

Another change being made in the fall,

Niles said, is that faculty parking gate cards no longer will serve as bus passes for faculty, These changes were made, Niles said, "to correct inequities which existed last year"



Cattle consume synthetic rations

You have probably heard the prediction that much of your food in the future will be synthesized from commercial chemicals. Many Michigan residents already are consuming food synthesized from chemicals.

Chemicals are being converted to milk and steaks on increasing numbers of Michigan farms following recent developments at MSU.

Cattle rations including low cost, efficient, nonprotein nitrogen (NPN) sources, such as urea and ammonia, have been formulated by MSU animal scientists. Since cattle are ruminants, they can convert manufactured NPN sources into the protein needed for milk and milk production.

"Cattle can produce a pound of edible protein — meat or milk
— much cheaper from NPN source than from traditional plant
protein sources such as soybeans," explained H.E. Henderson, MSU animal scientist.

What does this mean to consumers?

"It means that beef and dairy producers can meet a growing demand for meat and dairy products at lower prices than if they fed only plant proteins," said Henderson.

"And the effect of replacing plant proteins in cattle rations

with NPN sources may reach around the world." Soybeans, a key protein source for cattle rations before NPN sources were developed, also meet the protein needs of humans.

About 75 per cent of all meat and milk is produced by protein and carbohydrate feeds that could be consumed by humans,

Henderson'said. Scientists estimate that more than two - thirds of the world's population receives a protein - deficient diet. So, until now, catile

have been competing with people for soybean protein. "Providing soybean products as a protein source for humans is much more efficient than first feeding that plant protein to animals to get meat and milk." Henderson points out.

And in many countries with an acute protein deficiency problem, livestock production methods can be developed that rely on NPN sources rather than plant proteins," he said.

Student heads fund drive to aid Pakistanis By RICK WILBINS State News Staff Writer

Out of a projected \$100 million in relief to East Pakistani efugees in India, \$200,000 has been collected by a Lansing elugers in mased emergency fund headed by an MSU doctoral student. Shrikuma Poddar, 2601 Cochise Lane in Okemos, a Salcutta - born doctoral student of business and the chairman Educational Subscription Service, said he expects the East Pakistan Emergency Refugee Relief Fund to collect the omaining amount by the end of the year.

poddar said the \$100 million to be raised will be used to the more than eight million East Pakistanis who have night refuge in India since the civil war between East and lest Pakistan broke out in March.

Poddar said every major relief agency aiding the nomeless India and East Pakistan has been invited to join the effort. three major groups - CARE, U.S. Committee for UNICEF nd the International Rescue Mission - have already named opresentatives to the planned 100 - member National

Poddar said all funds raised will be distributed through hese internationally recognized organizations plus such other gencies as the American Red Cross, Church World Service, atholic Relief Service and the Prime Minister's Relief Fund. The Emergency Refugee Relief Fund is a two - month hrainchild of Poddar, who said he formulated the idea fter a visit to his native India in mid - June. He said the bject poverty, disease and pitiful living conditions he bserved so affected him that he decided he must bring the fugee's plight before the American people.


"The magnitude of disaster was too great for these people to react emotionally. They had no time to even think," he

Poddar was appalled by the lack of facilities in the hospitals. In the Bengal hospital, he said there were two or three patients in every bed, and people were lying in the corridors unattended. The doctors had neither saline solution for treatment of cholera nor small needles for use in feeding children intravenously. Although the hospital was built to hold 250 people, it was crammed with over 600 refugees, he

The cost to India of supporting the refugees is reported to be running more than \$5 million a day. Poddar estimated at least \$100 million more in relief supplies was needed just to hold down the already ghastly death toll.



personal contact of local charitable organizations and businesses. Poddar said he will be primarily concerned with running the direct mail facet of the campaign since he is particularly experienced in that area (his company is a direct - mail subscription firm).

