Nonnamaker resigns for teaching position

Eldon R. Nonnamaker, vice president for student affairs and services, announced last week that he will resign from his position to teach in the College of Education.

It is expected that President Mackey will nominate Moses Turner of Texas Tech University to replace Nonnamaker. Mackey is also expected to name Joseph E. Dickinson of the University of Michigan as successor to Leslie W. Scott, who is retiring as Vice President of University Develop-

Nonnamaker, who has been vice president for student affairs and services said he has wanted "to return to the classroom for some time. .

"I have talked to my staff over the years and to my family. My family strongly urged me to return to teaching," he said.

NONNAMAKER WILL BECOME a professor in the Department of Administration and Higher Education. He will begin teaching as soon as a successor is appointed.

East Lansing reconsiders mall

East Lansing voters will again be asked their opinion on the November ballot about construction of a proposed Dayton-Hudson shopping mall on the city's northwest side.

City council decided Tuesday to add the proposal to November's ballot because it differs from last fall's proposal in several

The new mall, although proposed for the same U.S. 127 and Lake Lansing Road site, differs from last year's plan in that it reduces the size of the proposed shopping center by about 30 percent. The size is cut from 710,000 to 495,000 square feet.

This size reduction could reduce traffic flow around the mall, said Jerry Amundson, Dayton-Hudson Properties vice president of development, at an early August council

meeting. The new proposal offers changes in the overall land-use of the site which includes greater emphasis on using outlying land for parks and residential areas.

The proposal also sets the mall further back onto the site than the earlier proposal, said Patricia Hobar, national public relations manager for Dayton-Hudson Properties.

NO OTHER COMMERCIAL development will be constructed on the land surrounding the mall, she said.

Dayton-Hudson representative Dan Swantko said other changes from the original plans include making the facility's water retention pond large enough to be used as a recreational lake and also deleting construction of 400,000 square feet of

additional office and commercial space. The council made the decision to add the mall proposal to the fall ballot after Dayton Hudson announced it was considering constructing the mall across the street from U.S. 127 boundary in Lansing Township. Construction there would have given East Lansing all the traffic flow of a mall placed within the city, but none of the added tax

The ballot proposal will be viewed by the council as an advisory vote because it does

MSU continues testing waste disposal sites

More wells will have to be dug near two MSU chemical waste disposal sites before officials are certain no water contamination exists, officials from MSU and the Michigan Department of Natural Resources said Wednesday.

In a meeting between DNR and MSU officials, DNR officials said the direction of the ground water flow had shifted since the original wells were drilled, and new wells will now have to be dug downflow of the ground water.

"It's not that they're doing it all over," Charles Downs, spokesperson for the University on the matter, said of the new wells. "It's just that they're doing additional testing." However, when Robert Hayes, a DNR geologist, was asked if it were true that nothing was really certain about the sites at this time, he replied, "That is essentially correct."


DOWNS SAID IT was agreed in the meeting that there has been no contamination of MSU's water supply, but the six-month testing of the water should continue.

So far, a total of 18 wells have been drilled around the waste sites during the course of the investigation, which started in April.

"Observation wells were drilled around the two dump sites and the control wells were dug farther away, and away from what was thought to be the drift," Downs said. Observation wells were used for samples near the sites while control wells indicate normal conditions, Downs said.

Ground water flow is now in the direction of the control wells for at least one of the sites and possible at both, he said.

HE ALSO SAID that material from the disposal sites and earth excavated from the area will be hauled to a land fill in Wayne County in the next few days. One of the waste sites was located 600 yards southwest of the Jolly and Hagadorn roads intersection. (continued on page 14)

Business college limits enrollment

The College of Business has created enrollment limits preventing non-business students from enrolling in business courses, the college's associate dean

James F. Rainey said that the move is an effort to solve an accreditation problem within the college.

He added that the need for more faculty members is the root of the accreditation problem and the reason for the enrollment limits.

The college was informed during winter term of 1978 by the American Assembly of College Schools of Business that its faculty-student ratio exceeded the limits for accreditation.

Without the needed increases in faculty, Rainey said, many classes are "virtually closed" to students outside of the College of Business. Many students have found that

required courses are closed to them because they are not enrolled in the college and this problem has caused much confusion.

As soon as the college is able to match the number of faculty members to the credit hour guidelines, non-business students wil find it less difficult to enroll in business courses.

Until the guidelines are met, Rainey added, the college will attempt to provide relief whenever possible.

Scientist claims Stonehenge solved

MOSCOW (AP) - A Soviet scientist claims he and his colleagues have solved the riddle of England's mysterious Stonehenge, saving it was built as a model for the planets in the Earth's solar system.

In an interview with the official news agency, Tass, sent on its wire Wednesday, Vladimir Avinsky, a prominent geologist and minerologist, did not dispute recently espoused theories that Stonehenge is actually an ancient but sophisticated astronomical observatory. But he said he believes he has discovered another amazing attribute for it. Researchers have speculated that

Stonehenge's circle of stones are positioned so they can accurately determine time for lunar and solar years, and even be used as a navigational guide to get bearings by the stars.

So accurate is the correlation between Stonehenge and the planets, Avinsky said, that those circles modeled after the Earth and its moon have a margin of error not more than one percent.

Pope to summon cardinal conclave

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope John Paul II will summon cardinals of the Roman Catholic Church to an extraordinary conclave next month, shortly after he returns from a nine-day visit to the United States and Ireland, Vatican sources said Wednesday.

The sources said the conclave of the pope with all 131 cardinals, planned for November, would be unprecedented in modern times. The exact scope and purpose was not given and there was no official confirmation.

In the past, the cardinals — or princes of the church — have met privately only to elect popes or to attend consistories called by the pope to name new cardinals, the sources noted.

Vatican analysts said the pope may be convening the meeting to review his first year of his pontificate. He was elected by the cardinals on Oct. 16, 1978.

The pope returns to Rome on Oct. 8 after two days in Ireland and a week-long visit to six U.S. cities — Boston, New York, Philadelphia, Chicago, Des Moines and Washington.

"Fatally wounded" President may be alive

NEW DELHI, India (AP) - Most residents of the Afghan capital believe former president Nur Mohammed Taraki was fatally wounded in a weekend coup, but officials of the new ruling party say privately he is still alive, according to a reliable report from Kabul

The new regime of Hafizullah Amin has made no public attempt to counter reports now rife in Kabul that the 62-year-old former president died from gunshot wounds after a shootout at his palatial residence. Pakistan Radio Tuesday reported Taraki had died.

The mile-high capital remained tense Wednesday, and tanks and troops armed with Soviet-made AK47 submachine guns blocked entrances to key ministries, sources said.

Most Kabulis feel Taraki died in the gunbattle in which his trusted bodyguard, Tarun, was killed either on the 14th or 15th," said a diplomatic source with contacts in the Afghan capital. "The exact date is not known.

Judge levies fine against striking nurses

PROVIDENCE, R.I. (AP) — A Superior Court judge today levied a daily fine of \$10,000 against striking state nurses while members of the National Guard and volunteers cared for 1,500 chronically and mentally ill patients.

Judge Anthony Giannini said the daily fine will be shared by the 225 registered nurses and will be deducted from their individual paychecks as long as they refuse to return to work.

