Two Teams Meet Again Today as State Seeks Revenge.

Capicek, lanky center fielder for the visitors, was a threat in the side of all three State hurlers. He wound up the day with four hits, two of them for extra bases. He scored three times and batted in two more and was the main reason for the Wisconsin victory.

George Zuhls, the first of the pitching brothers, deserves a better fate than that accorded him in the eighth inning when he was yanked in favor of his twin. He held the Kobsmen to their five hits in that period, and would have had a safe lead if his team-mates hadn't got a bad attack of throw-the-ball-around. Outside of that second inning, he was in danger only once—in the fifth when the Spartans filed base runners after two were down. He got out of that hole without a run being scored.

Randone reached first in the opening frame after one walk and a single in right but was out trying to steal second. Then in the second came the flood.

Wegner fanned to start the frame, but Gorlock started things when he singled to right. Capicek then got the first of his four hits when he tripled far into right center, scoring Gorlock. Ferris then singled to right, scoring Capicek. There was a brief resting period when Schroeder fled to Welch, but Zuhls walked, sending Ferris to second. Reinhardt sent Ferris across with the third tally, and another single by right and Randone ended the inning by flying to Welch in right.

Spartan Rally

The Spartans came right back in their half to score all their runs, battling all the way around. Bartling opened with the first of two hits, a single to left between Gorlock and Schroeder. Lehnardt drew the first of three passes tossed to him during the course of events, and there were two on. Barringer scored them both with a drive to right that evaded Reinhardt for a triple. Welch sent a towering fly in the same direction and Reinhardt obliged by dropping the ball, Welch taking three bases and Barringer scoring.

Ziegel got an infield hit when Zuhls took too long in fielding his grounder, and the Spartan first sacker added to the bewilderment of the Badgers by taking second as the visitors left that base unguarded. Walters drew a pass and the sacks were loaded.

Glaza made the first out of the inning by fanning, but Wegner hit a grounder to Meyer, which that gentleman proceeded to throw into left field. Welch and Ziegel scored on the play. Walters took second, but Wegner was out trying for second. Sebo ended the inning by grounding to Schroeder on a nice line.

The Posermen scored their run in the third in this manner. Heyer opened by grounding to Wegner, but Wegner got an infield hit. Gorlock was thrown out by Glaza, Wegner taking second. Bartling and then three badly to Ziegel on Capicek's grounder, and when Ziegel threw wildly past Wegner trying to catch Wegner off the base, Wegner scored and Capicek went to second. Ferris ended the uprising by grounding out to Glaza.

The Badgers got two hits during the fourth and fifth but no damage was done, the Spartans keeping their lead.

Sebo opened the State fifth with a bunt and was safe when Randone tried to test Wegner's abilities as a first sacker. Bartling then got his double to left and there were two on. Zuhls decided that strategy was the better part of valor and passed Lehnardt intentionally. Barringer proved that the strategy was right by forcing Milt at second for the last out.

Capicek started the Badger sixth with a double that just barely got past Lehnardt in center. Ferris struck out, but Schroeder tied up the ball game by singling to left.

Second Meet of Year Ends in 6-3 Victory for Ball Team; Win All but Six Sets.

Successful in their match with Michigan here last Tuesday, Michigan State's tennis team is looking forward to a pair of matches this week-end. The Spartans meet Wayne university at Detroit.

In defeating the Wolverines, 6-3, State netters gave indications of possibly duplicating the record set by the 1934 Spartan tennis team, which won 20 consecutive matches. Michigan captured only six sets from State players.

Willard Klunzinger, playing number 1, started out the afternoon by defeating Rodriguez in straight sets, 6-4, 6-4.

Bob Rosa defeated John Kahn of Michigan likewise in quick 6-3, 7-5 order. The next match involved two old home town rivals from Grand Haven. This year Scholtz, State's number three man, lost to Miller Sherwood 1-6, 3-6, 3-6.

After losing the first set, 4-6, Stenebraker of State rallied to beat Dean in the last two sets by decisive 6-2, 6-2 margins. Eissler lost his match in straight sets to Thorpe, 3-6, 3-6. Hyatt, playing number six for the Spartans, defeated Flick after three sets, 1-6, 6-4, 6-4.

