## Resignation of OBA head stillunofficial

The Black United Front (BUF) Thursday released a statement that the head director of the Office of Black Affairs (OBA), John (Deacon) Jones, "has

officially resigned.' However, Harold Buckner, chairman of the Associated Students of MSU (ASMSU). said he had not been informed of the resignation. And the ASMSU board, whose 'advise and consent" on OBA directorship s required by the ASMSU Code of Operations, has not yet had an opportunity act on the resignation.

Under the Code of Operations, OBA has no affiliation other than budgetary with the ASMSU Cabinet," and is controlled by

The BUF statement listed two reasons or Jones' resimilation.

"Deacon is carrying a very heavy ecademic load of 19 credits and because of this he will not be able to contribute as much time as is necessary to a very ime-consuming job." it said.

"Secondly, as head of the OBA, the firector has to be a member of ASMSU which is tedious and takes a considerable amount of time. Because of these two reasons, Deacon has indicated that he must step down from his post.

"However, John Jones will still continue to serve and function for black people where time will allow," the statement added. "He is still in the struggle but in a

more limited capacity." Jones has been unavailable for comment or several days.

Rumors of Jones' possible resignation as firector of OBA have been circulating for more than a week. But he was present, as director and a representative of OBA, at Tuesday's ASMSU meeting, so some board members assumed the rumors to be false. Thursday's statement changed the

extended the 1969 contract. In the latest offer, NYSA President James Dickman proposed that the ILA members draw their 40 - hours - a - week guaranteed pay as employes on the regular payroll of individual shipping firms.

Under the present, long - established hiring procedure, shippers draw their quota of longshoremen for a day's work from a labor pool at a hiring hall - the so - called waterfront shapeup.

# Milliken, Kelley file suit against school tax system

Gov. Milliken and Atty. Gen. Frank J. Kelley announced Thursday that they will file a court suit asking that the state's system of financing public schools through local property taxes be declared unconstitutional.

At a joint news conference late Thursday morning, Kelley called the school aid formula "a violation of the equal-protection provision of both the state and federal constitutions." and said a suit will be initiated in Ingham County Circuit Court within 10 days.

In response, the governor has agreed to

ask the state Supreme Court to then take immediate jurisdiction of the case. Milliken financing and state school aid grants of is the only state official who can make

such a request. Kelley said he decided to file suit rather than issue an attorney general's opinion because an opinion would be subject to a court test and would delay the final disposition of the case. In order to avoid a "chaotic situation" in the state's schools, Kelley said he will ask that a ruling be declared effective beginning with the 1972-73 school year and that the declaration not be made retroactive so that the state can continue present methods of school financing.

"To do otherwise would disrupt the flow of public education in this state," he

Kelley's action came in response to a request by five legislators for an official ruling on the issue.

"I have reviewed a recent decision by the California Supreme Court declaring unconstitutional that state's system of financing public schools through its local property taxes and state school aid grants and have also studied the possible impact system is declared unconstitutional." of that decision on our system in Michigan," he said.

"It is clear from this review that the public interest requires a court

challenge to our system of property tax public education which, in my judgment, is unfair, unequal, and inequitable," he said.

Kelley cited figures from two unidentified school systems in which state aid failed to make up the difference arising in the vastly divergent sums grossed through property taxation.

"There are scores of such examples," he said. "Such a system clearly does not provide all of the children in this state with equal education opportunities. In these circumstances, the property tax and state school aid grants system must be challenged.'

So that a decision on the case will be made in time for the 1972-73 school year. Kelley said he and Milliken will seek a "speedy determination" of the issue and will request the Supreme Court to give the matter top priority.

"In the meantime, I believe that proposals for changes of the property tax and state school aid grants system should receive continuing consideration since they may provide an alternative if the present Kelley said.

Kelley would not predict the outcome of the case, but said the suit will be a (Please turn to back page)

# Senate wants Viet exit

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Senate renewed Thursday its call for total U.S. withdrawal from Indochina, setting a six month deadline after Democratic leader Mike Mansfield appealed for action to "bring this horrible war to an end."

"Why not try?" Mansfield appealed. "What have we got to lose? You've got a lot to gain." The vote was 57 to 38 in favor of Mansfield's amendment to set a six-month deadline - which would not be binding on President Nixon - contingent on release of American prisoners.