He said he expects to collect \$10 to \$20 million from direct mailing pleas, \$25 million from the response to the media campaign and \$20 to \$25 million from businesses.

Poddar said the relief fund will appeal to America's sense of humanity. He said the advertising approach will be: "For \$5 you can disprove the myth that Americans don't care whether Asians live or die."

Doyle, Dane and Bernach, a New York advertising agency, has prepared a public service campaign for radio, television, newspapers and magazines, according to Poddar. However, that part of the media campaign is pending approval by the Advertising Council of the American Advertising Agencies. So far, however, the council has failed to act on the relief fund's two - month - old request, Poddar said. When initiated, the campaign will run for 13 consecutive weeks on all three national networks.

"What we want is for eight million families to be good Samaritans for eight million refugees," he explained.

Poddar said the relief fund is politically neutral because "otherwise it could not serve its humanitarian goals." He said organizations such as CARE and UNICEF would not be able




He added that the political implications have prohibited the U.S. from endorsing the fund. Poddar is confident the American people will contribute

generously to the fund. He said that in a situation such as the East Pakistani refugee crisis, people simply have to react.

"There isn't enough time for people to think something like this out. They've just got to react and quickly. A doctor in the Bengal hospital told me foreigners often came by and promised aid but none has come so far.

"What good will food and medical supplies do after these people die?" he asked.

Groups join to push Lindsay candidacy

WASHINGTON (AP) - Young, amateur backers of John V. Lindsay began fanning out across the country Monday hoping to convince the New York mayor and Democratic party pros that he can take the presidency.

Organizers say they urged Lindsay to run for president four months before he announced 10 days ago he had switched from the Republican to the Democratic party.

They said they are working for Lindsay without either his support or encouragement. Leaders of the Committee for a Choice are Chris Jonas, 26, the bearded vice president of a New York importing firm, and his brother

Stanley, 24, a moustached graduate student. At a news conference Chris Jonas said Lindsay - for - president organizations are active in 15 cities and about 300 college

A just - completed meeting in Washington was designed to pull the volunteer groups under a single umbrella and launch a vote;registration drive among newly enfranchised 18 - to - 21 year - olds.

He said the committee hopes to mobilize the kind of backing former Sen. Eugene McCarthy received in his 1968 bid for the presidency, though he said Lindsay's appeal is

Philadelphia, Chicago, Charlotte, Jersey City, Baltimore and New York were among the cities represented at the Washington meeting Sunday and Monday.

Lindsay has held off saying whether he will be a candidate in 1972 in any of the presidential primaries, and Jonas said one of their purposes is "to put pressure on the mayor to run."

"Up until this time the Democratic contest to unseat Richard Nixon has been a bore," Stanley Jonas said. "The Democrats seem determined to turn to candidates from rural states."

Lindsay can draw support from the 75 to 80 per cent of Americans who live in urban areas as the man best able to solve the problems of the cities, he said.

Chris Jonas said 1,000 volunteers are working actively in New York, and Chicago organizer Richard Holtzman said 22,000 are busy in Illinois.

He said organizations capable of working for Lindsay will be set up in each of the presidential primary states.

Of particular importance, he said is Florida where out - of - state college students between 18 and 21 will be able to vote on

Top-ranked black official speaks out to back Nixon WASHINGTON (AP) - While the Nixon

administration often is accused of lacking sympathy for minority groups, one of the government's highest - ranking blacks rapidly is becoming a principal defender of the

President and the Republican party.

Arthur Fletcher, asst. secretary of labor, will spend more and more time on the banquet circuit between now and the 1972 election, sources in the administration and the Republican party say, because he is black and he is a dynamic speaker who not only defends the administration as a strong enforcer of civil rights laws, but also accuses the Democrats of promising more than they can deliver.

The 45 - year old former end for the Baltimore Colts and Los Angeles Rams has accepted numerous GOP speaking invitations since he brought the Republican National Committee out of a near - slumber during a post - luncheon speech last month in Denver.