Doubles Fasier
The Green and White won two out of three matches in doubles. The first match, Klunzinger-Scholtz versus Sherwood-Kahn, was the most thrilling match of the day. State lost the first set, 4-6. The Wolverines had set point in the second set, but Klunzinger-Scholtz finally triumphed, 8-6. Likewise the Spartans won the third set, 6-4, but only after getting set point twice, then having the Michigan duo rally.

Captain Rosa and Stenebraker easily outpointed the number two doubles of Michigan. The State combination won in decisive sets, 6-1, 6-4. Rodriguez and Dean were no match for these two. Eissler-Hyatt (S) lost to Flick-Therwood 3-1, 9-1, to conclude the afternoon's tennis.

Michigan State's golf team will journey to Ann Arbor Saturday afternoon to meet the powerful University of Michigan linksmen. Coach Ben Van Alstyne has announced that nine men will make the trip to meet the Wolverines in match play.

Hoping to pull some unexpected points out of the match, the Spartan mentor will pit Neal Taylor against Chuck Koes, the Wolverine's ace, with Tom Brand, State sophomore, facing Malloy, another star of the Wolverine lineup. Lee Hendrickson and Carl Nosal will play in the third and fourth positions respectively for State.

Other Spartans to make the trip will be Henry Zimmerman, Hal Richardson, Howard Silcox, Jim Rousner and Allan Lefel. Richardson is the only veteran among this group, but some pretty fair scores have been turned in by the others considering the unfavorable weather that has greeted their practice sessions.

Johnny Fischer, the individual star of Michigan teams for the last three years, has graduated, but his absence will not be severely felt with the boys of stars on hand to take his place.

STATE IS AMONG FIVE MICHIGAN TEAMS AT PENN

Spartans Defend Only Four-Mile Crown as Injuries Force Team Out of Medley.

Nationwide track interest centers in two cities today as the Penn and Drake Relays stage their annual carnivals in Philadelphia and Des Moines, respectively.

The cream of the country's tracksters will appear at the Penn meet, which is acclaimed by critics as the greatest carnival of its type in the world.

Attracted to the meet are five Michigan schools—the university, Michigan State, Ypsilanti, Western Normal and Wayne university.

Although winner of the four-mile and medley distance titles at Penn last year, Michigan State will defend only the former crown tomorrow. Injuries forced Athletic Director Ralph H. Young to withdraw his medley entry.

Young took six Spartans east in addition to Trainer Jack Hengstall. It marks the first time in Hengstall's 20 years of training State teams that he has accompanied the track team to Penn.

Co-Captain Charles Dennis will lead the Spartan four-mile team. He was a member of last year's quartet, which whipped its closest rivals by 23 yards.

Dennis is teaming with Gerard Bos, Robert Hills and Art Green, all fair mile runners. Edward Bechtold, Kenneth Waite and Nelson Gardner, who have recorded faster times for the distance, were left behind suffering from one injury or another.

Dennis ran at Penn last spring, capturing a fourth in the 3,000 steeplechase. He will again compete in the race today, along with Hills.

In the 400 meter hurdles, Clare McDermott will seek laurels for State. Albert Agelli, State's top ranking hurdler, is just getting into shape after being laid up several weeks with a bad hip.

Francis Dietrich rounds out the Spartan delegation. He is in the broad jump and the hop, step and jump.

Inability of Waite and James Wright to run led to State's withdrawal from the medley. Both are expected to be in shape for a dual meet with Marquette May 2.

Just where State will meet the Hilltoppers remains undecided. The teams probably will oppose each other at Potomac held in Lansing.