"You can't stop the war by an act of Congress of this kind." Republican leader Hugh Scott said, expressing the Nixon administration's contention the Mansfield amendment is a waste of time and potentially harmful.

Scott's plea was echoed by John C. Stennis, D-Miss., chairman of the Armed Services Committee.

"Everytime we pass this amendment in this way we put obstacles in our path, and lend encouragement to the enemy,"

Noting that Mansfield's amendment to the \$21 billion military procurement authorization bill, like one with a nine-month deadline passed last June, faces House opposition and a possible conference stalemate, Stennis said it would be better to pass it as separate legislation.

"They want to hang it on a bill here and send it to a hostile conference," he said.

Thursday's vote was closer than the 61-38 margin last June when nine-month withdrawal amendment was attached to the draft extension bill.

The touchy issue of the American prisoners swirled through the debate. When Scott said the amendment would give up a valuable U.S. bargaining card, Mansfield shot back: "What is that

And he objected when Sen. Robert Dole, R-Kan., the GOP national chairman, said "many of those who voted for a declaration of war now want to vote for a declaration of peace," a reference to the 1964 Gulf of Tonkin resolution used by the Lyndon B. Johnson administration to justify dispatch of 542,000

men to Indochina. Dole, Mansfield and Sen. J. W. Fulbright, D-Ark., argued over whether the amendment sought to place blame for the war. "I'm not shifting the blame to anyone," Fulbright insisted.

"All I want to do is stop the war." But Dole said, "what we do effectively undercuts the

Before turning to Mansfield's amendment the Senate rejected 51 to 42 an amendment by Sen. Thomas F. Eagleton, D-Mo., to cut \$35.3 million added by the Senate Armed Services Committee for additional research on a new U.S. tank.

The committee added the funds to a \$27.5 million House allowance for work on the Main Battle Tank, but additional funds sought by the Pentagon to start production were denied. Eagleton contended "blind congressional acceptance of bland

Army assurances have kept this highly questionable tank rolling along." Committee members said its development is essential. Mansfield's amendment faces the same obstacles as his earlier

proposal, which was rejected by the House and then diluted by Senate - House conferences into a call for President Nixon to negotiate an end to U.S. involvement in Indochina "as soon as practicable."

In the meantime, it could lead to a lengthy delay in final enactment of the big arms bill, one of the measures that must be passed before Congress can go home this year.

## 15,000 man quota set for remainder of '71

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Pentagon set a 10,000 man draft quota for the next three months and indicated next year's inductions will level off at about 1971's nine-year record low of 98,000.

The first men to be inducted under the renewed draft likely will be the Army uniform in mid-October, the Defense Dept. said. These inductees probably will be taken from among college and junior college graduates whose deferments have expired.

Selective Service officials have said

nearly every qualified man with lottery No.

125 or lower will be called.

Meanwhile spokesman Friedheim disclosed that Secretary of Defense Melvin R. Laird has ordered the Army to reverse the policy under which Army recruiters rejected veterans seeking to re-enlist.

The policy conflicted with Laird's recent public warnings of a dangerous military manpower shortage. Friedheim attributed the conflict to what he called "confusion" on the part of recruiters.

Freidheim also denied that the low draft call for the remainder of this year suggested that Laird was crying wolf when he predicted during Senate debate that Army readiness would be damaged significantly unless the Selective Service law was quickly revived.

The Pentagon spokesman argued that, low as it is, the new draft call for October, November and December will generate voluntary enlistments in the armed forces.

Officials said that actual inductions in the final quarter this year will total close to 15,000 because the Selective Service System is expected to deliver nearly another 5,000 men under a previous quota which had not been filled when the draft

law lapsed temporarily on June 30. Officials said most of the new quota probably will be filled in October and November in line with a longtime policy which has minimized draft inductions during December because of the Christmas holiday season.


The total 1971 call of 98,000 is the lowest since 1962 when 76,500 men were

Friedheim said that total inductions in 1972 will be "certainly within the same range as this year.'

With the size of the armed forces being reduced sharply, this year's total draft calls fall more than 65,000 men below the 1970 total of 163,500.

