

Board members urged Flood not to resign, but she said her decision is the result of weeks of thinking and frustration and she would not reconsider.

Flood, one of the two board members who ran on the slate of the People for Progressive Policies, was a member of the Budget Committee and was working with the Council of Graduate Students on a project to send case studies to Congressmen of students who have been hurt by the financial aid legislation from the Dept. of Health, Education and Welfare.

An election to fill Flood's position is not expected until fall term.

In other business the board reversed its approval of an appointment to the Student · Faculty Judiciary, established a Cabinet service on Labor Relations and voted against a motion to institute a voluntary check - off system for the collection of the ASMSU student tax.

In a major action the board reversed its Wednesday approval of the appointment of John Braden, Rochester sophomore, to the Student -

Faculty Judiciary. Several board members asked that Braden's appointment be reconsidered, saving that the vote of approval was very close and that the board needed to fully examine the effect of Braden's involvement with the ASMSU board

on his judicial position.

"It's like putting a lobbyist on a circuit court in Lansing," Charles Massoglia, Off - Campus Council representative, said. "I'm suggesting that in this instance our appointment was inappropriate."

Flood said that she had decided to change her vote to one of disapproval after many of her friends and constituents had told her they felt the appointment was out of line. In this case, she said, Braden's involvement with the board was too extensive.

Braden, president of the MSU College Republicans, had attended a BudgetCommittee meeting during the week in place of Shelley Nolan, social sciences representative, board members said. Braden also attends most board meetings.

Defending his appointment, Braden

"Does involvement in student politics or any politics automatically disqualify someone from a position? You've been talking about my affiliations, not the way I think."

Braden was recommended by the All - University Student Judiciary for the position.

Other action included establishing 'labor relations' as an ASMSU Cabinet service to support unionization attempts by student employes on campus.

The board is expected to define the purposes and funding of the service

"Whether the service is any good depends on how much ability the board gives it to help the students," Tim Cain, president of the Kellogg Center Student Employes Assn., said Monday.

"It could be a file system or a real help to students," he said.

The board also defeated a motion which would have supported a voluntary check - off system for the collection of the ASMSU student tax,

Under the present system undergraduate students are automatically charged a 50 cent tax for ASMSU each term. Refunds can be obtained at the ASMSU Business Office during the first week of classes

Richard Evans, ASMSU; comptroller, said that PIRGIM's experience has shown that an organization using the check - off system stands to lose up to 30 per cent of its expected funds. He said that the board would be unable to sustain its services to students if it lost this much.

"The tax is like an insurance policy," Massoglia said. "It provides services such as legal aid so that someday they will be available to the student when he needs them.

Police panel plans action to determine property tax credits. Retroactive to Jan 1, 1973 some on gay recommendation

The Committee on Public Safety voted Monday to act on a recommendation presented by the Gay Liberation Front asking that restraints be put on plainclothes officers of the Dept. of Public Safety in their attempts to apprehend homosexuals on the MSU campus.

The recommendation, presented by Don Gaudard of Gay Liberation specifically requests that no member of the University police department be allowed to act as a plainclothesman or undercover agent on - campus; that toe - tapping, facial expressions and knocking on walls not be used as a cause for arresting someone on charges that he is

soliciting for illegal sexual acts; that no police officer arrest a person on charges of illegal sexual activity unless person arrested for illegal sexual acts and that no person arrested by a or the property tax component of rent words such as "fag" or "pervert."

Gaudard told the committee that the two charges suspected homosexuals are most often arrested for in the Union are: "attempting to procure for an act of gross indecency" and "attempting to solicit for illegal sexual activity.

Professor critical

of income tax cuts

By the computations of one MSU professor of economics, students stand to gain only small benefits from a state tax cut which was signed into law by Gov. Milliken last Wednesday. The new law, which will result in a

\$372 million decrease in state tax revenues for the 1973-74 fiscal year, provides renters, including off campus students, with a tax rebate if a portion of their rent exceeds 3.5 per cent of their income.

However, Professor Milton C. Taylor has pointed out that student renters with an average student income will usually gain only about \$5 under

Students who work, however, will benefit from an increase in the personal tax exemption from \$1,200 to \$1,500 which is part of the tax package. This change will take effect on Jan. 1, 1974.

However, two typical student cases described by Taylor indicate that a student renter would only receive \$3.90 or \$12.15 in tax rebates under the new formula.

