he MetGCSA superintendent's Sherwood A. Moore Award is conferred on professionals who demonstrate above-and-beyond commitment and actions that promote the image and reputation of golf course superintendents. This year's winner, Rockrimmon Superintendent Tony Girardi, has spent a lifetime in the aboveand-beyond realm—and he's still going!

Catching the Bug

A native of Narragansett, RI, Tony spent his high school summers running a successful landscaping business with his brother, Michael. He then enrolled at the University of Rhode Island (URI) as a business major. His plans took a major turn, though, during a summer break.

"Scott Cybulski, a childhood friend and superintendent who was enrolled in URI's turf school, convinced me to work with him one summer on a golf course," Tony recalls. "We signed on with Tim O'Neill at The Country Club of Darien. It was an awesome experience. I guess you could say I caught the bug. Tim was instrumental in kickstarting my golf course career and is still a mentor of mine to this day."

After the summer at Darien, Tony immediately transferred into URI's highly regarded turfgrass program. He completed his B.S. in turfgrass management in 1992, having worked another season with Tim, and then moved across town to take an assistant's job at the Woodway Country Club. He spent the next three years working for then Superintendent Larry Pakkala.

"I lucked out with that first job," Tony says."It was tough work, but I had the good fortune of learning from one of the best. I wouldn't change one thing about my experience as an assistant at Woodway."

In the Spring of 1995, Tony landed his current position as superintendent of Rockrimmon Country Club, succeeding Gregg Stanley. He lives in a lovely home on the club property, which has the unique distinction of having 17 holes in New York and one hole in Connecticut.

"I think that qualifies us as a single, multistate golf course," Tony jokes.

Building Up and Giving Back

During his 27-year tenure at Rockrimmon, Tony has renovated or rebuilt nearly all facets of the golf course. Many of those projects were based on a master plan developed by golf course architect Roger Rulewich. All parts of the course were improved, including multiple green complexes, the reconstruction of every tee complex, the installation of new cart paths, the complete renovation of all bunkers, and the installation of a state-of-the-art Rain Bird irrigation system. Tony is quick to credit the success of these many projects to the tremendous support he has gotten from the membership at Rockrimmon.

"The members here at Rockrimmon have a true passion for their course and put a premium on maintaining the highest quality conditions," Tony says. "My crew and I didn't want to let them down. We have a veteran staff at Rockrimmon. Many have been here since Gregg's days, and worked hard doing most of the construction work

After two years at Rockrimmon, Tony began his long history of giving back to the industry he loves. He joined the MetGCSA Board of Directors and spent 15 years rising through the chairs to become president in 2009 and 2010.

"Being elected as a board member many years ago and then becoming president of our association are among the highlights of my career," Tony says. "It was extremely rewarding. I couldn't be prouder of our association and all we have accomplished together."

In Tony's lengthy tenure on the board, he chaired many committees, including the Tournament, Government Relations, Club Relations, Website, Membership, and Scholarship & Research committees. He also hosted several monthly meetings over the years. And although he enjoyed each committee assignment, Tony is most proud of his role in initiating and developing the Met's first-ever website.

"We started from scratch," he says. "It's been very satisfying to see the website develop into a powerful communication tool for the membership."

During his tenure as president of the Met, Tony was also active in supporting the New

York State Best Management Practices (BMP) initiative. That ground-breaking template was developed to help golf course superintendents in New York fine-tune their operations for environmental compliance in all areas. The popular BMP guidelines are a work in progress that continues to evolve and improve.

A Passion for Lifelong Learning—and Contributing

In addition to his commitments to the MetGCSA, Tony took on a number of other positions to further contribute to the turfgrass industry. He served five years on the Water Wise Council of Westchester County, initiated years ago by Ted Horton. That committee was the driving force behind helping guarantee that the golf courses in Westchester County were allocated the irrigation water so desperately needed through the summer months. Tony has also served for 12 years, and continues to serve, on the Tri-State Research Foundation ris-

ing through the ranks to serve as its president in 2016/17. During his time in that position, important research from Rutgers University, through Dr. Alberecht Koppenhöfer and Dr. Bruce Clarke, helped solve difficult turfgrass problems such as the Annual Bluegrass Weevil and the devastating Anthracnose disease.

