Olin's Domain

Last March the College infirmary treated a total of 2,508 cases, a record for this hospital during any other equal period. It stated Dr. H. J. Olin, college health authority, today.

During this period 91 students were hospitalized and the average time for recuperation was 10 days. A majority of those requiring attention were suffering from sore throats and sinus infections.

The hospital carries a staff of three physicians, Doctors Olin, Johnson and Hodges, as well as six nurses. This equates three doctors and three nurses to be on duty at all times to minister to the needs of the patients.

Only the most modern equipment and the most sanitary conditions are encountered throughout the infirmary.

Appendicitis was also more prevalent during the past March than at any other time, there being 15 cases treated. As the college hospital has no operating room or X-ray equipment it is necessary to send the more serious cases needing operations to Lansing hospitals. Of the 15 cases treated in March, 10 resulted in the removal of the appendix.

Due to increased enrollment the hospital staff is taxed to the limit. One year ago last March we treated only 2,090 cases of which 12 were hospitalized, the average time for recuperation being 4.4 days. Students will be treated as efficiently here as modern equipment and medical knowledge is a constant of their ailments. This infirmary is for the health of the student body," added Dr. Olin.

Metropolitan Star to be Last Attraction of Artist's Series

Ezio Pinza, sensational young bass of the Metropolitan Opera company, will be heard here in concert as the last attraction of the artist's series on the Michigan State campus.

The concert will take place in the East Lansing high school auditorium, next Monday evening, April 19.

Any one who thinks that opera has an edge on romantic appearance and singing will do well to listen when this tall young Italian sings his program. For in Pinza's voice there is an appeal that has singled it out among other great voices of the day for special recognition.

Added to this is the singer's attractive stage presence. Tall, slender and athletic, Pinza has all the qualities which might go to make a complete musician, yet he is indifferent to adulation. It is said he never reads his press notices. He doesn't wish to be influenced by what critics think he says, but rather a man, in order to be thoroughly himself, must not try to make himself into what other people think he should be.

Pinza has had a curious background. He comes from a Roman family, none of whom were musicians. His early ambitions were to become a professional bicycle rider, but at a rider he was in the least, unaccomplished. After hearing Pinza sing, his classmates advised him to study music. He took their advice and entered the Bologna Conservatory. He was about to make his debut when the war intervened.

After having served the duration of the war in the Italian army, he returned home. From his first appearance at Rome at the Teatro Regio dell'Opera, and scored a tremendous hit. He later sang at Paris and at La Scala in Milan. Before coming to the Metropolitan in New York, where he holds at present the leading place among the basses. He is famous for his splendid characterizations of the "buffo" bass roles, such as Mephisto in "Faust."

Round-table discussions are to start Friday morning with the following topics: Business and financial problems, hall work, and fraternity alumni.

During a luncheon Saturday noon chairman of the various round-tables will report conclusions reached and findings made. At that time there will also be a farewell address to starting fraternity men.

Another important feature of the program will be an interfraternity dance held Friday evening. The visitors are to be guests of honor. Details of the party will be announced later by Rex Lamerson, chairman of the affair.

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State Dedicates New Track Saturday



The new track and field plant at Michigan State College, recognized as one of the finest and most modernly equipped and built in the nation, will be dedicated at East Lansing on April 14. University of Chicago will meet the Spartans in a dual meet as the principal event of the day's program.

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Gov. Murphy Will Attend Track Event

Bound to Appear at Opening of Modern Plant Here Saturday

Called by leading authorities on track construction the latest thing in college layouts, Michigan State's new track and field plant will be dedicated Saturday to the accompaniment of martial music and the blowing of artillery.

The ceremonies call for the R. O. T. C. unit to provide the 100 piece band and the necessary field pieces and powder. President Robert S. Shaw will deliver the dedication speech shortly before the opening of the meet with the University of Chicago.

Governor Frank Murphy will attend the ceremonies as will numerous other officials and guests. Chester L. Brewer and George Gauthier, both identified with athletics in the past will be guest speakers.

The new track, fourth to be employed since the college was founded, was the result of an intense search headed by Athletic Director Ralph Young.

All the leading tracks in this country and Canada were studied in addition to consulting forty-five athletic coaches. As a consequence of this detailed study, Young was able to incorporate the best features of the leading plants.

Another distinctive feature of the track is that it will be used only for track and field, whereas other tracks are found in football stadiums. Texture of the center on the track, location of the pits for the various field events, and other details result in maximum efficiency.

Two 220 yard straight-ways permit 16 lanes of hurdles. The "curves" are constructed so that the runners do not have to slack up in order to round the curves. In the dash and hurdle events there will be no "outside or inside" lanes.

The oval part of the track is a quarter mile. Runways next to the outside or inside lanes will not be used under ordinary conditions.