About 600 members of the National Guard and volunteers have been staffing

two state hospitals, including a mental hospital, since the strike over a lengthy staffing dispute began Thursday.

The court is not concerned with reimbursing the state (for expenses incurred by the strike), but believes the fine might induce the local union to go back to work," Giannini said.

He said individual union members will be exempted from the fine as soon as they return to their scheduled work shifts. Others remaining on strike will continue payments on a pro-rated basis.

House undecided on pay raise amendment

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House first passed, and then killed, an amendment to give itself and top-paid government bureaucrats a 7 percent cost-of-living

Rejection of the increase Wednesday came on a 219-191 roll-call vote after the House initially approved the amendment on a head-count tally in which no names were recorded.

The amendment would have given congressmembers and senators a \$4,025a-year pay hike, and it would have provided a 7 percent increase to all bureaucrats and federal judges who make more than \$47,500 a year.

It was the second time this year the House has passed a pay raise only to kill it at the last minute. In June, it accepted an amendment to increase its \$57,500-ayear pay by 5.5 percent but then turned around and killed the bill to which the increase was attached.

Rejection of the bill Wednesday killed not only the pay raise but also a resolution that is needed to provide emergency funding for a variety of federal departments after Oct. 1.

Government orders DC-9 inspections

WASHINGTON (AP) - Airline mechanics across the United States made detailed inspections of DC-9 passenger jets Wednesday under government orders prompted by the discovery of cracks in the rear section of some planes.

The cracks were found in the rear bulkheads of four DC-9s operated by Air Canada after a pressure bulkhead failed and knocked the tail cone off one of the airline's planes Monday. The craft made a safe landing in Boston.

The Federal Aviation Administration

sent an airworthiness directive Wednesday morning to all U.S. airlines operating DC-9s. The FAA ordered special inspections of the planes' bulkheads, which form a wall sealing the rear of the passenger cabin.

The inspections must be completed within 10 landings. Fred Farrar of the FAA said about 125 of the 377 DC-9s in domestic service are covered. If cracks are found, repairs must be made before the plane can fly again.

Dems favor oil price controls

WASHINGTON - House Democrats on Wednesday declared themselves in favor of reimposing price controls on home heating oil, sending a "loud message" to President

The resolution, approved by the House Democratic Caucus, is not binding. But Democratic leaders said it was designed to express a feeling that strong, immediate government action is needed to check soaring fuel

Home heating oil is now selling for average prices above 80 cents a gallon, a 60 percent increase since last winter.

The resolution, approved by a voice vote of the caucus, asserts "it shall be Democratic policy in the House that mandatory price and allocation controls for (heating oil and similar fuels) be re-established."

Then-President Gerald R. Ford removed price controls from these fuels in 1976. It was the second slap House

policy. In May, the caucus overwhelmingly expressed its opposition to the president's decision to phase out price controls on domestic crude oil. Rep. Peter H. Kostmayer, D-Pa., sponsor of the House resolution, told colleagues that "the astronomical increases in

prices in the past eight months alone justify the establishment of price controls." In an interview later, Kost-

mayer said the effect of the resolution "is political. It sends a loud message to Jimmy

Carter may coerce Russians from Cuba

WASHINGTON - The Carter administration is considering a number of options to put an economic squeeze on the Soviet Union if the Russians refuse to resolve the issue of Soviet combat troops in Cuba, administration officials said Wednesday.

A leading option under consideration is to grant coveted trade concessions to China and withhold them from the Soviets, the officials said.

But the officials, who asked that they not be identified, said the administration is not seriously considering changing the long-standing American policy against arms sales to China. Nor is it considering curtailing wheat shipments to the

The options are being prepared in the National Security Council, the sources said, in the framework of President Carter's statement that "we have the right to insist that the Soviets respect our sensibilities and concerns if the Soviets expect us to respect their sensibilities and their con-

Two areas in which the Soviets have demonstrated the most sensitivity are access to

Western technology and trade and American relations with

The trade concessions option centers on an American pledge to the Chinese to recommend to Congress by Nov. 1 that China be given the same tariff rates as the United States' regular trading partners and access to credit from the U.S. Export-Import Bank.

The Soviets have been seeking the same concession for many years. It has been denied them because Congress has insisted that trade concessions

be linked to emigration policies. Earlier this year, the administration delayed the recommendation of concessions to the Chinese, in part because it could not decide what to recommend about Soviet trade. "even-handed" in dealing with the communist rivals.

Now, the sources said, the anti-Soviet feeling on Capitol Hill is such that concessions for the Soviets would likely be defeated even if the administration asked for them.

Less dramatic trade-related options being considered, the sources said, include tightening restrictions on transfers of sophisticated technology to the

Weizman calls U.S. 'soft'

WASHINGTON - A top Israeli official accused the United States of "weakness" in an unusual public shouting match that underscores differences

between the two countries. "You are soft," Defence Minister Ezer Weizman told Assistant Secretary of State Harold Saunders at the height of the

"You lost Ethiopia. You lost Angola. And you lost Iran."

In a tense exchange lasting more than an hour, Saunders, known as a soft-spoken diplomat, fired back that bombing southern Lebanon ultimately will prove to be a foreign policy disaster for Israel.

"I'm warning you, Lebanon will be your Vietnam," Saunders told Weizman.

BUT WEIZMAN, ISRAEL'S first air force chief, did not

"Don't tell me how to do anything," he said. And he then criticized U.S. policy in Ethiopia, Angola and Iran.

The argument, in English, was carried on during a Saturday night cocktail party at the home of Israeli Ambassador Ephraim Evron. The guests included Defense Secretary Secretary of State Cyrus Vance Harold Brown and U.S. Middle insisted that he wanted to be East mediator Robert Strauss, but they had left before Saunders and Weizman, leaning on a bar in a paneled wood alcove, had their dispute.

More than a dozen Israeli journalists and guests were within earshot. One, Ido Dissentshik, bureau chief of the Hebrew newspaper Maariv, provided an account to The Associated Press.

He said it apparently was set off when Saunders admonished Weizman that the United

States was not completely consulted on an Egyptian-Israeli plan to patrol the Sinai Desert.

"IS THIS CALLED friendship?" Saunders reportedly asked.

Faced with published accounts of their disputes, Weizman and Saunders went out of their way Wednesday to project a spirit of good fellowship.

Reporters were advised to assemble in the lobby of the State Department where the two ministers, breaking off talks about Sinai peacekeeping operations, appeared.

"I was very sorry it blew up like that," Weizman said. "But this is it, this is a democracy."

Weizman called Saunders a friend and said, "Today we were very calm, and as usual, extremely friendly."

SAUNDERS SAID "EZER and I have known each other for 15 years. We've discussed many things over the years and always come out of it with smiles.'

Hodding Carter, the State Department spokesperson, said accounts of the argument were "relatively correct," but he tried to minimize the import.

FUNDS DECREASED

Sheriff's Dept. cut

The Ingham County Sheriff's Department will lose nine employees next year under the county's new 1980 budget which was approved at Tuesday night's board of commissioner's meeting.