The law changes the formula used Retroactive to Jan. 1, 1973, some renters and homeowners can get a refund for a part of this property tax credit, even if they pay no income tax. Students who live in residence halls cannot receive a rebate, since residence

halls are tax - exempt property. Under a complicated formula developed by the state legislature, the complainant is someone other than renters count 17 per cent of their total the Dept. of Public Safety; that no annual rent as the property tax component of the rent. If the amount be degraded by the arresting officer; of property tax paid on a homestead campus police officer be addressed by exceeds 3.5 per cent of the taxpayer's personal income, the taxpayer can receive a refund of 60 per cent of that amount.

The new property tax credit replaces a variable scale which has been used previously. The new property tax credit is calculated on a broader income base than before. Income now includes an individual's earning, gifts, social security payments and welfare payments. The first \$300

which an individual receives as gifts is excluded from the new income base. Any support which a student receives from parents is considered a gift, and any excess over \$300 is considered

By Taylor's computation, if a student receives \$3,600 from his parents and has no earnings, he would be entitled to a small refund. The student's total income would be \$3,300. Three and one - half per cent of this equals \$115.50. If the student pays \$80 per month for rent, the property tax component would be \$122, or 17 per cent of his total rent for the year. Since the property tax component of his rent exceeds 3.5 per cent of his total income, the student would be eligible for a refund of 60 per cent of that difference, or

Another student who earns \$1.500, receives \$1,500 from his parents and pays \$75 a month for rent would be eligible for a larger refund of \$12.15. Because neither of these students

"We decided when Common Cause began two and a half years ago that we had to focus on a limited number of problems," Gardner wrote in the Common Cause Report From Washington, a newsletter published 10 times each year and sent to members. "Random indignation and the diffusion of resources over too many targets are two of the great, traditional weaknesses of citizen action. We have to pick a few targets and mobilize resources to attack them.

"In Common Cause, with rare exceptions, we do nothing but fight specific battles, legal or legislative, and we stay with a battle until we win or lose. This philosophy has brought us dramatic victories, but it means that we can fight only a few battles at a

Doyle said the ociation is concerned several hiring policies the claims Singer tituted such as the uction of provisional intments and the new night examinations cedure. He was rectly referring to the hiring of a state senator's wife who passed one of the midnight "examinations" and received a civil service job with \$12,500 pay without going through the usual channels.

Doyle also said Singer has treatened the association via a letter he sent to it this year that said the association would not receive action on certain requests if it did not cooperate with his new innovative programs. He did not specify the type of threat Singer alledgedly made, or what type of requests the association made.

He added thtat the "crowning blow" which led to the request for Singer's resignation centered around "gross violation of the Constitutional neutrality of the Dept. of Civil Service staff" in which the Dept. of Civil Service was directed by Singer to make recommendations to the Public Advisory Committee. The committee was established to make recommendations on increasing employe representation and recognition. Doyle said the civil service department does not have the power to make recommendations.

"I don't have specifics of personal misconduct on Singer's part, but the courts will decide that in the near future," Doyle said.


Singer is currently involved in 10 court cases, mostly personnel grievances and one in which his own hiring isquestioned.

Contacted at his office, Monday, Singer said he regretted that Doyle chose a press conference to express the association's displeasure with him. He said he has always been open to dialog with the association to discuss any differences the association has had with him. "Since I have been here,

John Doyle has conducted a personal feud against me," Singer said. "This action is regretful but nothing new." Doyle denied that the

Women study tenure system

By LAURA MILLER State News Staff Writer

A lengthy explanation of the faculty tenure system highlighted the latest fact - findingsession of the Women's Advisory Council Monday.

Herman L. King, asst. provost, addressed the council in a three - hour meeting whose major business was to explore the history and concept of the tenure tract.

In the past, numerous women have charged that the tenure system discriminates against women who lose tenure when they leave the University to raise a family and return

King said the problem of former women faculty returning to the University without tenure is a recognizable problem, but that the University has "no answer for it yet."

The council did not question King about allegedly discriminatory practices in the tenure system including charges that some faculty women are not given tenure when their husbands are on tenure. But Mary K. Rothman, chairwoman of the council and director of women's programs, said the discussion was an exploratory effort.

At this point, the council is looking at the tenure concept," she said after the meeting. "I think the reason the council didn't challenge King hard is because they're gathering their facts.'

The council wants to know what tenure is and how it works before it moves on the concerns of numerous women's groups, she said.

Council member and professor of sociology Ruth Useem believes the tenure concept is to protect unpopular ideas but indicated the system may affect women differently

"We have some slight data to indicate men can work with men they don't like because they respect their ideas," Useem said, "but sometimes men can't work with women they don't like because they don't respect their ideas.'

King said the problems of women and tenure are very subtle and will be difficult to deal with, because they are







MSU black womer denied job status

Who needs blacks? Furthermore, who needs the black woman in faculty and administrative positions at this University?