Pedestrians are apt to go home from a ard day at class with bicycle tread marks on their backs, and bicyclists with car reads on theirs, this year.

The number of registered bicycles on ampus has risen sharply in recent years. Most of the new riders appear to be ignorant of traffic regulations pertaining to - which constitutes a serious

The total number of bicycles registered with the Dept. of Public Safety was 5,163 ast year and 3,793 the year before. As of Wednesday - with two full days of registration remaining — 5,738 bicycles had een registered.

Today is the last formal day of

Richard Bernitt, director of the Dept. of Public Safety, attributed the increase to the national surge in bike riding.

The All University Traffic Committee (AUTC) is trying to make bicyclists realize that they have to follow moving traffic regulations, just as they would driving a

"Kids just don't know the scope of the problem. They aren't following the traffic regulations and it seems that they aren't going to until something terrible happens." Diane Rathnow, student member of the AUTC said.

Bicyclists are governed by the same traffic regulations as motorists and are fined the same amount for traffic law infractions. However, bicyclists do not receive points on their traffic records for tickets incurred on a bicycle.

Fifty tickets have been issued to bicyclists since Tuesday, most of them for riding the wrong way on a one way street and running red lights and stop signs.

Last year there were five reported bicycle accidents not involving motor vehicles and 16 involving motor vehicles, 13 of which reported personal injury, Bernitt said.

"Bicyclists violating traffic regulations have been the cause of a number of near accidents since the beginning of the term," Capt. Adam J. Zutaut, police commander of the Dept. of Public Safety, reported.

Safety has been the overriding factor in emphasizing bicycle compliance with traffic regulations, Zutaut explained. "If we can get voluntary cooperation,"

he said, "we'll avert serious accidents."

Zutaut said he is also concerned with many bicyclists who fail to register their bikes. Registration is more to the advantage of bicycle owners than the safety department or University, he 'The registrations cost 50 cents, but it is

the only way we can identify a bike when it is stolen," he said. Students who live off-campus are advised to register their bicycles with the police department of the community in

which they live, since the departments work together in attempts to recover them. The AUTC suggests that bicyclists put their license stickers on the inside bar of the bike so that anyone who might steal it cannot remove the sticker by sawing off

The Dept. of Public Safety has recorded nearly 40 bicycle thefts since the start of the term. A total of 633 bicycles were stolen last year.

Registration officials will accept bicycle registrations in West Mayo lobby today and in Quonset 104 throughout the rest of the year. Bicyclists caught riding unregistered bicycles on campus after today will be

## W. Germans plan GI subsidy uncertain — will be covered by loans from West Germany and by

WASHINGTON (AP) — For the first time since France helped it win the American Revolution of 1776, the United States is to get a direct subsidy from a foreign government. Negotiations are moving toward cash payment by West Germany to help support U. S. troops there.

U.S. and West German officials say they have agreed that West Germany is to make a contribution to the U.S. budget. It is designed to cover part of the \$1.2 billion which the United States calculates as the annual cost in foreign currency of keeping 200,000 American troops in West Germany. Additional costs in

Over the two years that began July 1, the West Germans say they expect to spend more than three billion marks, \$900 million, on U.S. military equipment. This offsets some of the U.S. spending in foreign currency.

The last time the U.S. Treasury can recall anybody handing the United States any free money was back in 1781, when Louis VVI came through with a gift of six million livres to the Revolutionary forces. That amounted to some \$1,089,000 at the time, but a dollar went a good deal further in those days. The king handed out a good deal more in the form of loans, which he got back later. The money helped inflict a defeat on Britain, with which Louis was at war in any case.

The West Germans are also offering loans of various kinds now, These will help the United States scrape together scarce foreign currency but the money will have to be paid back some day. The West Germans have given this type of help in recent years and a part of the debt is already coming due.

This is the first time the West Germans have said they are ready to make a contribution that would ease the burden on the U.S. budget as well - a non - reimbursable contribution like the Marshall Plan aid to Europe that followed World War II. In ordinary language: a free gift.

## Campaign complaint awaits investigation

on a complaint against two East Lansing city council candidates, according to a spokesman for the state Attorney General's office Thursday.

