

State Eleven Closes Season Playing Arizona Here Saturday

Reach Peak In Whipping Kansas '11'

Arizona to Make First Eastern Appearance Here This Saturday.

A rugged University of Arizona football team will come out of the southwest to help Michigan state ring down the curtain on the 1936 gridiron season in Mackinac Field here Saturday.

It will mark Arizona's first invasion into this section of the country. Coached by "Tex" Oliver, former Southern California star, Arizona annually is being represented by a stronger football eleven.

Saturday's game also will bring to a conclusion the collegiate football careers for 11 Spartan seniors. One other, Vincent Vanderberg, a center, already has played his last game in a State uniform.

In addition to the pair of pivot men, the other seniors include such illustrious gridironers as Al Agett, Steve Sebo, Art Brandstatter, Fred Ziegel and Harrison Yumarn; all backs, and Milton Lehnardt, Henry Kutchins, Julius Sieder, Gordon Dahlgren and Howard Zindel, and Sam Ketchman linemen.

Fertig Also Senior

Norman Fertig also is listed to graduate next June, but Norm may take advantage of another year of football he still has available.

Flushed by their 41-0 triumph over Kansas at Lawrence in their last start, the Spartans are confident they will wind up the year by adding Arizona to their list of victims.

Begin Clicking

After a scoreless first quarter, State went to town against the Jayhawks of Kansas and before the final gun boomed in the rather warm air, which made things uncomfortable for the visiting players, the Spartans had piled up their largest score of the season. State scored six touchdowns, and a half dozen different players had a hand in crossing the goal line. Four of the markers were produced by ends.

Hank Kutchins registered the first and Frank Gaines, Ole Nelson and Dave Diehl, all flankers, duplicated Kutchins' feat. John Pingel and Gene Ciolek tallied the other touchdowns.

Lehnardt was the only end who didn't score, and Mill was less than six inches from the payoff line when the game ended.

Aggett Pass to Kutchins

The first marker came as the result of a 25-yard pass from Al Aggett to Kutchins. Aggett intercepted a pass and ran 23 yards to set up the second touchdown. Gainer ran for a touchdown on the end around play.

Both of the touchdowns came in the second quarter.

In the third stanza, Pingel heaved a long pass to Gaines for a first down on the Kansas 12. John then knifed his way through center to count.

Kansas reached State's 30 in the fourth quarter, but a fumble cut the march short as Diehl recovered for the Spartans. In four plays State had chalked up its fourth touchdown, Ciolek stepping over the last white line.

Sebo Breaks Loose

The Hawks kicked off to State on the latter's 17. On a fake kick, Sebo carried the ball to Kansas 22. Then Ciolek dropped back and shot a touchdown pass to Nelson.

Nelson blocked a Hawk punt late in the game and Diehl scooped the pickup up and raced merrily for the final touchdown.

State's champions will reach East Lansing today and after a day of rest will start preparing for the defense of their Central Intercollegiate championship here, next Monday.

Among the entries in the Central meet is Indiana and the Don Lash. The Hoosiers are the only ones to hold a victory over State in the last five years.
