Much interest is centered about the Gary Commercial club's junket through the steel works, tin plate mills, coke ovens and bridge plant of the city which will take place next Tuesday afternoon. Probably one-fourth of the business men of Gary have never been inside the steel mill gates and not more than a dozen have ever inspected all of the local subsidiary industries of the corporation.

Inspecting the industries of Gary is no walking matter. This trip will be made on a special train of flat cars. To walk through the steel plant alone, which covers nearly 1,000 acres, would take nearly a day and a half. It must be remembered that the mills are now scattered along eight miles of lake coast. From the office of the superintendent of the cement mills at Buffington in the notheast part of Gary, to the office of the superintendent of the coke ovens at the east end of the steel plant, is just eight miles away and the whole intervening territory is now a continuous industrial array where 10,000 men are kept at work.

Aside from its educational value the trip will surely open the eyes of those in attendance because very few realize the scope of the work accomplished.


