MSU Vice president for Business and Finance Roger Wilkinson told the trustees inflation was the main reason for the

\$30 per term room and board rate increase. "The economy as a whole has an inflationary impact on the University," he said, adding that the cost of operating residence halls is expected to be about \$25 million next year - a \$1.7 million increase.

Wilkinson cited a 20 percent increase in utility charges, an 8 percent increase in base food costs and a 6 percent increase in salaries and wages to University staffers as factors in the rate hike.

Trustee John Bruff, D-Fraser, pointed out that even with the hike, MSU room and board rates are the third lowest in the state. But he added his concern that MSU is moving "away from the land-grant philosophy of offering education to lower class families '

Despite reluctance expressed by other trustees to another increase in housing rates, only Trustee Michael Smydra, D Lansing, voted against the hike.

The board also voted to raise the monthly rent of University apartments by \$9 per month. Beginning July 1, a one bedroom unit will cost \$148 per month and a two bedroom unit will rent for \$156.

Research Cottrell of New Jersey was the firm chosen by the board for a \$2 million contract to install baghouse filters on Power Plant 65. The filters are designed to remove 99.7 percent of the fly ash emitted from the power plant smokestack.

The contract with Research Cottrell is part of a \$6.5 million package designed to bring the smokestack emissions within air quality control limits set by state law.

About \$2.2 million of the package will be provided by the University, with most of the remaining funds coming from the state, Wilkinson said. Both baghouses, which function like

hundreds of large vacuum clearner bags, will be erected next to the power plant by fall of 1980 under the current schedule.

The trustees also approved funding for a Kellogg Center remodeling project, which includes the renovation of 175 guest rooms and the corridors of the second through seventh floors.

Included in the \$322,000 project, which will take about one year to complete, is the conversion of eight guest rooms to meet the barrier-free design code. Four guest rooms which had earlier been made accessible to handicappers will also be updated.

Administrators said no changes would be made in Kellogg Center conference sched-

In his monthly report to the trustees Friday, MSU President Edgar L. Harden expressed his hopes that MSU would receive a "responsible budget" from state appropriations this year, but emphasized that the Legislature is not the sole source of MSU funding.

"We are a tax assisted, not a tax supported institution," Harden said.

He also announced the formation of a committee headed by Lecture Concert Se ries director Kenneth Beachler to work with architects on the State Center for the

Alleged terrorists seized in Yugoslavia

BONN, West Germany (AP) - Yugoslavia has seized four of West Germany's most wanted terrorist suspects, including a woman with reported ties to the Red Brigades murderers of former Italian premier Aldo Moro, the Bonn government said Monday

Informed sources said the two men and wo women were captured in Yugoslavia May 11, on the same day that a fifth suspected German terrorist was seized at Orly airport in Paris before he could board a plane for Zagreb, Yugoslavia.

A Justice Ministry spokesperson said the four were among 20 alleged hard-core terrorists sought in a string of political nurders, including last year's kidnap-slaying of industrialist Hanns-Martin Schlever.

The sources, who asked not to be identified, said the terrorists were seized in an international dragnet that spanned East and West Europe

German officials refused to give details of

the Yugoslavia arrests. Sepp Binder, the Justice Ministry spokesman, told a news conference Bonn has asked Belgrade to extradite the four suspects — Brigitte Mohnhaupt, 28, Sieglinde Gutrun Hoffman, 33, Rolf Clemens Wagner, 33, and Peter Boock, 26.

The suspect arrested in Paris, Stefan Werner Wisniewski, was nabbed at the airport with a ticket to Zagreb, Yugoslavia. in his pocket. All are suspected members of the terrorist Red Army Faction.

Binder said Yugoslavia has asked Bonn to arrest and deport an undisclosed number of persons wanted by the Belgrade govern nent. Nuclear power rally draws 15,000 in N.Y.

More than 15,000 people rallied at the Dag Hammarskjold Plaza at the United Nations in New York City Saturday, calling for disarmament and dismantling of nuclear power plants, while the historic United Nations Special Session on Disarmament continued into ts fifth day inside the U.N. building.

The massive rally, sponsored by the Mobilization For Survival national coalition, drew representatives from Canada, Britain, Sweden, Yugoslavia, Japan, Australia, Switzerland, West Germany, Holland and Belgium

The 500 member Japanese delegation arrived with a petition signed by 15 million people calling for an end to the arms race.