The complaint, filed by Perry Bullard, attorney for the Coalition for Human Survival, alleges candidates C. Max Phillips and Duane P. Bone violated state limits on campaign expenditures in the recent city primary election.

According to Michigan elections law, no more than \$400 can be spent by any one organization in behalf of a council candidate. Bullard, who is a resident of Haslett, said Bone and Phillips filed initial financial statements listing expenditures well above that

The spokesman for the Attorney General's office said the complaint, which was received earlier this week was "awaiting assignment" in the department's criminal division. They had no idea when a decision on the case might be

"Our objective is to provide the largest possible increase that we can, consistent with budget realities and out responsibility ot provide quality education," Wharton

"Given the uncertainty of whether the governor will exact any or all of the 3 percent reduction in the higher education bill, we are unable to make precise determinations of the funds we will have available for salary increases.

"At the moment, we have not settled on

any one alternative over another. When we do, this will form the basis of my recommendation to the board of trustees. I expect a recommendation will be made no later than the scheduled Oct. 15 board meeting, and it is possible the board can meet earlier in special session if the situation permits," Wharton said.

In addition to the question of how much of a reduction up to 3 percent will be made on MSU's appropriation, a time factor of how soon the decision will be made concerns the University, one source said.

While a meeting between the budget office and MSU is likely to work out an agreement on the amount of the cut, this might not occur for several months.

While the governor has authority to make cuts in the budget not to exceed 3 per cent, the MSU appropriation he signed Wednesday includes funds for a 3.5 percent pay increase for faculty and staff. Furthermore, the MSU administration had been prepared to squeeze out enough funds

about \$2 million - through internal reallocation of resources to produce a 3.5 percent salary increase in addition to what the legislature authorized.

The governor's order to cut the budget was most likely motivated by a desire to provide as much funding as possible for a welfare package that has yet to be approved by the legislature, the official

University administrators contend that they have already trimmed the 1971-72 budget to the bone and that no more cuts can be made to finance faculty and staff wage increases without seriously eroding MSU's services to the state.

Last year, a 1.5 percent internal budget cut to all colleges of MSU was ordered in January by the central administration, a reduction that was not restored with this year's new budget.

# **EDITORIALS** Detroit busing plan: a bitter, necessary pill

The ruling Monday by federal Judge Stephen J. Roth may well deal a death blow to the all white suburban school system. Judge Roth ruled that the State of Michigan and the Detroit Public School System were guilty of maintaining "de jure" or legal segregation, which was prohibited by the Supreme Court in

There are 86 school systems in the greater Detroit area - the Detroit School System and 85 smaller suburban systems scattered throughout cities and townships in Wayne, Oakland, and Macomb counties. The schools in the 85 smaller suburban systems are, by definition, nearly all white. When the suburbs themselves are all white and the suburbs have their own school systems, things naturally turn out that way.

By maintaining separate urban and suburban school structures, significant integration can be prevented. Whites willing to flee to the suburbs can be almost assured of sending their children to all white schools.

This flight has prevented any kind of meaningful integration of public schools in the Detroit area. In addition it has robbed the Detroit School System of important property tax revenue. The effect of the flood of higher income groups from the central city over the course of decades has been staggering. Grosse Pointe individuals pay taxes equivalent to \$1,200 annually for each student. In Detroit the amount per student is only \$800.

#### Inequality

This situation naturally creates unequal schools. A student in Detroit cannot receive as good an education as one in Grosse Pointe with such a discrepancy in per capita property tax revenues. In essence. Detroit area schools, like those in other major metropolitan areas, are inequitable because of their systematic structure. Judge Roth's ruling paves the way to correct this situation.

Busing between the suburbs and Detroit becomes immediately available under the ruling as a means to eliminate school segregation once and for all.

Through primary experience, beginning at the first grade level, with members of other races, children should never assume the racist attitudes of their elders.

Granted, busing is wasteful in terms of efficiently setting up school boundaries. Yet an even greater waste is the human resources lost in maintaining segregated schools. As long as white and black children are educated and brought up in separate long already.

surroundings, the fears and prejudices of the past most certainly will be transmitted into the future.

In most cases children of elementary school age have not yet formed any sort of racial outlook. By sending young black and white children together, the kids themselves will find there is no more inherent difference between blacks and whites than between blondes and redheads.