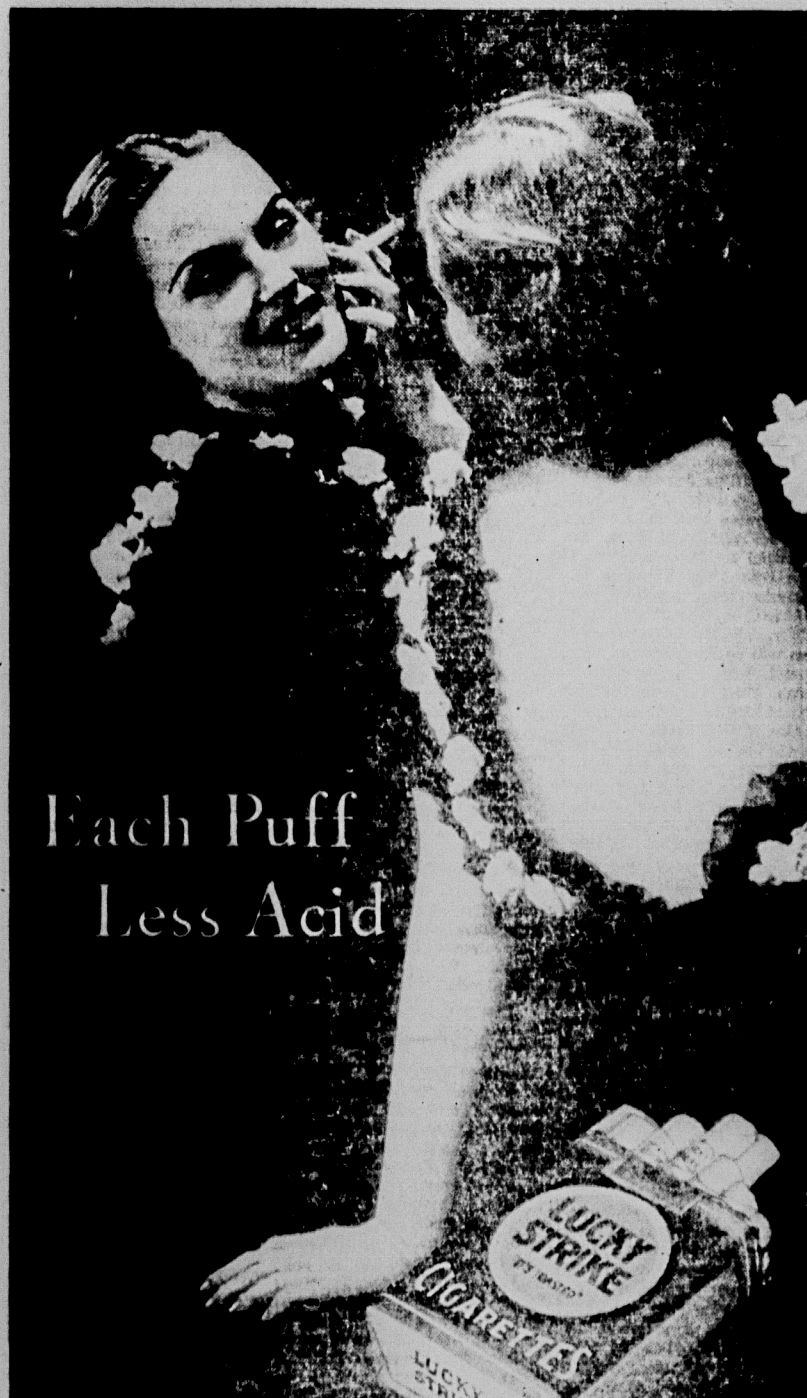
Delphics Topple Sigma Nus, 5 to 3

barrage while holding their opponents to a lone tally. Tuesday night, Lambda Chi defeated the Hesperian society, 3 to 1, the Hes-



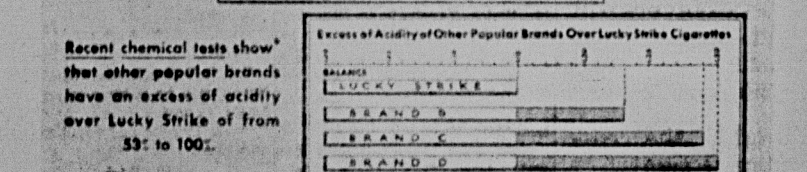

Try whispering loudly enough to be heard in the back row and still make it seem inaudible to the character next to you. Try acting heart-broken when you're on top of the world, and above all—try being romantic when your feet hurt. Then, reversing Groucho Marx's line, "Even if the plays aren't good, you'll like them."