Although the number of employees in the department will be reduced, the actual funds for the department will be increased from \$3.7 million to \$4.2 million, because of the partial state funding for 20 paramedics.

The original budget deleted 12 employees from the sheriff's department, but the commission voted to allow continuation of a crime prevention coordinator, audio-visual technician, and intake referral coordinator.

In addition to the nine sheriff's employees cut from the budget, four law enforcement officials will be released during 1980.

New councilmembers goal: community-sponsored services

Joan Hunault, East Lansing's newest city councilmember, exemplifies the old saying with a new twist: "Woman's place is in the House . . . and the Senate.

Hunault, sworn in at Tuesday's city council meeting, is a legislative analyst on the democratic staff of the State House of

Hunault was chosen from among one dozen candidates and five finalists for the council seat elected councilmember Carolyn Stell vacated Aug. 7. Stell resigned because of a possible conflict of interest with a new job as associate state court administrator.

Her primary concern, she said, is working with the University to establish a rape counseling center.

She also suggested continued funding of the Tenant's Resource Center and encouragement of cooperative housing as steps the city can take to expand the numbers of housing units available to students.

Hunault received a bachelor's degree in English literature from MSU in 1972 and is currently working towards a master's degree in public administration.

Lansing shelter for the abused closer by city council resolution

Operation of a shelter for domestic abuse victims in Lansing came one step closer to reality at the Lansing City Council meeting Monday night

The council voted six to one to give the Council Against Domestic Abuse six months to bring a house in north Lansing up

to city code requirements. At the meeting, Marcia Macomber, executive director of CADA, said she hoped the house, which will be used as a shelter for battered wives, would be open by

Councilmember William Brenke, from the second ward, was the only member to vote against the resolution.

Brenke said one reason he voted against the resolution was that the house had only two bathrooms.

The only stumbling block that may endanger the opening of the shelter now is lack of funds, Macomber said. She said she hopes the landlord will assist in fixing up the house.

CADA currently receives funds from the federal and state governments and from private contributions.

In other actions, the council voted to purchase the Foster Elementary School, 200 N. Foster, for about \$300 from the Lansing School District.

Councilmember Robert Hull, from the first ward, said he hoped the school would house various community organizations.

have some qualifications for the position, some trustees argued his poor track record in affirmative action hiring would not help the University in its fight to treat all persons - regardless of sex or race equally. And against a past history which is marred with white racist tendencies, MSU cannot afford to trust its top offices to those who may want to keep the power in white hands. In addition, it was revealed at the same meeting that a mere handful of minorities and women were employed in top level positions across the University board.

While it comes as a shock to no one that minorities and women do not share much of the bureaucratic wealth at MSU, these two instances combined to form a fright ful picture: one of discrimination and deceit. And it was this picture that Mackey tried to alter as he entered the presidency. Lee June, assistant director of the Counseling Center, was appointed to replace James Hamilton as assistant provost due to Hamilton's leave. While it has been rumored that Hamilton will not return, at least, some say, a black man with concern for affirmative action practices, will fill his shoes.

On Sept. 8, Mackey was expected to announce a few appointments to the Board of Trustees. Mackey canceled that meeting. This writer still wonders why. But Mackey is still expected to make some other announcements at next week's meetings.

These appointments should prove to be interesting as well as these meetings. It shall also be intriguing to see if Mackey is making positive changes or just putting a little make-up on the wound called MSU's affirmative action plan. This University does not need anymore cosmetic changes. It needs to see competent, serious changes that will improve this community.

Historically speaking, whenever minority groups, and groups in general, complained about an institution's policies, the institution changed its make-up to show it had a new look. But a close examination of the new faces showed that they were just that make-up. The cracks in the cheap make-up could be seen easily

Like a modern-day Alamo, Demonstration Hall stands as a remnant of a proud but dwindling army.

The building houses the administration and facilities of the U.S. Army's Reserve Officer Training Corps (ROTC), an organization whose membership numbered in the thousands two decades ago, but now has less than 100 members.

Demonstration Hall was constructed for ROTC in 1927. It was the result of a very popular and highly successful program that won the Army's highest award for excellence.

During the late 1920's ROTC's Cavalry Corps was one of the most prestigious groups on campus. The annual spring horse show sponsored by the Corps, using Army-owned horses, was the highlight of the season in this area. It drew thousands of spectators from all over the state and was acclaimed as one of the best horse shows in the COUNTRY

DEMONSTRATION HALL'S SPACIOUS arena, acclaimed at the time as "five feet longer than New York City's Madison Square Garden", was ideal for the popular horse shows. Polo was also played in the arena, and horses were kept in the stables that circled the arena floor.

The building was also equipped with a shooting range in the basement, rappelling apparatus, a large gym which doubled as a ballroom and classrooms for the study of military science.

The horse shows continued and ROTC flourished until economic conditions brought on by the Depression caused the horse shows to be discontinued in 1933.

World War II caused a disruption in the ROTC program, but after the war, ROTC was expanded to the point where MSU's

department was considered one of the top three college military departments in the country. Until 1962, two years of ROTC was mandatory for every able-bodied male student.

The Cavalry Corps was still popular after the war, but there was one important change - there were no longer any horses. The Cavalry became mechanized and instead of cadets parading their horses on Demonstration Hall's spacious front lawn, the groan of tanks and trucks became commonplace.

NO LONGER NEEDED for horse shows or polo, Demonstration Hall's main arena was converted into a hockey rink in 1950. It served the MSU hockey team until Munn Arena was completed in 1974, after which it was used for recreational skating.

In the mid-60s, during the Vietnam War and the period of student protest, the building was the site of many anti-war

The Army's presence on campus provided a convenient target for anti-war activists. Rocks and bottles punched holes in the latticeword of windows fronting the building. Uneven repairs have left an erratic checkerboard of old and new windows, the scars of old wounds.

Since the end of the Vietnam War there has been a steady decline of ROTC cadets, and yet many of the facilities at Demonstration Hall remain intact. The shooting range in the basement is still functional, as is the rappelling apparatus. The trophy cases in the halls laud the achievements of distinguished

Where drill teams once practiced on the front lawn, there are now but a few students tossing a frisbee. Times have changed.

Chinese students arriving

By WILLIAM E. KRESNAK Thirty years after China closed it's doors on the Western world, Chinese students are once again flocking to the United States to gain the scientific knowledge needed to modernize their nation.

are so advanced in America, the end of the year with 2,000 many Chinese want to study here," said Liu Chiwu, a visiting scholar from the People's Republic of China who is doing

plant genetics research at MSU. Reports say that China hopes to have 800,000 trained scientists by 1985 as part of a massive campaign to modernize in the areas of science and technology, agriculture, national defense and industry. It hopes to become a fully industrialized na-

tion by the year 2000. To train the estimated 465,000 additional scientists and Princeton. needed to reach its goals, the Chinese government is sending thousands of its students overseas for education.

Colleges in the United States. Japan, Great Britian, France, West Germany, and several other nations are expected to help China's scientists.

AT LEAST 500 students are expected to be enrolled by the end of 1979 in each of the 11 Western nations China has negotiated with. China will pay all tuition fees and expenses for these students and the cost could exceed \$50 million a year within two years.