Twenty three people from East Lansing joined the non-violent action group, which featured speakers and entertainers including Dr. Helen Caldicott, cancer specialist and pediatrician at the Children's Hospitai in Boston, singer Pete Seeger; Rev. R. D. Kirkpatrick, long-time aide to Martin Luther King, Jr., and David Dellinger, staff member of the left wing magazine Seven Da

Terry Provance, national coordinator for the Mobilization group, opened the afternoon rally by explaining the coalition's goals: to stop the arms race, to ban nuclear power and continued on page 12

internist. Two hours after the appointment, he was on the operating table. He had a collapsed lung.

"Chuck may well have died in another 24 hours," his father contended. He also said the doctor who operated on his son told him collaposed lungs are "relatively easy" to diagnose and in some cases can be done over

The student's parent, who asked to remain anonymous, said the doctor at Olin should have diagnosed the collapsed lung. He filed a complaint with the Ingham County Medical Society. Jack Kanter, the society's executive director, said the case is now being reviewed.

Dr. John Siddall, director of Olin, reviewed the case and did not suspend the doctor because he discovered no "irregulari

"Many statements the boy's father makes could be taken as libelous," Siddall said. "But we will have to see what conclusion the society reaches

This is the first time the society is investigating a doctor at Olin for misdiagnosing a patient. A society subcommittee of five doctors will review the student's case and inform the parent whether, in their opinion, the physician at Olin was negligent.
If the doctor at Olin is found negligent, the

student's family has the responsibility of pursuing the case, although such a finding is statistically unlikely.

"Ninety percent of the complaints show a misunderstanding between the doctor and patient," Kanter said.

Key legislators have told the MSU Board of Trustees that the Legislature will probably follow a proposal by the Michigan Efficiency Task Force and ask the health center to raise its \$1.7 million budget by itself. The Task Force noted that Olin has

lost money every year for the last five years. This budgetary problem will not help battle the poor image Olin has with the students, especially when they rely on hearsay. Most students believe Olin's doctors are impersonal and incompetent, the nurses inept and the service slow.

But when each student is asked about his or her personal experiences at Olin, the picture becomes a bit more positive.

A 1975 survey of 328 students by the now defunct University Health Care Ad visory Board showed students thought worse of Olin on the basis of word-of mouth than from their own experiences

Of the survey's respondents, 41 percent said Olin's health care was poor based on other people's comments. Only 2 percent said the service was satisfactory

The percentages changed when the participants judged from their own experiences: 20 percent said Olin provided satisfactory service while 27 percent said it

Four sought in rape of student

Four men are being sought for questioning by the Ingham County Sheriff's Department in connection with the abduction and rape of an MSU woman May 20.

The 20-year-old student was attend ing a block party on Linden Street the weekend of the East Lansing Art Fair. About 200 to 300 people attended.

At about midnight that Friday, the woman went to a van parked in the city parking lot on Linden with a white male in his mid-20s, Detective Robert Bald-

He was officially described as having medium brown hair, a neatly trimmed mustache, was about 5-feet 6 inches tall and 140 pounds, and was wearing gray or beige corduroy pants and a cotton

As they sat in the back of the van, a black man described as about 25 years old, about 6 feet 1 inch with a muscular but thin build, got into the front of the van with a woman with long blond hair.

Two more men approached the van. One was described as white, about 5 feet 9 inches with a heavy build, a mustache and shaggy hair.

The other man, also white, was about 5 feet 4 inches, small and slender with straight brown hair and wearing a dark

As these two men got into the van. the blond woman in the front seat got

The four men held the other woman in the back of the van and drove her to Williamston where she was raped several times, Baldwin said.

The black man and the man she initially went to the van with took her to a silver van parked on Grand River Avenue in Williamston.

They then drove back to East Lansing and dropped the woman off near her residence at about 3 a.m. Saturday, Baldwin said.

The woman then went to Olin Health Center, and was treated for injuries.

The brown van that was parked in East Lansing had porthole windows in the rear on the sides and also had a sunroof. The interior of the van had

JERUSALEM (AP) Yıtzhak Navon a native-born politician and playwright. became Israel's fifth president Monday and appealed directly to President Anwar Sadat of Egypt to reopen stalled Mideast peace talks.

The time has come "for the great reconciliation between Arabs and Jews Navon said after taking the oath of office in a colorful ceremony at the Knesset Israel's parliament

Reports reaching Hong Kong from China indicated many of the refugees. said by Peking to total at least 89 700, are being resettled on special state farms.

