# Area residents foresee beef shortage, stock up

By JOHN LINDSTROM State News Staff Writer

William L. Walker, general counsel to the government's Cost of Living Council, insisted Friday that reports of a shortage of beef were exaggerated.

But few people in the Lansing area seemed to believe him as hundreds this weekend rushed to supermarkets and local butchers to stock up on meat in anticipation of a possible beef drought next week

"The customers are stacked four or five deep right at the counter," Jim Keban, a truck driver now working at the counter at Van Alstine's Quality Beef Farm in Okemos, said Saturday.

"The meat shortage is true - it's here and it's bad," Keban added. "I'm supposed to be a truck driver but we're not shipping anything out so I'm working at the counter."

Don Popoff, owner of Consumer Beef in Lansing, said that his business has shifted from restaurant purchasing to large purchases from individuals with freezers trying to stock up on

"The restaurants can't buy any choice cuts because they aren't available," Popoff said.

Rick Root, manager of the International House of Pancakes in

Meridian Township, said that he hasn't operation around August 20 if he had too much of a problem getting steaks in the last week, but he expects more difficulty in the next several

"We've got a sign up about the shortage and we expect it to get very tight in the next three weeks. Both of our suppliers told us they would have trouble supplying us," he said.

"It's very difficult for us to get steaks," Rick Kramer, asst. manager of East Lansing's Starboard Tack restaurant, said. "We should be all right until next week, but I hear after that they won't be slaughtering any more cattle."

Other meat retailers and wholesalers indicated that sometime around August 20 may become the critical time for meat supplies.

In anticipation of that critical shortage, many suppliers have had to limit the amount on customer orders. "We're holding people to five pounds of ground round, two round steaks, two sirloins," Keban said. "Around 4 o'clock we ran out of

Douglas Peet, owner of Peet Packing and Farmer Peet's meat, and one of MSU's major meat suppliers, warned that he may have to shut down doesn't get any more beef.

Cruise missiles are being developed be launched from planes, surface ps, submarines or land bases, ments said. With a range of about 000 miles, they will fly at supersonic subsonic speeds and at low or high itudes and will be highly neuverable.

## Richardson cites crime fight defects

WASHINGTON (AP) - Atty. Gen. Elliot L. Richardson says the government has failed to develop ways of judging the effectiveness of crime fighting efforts and cannot even measure the volume of crime.

Richardson said that correcting those faults will be among his major priorities in the job be began two

His statement in an interview were his first public remarks since taking office about the shortcomings of the crime fight launched under former Atty. Gen. John N. Mitchell as a major thrust of President Nixon's first term.

Richardson had no direct comment on Mitchell's leadership of the effort. He said that before the government can find ways to curb crime, it must

know how much crime there is. The FBI crime index measures only a fraction of the murders, rapes and thefts committed in this country, he

Numerous critics have complained that the FBI crime statistics are inaccurate and have accused the

Justice Dept. and local police agencies of manipulating the figures for political advantage in election years. But no attorney general in recent

while holding office. 'The apparent difficulties of enforcing a court order directed at a president have led the courts, historically, to try to avoid disrupting the constitutional

First, they might argue, presidential balance among the three branches.

The late Supreme Court Justice Felix Frankfurter wrote in 1952 that "clashes between different branches of the government should be avoided if a legal ground of less explosive potentialities is properly availab

"To start with a consideration of the relation between the President's powers and those of Congress - a most delicate matter that has occupied the thoughts of statesmen and judges since the Nation was founded and will continue to occupy their thoughts as long as our democracy lasts - is to start at the wrong end."

#### Grenades kill 2 in Athens

Palestinian terrorists tossed hand grenades and fired pistols into a crowded Athens airport lounge Sunday, killing two Americans and wounding dozens of other persons in an unsuccessful bid to hijack a plane to the Middle East.

The initial attack was aimed at passengers about to board two Trans World Airlines flights to Tel Aviv, officials said.

The terrorists surrendered to police after holding 35 hostages for two hours during which they negotiated for a plane from behind a marble cost \$5.3 million to operate bar in the transit lounge.

Police surrounded the airport after the blasts ceremonial military bands and two men identified as Arabs surrendered after cost \$10.6 million. the two - hour standoff. The terms of their surrender were not immediately announced.



#### Japan will not rearm

Prime Minister Kakuei Tanaka said Sunday Japan will not acquire nuclear weapons in order to become a permanent member of the United Nations Security Council or to protect its long supply lines at sea.

Appearing on NBC's "Meet the Press," he said that Japan is under constitutional restraints not to rearm or to

Tanaka said Japan will continue to depend upon the security treaty with the United States which provides a nuclear umbrella for Japan's protection in exchange for the use of bases in Japan for U.S. ground, navy and air forces.

Tanaka was here last week for talks with Nixon, and his TV interview was taped in advance for Sunday.

