The Spartans followed up the 22-17 loss at Wisconsin last Saturday, by dropping a 27-21 decision to Butler University at Indianapolis last night. The double reversal ran State's string of consecutive defeats to five.

State hasn't won a game since it turned back Syracuse here on January 29. Since then Northwestern, Hawaii, All-Stars, Hope, Wisconsin and Butler have taken the Spartans into camp.

Coach Butler last night, the Spartans held on valiantly. They led 14-11 at the end of the first half, but went into their usual lull during the second half. In winning, Butler beat State for the fourth straight time. The Indianapolis club is still to lose a game to the Spartans.

The Spartans played their worst offensive game of the season in losing to Wisconsin. State's sharpshooters were hitting about 10 percent of their shots during the game.

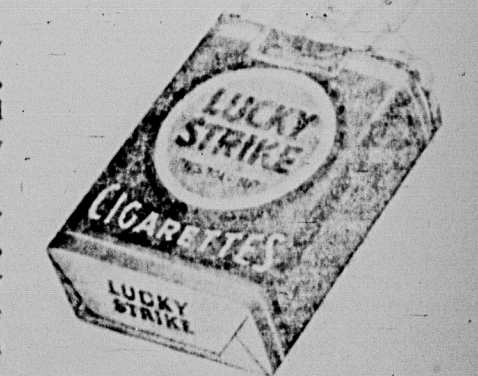

It was disclosed Waite had smashed the old meet record set six years ago by Clark Chamberlain, recognized as one of the best men ever to wear the livery of Michigan State.

Chamberlain, during his collegiate days became the first Spartan to win the I. C. J. A. cross-country individual title. Waite has duplicated Chamberlain's feat and a comparison of records bears out the fact Waite undoubtedly will perform greater accomplishments on the track than his predecessor.

Unquestionably, Tom Ottey is the peer of all distance runners in State history. Ottey was a two-time cross country winner, and in addition to carrying off numerous individual honors on the track, also represented the United States in the 1932 Olympics.

Whether or not Waite will excel Ottey, naturally is a question. Waite, like Ottey, gained the harrier title as a junior.

Waite faces two years of track and another season of cross country. With Captain Carl Mueller, he will lead the State trackmen into their first major competition of the season next Wednesday night in a dual meet with Michigan Normal.

The State captain as present is suffering from a leg injury, which isn't expected to keep him on the sidelines for the initial meet.

Waite in all probability will run both the mile and two-mile against the Hurons and on past showings should win both easily. His first indoor test of the season will come on February 20 when State battles Michigan at Ann Arbor.

The Spartans will send other good distance runners into action this season. There is Harold Sparks, two-mile state intercollegiate outdoor champion; Gerald Boss; Art Green; George Grant; and Harry Butler.

In the quarter-mile Darwin Dudley looms as a certain point winner. Mueller and Wilbur Green are expected to do their share in the sprints, while Clare McDermott is looked upon as a contender in the hurdles.

State will carry strength in the shot put with Eric Bremer and Art Jenkins throwing the iron ball. Each has done 44 feet in practice. Bill Smith completes a strong trio in this event.

Lolo Habrie is an average pole vaulter, while Henry Merdler may pick up a few points during the season in the high jump.

Needless to say, State's best bet in national competition appears in the distance races.