Racial hatred does not develop naturally; it is learned. Segregated schools have been implicitly teaching this lesson for years.

#### Traumas

Some complain about the emotional traumas which would develop among youngsters who would be forced to spend an hour each day on a bus going from Detroit to Bloomfield Hills and back. Strangely enough farm children have been taking such busrides ever since school buses first hit the road and have managed to live through it.

Busing alone, however, will not eliminate the differences between suburban and inner city schools. In fact there will be a great and completely justifiable uproar if busing between school systems is not combined with steps designed to equalize school system revenues.

With this goal in mind a greater Detroit area school system should be established. All 86 school districts in the Detroit area should be included. Of course it will require considerable time and expense to standardize 86 separate educational programs overnight, but these are costs which must be borne. Busing between unequal school systems would be as intolerable as no busing at all.

Busing will be a bitter pill for Detroit to swallow, but unless the pill is taken, the disease of racism unequal educational opportunities will not be cured. Seventeen years after the Supreme Court outlawed segregated schools, Detroit, like all other major urban areas, is still maintaining an essentially segregated system of education.

This must end - not only to equalize educational opportunities, but also to mix the races at an early enough age to retard the development of racist attitudes. For the most part America has done little to solve her racial problems. Judge Roth's ruling has the potential to make Detroit a model for urban socialization, if he carries his initial "de jure" segregation decision to its logical conclusion: busing of students, which in turn will necessitate a greater Detroit area school system. We have held onto the segregated status quo much too

## Driving rules unfair

One of the interesting things about the University power structure is that regulations are generally made by individuals exempt from them.

Student Motor Vehicle Regulation Number 21 is a classic case in point. Under these statutes a student is parking and driving violations. It is not uncommon for automotive miscreants to amass fines of several hundreds of dollars.

For several years the members of the Student Traffic Appeals Court and the student delegates to the All -University Traffic Committee have lobbied for a scheme under

which violations would be assessed a flat rate of, say, three dollars (or \$10 for sticker violations) with a mandatory review of a student's driving privileges after his sixth or eighth summons.

Such reforms have been fined according to a "step scale" for "consistently blocked by the faculty-administration controlled traffic committee. Significantly, university employeees pay a flat rate for all parking violations.

We cannot help but wonder if the committee would legislate the same way if faculty and staff were presently faced with a noxious "step

When an MSU officer stops someone in an automobile for a traffic violation, is it legal for the officer to search the vehicle or must he ask first or obtain a warrant? What happens if the person refuses permission to

No. The stopping of a motorist for a routine traffic offense does not authorize an officer to search the vehicle. However, when a motorist is stopped for driving under the influence, the arresting officer may search the vehicle without obtaining permission or a search warrant. The officer, except in the latter case, must abide by the directive of the motorist or seek a search

Why doesn't the police dept. designate "no student parking" areas more clearly, especially those areas marked in red on the campus maps but which have no signs or other visible markings? Is this a ploy to draw more revenue in parking violation

All but two red areas (Lot K and the

Hubbard Hall service area) are posted with signs indicating "No Student Parking." The Student Motor Vehicle Regulation specifically states that these signs are unnecessary; however, the department has augmented the map controls with some signs. There is no intent to derive more revenue - rather it's an attempt to avoid a posting of signs beyond those that are absolutely necessary.

I notice from reading the State News that many thefts and burglaries are committed quite frequently in parking lots. especially Lots X and Y. Why don't officers patrol these areas more heavily when reports indicate frequent incidents are occurring?

Officers spend many hours patrolling the areas where cars are parked. When a particular problem is noted increased patrol and surveillance takes place. In addition to regular patrol, surveillance from unmarked cars and on foot by plain clothes officers is utilized to apprehend those involved.

What is the crime rate in the university community as compared to a city of comparable size?

The 1970 "Michigan Law Enforcement Officials Report on Crime" as compiled by the Michigan State Police indicates that the crime rate for Michigan was 3,787.5. MSU, having an approximate 65,000 population according to the Tri-County Planning Commission, had a crime rate of 2,333.8 for the fiscal period 1970-71.