#### U.S. continues bombing

U.S. aircraft, including B52 bombers, continued operations Sunday over Cambodia at the Cambodian government's request, the U.S. Pacific military command reported.

As usual, the command refused to provide any details of the operations. Congress has ordered U.S. bombing over Cambodia halted by Aug. 15.

Sunday marked the 152nd straight day of activity for the heavy bombers over Cambodia.

#### Beef price freeze remains

Treasury Secretary George P. Shultz said Sunday the freeze on retail prices of beef will remain in effect until Sept. 12, the date set by President Nixon despite the growing absence of red meat from supermarkets.

Shultz first said the lifting of the freeze before Sept. 12 "remains to be seen," but then said: "that date stands."

"The last I talked to the President that was the date that had been set," Shultz said. "As far as I know he hasn't shifted his view."

He explained that by saying a decision on the Sept. 12 date "remains to be seen," he reflected a "recognition of the fact that lots of questions have

been raised and lots of pressure has been put on." He spoke on the ABC television program "Issues and Answers."

# Defense Dept. spending criticized

WASHINGTON-The General Accounting Office says the Defense Dept. spent \$24 million on promotional activities that were not included in its 1972 public - affairs budget.

GAO, in a report Sunday to the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, said the Pentagon has a different definition of "public -relations activities" than that generally used by other government agencies.

For example, the report said, the Defense Dept. did not consider performances by the Navy's Blue Angels flight team or by the Air Force Band as public relations activities.

In releasing the GAO report, Foreign Relations Chairman J. W. Fulbright, D - Ark., noted Congress had imposed a \$28 - million annual ceiling on Pentagon public relations spending.

# Kent State probe to reopen

Atty. Gen. Elliot L. Richardson announced Friday that the U.S. Justice Dept. will reopen its investigation of the shootings at Kent State University in Ohio on May 4, 1970.

In the shootings, Ohio National Guardsmen killed four students and wounded nine others during a campus protest against expansion of the Vietnam War into Cambodia.

Richardson said he had concluded from a review of department files that "there are some areas where an additional inquiry is

"This does not mean that we have reason to believe that the prior decision to discontinue active investigation was wrong or made for improper reasons," he continued, 'nor does it mean that we think the additional inquiry is likely to lead to a different prosecutive judgment."

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

The board is responsible for selecting students to fill a

her of seats on each of 12 University wide committees.

But Grafton last week attributed the delay to what he termed "laziness of the board to find responsible students."

"The entire board is responsible through our Search and Selection Committee for actively recruiting committee members. The board just has not been doing a good job since the March elections -- they haven't expected to do any work," he said.

The committees which still have vacant seats include one seat on the Military Education Advisory Committee and an at - large seat and a second seat representing married

students on the All - University Traffic Committee.

Other seats include a selected student from the Office of Black Affairs for the Student Employer Advisory Committee and three representatives to the Health Center Advisory Committee for minority groups, married students and foreign students.

Allegations have been made that the board's delay in selecting committee members has impeded work for the

One committee chairman said Sunday he has had problems with ASMSU student appointees not coming to

the committee meetings, but the lack of a student representation has not impeded committee progress.

'It's a shame that the students aren't participating. We have enough other members to vote but the students don't get a voice in our work, especially since we are only charged to meet once each term," Richard Coelho, chairman of the Military Education Committee, said.

Grafton said he has taken the authority that if the board does not make the appointments, he can make temporary interim appointments until the board takes action.

"The code of operations gives me certain powers such as this for external affairs, and even though it is not a good way to make appointments, it speeds action in these committees," he said.

He said he made these interim appointments for the Financial Aids Committee and the All - University Traffic Committee.

Grafton explained the process involved in officially making committee appointments.

Deborah Hartshorn, representative from the College of Human Ecology and chairman of the Search and Selection Committee, advertises in student publications that petitions will be accepted for positions on various committees. Through the petitions applicants are personally interviewed by board members and final action is taken by board vote approving each potential committee member.


"Witnesses at the Senate Select Committee on the Presidential Election have made these charges. The

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

## Redeployment plan detailed

WASHINGTON - Secretary of State William P. Rogers has revealed that Cambodian troops will withdraw from "exposed positions" once support from American bombers ceases on Aug. 15.

Rogers, in an affidavit made public Saturday, said the bombing halt will necessitate a "redeployment of Cambodian armed forces, and is some cases civilians whom those forces are protecting, from exposed positions to positions where they can defend themselves and be resupplied."

"A lot of problems arise from the failure to be clear about that," he said. "The job, as far as the criminal justice system is concerned, is reducing crime, reducing the social cost to people of being victimized by crime.





"In any event, it will be the last time they are heard of in a U.S. national team." Washington says Bush


consistently has failed to look at the other side of the story, something which contributed to his and Dill's Gymnasts 'clinic departure to begin with.

Washington says he doesn't regret not telling Bush in the first place that the two were leaving.



"I just hope this incident won't affect those chances," Washington said.



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
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
