Marking his first appearance on the Michigan State campus, Governor Frank Murphy will speak at the college Union Thursday evening as guest of honor at the annual Michigan Press Association banquet.

Secretary of State Leon D. Case and President Robert N. Shaw of the college will also be included as honor guests at the banquet. Webb McCall, editor of the Times of St. Pleasant, will act as toast master.

Main feature of this evening banquet will be the showing of a humorous "Magic Lantern Show" by Chet Shafer, veteran newsman and "Sage" of Three Rivers, Michigan. Marked by a lengthy list of accomplishments of various kinds, Mr. Shafer also holds the distinction of being the grand dispatch of the International Guild of Foreign Paper Organ Pipers.

The Stalberg Trio will provide music for the night's entertainment, and Richard Baldwin of the Northville Record, will give the invocation.

An added feature following the banquet, will be the awarding of prizes in the 1936 newspaper contests. Presiding at this affair will be Prof. A. A. Applegate, head of the department of journalism and publications at Michigan State.

The closing session of the annual meeting will convene at 10 a. m. Saturday at the Old Hotel in Lansing in the East room where Richard Cook of the Lansing Banner will present the auditing committee's report. Amendments to the constitution will be considered and other new business taken up and disposed of at this time, winding up the winter program.

During the entire convention there will be displays of newspapers in the 1936 contests, job work, lifted forms and free advertising racks, all on exhibit in the Union building at Michigan State college.

Sociologist Meet To Be Broadcast

Discussion Will be a Part of Farmers' Convention.

"Cooperation of Town and Country in Community Building" is the general topic of a program to be presented by the department of sociology, Wednesday, February 3, as part of Farmers' Week. The object of the program will be to promote the cooperation of the villages and the rural districts in the building of community schools and churches, which would be difficult for them to finance separately. Reorganization of the school districts, with the community as the unit, will be a large point of discussion.

Dr. E. B. Elliott, superintendent of the Michigan State program, officials of the State Grange and the State Farm Bureau will present the point of view of the rural residents on the community building question. The attitude of the village residents will be given by Clarence V. Smazel, former secretary of the Michigan Municipal association. J. F. Thaden and C. R. Hoffer, of the sociology department, are among the speakers that Chairman Dr. Eben Mumford has secured.

Help The Red Cross

With a plea to all students to do their part, Alpha Phi Omega, service fraternity, has organized a drive on the campus for contributions to a fund to be turned over to the Red Cross for flood relief in the present distress in Ohio, Indiana, Kentucky and other states.

This will be the first time that any such coordinated attempt has been made to enroll student support for such a cause. College officials have given it their endorsement and have asked that the members of the faculty also aid in the drive.

There will be placed at important spots on the campus about seven boxes which will be plainly marked for the fund. These will be distributed as follows: the Union building, women's building, Olds hall, two at Mary Mayo, ap hall, and the library.

These boxes will be in those locations between 8 a. m. and 5 p. m. tomorrow. Following that the total funds contributed will be turned over to the local branch of the Red Cross as the donation of the students and faculty of this college.

That this is a worthy cause and an outstanding project for this campus can not be denied. The cooperation of every student as well as faculty member should be given. A suggested amount 25 cents from each person might be the average donation. At that rate the total would reach an impressive and worthwhile figure.

Five Ton Tug Of War Expected Farm Week As Ox Teams Meet

Two teams of tugging ox flesh pitted against each other in what portends to be a mammoth five-ton tug of war, will be the Farm Week feature highlighting the Wednesday evening entertainment schedule at Demonstration hall.

Boasting the largest perfectly matched ox team in the state, Frank Martin of Battle Creek, has consented to bring his team, weighing in better than three tons, and match them against anything lighter than a Mack truck, for entertainment of the agricultural visitors.

His challenge has been met by Merle Green, of Blue, who will bring to the college two oxen that tip the scales at slightly better than two tons. The ensuing contest holds possibilities bordering on a battle royal. Both the teams will be on exhibit during the remainder of the week.

Beginning Wednesday's entertainment program, a mounted tug of war has been arranged between cavalry students mounted on cavalry horses and members of the Black and Brindle ag. fraternity mounted on draft horses. The student team in this mounted tug of war will compete against Michigan's champion team of oxen.

Thursday night's program in the Armory will feature another pulling contest. This contest will find four outstanding teams of horses competing in a dynamometer test for power.

These teams are owned by Clare McLean of St. Louis, Michigan, who will bring a pulling duo to State weighing 3,800 pounds; from Ann Arbor, Ray Barnard will bring a team weighing 4,200 pounds; Fred Skelving of Iowa will appear with a pair of horses weighing 4,100 pounds; and George Wilcox will bring a team from Cleveland weighing in the vicinity of 4,000 pounds.

Winners in this pulling contest will be awarded ribbons, with a trophy going to the team raising the dynamometer scale to its highest point.

An additional exhibit which is expected to be of special interest to Farm Week crowds, will be two grand champion stallions which will be on display at the college during this time.

This will mark the first time since 1929 that a grand champion horse in national competition has hailed from this state.

Under Pending Setup Board to Have Power to Appoint Heads and Administer Affairs of College Publications

In a move to strengthen its constitution, the Board of Publications Monday night approved a new constitution and recommended that it be presented to the student body as a whole for its ratification at the primary election to be held February 11.

The new constitution has been drawn up following a survey of similar charters of publications bodies at other colleges and universities. It is expected that the proposed constitution will clarify the powers of the board and will make more definite its duties.

Outstanding among the changes in the provision that gives the board this power to appoint editors and business managers of the various campus publications. The new constitution also provides for the administration of the affairs of such new publications as the Student News, the added home magazine.

The constitution will be given to the students for their approval at the primaries next month. If it is ratified at that election it will take effect immediately and will govern the selection of the next editors and business managers of both the State News and the Wolverine.

This constitution is expected to avoid future controversies such as that which provoked so much adverse criticism of the present system and under it. It is a move toward the revision of the constitution that gives the Board of Publications full power over publications elections.

All classes since 1930 were represented at the Sunday meeting. L. C. Lamson, Dean of the Liberal Arts division, Prof. Lewis Richards, head of the music department, and Miss Josephine Kackley, professor of public school music, represented the faculty. Miss Kackley was appointed general chairman for the organization work to be carried out before the spring meeting.

The purpose of the music alumni association will be to establish contacts between the music graduates and the college department, which will result in their mutual development and growth. The committee appointed Sunday will draft a constitution and by-laws, suggest ways and means of furthering the organization, plan a combined alumni and music department program, as a special event, and make suggestions to the alumni group for the official personnel for the coming year.