Those who are in decision making positions seem to have a negative response to these questions.

The Black Women's Assn. reports that the largest number of black women employed at the University in higher positions remain at the food service level. There are only six black women who are assistant managers of foods. On the other hand, the University only employs two black women as associate professors and three as assistant

It appears that the University perceives the black woman as one capable of only performing menial occupations, such as working in the food preparation and maintenance

Many intelligent black women have graduated from higher institutions of learning throughout the nation. However, this University appears to be reluctant about hiring black women in various areas of education. By virtue of this, many black students have problems identifying with white female instructors.

As Kay Lindsey said in a chapter from "The Black Woman." "The Black liberation is primarily concerned with the liberation of blacks as a class and doesn't promote women's liberation as a priority. The movement is for most part spearheaded by males."

The chapter goes on to say that the feminist movement is mainly concerned with women as a class but is composed of mostly white women. Thus, black women are victims of

Church of Holy Shield

Being a reporter is not an easy task these days. The government expects us to do double duty as defenders of the public's right to know and of the government's right to be lazy.

With the dearth of official agents to investigate crimes and conspiracies, the government, through courts and grand juries, has learned that soliciting a reporter's notebook is far simpler than gathering its own information.

Thus, a reporter is placed in a precarious position. One can opt to reveal everything to the government and let the sources be damned, or refuse to open his notebook to the court and face charges of contempt. Another option, which reporters are exercising more and more frequently, is to simply refuse to cover a story where a source may be put in jeopardy by revealing his identity.

To alleviate this crisis, many journalists have suggested that an absolute shield law be instituted to offer complete protection to the journalist and to confidential sources.

But veteran political cynics in the press say that only doctors and clergy are guaranteed privileged conversations. Newsmen will be forced to accept a qualified shield law such as the one the Michigan legislature may

vote on today. That bill defines the role of the reporter, the nature of the news media and the restrictions of the shield bill.

But chills run up the spine of some reporters when they remember the famous axiom, "what the legislature giveth the legislature can taketh

Hence we could have card - carrying reporters licensed to rake up qualified muck. Such would not be a desirable

I suggest a more practical approach to the problem of shield laws. Forget them! Instead, reporters should be urged to establish a new faith - "The Church of the Holy Shield." The ordained members of the church would evangelically interview numerous people and would hold

names sacred when requested.

The vows could be based on t guidelines for pledging membership Sigma Delta Chi, the nation iournalism association, which truth, energy and talent.

Lawyers see setback for school integration

WASHINGTON - The principle of merging school districts in cities and suburbs to produce metropolitan wide

desegregation has suffered a severe, but perhaps not fatal, setback, civil rights lawyers said Mondayafter hearing of the U.S. Supreme Court's action in a Richmond, Va., case.

The Court Monday, on a 4-4 vote, blocked the merger of predominantly black schools in Richmond, Va., with mainly white schools in two suburban counties. But the court did not issue an opinion on the constitutionality of city-suburban school consolidation designed to achieve desegregation.

"There's no question it's a setback, but the issue of merger is still alive," William Taylor, director of the Center for National Policy Review at Catholic University, said.

Such a ruling could come in the court term beginning next October, when a desegregation dispute involving consolidation of school districts in the Detroit area is expected to come before the justices.

In the Detroit case, U.S. District Court Judge Stephen Roth has ruled that governmental action and inaction contributed to creation of a two-thirds black city school system surrounded by largely white suburban school districts.

Roth ordered large- scale busing between the city and 52 suburban school systems in order to insure the right of black children to an equal

A three - judge panel of the Sixth U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals affirmed Roth's decision, and the panel's finding is being reviewed by the full circuit court

BIG TEN LEAD VANISHED Batsmen slump costly

MSU's Steve VanderLaan ended the 1973' season for the Spartan baseball team on quite a happy note.

Ahead, 4-1, in the seventh inning of MSU's final game of Litwhiler noted. the year against Wisconsin Saturday, VanderLaan put the first two runners on base with a single and a walk.

However, the lanky righthander bore down and struck out the final three batters, the last one on a called third strike.

The victory was only the sixth in the Spartans' final 18 games of the season, including winning only three of their final 10 Big Ten contests. The losing string was accompanied by a devastating batting slump.

Once the league leaders, the Spartans ended up in a three - way tie for fourth, five games behind champion Minnesota. Coach Danny Litwhiler's squad ended with a 27 - 20 overall record and a 9-9 Big Ten mark.

On its annual Florida trip in March, MSU lost its first four games but then came back to post nine victories in the final games. The Spartans continued the tear into the northern season only to hit their late season tailspin.