It is expected that 80 percent of the Chinese who will come to the United States will be visiting scholars trained in China before the Cultural Revolution, including professors and researchers with many years

THE TWO VISITING scholars now at MSU are Liu, who arrived in April and is working in the laboratory of William Tai, professor of botany; and Chen Maobai who arrived in July to work at the Cyclotron Labora-

Arrangements have also been made at MSU to accept a visiting scholar in the horticulture department, a graduate student in the department of crop and soil sciences, and a special student in the computer science program of the College of Engineering. They are expected to arrive sometime fall

Liu said some of the Chinese coming to this country may have adjustment problems at first.

"The biggest problem for the Chinese coming to America is language," Liu said. "We don't speak well because of our lack of

contact with foreigners and because we haven't had English textbooks made in other coun-

He also said that remedial work may be necessary for some of the visiting scholars because

China is not equal to that in the United States.

The Clash invade Detroit

The Clash, who since the demise of the Sex Pistols have been the standard-bearers for the remnants of the English p**k scene, finally made it to Detroit's Masonic Auditorium Monday for a concert that also featured ex-New York Doll David Johansen and

The midwest has been fairly well insulated from new wave rock for the past three years, and it has only been recently that this music has begun to erode the area's infatuation with heavy metal juggarnauts such as Styz, Nugent, Kansas, et al (witness the belated surge of interest in p**k rock at the Rainbow Ranch for confirmation of this). The situation is unfortunate, because while it may be the "latest thing" here in the heartland, much of it is already old hat everywhere else.

the Clash. Thanks to the timidity of CBS records, the group's summer, when a modified version came out with singles replacing some of the original album tracks. The group's Sandy Pearlman-produced follow-up Give 'Em Enough Rope, meanwhile. had been released a half year before. Having been exposed to the Clash in this bass-ackwards fashion, it is not surprising that the Detroit audience fully expected to hear the band as they sounded

The Clash, however, seemed intent on confounding the expectations of their followers. Instead of assailing the audience with one head-banging pogo tune after another, they seemed determined to be "The Clash/1979," spending as much time exploring new directions as they did re-cycling past glories for

The band sauntered onstage to the sounds of taped reggae

music, dwarfed by their amplifiers and by the huge backdrop which depicted national flags from around the world. They then launched into the first of the many reggae-based new tunes of the evening, delivered at a pace that must have seemed agonizingly stilted to the expectant neuvo punks. As if to further confound everybody, the band's trademark quasi-militaristic stage gear had been replaced by more "American" apparel - a cowboy shirt and slicked-back hair for guitarist Mick Jones, a flannel shirt and dungarees for lead vocalist Joe Strummer.

For the most part the new songs sounded strong, in large part because Nicky Headon's powerful 2-4 drumming propelled them along unflinchingly. (Another reason might be that the deafening volume more than compensated for the slackened pace.) Among the best of these new compositions was one called "I'm Not Working For The Kremlin" (to which one Detroit wit responded with "then who ARE you working for?!") However, the audience reaction was mixed - it was obvious that they were there for the

The band's vintage songs, it must be admitted, sounded great on stage. "White Man In Hammersmith Palais" and "Police & Thieves" - two of their earliest reggae-based songs - were incredibly strong, while "Janie Jones" and "Garageland" were everything the old fans could have hoped for. The greatest audience response, however, came after their version of "I Fought The Law," which has had the benefit of some radio airplay.

When called back for an encore, the Clash began with just a single bass figure by Simenon, over which Strummer delivered a haunting chant about world hunger. It was one of the few instances where the band's much-vaunted politicism was obvious outside of their all-but indiscernible song lyrics. The other instance came when (possibly in response to a taunt from the front rows) Strummer announced that "the time has come to sort out just who the poseurs are . . ."

The Clash could have done things a lot differently. They could have made things easy for themselves and played what they were expected to play, but chose instead to stretch out and experiment. Some of these experiments - notably bassist Paul Simenon's attempt at singing - didn't work, but most of them did, and it is their willingness to try new things that will keep the Clash around when the last pogo band gives up the ghost.

David Johansen, for his part, delivered a seamlessly tight and emotionally powerful set, featuring material from both of his solo albums as well as a few old favorites. Johansen thinks a lot like Ian Hunter, looks and sings like Mick Jagger's twin, and aspires to be a Noo Yawk version of Bruce Springsteen. Best of all, his band is strong enough to carry it all off without a flaw.

High points include a dynamic "Frenchette" from his first album, as well as "Melody" and the very Springsteen-like "Flamingo Road" from his recently released In Style LP. The Motown fave "Reach Out and I'll Be There" and Mitch Ryder's old "Sock It To Me" went down a storm, as did the old New York Dolls classic, "Personality Crisis."

David Johansen has come a long way since his days as the outrageous lead vocalist of the Dolls, and it doesn't sound like he's anywhere close to peaking yet. Johansen is going to get better and better - watch out for him!

The Undertones, on the other hand, were an anonymous and modestly-talented English pogo band that made the mistake of far out-staying their welcome.

'Apocalypse' coming soon!

"The most important thing I wanted to do," wrote Francis Coppola in his program notes for Apocalypse Now, "was to create a film experience that would give its audience a sense of the horror, the madness, the sensuousness and the moral dilemma of the Vietnam War." Coppola's film, years and many millions of dollars in the making, premiered in Manhattan, Los Angeles and Toronto last month, garnering about equal amounts of acclaim, disaffection and controversy. The picture has also done turnaway business in all three cities.

"No movie has ever seemed to capture so much of the flavor, the fear, the moral incongruity, even the sensuality of war - let alone such a complex, still hotly debated war as Vietnam," wrote State News film reviewer Byron Baker after seeing Apocalypse Now in early August. "The film," he wrote, "is a massive, powerful, disturbing, flawed and deeply ambiguous piece of work. One thing is certain: it creditably reflects the years of labor and the millions of dollars poured into it by Coppola and his creative associates. Apocalypse Now is an incredibly original movie - I can't recall ever having seen a film that looked, sounded or felt quite like this one."

At any rate, East Lansing audiences will soon get an opportunity to see what all the fuss is about. The United Artists release will open at the State Theatre on Friday, Octo-

Visconti's elegant 'Innocent' | Local M.D. publishes book |

State News Reviewer Italian director Luchino Visconti was seriously ill throughout the production of his The Innocent (Analysis Films; at the Campus Theatre), and died shortly before the completion of shooting. The director's illness (Visconti directed much of the film from a wheelchair) and untimely death may partially explain some of the film's weaknesses. The Innocent is a slow, lush, elegant period melodrama of lust and manners. Much of the film is gorgeous -Visconti, a romantic Marxist, directly utilizes flamboyantly detailed decor and costumes to give the viewer an arch, sumptuous sensual appreciation of the climes and lives of his characters - but it lacks both the consistent dramatic intensity and credibility to be very affecting. It's pretty, and it's interesting, but it isn't terribly compelling.