Vietnam said a handful of Vietnamese

capitalists of Chinese descent have fled because the conversion of South Viet namese society to communism is taking away their businesses and because of false rumors of war with China. Peking claims they are being expelled

NAIROBI Kenya AP government criticized the United States Monday for what it said were efforts by the CIA to assassinate the Ugandan

Official Radio Uganda quoted a military spokesperson which often is Amin himself, as saying: It is a shame that a country of the stature of the U.S. should allow its agencies to indulge in such evil schemes and then turn around and pose as a promoter of peace and champion of

The radio monitored here referred to what it said was a statement by former CIA Director William Colby saying the intelligence agency had tried since 1972

In a recent Playboy magazine interview. Colby was quoted as saying it would be proper for the Ugandan people to kill Amin and "it would be moral" for the CIA to help if the welfare of the American people could somehow be related to it.

CLEVELAND AP Mayor Dennis J. Kucinich one step closer to facing a recall election lashed out Monday at opponents who he said are returning Cleveland to a mockery it has known" in the past

The 31-year-old maverick Democrat attacked his critics at a holiday news conference called after more signatures were submitted demanding his ouster and the city council president announced plans to block Kucinich appointments to regional boards

George L. Forbes, president of the 33 member council said the body would refuse to act on any Kucinich nominations until the recall issue is resolved

Forbes decision was revealed Sunday night as leaders of the Recall Committee to Save Cleveland filed an additional 7 066 signatures on petitions.

The original petitions submitted April 28 were 3 335 short of the 37 552 registered voters' signatures required under the city charter to force Kucinich either to resign or face a recall election

Country salutes war heroes

With bugles rifle fire and flags, the country on Monday saluted the 1 million men who have died in American uniforms from Valley Forge to Vietnam.

Secretary of Defense Harold Brown presided over the Memorial Day laying of the wreath at the Tomb of the Unknowns in Arlington National Cemetery in Washington. He said the country should rededicate itself to preserving the strength of its armed forces so that it need not be proved in combat.

In Ohio small American flags were placed at the graves of 206 Confederate soldiers, most of them officers, who died during their imprisonment on Johnson's Island on Lake Erie during the Civil War

A special tribute to the 3,505 men who died on submarines during World War II was held at the U.S. Naval Weapons Station at Seal Beach in Southern

In Southgate, Ky., townspeople gathered for a service at the town's war memorial, a short distance from the site of the Beverly Hills Supper Club fire that killed 165 people in May of 1977. Surrounded by the same volunteer firefighters and police officers called into action when the disaster occurred, Mayor Ken Paul said the community of 3,200 in northern Kentucky "would never be the same again

Memoirs sales unaffected by boycott

WASHINGTON (AP) - The House is finally coming to grips with issues kept alive for years without a vote (whether tax credits for the cost of tuition should be allowed and what kind of schooling costs should be eligible.)

The long postponed debate is scheduled to begin Wednesday. after the House returns from its Memorial Day break. The Senate is continuing its recess all week.

The House debate will come on a bill that would allow direct subtraction from income tax owed of up to \$250 of college or vocational school tuition and on an amendment for credits of up to \$100 for tuition in lower schools. No votes are expected before

Lansing city workers seek union bargaining vote; hit new pay plan

A union drive in Lansing City Hall is in full swing, according to Al Singletary, a 54th District Court clerk. A bargaining agent for city hall employees will file a petition with the Michigan Employment Relations Commission this week to hold a collective bargaining election, he said.

The union drive was triggered by employee dissatisfaction with the Hay Classification and Compensation Plan ap proved recently by city council.

The study, which examined 660 non-union city positions, recommended that salaries of 340 lower level employees be frozen for up to three years

More than 50 percent of the proposed bargaining unit employees have signed Teamsters Union pledge cards, Singletary said. The proposed unit includes 340 employees, mostly clerical and technical personnel, he said.

MERC requires that cards be signed by 30 percent of the proposed unit in order for an election to be held.

Another 10 percent have signed pledge cards with the AFL CIO affiliated American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, which will be an intervenor in

the election. Singletary said.

Cards were signed with both bargaining agents so workers could have a choice. Singletary said.

The recommended salary freeze was the primary factor behind the union drive, he

the council on May 15 when the plan was adopted contended that salary levels set by the Hay classification were lower than those of comparable positions in the Lansing area. Singletary said the Hay consultants didn't look at any businesses in Lansing but used prior customers to establish the level of

salaries paid by private employers.
"The cost of living in Lansing is obviously much higher than many cities in Michigan without an industrial base," he said.

