Swimmers Will Meet Case University Here Tomorrow

Take Second Win Beating Cincinnati

Open Home Season With Cleveland Team Tomorrow; Cincy Easy.

Returning from Cincinnati with their second victory of the season, a 30 to 21 win over the Cincinnati university swimmers, Michigan State's national and preliminary to meet Case School of Applied Science in the Spartan pool Saturday night will be an easy job.

Coach Daubert's swimmers experienced little difficulty in downing the Chicago Wednesday night, capturing all but two of the first places of the meet.

Swimmers of both teams were handicapped by the cloudy water, but recently pumped into the pool following the recent disastrous flood and the times in most events were rather slow.

State finished one ten in four events, the 220 yard free style, in which co-captain Jim Harryman and Williamson were joint winners for State, the diving with Calloun first and Leighton second, the century free style, with Bill Bell and Gough finishing ahead of their opponents, and the 141 yard backstroke, in which Carr and Armstrong brought home the honors for State.

Both of State's relay teams took first place honors, the medley team swimming their distance in the time of 1:09.3. The two Billy Sims and co-captain Eddie McNamara captured the 100 yard free style relay with ease.

Coach Daubert, in stating that his swimmers will face their toughest opposition of the season, with the exception of Michigan, in Case Saturday afternoon, was nevertheless optimistic over his team's chances of capturing the meet. Added strength in the second place swimmers, will, he believes, provide State with its swimming margin.

The Case meet is open to all students upon presentation of their student books, and will be broadcast over college station, an its location in swimming events at the pool.

Although the Spartans displayed a slightly better, balanced squad than was expected, they still don't stand much of a chance of pulling in ahead of the Michigan crew.

Nelson Gardner, however, will prove troublesome in the half mile and Ken Waite is never anybody's set-up in the mile. Ross and Sparks are crack two milers, and Edwards stands a good chance in the pole vault.

All in all, State will do well to keep within hailing distance of the Wolves, and will be satisfied with a good showing.

State's topsters had it faced the task of capturing most of the second and third places to conquer the Hurons, because the experts picked Normal men to win six or seven of the 11 races.

Through no accident, but by worthy showing, the Spartans latched their way to six firsts, much to the surprise of even Athletic Director Ralph Young and his chief aids, Mike Casbel and Lauren Brown.

The Hurons didn't win the half, two-mile and relay, and there went the pre-meet predictions and brought victory to the Spartan camp.

Against Michigan tomorrow night, State isn't conceding a chance unless the Wolverines fold up. The Wolves have a swell sophomore shot-putter and high jumper in Watson, and the return of Hump should net Michigan a first in the pole vault, along with a dozen veterans.

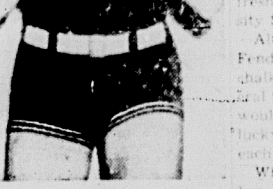
Although the men coached by Freddie Collins have failed to chalk up a victory this season, several times when it looked that they would crash through with a win, lucky crashes turned the tide each time.

The Spartan record this year is the poorest turned in by a State team in the last decade. It marks the conclusion of the second straight losing season in a row for State, but the cagers feel the fates again will favor them starting next season.

That the fates of sport have not been with State was exemplified here last Tuesday night as the Spartans wound up their home schedule dropping a heart-breaker to DePaul of Chicago, 23-21.

The team was set on victory and for a brief few moments it appeared the cagers would accomplish their aim. DePaul had led by four points at the end of the half and midway through the second period, the invaders increased their margin to six points.

With the score standing 17-11 against them, the Spartans began rolling. Huff, bang, and Garlock, Kraft and Osterink had registered baskets. The score was tied, but not for long.

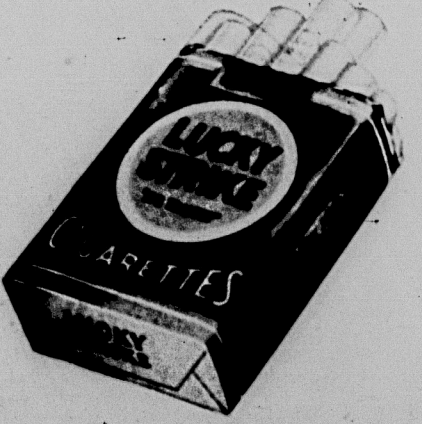