Based on a 1892 novel by poet and pundit Gabriele D'Annunzio, The Innocent concerns the doomed romantic outings of Tullio (Giancarlo Giannini), a wealthy, liberal and atheistic aristocrat. Though Tullio sees himself as a "sensitive, freethinking intellectual," he is actually a cruel, self-centered and thoroughly decadent popinjay. Not only does Tullio openly engage in an affair with Teresa

(Jennifer O'Neill, weirdly play-

ing a sensual Italian countess),

much to the distress of his wife

he has the lack of grace to come



the bottom line," Burns said. "In basic life problems, there's always a decision to be made." College students' lives typify this problem, he said.

When people go to college, they're confronted with a lot of different ways of doing things, and they have to make a lot of new choices.

"We see our firm guidelines and absolute rights and wrongs crumbling before our eyes," he

Burns relates this idea to his experiences in the '60s when he made the decision to drop out of medical school.

"My parents told me that they didn't think it was the right thing for me to do, but that they would be behind me no matter what I decided," he said. "I knew that it was not what I was supposed to do, but it was what I wanted to do right then.

Burns said he was independent of all "religious framework

or structures. 'These structures do three things," he emphasized. "They make your decisions for you, they tell you what you should want and they try to give you feelings of self-worth on the basis of their principles.

"But if I'm always doing what everyone tells me to, I don't feel myself," he said.



State News Staff Writer So. You've just moved into your dream apartment, only to discover the sewer is backing up and the furnace doesn't work. Where do you turn?

Or perhaps this is your first time living off-campus and you're unsure of the initial responsibilities of being a tenant.

In any case, don't panic. Problems encountered by new tenants are not insurmountable, according to Michael Yales, court system researcher for the Tenant Resource Center. Furthermore, there are steps you can take now, as you first move in, to avoid problems in the future.

One basic area of concern for new tenants is a housing checklist, Yales said. Every landlord must supply a checklist form to the renters if a security deposit is paid. The list is an inventory of furniture and property within the house or

"LATER ON, WHEN you want your security deposit back, you'll want something in writing about the condition and possessions of the place," Yales commented.

"This is not only an inventory of furniture, but of everything that's wrong. Renters should list every little thing they find, such as nail holes, broken furniture, tears in the carpeting. When you move out, you don't want to have to pay for those

A checklist should be provided to the renter on moving in, and should be returned within seven days. The landlord should give the renters two copies of the checklist.

In preparing the checklist, tenants may discover a few unpleasant surprises, like low water pressure or furniture in need of repair. To get maintenance work done, tenants should follow a specific procedure designed to eliminate unnecessary hassles. Yales said

"First, tenants should contact the landlord and ask him to have the problem fixed, and ask for it to be fixed within a certain time," Yales said. "The renter should write down the date he talked to the landlord, the topic of conversation, and a summary of what was decided.

'IF THE RENTER doesn't got results by the date agreed on, he should send a letter to the landlord restating everything discussed in the previous contact, and state that the landlord failed to complete the agreement. Then restate the problem and ask again to have it fixed. Give a date you want it fixed by."

If that doesn't work, the tenant's next alternative is the local building-department inspector. If the problem involves a code violation, the building department will give the landlord a specific number of days to solve the situation. Renters should ask for a copy of the building department report.

In an emergency situation where the problem must be (continued on page 15)





Edible wild vine

ATLANTA (AP) - No one would compare it to asparagus with hollandaise sauce. But there's enough of the crawling kudzu vine in the Southeast to feed an army, and experts say

The vine, brought over from Japan and now the bane of many farmers and homeowners who hate its one-foot-a-day growth rate, has long suffered a

bad reputation. But horticulturists, agriculsay the vine is used frequently vegetable

in Oriental cuisine and is high in fiber and low in calories, cholesterol and sodium.

Jake Tinga, a horticulture professor at the University of Georgia, explains that the vine is a "staple of Oriental cuisine." There its tips are cooked much like asparagus is cooked in the United States, and its roots are cooked as Americans would boil

said Trooper Erban Brown of the Lansing post.







Dredging up a controversary

The cutter head bites in the ground 15 hours a day and unknowingly churns up more than sludge. The dredge rumbles across the lake while more than 8,000 feet of pipe snakes silently toward the highlands. Observers of the dredging operation at Lake Lansing, however, have not been silent.

The Snell Environment Group of Lansing has advocated the lake dredging since the late 1950's and won the contract to oversee it. Average depth of Lake Lansing is six feet; dredging over 3/4 of the lake would



increase that to 12. The contract expires in November, 1981 with a projected cost of \$2


The dredge was moved on to the lake last winter by owners of the Eastlick and Eastlick Co., Sebewaing, Mich., but it did not shift into action until this summer. Voices of protest compete with the dredger's


A public act implements the Clean Lakes Program, designed to restore the recreational value of polluted lakes. Partially funded with Environmental Protection Agency moneys, Lake Lansing is being used as a model to determine if dredging is effective in reviving the health of such lakes. Property owners around the lake are being assessed to complete funding for the project. The Lake Lansing Assessment Association claims that their amounts of payments for the dredging are disproportionately large and questions whether they should be assessed at all for a project whose value has not been proven.


Most area residents support the idea of the experiment, but the question arises as of what to do with several thousand square feet of muck which will be dug up from the bottom of the lake. Because of the Wetlands Act, passed earlier this year, only highlands can be used as dumping sites since the filling in of lowlands and swamps is prohibited. Ingham County does not have any available highlands near the lake so five disposable sites to total about 120 acres were selected in adjacent Bath Township in Clinton County.

Members of the Coleman Road Association, in view of the first disposal area are taking the Ingham County Drain Commission to court for condemning private property in Clinton County to appropriate for sites. They worry about the sledge' contamination and seepage. They are not placated by promises of new walls as their well water source is tapped to supplement water used to stabilize the lake level as it is

As the dredge cuts another swath across the lake, pumping more water and sludge toward the Coleman Road site, cries continue to arise, but these are from Canada geese, who seem to welcome the temporary

Another disposal site, located behind Power Plant 65, had a concrete lined pit built in 1974 so it could be used as a disposal site for unknown chemicals as commercial haulers would only handle chemicals which were

Bottles of unknown chemicals were set on the edge of the pit and shot with a .22 caliber rifle, thereby allowing the chemicals to drain into the pit without

coming into contact with

CONCERN GREW ABOUT chemicals which had been dumped onto the ground at both sites and of the possibility the pit could be flooded, washing chemicals out onto the ground, so MSU began an investigation

earlier this year. The DNR joined the investigation shortly thereafter, and a letter dated April 23, 1979 from the director of the DNR.





Computer students get new consultant

In an effort to increase minority enrollment in computer science classes, a special computer consultant for those students will be available beginning this term.

The new program is designed for minority students who do not normally enroll in computer science classes while attending MSU, said Leslie Rout, special assistant to the president.

"When I first began to look at things that needed to be done here, this was an obvious need," Rout said. "For many minority students coming out of high schools in Detroit or Flint there is a fear of numbers that keeps them away from classes like this." Rout was appointed special assistant to the president shortly after Cecil Mackey took over as MSU president in August.

The program will be run on a limited basis with one specially selected consultant available 10 hours a week to provide assistance for minority students enrolled in CPS 110 and 120. The assistance will be in addition to that available under the

regular teaching assistant program. The cost of the program is expected to be \$375 per term and will be paid by the computer science department and the Provost's office.