Anyone who knows him knows that Tony believes knowledge is power. He will sign up for any educational program that helps to further his knowledge base and promotes the well-being of the industry. For example, when he qualified for the GCSAA certification program, he wasted no time in successfully completing the certification process. He has maintained the Certified Golf Course Superintendent distinction for the past 22 years.

Apparently, the GCSAA certification wasn't enough for Tony, for when he heard of the Master Greenkeeper Certification, given by the British and International Golf Greenkeepers Association (BIGGA), he enrolled right away. The certification pro-

gram in the UK is a challenging, three-phase process. First, the member must have worked in the industry for 10 years—with at least three years spent in the head green-keeper, course manager, or superintendent role—while also earning at least 120-educational credits. Second, the member must pass an eight-section assessment of their golf course by two current Master Greenkeepers, and, third, a grueling two-day, six-hour written exam.

Tony proved up to the challenge. He passed all requirements by April of 2018 and was presented with the highly coveted Master Greenkeeper Certificate at the 2019 BIGGA conference in Harrogate, England. His accomplishment is highlighted by the fact that, at the time, he was just the 74th recipient worldwide of the Master Greenkeeper Certification. And he is the first ever in the New England area to achieve this distinction.

"I had heard of the Master Greenkeeper Program through the years, but it wasn't until I attended the BIGGA Turf Manage-

ment Exhibition (BTME) in 2016 that I became more aware of the certification program and what it entailed," Tony says. Although he claims it was one of the hardest things he's had to earn, he always believed that you are never too old to learn. "I can safely say that I learned a great deal about golf course management from my peers in the UK and Ireland," says Tony. "The Master Greenkeeper process was an invaluable experience that allowed me to grow both personally and professionally." Tony has gone on to attend BIGGA's BTME each of the past six years.

Yet Another Accomplishment: A Well-Balanced Life

Even though Tony is extremely busy with work and related association commitments, he makes sure to carve out plenty of time to spend with his wife of 25 years, Christine (also a Rhode Island native), and their three children: Nicholas, 23; Matthew, 22; and Rebecca, 20. Needless to say, Tony is also an avid golfer, never to miss a chance to play in the two-ball championship and at Met meetings. His favorite hobby is maintaining his impressive 200-gallon saltwater reef aquarium. The beautiful tropical fish are something to behold.

With just one more college student to graduate, Tony and Christine are approaching empty-nester status. That doesn't mean they intend to slow down, though. Tony reports that they'll be spending many summer weekends in Narragansett at their second home.

"Boating, fishing, clamming, and plenty of beach time," Tony says. "Not to mention a career I love. Life is good. I guess you could say I'm glad I caught that bug all those years ago."

Tony will be presented with the Sherwood A. Moore Award at the Winter Seminar on January 12, 2022.



A Tale of Two Properties

Mt. Kisco Country Club opened its doors in 1928 as Lawrence Farms Country Club, complete with tennis facilities, horseback riding, and a lake for swimming. The brainchild of John Lawrence, the complex was built on farmland he purchased from one of the nation's leading industrialist bankers, Moses Taylor. Lawrence enlisted the design prowess of the famous Scottish-born architect Tom Winton who crafted the new Lawrence Farms golf course into 115 acres set in a natural depression between low wooded hills, well-bunkered greens, and a persistent stream in play for 13 holes.

A.W Tillinghast was another renowned architect who made his mark on the land-scape with some maintenance changes in the late 1930s. During WWII, a nearby club, which had opened in 1917 as Mt. Kisco Golf Club, ceased operations, and Lawrence Farms gladly assumed its membership and the Mt. Kisco name—with a slight modification. It became Mt. Kisco Country Club instead of Golf Club. The golf course you see today is the original Tom Winton design with the exception of the 17th green, which has been moved back and to the left behind the creek.

As Nine & Dine contestants saw, Mt. Kisco Country Club is not only aesthetically pleasing, but a challenging course to play. And golf event or not, you can always count on Andrew to have it in championship condition.

The Path to Mt. Kisco

Andrew was born, one of six children, on the west bank of the Hudson River in the quiet town of Marlboro, NY, just north of Newburgh. He was introduced to the game of golf at a young age, playing with his grandfather, John Agnew, who would take Andrew golfing at the nearby Powelton Club every year for his birthday from the time he was 6. A 50-year member of Powelton, John was a skilled golfer, winning the club championship three times in the 1950s and '60s. Andrew grew to love the Powelton Club and admired its immaculate greens and fairways. "Everybody in town considered PC to be the pinnacle of golf in the Mid-Hudson Valley," says Andrew.