"There's nothing 'Uncle Tom' about this guy," a party source said. "He's tough and he's a good speaker who believes pretty much what the party believes."

The sources also shot down reports circulating over the past three weeks that Fletcher will become director of the Office of Economic Opportunity. Current chief Frank Carlucci will move out of the post Sept. 1 to join Nixon's White House staff.

"That just isn't going to happen," one

source said of the rumored OEO appointment "They're kicking around ways to make him more effective" in the party. "OEO would

Fletcher said in an interview that group outside the government have suggested the White House consider him for the OEO job, "It would be a challenge," he said, "The


OEO doesn't have too many friends, either a Capitol Hill or among its constituents." "Lots of congressmen used to think a poor people would pat them on the back for supporting OEO," Fletcher said. "Then they were raising hell. It's a place where, if you want challenge, that's it.'

But, he added, "if I were to go into the OEO right now it would create a hellen problem. I would have to stick a lot closer by the desk to get on top of the job."

Fletcher said he is better able to travel for the administration in his present job, which has held since shortly after Nixon took offin in 1969, because the operation "is already running smoothly" and his presence is not required every day.

Fletcher has 20 speaking engagement during the next six weeks, and is scheduled appear before state and regional Republic groups in Minnesota, Wisconsin and Indiana,

President Nixon is reneging on his promise to fund all housing programs at the 100 per cent level, Phillip G. Bozzo, executive secretary of the MSU Student Housing Corp., charged Tuesday.

Bozzo said the Nixon administration apparently has decided to fund only \$225 million of the \$300 million authorized by Congress for the College Housing Program. The program, administered by the Dept. of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), provides interest subsidy grants and direct loans to universities and nonprofit housing corporations. 



Agencies accused of passing unsafe soups

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Agriculture Dept. said Monday a federal inspector was present in the Campbell Soup Co. plant which packed chicken vegetable soup contaminated with botulism toxin.

Rep. Benjamin S. Rosenthal, D-N.Y., accused the department of allowing the soup on the market even while the firm was in the process of recalling another lot of soup which Rosenthal called suspicious. Campbell denied any recall was in progress. Rosenthal said the Food and Drug

Administration, which is responsible for general sanitation procedures in food

plants, had not inspected the Campbell plant in two years. He accused the agencies of "an incredible abuse of their responsibility to protect the consumer from unsafe products."

It was the second time in two months that production facilities regularly monitored by USDA had produced soup tainted with the deadly toxin, although the department had no direct responsibility for the porduct involved in the first incident. One Agriculture official said it is too early to speculate on the implications of

The Food and Drug Administration determined that undercooking was the cause of botulism toxin contamination of a supply of vichyssoise packed by Bon Vivant of Newark, N.J., on May 21. A New York man who ate a can of the Bon Vivant soup died June 30.

responsible for the Bon Vivant vichyssoise, a Food and Drug Administration investigation disclosed that Bon Vivant had accidentally been undercooking its canned goods for 10 days before the vichyssoise was packed.

A USDA inspector had monitored the plant's production line the day before, and the government also found swelled and leaking cans - an indication of improper processing - among Bon Vivant products which were the responsibility of USDA. Responsibility for inspection of canned goods is split between USDA and FDA.

Agriculture is responsible for any products containing certain proportions of meat or poultry in the recipe. Federal law requires that an inspector must personally monitor the production line while such food is being canned.

All other canned goods are the Food and Drug Administration's responsibility. FDA inspects plants periodically, with gaps of years in many plants. Bon Vivant, for example, had not been inspected for form

Prof may solve traffic problems the day, he said. Morning rush By STEVE ALLEN

Urban traffic problems may well improve within the next few years, thanks to the work of John B. Kreer, professor of electrical engineering and systems science.

Kreer has worked on programs which will help alleviate traffic flow problems by connecting traffic signals and computer programs. Kreer has set up mathematical models of traffic flow which accurately apply to certain situations.