What guidelines do the police use in determining such offenses as "disturbing the peace," particularly in regard to

We would like our officers to make those participating in the party aware that a complaint had been made. In practically all instances this information results in the end of the problem to the complainant without further police involvement.

If a student feels he was mistreated by a police officer - for example, if the officer used physical force against him while he remained cooperative - what recourse does he have? Can he press charges against the officer?

If such a situation involved one of our officers, we would urge that the facts be made known to the officer's supervisor immediately. Furthermore, if the student felt that criminal charges were in order, he should present his case directly to the County Prosecutor for review and assistance.

## Beard no asset for 'A' student

Like over 9 percent of the working force in Michigan, I am unemployed. Like a good portion of these I am 23, in good health, draft exempt, take a shower daily, have short hair, and a good work record. Like a substantial number I am a recent college graduate with a B.A. in Business. Like only a few, I graduated with high honors with an A average.

Why, with these qualifications, has my quest for employment been so unproductive? It appears that the possession of a beard tends to negate all of the positive attributes one may possess. Not a long shaggy apparition, mind you, but a neatly trimmed beard that has drawn compliments from both friends and employers. Yet the resistance in the business community has been staggering.

Two weeks after having applied for a job with the Michigan State Employe's Assn. I found myself among the final applicants being considered. A preliminary interview, my academic record, plus my score on a competitive examination had brought me this far. It was not until about five minutes into the final interview that I was first informed that although courts had ruled otherwise, I would be required to shave off my beard as a ondition of employment. Please note that this is the association that represents classified state employees and purports to believe strongly in the merit system. If I were a state employe, they would be my representative in defense of my right to keep my

Early last week I inquired about an ad placed in the newspaper by an employment agency. I was informed during my interview

that while I had some of the best qualifications they had ever seen, it would be a waste of their time and effort to attempt to secure me a job as long as I kept my beard. Less than four hours later I was notified that a potential employer was very interested in me with the stipulation that I shave. Not that the company was anything but objective, of course, but they always wondered what a bearded person was trying to prove or hide. After my decision not to shave I was reminded that the agency would no longer represent me, but should I ever decide to shave I was to feel free to call.

I am not attempting to prove or hide anything; I have no objections to requirements that beards be shaved for valid job related reasons such as the health factor in food service. What I do object to, however, are the negative inferences that people often make because of invalid beliefs or assumptions. While the legality of such discrimination is questionable, legal recourse is not the answer. I don't feel as if I could fit into a company that puts more emphasis on appearance than ability. In a sense, it is a mutual rejection of a job offer.

I am not going to take up space in a futile effort to discuss the trite arguments that both sides have developed. I would just like to express my frustration and disappointment in a business community that is content to hire a less qualified employe because he is beardless.

# No support for proposed route

For those students who may not be aware of it. I want to advise you that the proposed M-43 highway extension will run a few hundred feet south of Cherrry Lane Apartments, Holden Hall and Fee Hall. It will run north of Spartan Village and the new medical school hospital. Thus, it will further divide one of the few contiguous campuses in the state. The Highway Dept., in speaking of the 40-50 mile per hour proposed speed limit has indicated that the speed is reasonable and the route would compare to Shaw Lane. Somehow, one cannot help but wonder how a 40-50 mile per hour limited access road could compare to Shaw Lane which has a 25 mile per hour

We can all do something about it by registering and voting in the East Lansing City Council election for those candidates who are opposed to the route. If we all act now, there could be 3 voices on the city council opposed to the campus highway.

On October 20, 1949 the governing board of Michigan Stae College (MSU) gave its approval to a project which now, more than 20 years later, is a source of controversy not only within the university community but without as well. Approved in 1949 was a highway route across the southern end of the campus that would use a 200 foot right of way north of the Grand Trunk Railroad tracks to be reserved for construction of the proposed route.

Proposals Since that original decision, a variety of proposals for the highway have been presented to the board. The most recent plan calls for a grade level, limited access (40-50 miles per hour) highway with at-grade crossings at Hagadorn and Harrison Roads and an underpass at Farm Lane and Bogue Street. In addition, the plans (Engineering Report 1680, Supplement A) call for a connection with Red Cedar Road that would provide access to and from the north only.