Stephen Kintz, Lansing deputy personne. director, said the consultants did contact Lansing businesses, but since private compensation levels are confidential, that information couldn't be set down in specific terms in the study

Councilmember Robert J. Hull, who cast the lone dissenting vote on the plan, said it was heavily weighted in favor of the finance and personnel departments

"The technical people on the firing line are getting redlined," he said. "I think we should be more service oriented.

While most council members agreed that the plan was not perfect, they said many of the problems could be worked out through an appeals process built into the study

Councilmember Terry McKane said under the old plan there was no review system for job reclassification.

The only way for an employee to get reclassified was by political means," he said. Under the Hay plan, dissatisfied em-ployees can appeal their classifications through two review procedures, he said.

They can first appeal to Hay Associates, he explained. If they don't receive satisfac-tion, they can appeal to a seven-member permanent review committee composed of city employees from varying classification



The city council is the second group of the seven local agencies that fund and staff the squad to actually announce plans to eliminate the funding from its budget. The Ingham County Board of Commissioners has also agreed to cease funding.

The argument behind seating non police membership on the Metro Squad policy control board is a sound one. At present the board allocates a great deal of money and energy to chasing after students with small amounts of marijuana. The squad policy board, made up of the heads of the law enforcement agencies in the tri-county area that contribute personnel to the force, has been criticized soundly by city council and commission members for making the management decisions that lead to this activity. It has also been charged that several members of the special unit are unfit

to serve in law enforcement.

In addition, because the policy board is not composed of community officials there is no discernible avenue for feedback, making positive changes difficult - nearly impossible — to initiate.

The East Lansing City Council was among the first groups to pull out its squad support. We hope it will not be the last. Perhaps through denial of funding citizens can convince the policy board that if cannot exist at the whim of police agencies and without supervision of the public.



Clayburgh shines in 'Woman

Despite some honest flaws — the film's able new film An Unmarried Woman (Twentieth Century Fox; at the Meridian

sometimes too tentative, sometimes too Eight Theatres) is a sincere, perceptive and straightforward attempt to delve into the specific natures and inter-relationships of women and men in contemporary society.

open this year, primarily because of the original and sustained insights into his characters and situations by writer director Mazursky, and because of the extraordinarily fine ensemble acting by his cast particularly by Jill Clayburgh, an actress heretofore seen unimpressively in largely unimpressive films.

Clayburgh's performance - the actress is seen in nearly every scene in the film - is superb, authoritative, even memorable, as she registers innumerable facets and subtleties of the great changes undergoing in the life of Erica, Mazurky's "unmarried woman" of the film's title.

As the picture opens, Erica is an upper middle class Manhattan woman; bright, happy and secure in what seems a very good and stable marriage to Martin (Michael Murphy). She is on good terms with the world. Shortly, however, the marriage abruptly dissolves - Martin, in his itchy 40s, announces he has found another, vounger woman

Erica, whose existence has gradually come to be defined — over seventeen years of marriage — by her relationship to her husband and family, is cast emotionally adrift.

The film centers on Erica's dilemma: the problem of finding one's self and one's place in society as a newly single woman. It is a significant issue, and neither Mazursky nor Clayburgh duck it by going for easy answers or sodden melodrama (though, at times, admittedly the film dangerously leans in those directions). Rather, Mazursky is here interested in process - how does a woman recover from such a blow; how does she respond and develop to the challenge of becoming her own person; where does she go from here?

Erica tries the singles bars, consults with her womanfriends, visits a therapist played, with unusual effectiveness, by Manhattan analyst Penelope Russianoff). has affairs, worries about her teen age daughter (Lisa Lucas), attempts to work into the social scene and eventually meets a British conceptual artist named Saul (Alan

Alan Bates - seen here in his first American film role - is dashing, handsome, strong as Saul - an almost archetypal romantic lead, possibly too perfect a soul to belong in this picture. When Erica meets him and begins to fall in love with him, the audience's spirits are raised significantly at last Erica's prince has come to the rescue. The character is too big, too mythic, for an audience to really accept Erica's ambiguous feelings toward him. This is, after all, a movie, and when characters of the stature and charm and goodness expressed by Bates comes on the scene, they ususally make someone very happy.