"Overall, we finished where we thought we would," Litwhiler said. "We just lost too much before the season. We lost power in Ron Pruitt and Shaun Howitt (graduation) and pitching in Larry Ike and Brad Van Pelt (signed pro contracts.)

"You just can't replace these guys in one year.

"I can't say we were disappointed in respect to our original thinking, but we were disappointed because we had the momentum going until we hit that terrific slump.'

What happened to MSU football?

EDITOR'S NOTE: Michigan State football has slipped from the perch of national prominence it held 1950s and '60s. Funds for sustaining a healthy football program have been at low ebb in recent years. But that seems to be changing with Burt Smith and Denny Stolz calling the shots. Those changes will be discussed Today's column focuses on the University's neglect in

supporting the football program and the consequences that **Duffy Daugherty accepted.**

Duffy Daugherty's resignation last November prompted Flint Journal Sports Editor Doug Mintline to write: "Shed no tears for Duffy Daugherty. Cry, instead, for a sick Michigan State administration." That statement merits interesting consideration.

The demise of Michigan State's football program is obvious. More subtle are the answers to the question "Why"?

It was former University President John Hannah and Biggie Munn, followed by Daugherty, who pushed MSU football to national prominence. Building a competitive football program here coincided with the expansion of the university, and it was football which carried MSU's reputation past that of an agriculture school.

From 1947 through 1966 the Spartans marked a record of 136-44-4, a lofty winning percentage of .736. Included in that era were two national championships, three runners - up and two third places.

Since then the record has become lean. The 27 - 34 - 1 mark seems to indicate that a famine has swept through the Green and White land. The withered percentage stands at

"Why?" has become an echoing question.

Much of the blame was shouldered by Duffy. The "dump Duffy" rumblings in recent years imply that football fans were pointing the accusing finger at the head When Duffy decided to step down he emphasized there

was no pressure to do so. Mintline claimed there was.

It is a fact that MSU's football department has not been funded so lavishly as certain other Big Ten schools.

Mintline attributed part of this to a disenchanted University Vice - President Jack Breslin who, he said, became upset several seasons back when Duffy didn't start

While there may not have been a deliberate attempt to "phase out" Duffy, evidence is credible enough to suggest that he wasn't given enough support to maintain a healthy

We can't deny that football, appropriate or not, is the number one priority of collegiate athletics and success of a university's athletic program will be measured by the performance of its football team.

That was a central idea of MSU trustee Pat Carrigan during the search for Biggie Munn's replacement as athletic

"Michigan, under Don Canham's leadership, has

achknowledged this reality in a clear and practical commitment to spend whatever has to be spent in order to have the best football team possible," Carrigan said in a statement submitted to the selecting committee last year.

"MSU, meanwhile, continues to finance 13 sports and the largest minor - sport program in the conference, while operating with one of the lowest conference budgets for football and finding it more difficult each year to compete for top football talent," another segment of the statement read.



Duffy Daugherty

Duffy was criticized for not compiling a strong enough assistant coaching staff after holdovers from the good years headed for pro or head coaching jobs elsewhere. It became inevitably weak, however, when salary levels were too low to attract top talent when vacancies occurred - and this happened frequently in recent years.

Big Ten data show new assistant coaches were starting from \$12,000 - \$15,000 in 1971 - 72. Daugherty's last two additions were salaried for \$10,000.

MSU's assistant staff, two years ago, was listed as receiving a median income of \$13,450, ranking ninth in the conference.

The Spartans' biggest rival, Michigan, which MSU must "competitively" match, spent \$65,000 more than MSU for football salaries two years ago despite MSU's staff longevity which was greater than U-M's.

Even more embarrassing was Duffy's \$29,400 salary when compared to Bo Schembechler's, who in his fourth year drew \$32,000. Also difficult to digest is the fact that certain other conference schools have more football operating funds despite attracting fewer fans than does

MSU's estimated football revenue this past season was \$1,714,050, almost 80 per cent of its total intercollegiate athletics revenue. However, only 24 percent of the total budget is allocated for football.

With the lack of football funds came deteriorating recruiting conditions by which Duffy and Co. had to 'impress' prep players. The results? Not too productive.

Yes, recent years have soured MSU's football prowess, and the University acknowledges the inadequacy of recent support for the program under Duffy, but it wasn't the school that accepted blame for the consequences.


The MSU ticket office announced Monday that it will begin selling special advance football tickets for this fall Thursday.



"I am well pleased with what has happened at MSU with the medical facilities and you have my full support for continuing growth. I would much rather have one new well trained doctor in this state than 14 additional lawyers," he said.