Kreer said that computerized traffic signal control provides "more flexibility in response to changing situations."

By burying loops of wire in strategic locations, Kreer said, the computers can be informed as to what the traffic flow is in certain areas. This allows more adjustment to particular situations, he said, which improves traffic flow.

Computers were first used for traffic control in 1960, said Kreer, around Toronto. Computerized traffic signal systems are not used anywhere in Michigan, but Lansing and Detroit are considering using such systems.

In Lansing, Kreer said, a three - dial controller system is used. Three timing patterns are used during particular parts of

hour, afternoon rush hour and normal traffic periods each have their own traffic signal pattern, Kreer said. He added that during early morning hours a different pattern is used at a few intersections in the Lansing area.

Kreer said that he thought a computerized traffic signal system would "potentially help across Grand River Avenue" in East Lansing. However, he said, "the discouragement of through traffic" on Grand River Avenue would help the East Lansing traffic situation the most.

Kreer said that more and more cities are going to block off parts of streets to alleviate traffic congestion. He said that often many cities build more streets to help their traffic problems and find themselves worse off because of it.

Kreer said that computerized traffic systems have already significantly helped unclog freeway congestion. He referred to a system used in Detroit and other cities called "ramp metering." This system, he said, cut down the rate of entrance onto freeways at times when freeway traffic is heavy. Kreer said that systems are being worked on now to control traffic on streets which feed into expressways to help eliminate freeway congestion.





Many standouts for 'S'

Squad depth is important. But just as invaluable to any good football team, MSU head coach Duffy Daugherty has often said, is the leadership of a small group of highly talented players.

If you've got them, if they stay healthy and if they come through as expected, a team will be strong. If they aren't there to start with, or if they should fail, many long Saturday afternoons will be endured.

For MSU, this could well be the year that those Saturday afternoons become shorter and much

Daugherty is blessed with some of the best individual talent since his national championship of 1965 and 1966. For MSU this fall, much depends on the likes of quarterback Mike Rasmussen and tailback Eric Allen not to mention the success of tight end Billy Joe Dupree.

Defensively, Ron Curl, Ernie Hamilton and Brad Van Pelt will pave the road to any sort of success

Add to all this State's best placekicker since barefoot Dick Kenney, soccer - style booter Borys Shlapack, and MSU could finally be ready to break the big one.

Rasmussen has been designated the No. 1 signal caller during the early practice sessions. The 6 foot, 172 - pound senior rewrote the Spartan passing record book in his initial varsity campaign a year ago after transferring from Fresno City College. His fine play in the spring game helped contribute to his new No. 1 status.

"Mike is a fine football player, a fine quarterback and a keen student of the game," Daugherty said.

Another of Duffy's fine prospects is fleet tailback Eric Allen. The Georgetown, S.C., senior was MSU's most valuable player last fall as the team's rushing leader. His 811 yards in 186 attempts and eight TDs gave him a 4.3 yards per carry average. Allen was third in the conference in rushing last year.

MSU could also have the best tight end in college football this fall in senior Billy Joe

Dupree. Though passed up by most of the so called "experts" on major pre - season all America teams, the 6 foot 4, 222 - pound Dupree has demonstrated that he can catch anything that comes close to him

Spearheading MSU's defensive machine will be Curl, Hamilton and Van Pelt. Curl is back after receiving an additional year of eligibility due to a fracture of his forearm.

Backing up Curl and Hamilton will be sure shot all - American Brad Van Pelt. The Owosso junior turned in a superb sophomore season playing both in the secondary and at the roverback positions.

Rasmussen, Allen, Dupree, Curl, Hamilton and Van Pelt represent the greatest number of prospective all - America performers since the invincible Spartan teams of '65 and '66 when Clint Jones, Steve Juday, Gene Washington, Bubba Smith, Harold Lucas and George Webster received such honors.

Winning players breed winning football, something MSU hasn't enjoyed in five years.
