Everett Pesonen, of the class of '29, made the statement in a recent issue of the State News, to the effect that open discussion in class spoiled the point that a professor was trying to make from well prepared notes.

From my own experience of three years of college classes, I find that the classes that I have gotten the most out of are those conducted on the "Open Forum" basis. There is nothing more interesting, and I might say, more enlightening to be obtained from a classroom than an honest opinion, whether right or wrong, of one's classmates, along with the opinion of the professor.

Some professors, who are conducting classes along this line, are, in my mind, following a rather poor policy of being very sarcastic in their discussion with the students. They also make very sarcastic remarks regarding the college during the discussion. In this sense I refer to a certain prof. I think that classes could be conducted very successfully along this line and not let sarcasm creep into the discussion. If a student feels that as soon as he starts to discuss a certain point the professor is going to come back at him with some bit of sarcasm, or a sarcastic remark with regard to the school, he is apt to sit back and not enter into the discussion, when he might add a bit to the thoroughness of said discussion by his contribution.

I am inclined to believe that students who are opposed to the "Open Forum" method of conducting classes are not to be just a little lazy and don't want to think or perhaps they are a little afraid of being ridiculed by the professor, or by his classmates.

I am of the opinion also that the professors who are opposed to the "Open Forum" method of conducting

classes are afraid of being "caught up" on their points by some student who hasn't been lulled to sleep by the monotony of hearing him rave on and on all through the class hour.

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# HASKELL GAME CLOSES STATE FOOTBALL SEASON

## Young Declares Haskell to Be Best Team That Ever Appeared at State.

The 1926 football season has the hardest schedules ever attempted by a Spartan team because history when Haskell downed State 40 to 7.

Following the game, Coach Ralph Young of Michigan State declared Haskell to be the best team that ever played on the local gridiron. Young declared that the Haskell team hit hard and took advantage of the weaknesses that have been evident in the Spartan front all season.

Haskell managed to score at least one touchdown in each period. In the first and third quarters two were scored. State registered in the first quarter when John Grim, veteran end playing his last game for the Green and White, snatched a Haskell pass and raced 48 yards for a touchdown. Smith added the extra point with a dropkick.

About the paramount feature of the game for State was the great showing made by the ends, Grim and Anderson. The latter played far over his head and gave the best exhibition of flank work offered by a Spartan this season.

Bob Grim was the hero of the day by reason of his scoring a touchdown. Grim closed his football career with the best game he ever played. His ability at solving the reverse plays used by Haskell was deserving of mention.

Elijah Smith, speedy Haskell half back, was the main cog in the Spartan offense. Smith's ability to squirm through masses of groundslaws was marvellous. The great blocking ability of the entire Haskell team made his shoving possible though.

The Haskell team offered as clever a collection of plays as has ever been seen in this vicinity. How the team works with Maxie McLain star fullback and leading scorer of the nation in the lineup can only be guessed at.

Nothing remains now to complete the football season but the scoring of the championship.

Five men have played their last for State. They are Captain Martin Rummel, Rudy Boshinger, John Grim, Pipp Wanner and John Garver. The latter was probably the most finished guard that has played at State in recent years.

All the teams were well matched as seen in the scores. The sophomore won their game in a last minute rally which nullified the winning points. Due to darkness the tactics and strategy were made in a six minute time to decide which team was superior.

The varsity sophomore team captured by 14-0. Freshman and state of the following year, B. Layman, F. Boshinger, E. Muffler, F. Pyle, M. Jolly, H. Brown, L. Dunge, A. Hanner, H. Nax, P. Tramm, H. Carter, H. Hessel, J. Layman, N. Pines, Z. Dwyne, Mackay, Armbush led the freshmen girls in hockey while M. F. Fabner and F. Woodworth captured the junior and senior teams respectively.

All hockey and soccer games have been interestingly played, and more favorable weather conditions prevail.

# STATE MAY BREAK INTO BIG TEN SOCCER CARD

## Possibility Looms for Combine With Wisconsin, Ohio, N. W. and Illinois.

Possibility now looms for Michigan State entering a soccer team into a combine newly formed league composed of western conference schools, according to a letter received by Coach Ralph Leonard this week from Director Stanley of the University of Illinois.

Under the tentative plans described in this letter, Michigan State would place a team in a combine with Ohio State, Wisconsin, North western and Illinois, with possibly other schools being added as interest becomes manifested. The schedule to be framed would be for the 1927 season.

# CROSS COUNTRY SEASON ENDS WITH VICTORY

## State Takes First Place In Central Intercollegiate Over Notre - Dame and Marquette.

State's winter cross country squad wound up a successful season Saturday afternoon by winning the first Central Intercollegiate meet from Notre Dame and Marquette. The Spartans had a low score of 27 with Marquette second with 47, Notre Dame third with 55, and Butler fourth with 82.

Individual scores for the run went to Henry Pfeiffer of Marquette, who crossed the course in the first time of 27:15.4, despite mud, snow and slush. Captain Ray Severance of State completed his collegiate career in a blaze of glory by taking a close second to Pfeiffer, about 10 miles south of Marquette and Young of Notre Dame took outstanding distinction.

Henry Wylie's great finishing sprint came near to giving him third place. As it was made up 20 or more yards in the last quarter-mile of the race he gave both Severance and Young a run for the title by the time they had been seen at East Lansing.

Severance well balanced team that has developed more strength with each year of the year, placed four men within the beaten, the sixth season being in 14th place. The kind of competition that was shown over the college course Saturday furnished the reason for the barring of the first team that competed here from the Western Conference. Van Arman, Duke of the team, State, Marquette and Notre Dame would have been sent to the front in the big race.

Michigan's national intercollegiate quartet with Severance, was seen in Marquette's race. The first Butler man to break was the first Butler man to break. Although a star for some runner, he found Saturday's race too fast and he had only a slight margin in the final 100 yards, having his first year of cross country.

The Haskell Indians were likewise undefeated the past season.