Seeing his passion for the club and the game, Andrew's grandfather recommended that he pursue a part-time job during high school at Powelton, working for then Super-intendent Bobby DeMarco, who was highly regarded by club members.

"I'm sure lots of members tried to insert their grandkids into jobs there," says Andrew, "so I was certain Bobby didn't have high expectations for me. But I was determined to impress him with my work ethic and to learn everything I could from him. I still remember the first day on the job. I was like a deer in the headlights, feeling insecure about my ability to do the job without a serious misstep." But it didn't take long for Andrew to earn Bobby's trust and respect and, at the same time, to recognize he'd found his lifelong career.

"The PC quickly became my home away from home," says Andrew, who after spending several summers working under Bobby DeMarco's tutelage, was inspired to head to SUNY Cobleskill to pursue an associate's degree in golf course management. With an A.S. under his belt, Andrew decided to enroll in Penn State University (PSU) to complete his bachelor's in turfgrass management under the late legend Dr. Thomas Watschke. In 2002, while at PSU, and with the recommendation of Bob DeMarco, Andrew interned at Sleepy Hollow Country Club in Scarborough, NY. The club was hosting the U.S. Women's Amateur that year, which proved a great experience for Andrew. "Working with the club's superintendent, Tom Leahy, and then assistants Paul Gursky,



Matt DuTremble, and Doug Vanderlee, I saw the different world of Westchester County turf management," Agnew remarks. "I learned something new every day and loved every minute of it."

And apparently Tom Leahy and staff were pretty taken with him too. While back at PSU for his last semester, Andrew received a call from Tom offering him the opportunity to assume Matt's position, who was moving on to Ardsley Country Club. This proved to be the turning point in Andrew's career. Andrew was like a sponge, absorbing as much information and knowledge as he could. It didn't take long for Tom to recognize Andrew's ability. In 2007, he assigned Andrew the job of renovation liaison, overseeing the restoration work being performed by Gil Hanse & Co.

"I had no experience with construction at that point, but I guess Tom saw something in me that I didn't know I had," says Andrew. "Those years coordinating with Tom, the Gil Hanse team and construction crew, the greens chairmen, and the GM prepared me well for what I'm doing now."

What's Doin' at Mt. Kisco

After 10 years at Sleepy Hollow, Andrew was selected in 2012 for the superintendent's position at Mt. Kisco Country Club. In his nine-year tenure, there has been no shortage of projects, which, at the moment, include finetuning a newly installed irrigation system, continued fairway recontouring work, and cart path construction.

"We've also done drainage work every year since I've been here to correct poorly drained areas, particularly on the fairways, and to replace failed drainage that had been installed on the property long ago," says Andrew. In the works now is a bunker renovation project and tennis bubble construction, followed by the construction of additional equipment storage buildings and paddle courts. Clearly no rest for the weary!

Though Andrew has his hands full on the course, he is grateful to have tenured staff by his side. His assistant, Tom Tooley, recently retired after 41 years at the club, but Andrew has brought in Bob Miller, formerly Golf Club of Purchase, to assist on his management team. In addition, his foreman, Leonel Alvarez, has been on staff for more than 25 years and helped him oversee his 15-person seasonal crew.

Andrew is also grateful to have a strong relationship with longtime Greens Chairman Tom Alfredo, as well as solid support from General Manager Tanya Barshell.

When asked how he likes being the head superintendent at such a historical gem as Mt. Kisco, being an outdoor enthusiast, Andrew remarked, "I'd still rather be outside doing tree work on a 10-degree day in February than in the office answering emails and working on budgets, but I guess that's the price of success!"

Beyond Work

The year 2012 was a big year for Andrew. Not only did he accept his first superintendent's position at Mt. Kisco, he also tied the knot with his wife of nine years, Colleen.

The Agnews live in Danbury, CT, and have three spirited children: Tommy, 8; Claire, 6; and William, 4. While not on the job, Andrew enjoys hunting and fishing with his children and is a big New York Football *GIANTS* fan.