Nonetheless, An Unmarried Woman is a kind of breakthrough movie; a kind of celebration of life possibilities for women and men alike in this cockeyed caravan. It is one of a handful of films — of which Annie Hall was, I suppose, the most recent which conveys something of the complexities, joys and frustrations of living in the world today.

rs three sell out performances in Hall last week proved that, if ng. Bob Seger is more in demand now ever before. The expectation before the was almost palpable as the re anxiously waited for some Dee usic by a Dee troit star.

Opening the show for Seger was Toby Beau, fresh from their well received appearance at Lansing's Silver Dollar Saloon. The group (which was named for a shrimp boat) has had more than their share of good fortune in the past year. They've only been doing original material for a year and a half, yet they're already scheduled to play in 60,000 seat arenas.

Toby Beau's music reflects their Texan heritage. Their sound is not unlike a gutsier Pure Prairie League, and the Detroit audience enjoyed it enough to demand an encore. This in itself was surprising. considering Detroit's reputation with open

member Balde (pronounced "baldy") Silva expressed his awareness of that reputation.

"When we first heard that we were going to Detroit with Bob Seger," he said, "we thought, Oh, wow, they're either going to kill us or love us. So far they really seem to like us. It's bull — what they say about Detroit audiences — that's the cream of the crop out there.

"This is our first big attempt at concerts, man, and it's like a fairy tale right now because it's been so good. This is our seventh or eighth show on this tour, and we've been working so hard," he exclaimed, noting that the band has received encores at every stop.

Silva gave most of the credit for the warm Detroit welcome to the star himself, saying "Seger attracts the nicest audience

they're good people."
While Detroit audiences have been notoriously cold to opening acts, their reception of headliners leans toward the opposite extreme. For Bob Seger, this eant thunderous applause that faded to a dull roar and underpinned the entire two-hour concert.

Seger, for his part, was great. This was the first time I had seen him since his rise to Superstar status, and I was therefore unprepared for the authority which he now displays on stage. This one-time loser has turned beautiful, and with the ever-sturdy Silver Bullet Band backing him up, he could do no wrong by Detroit's standards.

Much of the show consisted of material from Seger's new album, Stranger in Town, which features several really fine new tunes. "Feel Like a Number" and "Holly wood Nights" especially are great rock songs, althought the bulk of the album tends to be softer than previous efforts.

While the hard rock tunes were almost uniformly good, the show's highlights were the slow numbers, like "Turn the Page" and 'Mainstreets," where the eccentric Alto Reed was showcased on a variety of horns. Reed is a perfect foil for the less-showy Seger, and his mid-air acrobatics during "Get out of Denver" were a hilarious and welcome surprise

A stellar version of "Night Moves" capped the show, and to my ears this song never sounded better. The grand finale. complete with two backup singers, had the audience on their feet and shouting along with the band. "Night Moves" is a teenage anthem, and a lot of people in the audience seemed to have taken it very much to heart.

It took three encores before the audience was willing to let Seger leave, so the band served them up in fine style. Finally, Seger gave a weary salute and shouted "Good night! The night's still young!





Olin has one dentist, 12 doctors and 28 nurses, down two doctors from last year when it handled 110 000 visits. There are no specialists at Olin except the dentist. Doctors most com monly treat colds, flu, pneu onia and sore throats. The Health Center also provides dental, laboratory, gynecological and mental health services

The doctors and nurses are licensed and registered by the state. In addition, Olin is in spected periodically by the Joint Commission of Accredita tion of Hospitals and the Michi gan Department of Health. among other agencies.

Within the last 10 years, Olin has never received a citation from any agency, Cooke said.

North Central Association of Colleges, the group which ac credits MSU as an institution, had unkind words for Olin

In its report of 1975, North Central said the medical staff was too small for its potential patients. It also said MSU hadly needed another health facility Dr. Siddall does not refute

The board also unanimously reaffirmed its support of the Equal Rights Amendment by approving a resolution for trustee yeotts of states which have not yet ratified the amendment. Under the resolution, presented by Board Chairperson Patricia Carrigan Strickland, D Farmington Hills, trustees will not travel to or conduct University business in unratified states without specific prior approval from the board's audit

Smydra criticized the resolution because it did not use strong enough language" and did not include the entire academic community. He offered a "friendly amendment, which was not accepted, to include faculty members under provisions of the resolution.

However, other trustees and a faculty representative protested the amendment as a violation of faculty academic freedom rights. Trustee Raymond Krolikowski, D Birmingham, called Smydra's amendment "improper prior restraint" and Trustee Jack Stack, R Alma, said he would rather see faculty members "make a personal decision" on the boycott.