"In 10 years housewives are going to be using these things, but a lot of minorities aren't going to have any idea what happened because they never took a class. They are going to need some computer literacy," Rout said.


Frye, who teaches philosophy of feminism, said the program provides teaching-learning situations in which women are taken-

committee of city council members and Dayton-Hudson employees and will be made public before the November vote.

The council will make a final decision on the mall based on the results of the advisory ballot.

SWANTKO REQUESTED AT Tuesday's council meeting that the council approve the ballot addition. He 'mentioned contacts he had had with a pro-mall group which desired a council vote rather than a vote of the people, but said Dayton-Hudson would prefer the citizens' vote to a council decision to

Councilmember Alan Fox agreed with Swantko and said the council had only two options other than putting the question on the fall 1979 ballot: outright rejection of the proposal or putting it on next year's ballot.

Fox said last year's election which said "no" to the mall should not be overlooked.

"To turn that (the November 1978 vote) around, is to turn around the will of the community," he said.

He added that the council should not take it upon itself to "cheapen" the value of votes considered "transients."

"To try to measure people's value by how long they stay or how much money they bring into the community is something I'd thought was behind us," he said.

Other councilmembers agreed with Fox and said the November election will be the best time to solve the Dayton-Hudson question once and for

"An early resolution is better, so people will know where they stand. This matter has dragged on much longer than is healthy for the community," Councilmender Larry Owen said.







MSU kickers take easy win in season debut

If season opening games are any indication of what is to follow, the MSU soccer team may have found at least some of the offensive punch it lacked a year ago.

The Spartans, who had trouble scoring goals through most of last season enroute to a 6-6-2 record, opened the 1979 campaign with an easy 4-0 win over Eastern Michigan University Monday.

The score cannot begin to tell how the Spartans overwhelmed the Hurons.

Controlling the ball in Huron territory throughout most of the game, the Spartans took 32 shots-on-goal compared to just five for EMU. Only a half-dozen narrow misses kept the score from ballooning for MSU.

The Spartan defense made it an easy day for goaltenders Bob Grinter and Glenn Brodin. None of the five EMU shots-on-goal were any real

The first half of the contest was lackluster. The only score came when Mark Neterer took a centering pass from Eric Wostl and pushed it past EMU goalie John LaRose 17-minutes into the game. It was Neterer's first game for the Spartans after missing all of his freshman year with a

"It was a disappointing first half," said MSU head coach Joe Baum, now in his third season. "There was a lack of intensity. We weren't moving to the ball. We were waiting around, waiting for something to happen.'

shoulder injury.

But the second half told a different story. Kirk Rone started the offensive show with a long blast from the left side on a pass from Wostl just five minutes into the half. Twenty-eight minutes later, Neterer tallied his second goal of the afternoon after breaking free in front of the Huron

Ben Gellis added a strike with five minutes left in the game with a shot from the center crease to make it a 4-0

"We came to life in the second half," said Baum. "We were supporting well, block

ing well. I was happy with the second half.'

Baum was obviously pleased with the victory but indicated his squad needed to improve before it was ready for the tougher opposition on the schedule.

"We still have a way to go with this offense," Baum noted. "I'm not impressed with four goals. The thing that concerns me most is that our timing was off and our inner passing was off."

The Spartans didn't have much time to work on it either. They traveled to Big Rapids to face Ferris State College Wednesday after-

MSU cuts down Illinois, Oregon

The countdown to Rose Bowl 1980 has begun and the MSU Spartans are right where they want to be after two games - undefeated.

The Spartans downed the University of Illinois in the season opener two weeks ago, 33-16 to give MSU a share of the early lead in the Big Ten before beating the University of Oregon 41-17 last Saturday in a non-conference clash. By virtue of these two wins, MSU has moved up to eighth place in both the Associated Press and United Press International college football polls after beginning the season as the number ten team in each poll.

Despite the rather lopsided scores in each of his team's games so far, MSU head coach Darryl Rogers feels the Spartans still have a way to go before they are as good as people are saying they

"I do think we improved offensively and defensively from last week," he said after the Oregon game. "But at the same time, I don't think we are to the point where we are satisfied either offensively or defensively.

BUT MORE TIMES than not, the Spartans have looked like the Big Ten co-champions of a year ago. MSU has rolled up an average of 451 yards through the first couple of games behind the arm of quarterback Bert Vaughn and the feet of tailback Steve Smith.

"Bert has progressed well," Rogers said of the sophomore signal caller, who in his first two games as the replacement for Eddie Smith, has shown that he has a bright future. "He runs the football team well and he's more confident and more composed," he added.

By his own concession, Vaughn got off to a rocky start in the opener against the Fighting Illini when his first pass was intercepted. But he bounced back and threw for 233 yards and two touchdowns as the Spartans romped.

"It took me a while to see what they (the Illinois defensemen) were doing," Vaughn said afterward. "I learned a lot out there. There were one or two passes where I had a little indecision and a couple of times where I didn't deliver like I should have. The more I play, the better I'll get, I think."

Steve Smith, unlike Vaugh, is not a new name in the MSU lineup as he was the Spartans' leading rusher with 722 yards in 1978. But after he ran for 84 yards against Illinois and 154 against Oregon, it is easy to see that this is a different Steve Smith. "I'm more confident than last year," the 5-foot-9-inch, 182-pound junior said. "I'm also more hungry for yards. My first two years here, I was kind of shy and afraid to take a hit. Now I like

to give the hits," he continued. ILLINOIS WAS THE one giving the hits in the early going of the opener as they jumped out to a 10-3 lead in the second quarter. Mike Holmes did the damage for the Illini when he took a pitchout from quarterback Rich Weiss and raced 75 yards down the sideline for a touchdown.

That score seemed to do more for MSU than Illinois as it was at this point the Spartan offense grew some teeth. Vaughn went to work, completing three passes on the drive, the last one a 32-yard toss to Samson Howard for a

Vaughn did another surgery job on the Illini secondary late in the first half. The Spartans took over on their own 21-yard line with just 1:05 left in the half. He found Howard again for a big gain, hit two other passes and made way for Morten Andersen, who kicked the second of his four field goals of the day as the half ended.

MSU put the game away in the second half as they scored on their first two possessions. Vaughn threw a 29-yard touchdown pass to Mark Jones for the final score of the game late in the fourth quarter.

Linebacker Larry Savage was the top defensive player of the game for MSU. He was credited with nine tackles, including three sacks. "He was very good against the run and was very physical," Rogers said of Savage's performance against Illinois. "That's what we were looking for."

MSU got off to a 14-point advantage against Oregon and took a 20-10 lead by halftime. But the Ducks sliced the lead to just three points on an eight-yard run by Dwight Robertson midway

through the third quarter. DEREK HUGHES SENT the Spartans on their way on the ensuing kickoff, returning it 100 yards for an MSU score. The return broke the record for the longest kickoff runback in MSU history, busting the old record of 98 yards set by Russ Reader in 1946. Hughes scored twice more in the game on short runs

According to Rogers, MSU went into the contest with two major goals in mind to stop the Ducks and the Spartans accomplished both of

The first was to contain Oregon quarterback Reggie Ogburn and the option offense. "We took their option away," Rogers said. "We had to get to Ogburn because we couldn't let him get 276 yards on us like he did last week (when Oregon upset the University of Colorado 33-19).