In September of 1969 the board of trustees reaffirmed its support of the route and the State Highway dept., according to Henrik Stafseth the director, began in earnest to plan for construction of the 1.9 miles of 36 foot dual roadways to be built across the campus. However, on June 19. 1971 the board of trustees withdrew its support of the highway and indicated that there is a need for further consideration of the plans. (A public hearing has been

scheduled for Oct. 14.)

As a result of the trustees action this past June a considerable amount of debate has arisen. At present the board is receiving what I would label pressure to

approve the highway from several sources. One of the most common complaints against the board's position is that they have "broken faith" with the City of East Lansing. According to the city it has planned all of its streets in the past 10 years around the proposed highway plans and has gone so far as to develop a master street plan that takes account of the M-43 extension. In addition, the city's share of the construction costs of the Trowbridge interchange was \$200,000.

Safety

As all of us are aware Grand River poses a major problem with regard to traffic safety. In order to combat this threat, the city is supporting the destruction of a 200 foot wide stretch of campus for almost 2 miles rather than the destruction of the rather motley looking median that runs down Grand River Avenue. Grand River Avenue has more traffic accidents than any other street in the city, as the city manager has pointed out. However, he failed to note that, outside of Detroit, this is the most frequently traveled road in the state with 44,000 vehicles and 30,000 pedestrians using it every day. Allegedly the cross campus route would relieve much of the congestion by moving the traffic further south. One can't help but ask why a southern route is necessary since there are no residences in East Lansing, except on campus, that are south of Grand River Avenue. What is the matter with the proposed peripheral route (through Valley Court Park) or M-78? Can't these two roads relieve congestion?

The State Highway Dept. maintains that it has already spent \$1.7 million on the construction of ramps and structures at the Trowbridge Exit which will be wasted if the route doesn't go through. Is this the

The University has provided the City of East Lansing with a sizable portion of its income from commercial concerns. The city also receives shared revenues from the state on the basis of population statistics that include the University's student body. 



# Elected panel seeks James Madison dear

Search and selection committee members for dean of James Madison College will be chosen in an election Oct. 6. Four faculty and two student members will be elected.

Already appointed to the committee are provost's representative Herman King, asst. provost and John H. Wakeley, associate professor of psychology, selected by the provost from outside the college.

Further procedures will include an initial meeting arranged by King, a meeting with the provost, preparation of a nomination form which will be distributed to all faculty and students in the college, evaluation of nominations and presentation to the provost of a slate of from three to five candidates for dean.

Former dean Herbert Garfinkel resigned this summer in protest of the college's new bylaws. Garfinkel protested the implementation of the bylaws for a one-year trial period, with an equal student-faculty amendment authority inoperative for that period, following the defeat of the bylaws by the faculty.

Garfinkel believes the clause is illegal under University bylaws. "It is a bad policy in principle to provide students with authority equal to that of the faculty over the fundamental procedures by which a college shall be governed. Should this amending process be adopted, the student body would possess an absolute veto over faculty proposals for change. Surely such a veto goes far beyond the appropriate degree of student participation envisioned in the Taylor Commission Report," he

The equal authority clause is the most controversial section of

In a letter submitted to the provost at the same time Garfinkel said: "Regretably, some will misconstrue my position as generally hostile to student participation in academic governance. It is always difficult to avoid such stereotyping, but the record of the

past five years is clear enough. Students have been members of important policy-making bodies from the outset, including one who served on the original planning group preceding the college's

Ironically, it is Garfinkel's resignation that brought early implementation of the search and selection clause of the new

In another search and selection process, that for the dean of

the College of Education, things are moving swiftly, Lee Shulman, chairman of the committee, said.

The committee is now interviewing candidates on campus and all candidates are meeting with the provost and president.

The final list of candidates is expected before the end of fall term. This list will be presented to the president.

"The committee is extremely pleased by the progress,"

# U.S., Russia ink 'minor' pacts

WASHINGTON (AP) - Secretary of State (SALT) - to limit the nuclear arms race. William P. Rogers and Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko signed two disarmament side agreements Thursday and promised that the big powers will strive for a major accord to curb their missile systems.

At a State Dept. signing ceremony, Rogers hailed the agreements on modernizing the Washington-Moscow hot line and guarding in November, he said, "we must intensify our against accidental nuclear war as "this new imperative of the nuclear age.'