"If we come to the end of our dollars, the medical schools are going to get them first," Zollar added.

But one of the Senate's strongest supporters of the MSU medical schools, Sen. Garland Lane, D - Flint, said he doubts if the College of Human Medicine will receive an amount close to its requested state funds.

He said, however, the College of Osteopathic Medicine will probably receive state allocations



Repas files third gripe

Bob Repas, professor of Labor and Industrial Relations, has filed a grievance charging Michael Harrison, faculty grievance officer, and John Cantlon, provost, with

conspiring to deprive him of access to a hearing board. In a letter to Cantlon, Repas charged that by illegally referring his grievance, concerning the Academic Council's censure of him, to the grievance officer for informal

resolution, he was effectively denied a hearing board. Repas was censured last spring for his part in the release of the faculty salary list.

The provost must automatically establish a hearing board upon the request of a faculty member, Repas said. However, Cantlon referred Repas' cause to the grievance officer instead of establishing a board. The grievance further charged Harrison with conspiring

with the provost by procrastinating on Repas' charge for

five and one half months, then finally refusing to establish a Repas' has requested that a board order the provost to set up another hearing board to hear his censure grievance. Furthermore, that the board instruct the provost and grievance officer to examine the grievance procedure so that they do not, in the future, deprive faculty members of

their rights by their ignorance. The grievance is the third one filed by Repas in the past In the letter, which prompted Repas' grievance, Harrison said he was refusing to establish a board because no

"administrator or administrative body" had been involved in the censure motion. Under the grievance procedure, only an administrative action can be grieved against. However, Repas said the Academic Council could be classified as an administrative unit in this case because they

functioned as one by punishing him in the censure motion.

If the person still cannot be contracted through forwarding, his or her name will then be removed from the voting rolls.

Mark Grebner, member of Voter Assistance, a student voter drive organization, expressed concern Monday about whether many students who have moved within residence halls or within the university during the year and who have failed to leave a forwarding address would be able to vote in August. However, he added that the clerk's office is doing a "decent, honest job" by clearing up the roles and City Clerk Beverly Colizzi to inform voters of precinct eliminating "dead weight."

> Grebner was suspicious of Colizzi's motives, initially, because "there's been so much hostility between her and the community in the past," he said. "She kind of refused to change. She didn't want to adjust to the thousands of new student voters each year, but it really looks to me like she's doing a decent, honest job as city clerk.'

> Grebner said that his group will try to notify students of the precinct changes and work with the city clerk after the primary election in contacting students who have moved. He added that students who have changed residences should contact the city clerk at city hall.

Graves knocks audit of Model Cities project

Lansing Mayor Gerald W. Graves, who has quarreled with the Lansing Model Cities administration for months, is not satisfied with the Model Cities Audit Report, which was recently released by the U.S. Dept. of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

The HUD audit report, which criticized city relations with the Model Cities program, is considered a victory for the model cities administration.

Seven Model Cities policy board members resigned in December charging that the neighborhood program was filled with political maneuvering. At that time the seven members called for a U.S. General Accounting Office audit of the

HUD report said that the Lansing City Demonstration Agency, which represents the city of Lansing, had not adequately monitored existing model cities agencies from an operational stand point.

The audit also found that:

• the demonstration agency had kept incomplete and inadequately maintained accounting records;

operating agencies of model cities had not been audited as required;

the results of a review of the agency by a national firm of accountants were not being fully

deficiencies in the monitoring and evaluation process of model cities

Model Cities Director, Jacqueline Warr, said that "all audits are phrased in negative language, - they are meant to point out weaknesses and not praise strong points or success."

"This audit does point out technical weakness and procedural problems in the financial area," she

"We do admit," Warr continued, "that we have some program weaknesses, but, here too, we will be preparing a response to the findings, and I am confident that most of these process statements will be removed as they show an obvious lack of understanding of our process."

satisfied. He admitted that the City Demonstration Agency and Model Cities had not adequately monitored certain contract agencies, but said the HUD auditors failed to determine what the taxpayers received from Model Cities for the hundreds of thousands of dollars spent for monitoring and evaluation.

"HUD also failed to analyze the City Demonstration Agency and Model Cities administrative staff and determine its effectiveness, efficiency and capabilities," Graves said. "HUD advises that something is

wrong and amiss but it allows its auditors to leave town without providing a total audit," Graves charged.

Graves also said that he was hard pressed to believe that "there was no fat in the administrative budget of the City Demonstration Agency and Model Cities."

"I find it hard to believe that we need more monitoring and evaluation, as suggested by HUD," he continued.