Ogburn did throw for 176 yards, but he was intercepted twice and both thefts led directly to MSU scores. His longest run of the day was only four vards.

Rogers also wanted to control the Ducks' "Gold Rush," the defensive front four that sacked the Colorado quarterback nine times. "I'm really pleased with the way we protected Vaughn, Rogers said after the Spartans had not let the Gold Rush get to Vaughn. "Oregon can really put on the heat and we did a good job.

Vaughn thought the Gold Rush would put more pressure on him than they did. "I know we have a super line but I was really surprised by the time I had," he said.

The two wins give the Spartans a nine-game winning streak extending back to last season, which ties them for the third-longest string nationally, ironically with their next opponent, Miami of Ohio. The Redskins, perennial Mid-American Conference contenders, beat pre-season MAC favorite Ball State University 27-3 and stopped the University of Kentucky a week ago, 15-14, when a Kentucky field goal attempt failed on the last play of the game.

Watch for Quill in the Michigan Mile

Bill Stortz has trained some fine Michigan race horses over the years but not very many that could match strides with P.D. Quill. a three-year-old colt by Shecky Greene out of NuQuill (by Noble Union). He's big and he's strong and, as they say along the rail, he has heart. Though he may be just a bit over-matched, Stortz will send him to the post on Saturday afternoon for the 31st running of the \$100,000-Added Michigan Mile and One-Eighth Handicap at the Detroit Race Course

P.D. Quill is Michigan-bred and Michigan-owned and the fact that he is going to challenge the group of "name invaders" that ship in each year for Michigan's most - and some say only prestigious horse race constitutes an interesting commentary on the thoroughbred industry in this state. It has never really been a major league operation for any extended period of time: purses have generally been low (a factor somewhat attributable to the stiff chunk that the Michigan Legislature takes out of every bet) and the facilities at DRC and crosstown Hazel Park Raceway are adequate at best. Yet the breeding aspect of the business has matured noticeably during the past two decades, and P.D. Quill is

HE'S VERY GAME. He has a lifetime record of 10 wins in 14 starts, including seven for 11 this year. He has also come in third twice, so it can be said that on only two occasions has he finished off the board. His earnings total over \$150,000 this season and that's a lot by Michigan standards. Yes, it's true that when he has ventured outside of the state he has not faired well: he was unplaced in the Round Table Handicap on the turf at Arlington Park in Chicago and at Waterford Park in the West Virginia

Derby. But when he's home he is nearly unbeatable, defeating his three-year-old peers, older horses, whipping the opposition on wet track or dry, even when high-weighted.

He loves Michigan tracks. He won six in a row at Hazel Park earlier this year. On July 14, P.D. Quill beat his fellow Michigan Mile nominee, Win Bill, by eleven lengths at a distance of a mile and one-sixteenth on a fast track. On Labor Day at DRC, with the track surface an ocean of mud because of a one-hour downpour, he beat Win Bill again in the mile and one-eighth Frontier Handicap, ticking off fractions of :23.2, :48-, 1:12.3, 1:39.2 and 1:52.3, carrying 125 pounds (including his jockey, Grady Overton) while doing so.

To the learned horse player, a time of one-fifty-two and change for nine furlongs may not seem overpowering. But it must be remembered that ever since a new track surface was put in at DRC at the start of the 1978 season, all the horses have slowed down. The Detroit record for six furlongs, for example, was set by Glass House who did a 1:08 in 1964, but this year only one winning horse, Tikvah, has bettered 1:12 for the same distance (he did a 1:11.1). And it should be noted that P.D. Quill's Labor Day time of 1:52.3 is exactly the same clocking that A Letter to Harry had when he won the Michigan Mile and One-Eighth last year, and he did it on a fast, dry track.

MOST OBSERVERS, THOUGH, see P.D. Quill as an underdog. Bud Sears, director of racing and racing secretary at DRC, says he is unproven against top quality horses. This sentiment is echoed by Al Coffman, the superb handicapper for the Detroit News. "Times are very deceiving," says Coffman. "A horse can run well

against his own kind, and then fold when he takes a step up in class. The key is the quality of the opposition.

The opposition will be fairly formidable. Sensitive Prince, Golden Act and Darby Creek Road, all veteran Triple Crown campaigners, have been nominated, along with Star De Naskra, Cox's Ridge and A Letter to Harry. Not all of them will go to the

race for longshots. In thirty previous runnings, only three favorites have won. And no odds-on favorite (a horse who will pay even money or less on a dollar) has ever won. High weight assignments have done many of them in. P.D. Quill won't have to worry about that, he'll tote only 109. That's a sixteen-pound drop from his last race.





Rowing Club offers adventure

State News Sports Writer Ever wonder what it would be like to glide across a lake in a boat reaching speeds of 20 mph or more - without the aid of a motor or sail?

Does the idea of being on a team where each member is equally vital to its success seem challenging?

If such thoughts are worth experiencing, MSU offers one of the oldest sports in the world today - rowing.

"It really does offer something for everybody," said Mike Cousino, a senior accounting major and coach of the MSU Rowing Club. "Rowing is both a male and female sport. In fact, it has grown tremendously for

women in the last ten years." ROWING HAS LONG been a prestigious sport at eastern schools such as Harvard and Yale. But it has only recently gained prominence in the Mid-

"Michigan and Ohio State has just started programs," said Cousino. "MSU, Minnesota, Purdue and Wisconsin have had rowing teams for some time. Wisconsin, however, is one of any other sport," noted the better teams in the region."

petes against those schools and many others from around the country at open rowing contests called regattas. The regatta season extends from early spring to late summer and offers teams the chance to experience what rowing is all about. The course in such a race is usually a straight 2,000 meters for men and 1,000 meters for women and is held

on a wide lake or river. Among the regattas that the club participates in during the spring are the Midwest Rowing Championships at Madison, Wis., the Midwest Association of Rowing Colleges Regatta at Marietta, Ohio, and the State of Michigan Championships at Grand Valley State College.

Last summer, the lightweight novice crew won their division at the annual Chicago Lakefront Regatta. But to be a winner in any

sport, it takes a lot of hard work and practice. Rowing is no exception as Cousino is quick to ROWING PROBABLY RE-QUIRES more training and good physical condition than

For that reason, Cousino has his squad working all year. They practice three or four days a week during the fall, although Cousino would work them seven days if he could. The training schedule gets more hectic when rowing is in season. The crew will row 10 to 12 miles a day as well as run three miles to help build leg Success of a team does not

always depend solely on the ability of its members, but on that age-old problem of funding. Many schools have made rowing a varsity sport and consequently try to offer new equipment as well as scholarships. Wisconsin University's rapid success is attributed to that fact. Wayne State University is another school that gives scholarships for rowing. It is a dilemma that understandably has Cousino worried.

'Money is a real problem,' Cousino said. "We'd like to buy a new boat next spring. The schools that do well in rowing get funds for boats, boathouses Cousino. "It is extremely diffi- and scholarships from alumni, The MSU Rowing Club com- cult on the legs. Working out is the university and the com-

Hospital pleads for death of child

DENVER (AP) - A comatose 17-month-old boy who is the center of a controversy in Colorado is losing ground, hospital officials said Tuesday in pleading for a court definition of death.