But both he and Gromyko noted the agreements fall far short of the avowed goal of

Rogers said "considerable progress has been made in this larger endeavor" for a mutual restriction on antiballistic missiles AMBs) and on offensive missiles, "but much remains to be

At the SALT negotiations resuming in Vienna efforts to reach agreements to limit the means as well as the risk of waging nuclear war. We shall strive toward this objective.'

Gromyko said in like vein: "The agreements the U.S.-Soviet Strategic Arms Limitation Talks signed today do not yet solve in any way the

armaments. This task is still outstanding and the participants in the talks should seek ways to solve it."

Rogers and Gromyko then went into a luncheon discussion at the Soviet embassy of other outstanding issues ranging from European security to the India-Pakistan difficulties.

Their meeting wound up a series of three high-level U.S. - Soviet parleys during Gromyko's visit to attend the U.N. General Assembly. The foreign ministers met in New



# Series to show Fuller film today



# Savoy Brown fails to fit blues guitar billing

Promotion is perhaps the single most disgusting aspect of the contemporary music scene. In the radio hype of Savoy Brown's latest album, "Street Corner Talking," the group is described as playing "Chicago Blues" music, and Kim Simmonds is described as a "revolutionary blues guitar genius," or something like a combination of Lightning Hopkins, Jimi Hendrix and Satan.

Whoever conceived that commercial has not listened to the album. First, Savoy Brown does not play "Chicago Blues." There is one cut which normally would fall into that category, but the album is not blues. Secondly Kim Simmonds is not a "revolutionary blues guitar genius." Savoy Brown does not play blues on this album, so it would be quite difficult for him to play any blues guitar, let alone revolutionary blues guitar.

What Savoy Brown does play is good - time rock and roll music, and "Street Corner Talking" is a pretty good collection of

This is a debut album for this particular band. The only remaining member of Savoy Brown is Simmonds. He plays lead guitar and writes most of the songs, which leisurely roll along, following his guitar line.

The high point of the album is definitely a song called "All I Can Do" which is written by Simmonds and organist Paul

This is Raymond on organ, and his jazz oriented solo is particularly well done. In the next instrumental break it is Simmonds' turn to entertain. His solo shows some imagination, and is pleasant, indeed.

The album has a low point in "Wang Dang Doodle." "Wang Dang Doodle" is an old blues favorite written by Willie Dixon. Where Savoy Brown's leisurely manner is appreciated elsewhere, on this song it is inappropriate and unsuccessful.

To hear this song done well, one ought listen to "The London Howlin' Wolf Sessions." Wolf and company (Eric Clapton, Charlie Watts, Bill Wyman, Ian Stewart) play a more spirited version. Most of the time Wolf sounds like he really is going to "pitch a ball." (or that he presently is pitching a ball) while Savoy Brown and lead singer Dave Walker sound like they are playing it the morning after. The entire album is good listening. Howlin' Wolf's rough voice

does good things to songs like "Do the Do," "Who's Been Talking" and "The Red Rooster." "The Red Rooster" has a recorded rehearsal in which Howlin' Wolf plays a bottleneck and sings to demonstrate how he wants Clapton to play along. The old guitar really sounds nice, and somehow Clapton's electric slide guitar on the finished version can not match it.

What could potentially have been the best song on the album, "Built for Comfort," is destroyed by a horn section. Wolf is most convincing when he sings "Because I'm built for comfort / I ain't

built for speed / But I got everything / That a good girl needs" The session work is also excellent. Clapton, who has done session work in the past with George Harrison and Steve Winwood, shows once again that he enjoys being out of the limelight and can contribute mightily to a song without launching

into a 15 minute solo. Winwood also plays on a few cuts. "The London Howlin' Wolf Sessions" fulfills some of the promise of Savoy Brown's misleading radio hype. If you bought "Street Corner Talking" because of that commercial and have not yet opened it, exchance it for "The London Howlin' Wol Sessions." If you would rather sit back and tap your feet to some rock and roll, keep "Stree Corner Talking." (Or buy it if you have not already done so.) If you enjoy both styles of music and have enough bread, buy them both.