Attorneys for Parkview Episcopal Hospital of Peublo filed a brief with the state Supreme Court Tuesday asking that doctors be allowed to follow a judge's order and disconnect Jerry Trujillo from life-support equipment.

The boy has been comatose since Aug. 23, and doctors have said his brain is dead and that he does not respond to pain or other stimuli.

"A hospital and its staff live to treat the sick that they may become healthy, and the dying that they may do so with dignity," the brief said.

"They do not live to inject IVs and pump air into a grossly battered corpse for weeks . . . because a Legislature and a court have dodged the issue of defining death for 103 years."

The only guideline now in effect in the state is the common-law definition of cessation of heartbeat and spontaneous breathing. A bill that would have defined death as irreversible cessation of brain functions was introduced in the Legislature this year, but was killed in the Senate.

At a news conference at the southern Colorado hospital, Thomas Reichert said the boy's condition is deteriorating, adding: "We doubt that he will

last another week."

The boy's mother, 20-yearold Rosalie Lovato, has been charged with felony child abuse. His two sisters are in the custody of the county.

The mother's attorney and the boy's court-appointed guardian asked the Supreme Court last week to stay an order by District Judge Donald Abram that authorized an end to extraordinary measures for the

The high court issued the stay, giving the judge, hospital and doctors until Monday to show why the life-support systems should not remain connected. It was in response to that order that Parkview filed

VATICAN CITY (AP) - Church officials said Wednesday they are puzzled by the controversy in the United States over Pope John Paul II's six-day American tour beginning Oct. 1.

"It's ridiculous," snapped the Rev. Vincent O'Keefe, an American Jesuit official, reacting to the fuss over masses being said on public property and public funds being used for extra police protection and construction of special platforms.

"It's a classic case of one being unable to see the forest for the trees," said an Italian prelate, who asked not to be identified.

"The pope is not only a religious leader. He is a world leader and a head of state. I am puzzled why his visit cannot be perceived as a joyous and peaceful occasion that will help bring them together."



Beached whale may not survive

SEATTLE (AP) — A 14-foot newborn sperm whale that beached itself in Oregon arrived in Seattle today after an all-night ride on a flatbed trailer covered with wet mattresses. Officials said it would take a miracle for it to survive.


However, within hours, the baby whale was swimming and spouting in a pool here.

The female whale, with its umbilical cord still attached, stranded itself on the beach near Rockaway, Ore., Tuesday afternoon. Volunteers had heaved the baby whale back in the ocean only to have it swim back to shore.

Members of the Greenpeace Foundation and the Oregon State University Marine Science Center loaded the 800-pound mammal on the trailer about 8 p.m. Tuesday. Beachfront residents donated mattresses which were soaked and put over the animal.

Church labor seeks unionization

American churches face a spreading movement of their employees to organize for collective bargaining, and a leading church labor expert says the churches must uphold the process to maintain their credibility.

Churches long have preached the right of union organization, he says, and it's now essential for them to affirm that principle in their own practices.

Any attempts to circumvent it would undermine church efforts in behalf of justice "at all levels of society," adds Msgr. George G. Higgins of Washington, D.C., long-time Roman Catholic specialist in labor rela-

Quoting a 1971 declaration of Catholicism's international Synod of Bishops, he says that for the church effectively to defend justice it first must be applied "within the church her-

YET FOR MANY reasons, including the personal commitment of most church employees to serving Christianity, often at comparatively low pay, they have remained largely without group representation or contractual stipulations on terms



Catfish stroll in Miami

MIAMI (AP) - Helen Corbett brought home a mess of catfish and dumped them in her sink. They looked much alike. But when she turned to get a

knife, one catfish jumped out

and walked across the kitchen.

"I couldn't figure out what he was," Corbett says. "The rest of the catfish were just fluttering around in the water. But I saw this one just hop out of the sink and he walked about five or six steps over by the refrigerator."

and took it back to the canal where she caught it.

Wildlife authorities say Corbett isn't telling a fish story. In fact, since recent heavy rains, they've been deluged with calls from people unnerved by the sight of catfish creeping across their yards.

"After these heavy rains, a lot have come out of the canals and become visible to people," said Frank Morello, a biologist with the state Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission.

The catfish, he said, haven't

presented any problems, but they have stirred curiosity.

The walking catfish, native to Southeast Asia, is one of 23 exotic species of fish thriving in Florida waters, Morello said, and the walkers can be found from Homestead, south of here, to Lakeland, in central Florida.

On cool, rainy nights, the fish, which can grow to 18 inches long, come out of ponds and canals, "walking" with their pectoral fins.

Paul Shafland, of the state's Non-native Fish Research Laboratory in Boca Raton, compared the process to a soldier crawling on his elbows.

One gill has a special air bladder that enables the fish to stay out of the water as long as they stay wet and cool, Shafland

"We'd sure like to know how to get rid of them," said Barbara Walden, of Fort Pierce.

She said her family has three ponds on the edge of Fort Pierce, on central Florida's Atlantic coast, and walking catfish live there "by the hundreds and hundreds.

Senate approves arms increase

By ROBERT PARRY **Associated Press Writer**

WASHINGTON - Senate backers of higher military spending, flexing their muscle in the midst of current Salt II debates, see approval of a three-year boost in defense spending as a sign of U.S. willingness to challenge Soviet

military might. However, Defense Secretary Harold Brown said today that the Senate-approved \$24.9 billion increases are more than are needed to maintain an adequate national defense.

The Senate action includes a 3 percent increase in fiscal 1980 and 5 percent boosts in the second and third years.

"My own judgment is that . . . this time . . . because the programs that such a real growth rate will finance are adequate to meet our objectives and arrest the dangerous trends we see," Brown fiscal 1980, which starts Oct. 1,

told the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

THE SENATE ON Tuesday approved a 3 percent increase in 1980 defense spending, after inflation is deducted. However, in a later non-binding vote, it also called for increasing defense spending by 5 percent above inflation in 1981 and

President Carter has supported a 3 percent increase in real defense spending and has pledged a hike of that size to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. He has objected, however, to a 5 percent spending hike in 1981 and 1982.

The Senate votes upset defense spending critics, who 3 percent is the proper figure at noted that only hours earlier senators had decided to force \$3.6 billion in savings, mostly from social programs.

The Senate action added \$3.2 billion to the defense budget for

and pushed the 1980 deficit figure above \$30 billion.

However, supporters of a strong national defense praised the Senate action.

"I THINK IT means that the U.S. Senate, reflecting the view of the American people, has declared that we are moving out of the post-Vietnam era," said Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga., one of the Pentagon's leading allies on Capitol Hill.

"We're sending strong signals to our allies and our adversaries around the world that while we don't want an arms race, we're not willing to allow a unilateral, one-sided arms race to continue with the Soviet Union being the one that's racing," Nunn added.

The Senate resumed work on its proposed 1980 budget today as Republicans pressed for a \$24-billion, anti-recession tax cut in calendar year 1980. They also urged a \$19-billion cut in federal spending.
